J. HANNA NAMED HUIT. TT AS MABEE'S SUCCESSOR

Provincial Secretary for Ontario Has the Refusal of Chairmanship of Dominion Railway Board and Will Accept Unless His Work Here Compels Him to Refuse-Hon, L. B. Lucas Will Succeed Mr. Hanna.



Unless Sir James Whitney and his cabinet colleagues can pursuade him to remain, and unless he decides himself that the work he

colleagues can pursuade him to remain, and unless he decides himself that the work he now has in hand is of too great importance to leave, the Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary for Ontario, will accept the position of chairman of the Dominion Railway Commission, in succession to the late Judge J. P. Mabee, which has been offered to him by the Dominion Government. If Mr. Hanna accepts the position he will be succeeded by the Hon. I. B. Lucas.

While no definite statement as to the offer or the decision of Mr. Hanna has been made public, The World understands that Mr. Hanna is very likely to accept the position. A despatch was sent out from Ottawa a few days ago stating that Mr. Hanna's name had been mentioned, along with half a dozen others. When Mr. Hanna was asked about it, he replied that it would be bad grace to accept a position before it was offered. Since that time, however, a definite offer has been made, and Mr. Hanna is now considering it.

Just at present this province can ill-afford to lose the services of Mr. Hanns. His prison reform work at Guelph is the first of its kind in Canada, and the best in the world, according to authorities who have visited the farm since it was established. In addition to that, he has under advisement the question of the complete reorganization of the public institutions of the province, and by the purchase at Whitby of a site for the new asylum, now situated on Queen-street, Toronto, a beginning was made on that work.







The idea of cutting out apartments altogether, on the excuse that some builders have taken advantage of former conditions is unfair, unreasonable and displays the mental capacity, the great thinking power of the members who voted for such a muddleheaded move. If apartments have been built out to the sidewalk line and have obstructed the view of residences on the street, if the buildings are sometimes poorly constructed and are not up to modern practice, then the logical method of dealing with the subject is to make regulations that will see that advantages not taken by the residents are seized by apartment builders and that they be forced to so equip and construct apartments that the health of the occupants will not be endangered. Apartments, moreover, should be

Lat common sense rule in dealing with subjects affecting the housing of the people. With our present congested condition, that cannot be relieved until the council wakes up to the need of working on a big city's basis, apartmet is are absolutely necessary. The space in this city of nearly a haif million people must be conserved. Two and three familles in a house is fin:for the landlord, but we must see that

all our people are properly housed. The city council should reseing that apartment bylaw at once and set to work on regulations that will tend to the improvement of living conditions in apartment houses.

The development of apartments will eventually mean cheaper housing and less doubling up in six and eightroomed dwellings.
