SEVERE FIGHT AT SANTIAGO

General Shafter Admits a Loss of Upwards of Four Hundred in Killed and Wounded.

OUTER WORKS OF THE CITY NOW HELD BY AMERICANS

Battle Lasted From 8 o'Clock in the Morning Till Sundown-Sampson's Fleet Took a Hand and Played an Important Part in the Encounter.

AMERICANS LOST HEAVILY.

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 1.-The War Department has received the following from General Shafter, dated at Siboney: Had a very heavy engagement today which lasted from 8 a.m. until sundown. We have carried their outworks and are now in possession of them. There is now about three-quarters of a mile of open between my lines and the city. By morning my troops will be entrenched and considerable augmentation of forces will be there. General Lawton's division and General Bates' brigade, which have been engaged all day in carrying El Canay, which was accomplished at 4 p.m., will be in line and in front of Santiago during the night. I regret to say that our casualties will be above 400, of these not many killed. [Signed] SHAFER.

NAVAL FIGHT ON SUNDAY

Four American Battleships to Be Sent into Santiago Harbor to Fight Cervera. New York, July 1.-[Special to Toronto World]-A special to The Telegram from Washington, says: The attack on the city of Santiago de Cuba was a very feint, designed to distract the attention of the enemy from the real object of the assault, the fortifications. With Morro Castle and Estrella battery in the possession of the American troops, the harbor was open to the American fleet, and the four battleships will be removed, and the four battle ships, Iowa, Indiana, Massachusetts and Oregon, will be sent into the harbor to give battle to Cervera's fleet. The naval fight will probably occur on Sunday morning, when it is concluded the city, under the guns of the American fleet and attacks on shore by the American troops, will be compelled to surrender.

BRITAIN STRONG AT MANILA

Naval Force Ample to Protect English Interests. London, July 1.-In the House of Commons today Mr. Michael Davitt asked whether article four of the Suez Canal convention stipulated that warships of the British fleet should only remain 24 hours at Port Said; whether the Spanish ships had been there since Sunday and whether Egypt or Great Britain was responsible for this long stay? The Parliamentary Secretary for the Foreign Office, George H. Curzon, in reply, said the provisions of the convention have never been brought into operation, and the question was one, primarily, for the consideration of the Egyptian Government, adding: "There seems to be good reason for the course adopted in the present case."

MANZANILLA BOMBARDED

But a Spanish Account Says Only One Person Was Wounded by the Fire. Madrid, July 1.-The impartial publishes a despatch from Santiago de Cuba, saying that four American warships at 4 o'clock this morning opened fire upon Manzanilla, Province of Pinar del Rio. The despatch adds that the firing, which lasted an hour, was answered by the Spanish gunboats in the harbor, and it is further said the Americans retired with one vessel seriously injured, as she was towed away with her dreds extinguished. Continuing, the despatch to The Impartial asserts that only one Spanish person was wounded during the bombardment. From the same source it is asserted that the Americans used a captive balloon yesterday in taking observations of the fortifications of Santiago de Cuba.

MATTERS IN THE EAST.

Philippine Insurgents Occupy the Whole of the Province of Bulacan-Governor Captured. Hong Kong, July 1.-According to private letters from Cavite, dated June 27, the insurgents occupy the whole of Bulacan Province. Occasional skirmishes occur. The insurgents captured the Spanish ship Bobal in Karabaya Bay while she was loading 500 troops. A stubborn fight ensued, in which the Spanish commander, a lieutenant-colonel, was killed. The insurgents have captured the Governor of Batavia, together with his wife and children. General Aguinaldo placed under arrest the rebel leaders Artachile and Sandico, for having revealed the fact that the steamer Pavia, recently seized by the Hong Kong authorities, was laden with arms for the

DOMINION DAY IN LONDON.

Lord Strathcona, Hon. Edward Blake, Hon. Messrs. Mulock and Dobbell Made Speeches.

London, July 1.-Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal presided this evening at the Dominion Day banquet given at the Imperial Institute. Two hundred and fifty Canadians were present. The guests included the Marquis of Lorne, the Duke of Norfolk, the Earl of Dunraven, Baron Herschell and Sir Charles Tupper.

FELL FROM A WINDOW

Sixteen-Year-Old Boy at Stratford Rolloed Out of His Bed Through a Window and May Die.

Stratford, Ont., July 1.-Charles Lewis, about 16 years of age, son of Wm. Lewis of the American Hotel here, fell from a three-story window last night and sustained serious injuries. It seems that on retiring last night he drew his bed close to the window to get the fresh air. His bed was higher than the window sill, and it is surmised that he rolled out of the window. He was found in an unconscious condition on the sidewalk about 3 o'clock this morning. He was carried to the house and three doctors were hastily summoned. When it was found that his left arm and a number of ribs on his left side were broken, besides some internal injuries. The doctors cannot say yet as to the outcome of the case. Lewis gained consciousness about noon today, and is much better to-night, and hopes are now entertained for his recovery.

BIG FIRE IN ST. THOMAS.

Court House, Jail and County Offices All Destroyed Last Night.

St. Thomas, Ont., July 1.-The Court House, court jail and all the officials' offices were totally destroyed by fire here to-night. The blaze started at 12:15 and was first discovered by Mrs. Robert McLaughlin, who lives opposite the large structure. She ran to the telephone immediately, but was unable to raise the central office, and notification was not received at the fire hall until about 20 minutes later. The flames spread rapidly, and it was only a few minutes before the whole building was a mass of flames. The large dome and flagstaff fell in and carried the roof with it. The law library, which is valued at several thousand dollars, was totally destroyed by fire and water. The governor's residence, which is attached to the back part of the jail, was not seriously damaged. The rear part of the jail, in which the prisoners sleep, is built of solid stone, and at the time of writing it is believed will be saved. Governor Moore says he thinks the fire is of incendiary origin, as there has been no one up in the part where the blaze started for a month.
