Over considerable sections of Canada the sugar beet grows well, and comes either to perfection or very near to it. But the production of the beet root, of good quality too, is not enough. Our winter comes too soon and is too cold for the easy and convenient handling of the beets and for going through with the various processes with the juice. That it a serious hindrance, and it is a permanent one too; it can never be removed. We have heard this story told: That a man who sank thousands trying to make beet sugar in Quebec, without success, afterwards tried the same thing in California, and made

money. California has an open winter Now, if nature has put an interdict against the production of beet sugar in Canada to compete with that from the cane, the last shred of argument found on the idea of protection to native industry. vanishes away, except as regards maple sugar, which does not count for much. The inference from all this is close at hand.

for the reason that we have positively had made better sugar, for better value on the dollar's worth under protection than we had before. But why not admit raw sugar free, leaving the duties on refined sugar in proportion as now? The finance minister will make a popular move when he does this. 
