OLD MARS IS ALL RIGHT

THE GREAT PLANET SEEN THROUGH THE LICK TELESCOPE.

His Mountains and Canals—Venus, Jupiter and Saturn, the Moon, Saturn as the Last of the Planets—Interesting Astronomical Chapter.

Professor Edward F. Holden, director of the Lick Observatory at Mount Hamilton, Cal., takes us on a tour of the New York Herald of Wednesday giving the results of the season's observations through the famous telescope. Considerable interest has been attached to the results of these observations.




