NOT A DUMPING GROUND

THE UNITED STATES ASCERTAINS THAT IT CANNOT SHIP ITS REJECTED CELESTIALS TO CANADA

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—A new complication has arisen in connection with the Chinese question. It appears that the British government refuses to permit its possessions to be made a dumping ground for the rejected Chinese of the United States, except upon payment by one of the customs officers on the northwestern boundary. He reports to the department that while strenuously endeavoring to carry out the instructions of the famous Chinese circular and to put back upon British soil, Chinese who come into the United States in violation of the provisions of the restriction act, he was met with a Canadian station which required payment to the treasury of the Canadian government of \$30 for each Chinaman as a condition precedent to readmission to British soil. The officer informs that he has no money for such readmissions, and asks the treasury department what he is to do about it. The text of this circular is as follows: "The British government has no objection to the admission of Chinese to its possessions, but it is necessary to decide the fate of two others."
