





RAMBLER ABOUT LONGFORD.

STORIES OF ITS EVENTFUL PAST—TIMELY REFLECTIONS.

The World's Commission Continues His Narrative of Ecclesiastical Doings Both Protestant and Catholic, in Lovely Longford, in the Long and Tale and Monastic Ruins—Then and Now.

In continuation of my ecclesiastical article respecting County Longford I will glance at the chief monastic institutions which formerly flourished here and whose ruins are now points of interest for the archaeologist and tourist.

The principal monastic ruins are Leiria, Inchmahon, Ardragh, Abbotstown, Inchoffin, Ardragh, All Saints' Island, Inchoffin and Inchoffin.

There are few places in the County of Longford which possess such interesting ruins of ecclesiastical history as the neighborhood of Granard, in which was erected the great Abbey of Leiria, which bears the name of the parish of Abbeystown. It is told by the ancient annals that one of the first places in Leinster which St. Patrick visited after leaving Tara was Granard, one of the chief seats of the monastic life in the north of Ireland.

Later, in 1205, an abbey of the Cistercian order was founded here by the monks of Leiria, who were expelled from their monastery by Edward Bruce. The monks fled to Athlone and then to Leiria, where they were again expelled in 1297. The ruins are covered with ivy.

The Church on the Lough. On the Island of Inchmahon, in the Lough, as the ruins of an ancient church and monastery of large proportions. No part of the County Longford possesses more romantic scenery. It is recorded that the conversion of the Picts and Scots he retired to Inchmahon, where he spent a long time in prayer and fasting preparatory to his journey to Iona. The Danes plundered and burned the abbey, which was restored and again spoiled in 1543. The ruins are extensive.

The Abbey of Longford. Contemporary with the foundation of the see of Ardragh an abbey was founded in Longford by St. Idus, one of the disciples of St. Patrick.

The foundation of a Dominican abbey in 1460 by O'Farrell, Prince of Annull, is supposed to have been the origin of the town of Longford. In 1469 the monastery was destroyed by fire. The monks were expelled and the site was used for a market and a fair. The ruins are extensive.

The ruins on the Shannon. Next in importance to Longford, as the capital of the county, are the monastic ruins on the Shannon. Those of Inch-Clostran or the Quakers' Island are said to be the finest in the county. There are no less than seven churches here. According to the local historian Farrell the monks were very strict. No woman on any account was allowed inside the walls that enclosed the church. If she came in she was left in one of the churches till she died, and the church was accordingly called "The Dying Church." About 100 yards south is a gate leading to a church which lay outside the precincts. The name of the church is "The Lady's Church." The island is full of bones and skulls.

Inchoffin is an island in Lough Beg, in the Shannon. There are many ruins here, including the remains of a castle and a church. The ruins are extensive.

All Saints' Island, Inch Aughin and other islands have their monastic history and possess ruins of bygone days.

Distant about five miles south of Longford is the cemetery of Abbey Ardragh, in which stand the crumbling ruins of a priory of St. Augustinus.

Then and Now. Next to the ruins in Lough Beg the best preserved of all the county monastic ruins is Abbey Shrale, situated near the River Inny. The original abbey was destroyed by the Danes, who came up the Shannon from Limerick. Its successor continued till the suppression of the monasteries by Queen Elizabeth, who granted it to Sir James Hamilton, Earl of Roscommon, and his heirs male forever.

The Abbey of St. Idus, a commanding position, at its foot the Inny flows down to the sea. The existing ruins show it to have been one of the finest and largest in Leinster.

The Reformers and Ballymacormack Church. In the cemetery of Ballymacormack, distant one mile from the town of Longford, are the remains of an old church which was once a chapel of ease for Longford. The northern, southern and western walls stand in good condition at a height of 16 or 20 feet.

In the middle of the southern wall there is a low-arched doorway and several well-preserved windows of ancient pattern. The church was built in the 12th century by O'Farrell of Longford and existed until the 16th century.

A story told me about this old church was that the Reformers thought to make a church out of the chapel and roofed it for this purpose. The next morning the roof did not again attempt to meddle with Ballymacormack Church.

On the days of the pestilence of 1832 the parish priest of Longford used to go out to the old ruins and say in it, the congregation kneeling away from each other for fear of contagion.

The Protestant Reformation was established in County Longford by Queen Elizabeth, who joined the diocese of Ardragh to that of Kilmore. In 1633 Dr. William Bedell, who had been the first Protestant bishop, resigned, and Dr. John Richardson, a native of Chester in England, and Protestant archbishop of Kerry, was promoted to the see of Ardragh. He died in 1654. The see remained vacant during the Commonwealth. In 1660 the see was restored to those of Ardragh and Kilmore. The present bishop is Dr. Shore. His predecessor, Dr. Darby, was at one time rector of Longford parish and was highly respected, so it was told, by both Catholic and Protestant alike.

Now, nearly all my informants were Roman Catholics. Of present-day Protestants, including Mr. Edward Blake, they had no harsh words as a rule; but when the spirit moved them they became eloquent of the "persecution" of the Puritans.

Formerly they said to me that on the ruins of monasteries and of towers and of the debris of religious bigotry and intolerance are the bones and the skulls of the monks and the schools of Lough Beg.

And so once again I was reminded that there are two sides to every question and that truth lies in a well, and that the well is deep.
