Invading Force is at Verviers, Having Crossed the Meuse South of Vise on Newly-B uilt Bridges, Undeterred by the Fire From the Belgian Guns. Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to The Toronto World. Bazzar at Grimsby LONDON, Aug. 7.-Hugh Martin, The Daily News correspondent, wired Mrs. Burkholder of Hamilton has announced that a bazaar will be held at Grimeby in aid of the hospital-ship fund. from Rotterlam Thursday night: "Speaking to Dutch across the frontier at Rysen this afternoon, Ger-mans declared that the crown prince with \$00,000 men is at Verviers. Six with 800,000 men is at Verviers. Six pontoon bridges were thrown across the Meuse south of Vise yesterday, and by 5 o'clock this morning a large German force had crossed to the left bank un-deterred by the fire of the Belgian guns. The army then began to move south on both sides of the river, blow-ing up a number of steam tramway bridges on the Tongeren-Bilsen Line. An eye-wilness described to me as a mighty spectacle the orderly advance of the German army, which rolled slowly down the slope towards the river, bringing a host of machine guns and motor wagons, cevalry riding thru growing corn. On the Lancers' flags appeared the date 1871. Troops are in gray-green uniforms, magnificently equipped. But a pitiful spectacle was provided by fifteen prisoners, appar-ently farmers, marching with bowed heads and hands bound behind their backs. "Buddenly an aeroplane swooped

Nor are tame animals and birds less guilty in this respect. Healthy birds in an aviary will bully an ailing bird shame-fully. A sickly hen in a poultry yard has a miserable time, and even cats which have been brought up together will "round on" one of their number if it falls sick.

sick. Lovers of pets should therefore be warned in time of this unamiable weak

warned in time of this unamiable weak-ness which is so common in both wild and domestic creatures. Whenever an animal is ill, the first step is to isolate it, not so much for fear of infection as to protect it from the cruel attentions of its fellows, attentions which may cause its death by violence. It will appreciate the value of guiet, cosy guarters, in which it may be safe from nersecution.

quarters, in which it may be safe from persecution. No satisfactory explanation has yet been given to account for this deplorable characteristic in birds and animals. It has been suggested that they are govern-ed by that apparently cruel law, "the susvival of the fittest." More likely is it that instinct guides them in this respect for the good of the race, so that slokly young may not be raced from slokly parents, or maybe a limited food supply renders the removal of the useless desirable. Bentimental lovers of birds and beasts would shut their eyes to these character-istics are only too well marked, both in wild and domestic creatures.
