TRUBLE AFTER FINE

Thomas Hunter, insurance Agent, is Arrested on a Serious Charge.

WAS THE POLICY A FRAUD?

James C. Harkness Did Not Get the Insurance on a \$1000 Policy and Wants to Know Why.

The Detectives Investigated the Case and Reported That There Was No Such Company as the London Fire Office, Limited, 25 Barton's-Lane, Canning - Street, E.C., London, England, and the Law is Put in Motion Against Agent Hunter-Underwriters Took It Up.

Thomas Hunter of 35 Beaufort-street was placed under arrest yesterday afternoon by Detective Burrows on a charge of obtaining the sum of \$17.50 from James C. Harkness of 130 West King-street by false pretences.

The complaint says that Hunter effected some insurance for him, in a company which really has no existence in fact, and by a similarity in the names of companies he was defrauded.

The story as alleged. The story of the alleged fraud dates back nearly a year. Hunter, it appears, was in the habit of effecting all the insurance for the firm of James Hunter & Company, then at 101 West Adelaide-street. Later, Hunter entered into partnership with James C. Harkness, under the firm name of the Toronto Paper Box Company.

Couther then applied to Hunter for \$1000 insurance in addition to the two policies already placed with the Phoenix of Brooklyn and the Scottish Caledonian Companies.

It is said, found it difficult to place the additional insurance because of the hazardous nature of the business. Arrangements were then made by which the policy would be issued in the United States. Hunter, acting on information contained in a circular sent to him by Frank G. Anthony of Brooklyn, N. Y., wrote a letter asking Anthony to place the insurance with a reliable company.

This was done and the policy was sent on to the Toronto Paper Box Company. The premium paid to Hunter was \$17.50, the specific amount contained in the charge.

A Fire Occurred. Some months ago the firm dissolved partnership, and Harkness company was formed. He removed his factory from Adelaide-street to 130 West King-street, and had the policies transferred. On the morning of the 22nd inst., a fire took place in the building occupied by Harkness and his partner, which was largely damaged by water and smoke. Soon after the fire he wrote to the alleged insurance company to get his loss covered by the policy, and received no answer.

Claimed to be an Agent. The day he was called on Hunter and was told that he only acted as agent in the transaction, and had nothing to do with the payment of the insurance. Mr. Harkness recently paid \$1000 to the Phoenix of New York and called at a broker's office. He was told the firm was in London, and he afterwards returned to Toronto. He afterwards laid the charge.

The Policy a Question. The policy is now in the hands of the Crown and will be put in evidence in the Police Court to-day. It is alleged to have been issued by the London Fire Office, Limited, 25 Barton's Lane, Canning-street, E.C., London, England. The firm name of J. C. Hunter & Co. is also graphed on the policy as being the managers, and E. W. Atkins and Montgomery Blair of New York as directors for the United States.

Two Other Policies. The authorities under other policies made out in favor of Reardon and Anderson, picture frame manufacturers, at 47 West Adelaide-street. It is alleged a policy in a local company, which expired on Jan. 19, 1898. Reardon and Anderson could not get the company to renew the insurance, and Hunter was asked to get the risk. The insurance was issued for \$2000. One half of this was given to the manager of the company, and the other half was placed with the Great British Assurance Company, Limited, London, England, with the office at Chicago, Ill. This policy is signed by Halmer L. Wilcox, director, and countersigned by the Montreal branch of the company. It is now in the possession of the authorities at the Ontario Bank, and is endorsed by Hunter.

What the Detectives Found. Detective Burrows and his assistants have been working on the case for the past week. They state that after making enquiries they found that there were no such companies in existence, and brought the matter to the notice of Crown Attorney Curry, who ordered the information to be laid against Hunter, and the arrest followed.

Hunter Bailed in \$2000. Hunter was obliged to remain in the cells for two hours until bail could be secured. Bonds for \$2000 were furnished by W. J. Sunahan, secretary of the O'Keefe Brewing and Malting Company, and Hunter was released.

Hunter's Side of the Story. Hunter was seen last night at his home. He said he was not surprised at the action taken by the authorities. Last Saturday Mr. E. A. Lilly, manager of the Canadian office of the London Assurance Corporation, the company at Montreal which Hunter represents here, arrived in the city, and asked him if he had issued any of these "American" policies. The whole matter was explained, and Hunter returned east. All this time the Underwriters' Association had the matter under consideration, and had appointed a committee to investigate Mr. Hunter's alleged misdoings.

Underwriters Took It Up. A meeting was called for Monday next, at which Hunter presented a statement of his side of the case. Hunter received a letter from his manager yesterday morning, in which the committee of the underwriters had dropped the matter.

A Criminal Offence. It will be of interest to note that it is a criminal offence for an agent to place insurance with a company not registered in Ontario. Mr. Hunter admits doing this, but says he never knew it was wrong until his manager told him so last Saturday. Mr. E. A. DuVernet has been retained to defend the accused.

THE NEW PARTY IN CANADA

A Writer Describes an Aggressive Political Development in This Dominion.

ARTICLE IN THE NEW YORK SUN

Watchword for This New Party, the Writer Says, is "Canada for Canadians."

From The New York Sun. Montreal, March 3.—As the discussion over the failure of the Joint High Commission to arrive at any settlement proceeds, the more it reveals the growing dissatisfaction with both the old political parties and their leaders. It is impossible to dignify with the title of arguments the in quences which the old party journals are freely throwing at each other, and from which the new generation of Canadians are turning in disgust. The internal and external affairs alike of this country have been brought into such a state of confusion that some issue will have to be found before very long if trouble is not averted. Yet, with all that is facing them, the party leaders have only the old threadbare speeches with which to meet a grave national emergency.

Both the old political parties in Canada are disintegrating. I might go even further, and say that one—the old Tory—is disintegrated; the other—the Liberal—is in process. The younger men of Canada, whose careers have been blocked by the results of Tory rule and subservience to alien influences, are looking about them, and are apparently getting ready to strike out on new lines for themselves and to form a new party whose watchword will be "Canada for Canadians." This was to be expected after the complete failure of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to respond to the high expectations he raised throughout the country during the election campaign of 1896, and the fact that many of them doubted whether the circumstances would permit him to carry out in its integrity the policy which he developed in his numerous and highly applauded speeches, and there was an inclination to be charitable toward his possible shortcomings, but very few were prepared for the almost cynical abandonment by him of all efforts to speed through the House in Canada the Joint High Commission has left it.

FATHER GEOGHEGAN'S FATE

Now Lies in a Sealed Envelope and Awaits Bishop DuMoulin's Return on Wednesday.

SPECULATION AS TO THE VERDICT

It Does Not Matter What the Court Does, the Congregation Will Stick to Him.

Hamilton, March 3.—(Special.)—The synod judges climbed down from their benches this afternoon, their sealed verdict in the case of the Rev. Father Geoghegan on Wednesday, and then returned home.

Little New Evidence. There were two chief witnesses to-day—the boarding house lady and the Buffalo clubby. The former stated very little new evidence, and the clubby, although called as a witness by the prosecution, failed to identify Miss Hore.

The Judges Get to Work. After this the judges excluded Canon Bland and Forester, and writing up the twenty-seven foolscap pages of evidence, began to tell it down. It took two hours, and when finished looked like an arithmetic sum, with the pros and cons arranged side by side, as in a ledger.

Number of Leagues. The result on paper will be zealously guarded until Bishop DuMoulin breaks the seal on Wednesday, but it hasn't prevented a number of leagues already. From these it is safe to say that the court, while it will not bring a straight verdict of guilt, is in favor of at least temporary suspension.

Degrees of Punishment. The three degrees of punishment which Bishop DuMoulin has within his power to inflict are: unfrocking suspension and rebuke, and, from statements made by the court, it will be the middle course that will be pursued.

Father Geoghegan is Happy. Father Geoghegan has recovered his high spirits without a scratch, but, if the synod court should happen to go against him, the congregation will stick to him to a man, and will not be deterred by any of the charges which have been made against him.

JOHN DOLL GETS EVEN

A Belief That Italy's Move in China is Backed by Great Britain.

AND THE OPEN DOOR POLICY

Is to be Supplanted by a Policy of Partition, or "Spheres of Influence."

One Diplomatic Agent Said to Have Suggested International Control of China—Italian Government Acknowledges That Steps Have Been Taken to Secure a Share of Influence in China, and Says Other Interested Powers Are Agreeable.

Pekin, March 3.—The demand of the Italian Government upon the Government of China for a lease of San-Mun Bay as a coaling station and naval base on the same conditions as those under which Germany holds Kiao-Chow Bay, including a demand upon the part of Italy for the concession of three islands off the coast of the Province of Che-Kiang, with the right to construct a railroad from San-Mun Bay to Po-Yang Lake, and preferential mining and railroad rights within a sphere of influence covering the southern two-thirds of Che-Kiang Province, has caused great excitement here, not only among the Chinese, but also among the diplomats. The Chinese are firmly convinced that Great Britain is chiefly responsible for the Italian abandonment of the "open door" policy. The diplomats openly say that the new development is the beginning of a policy of partition upon the part of the powers, the agent of a great power, during a conversation, is said to have suggested that the moment a question is asked of international control of China, and it was added that if the policy of the "spheres of influence" should be really inaugurated, the United States would be expected to have a say in the matter; and he further said that there were indications that America would likely to prefer the Province of Pe-Chi-Li.

Contra the Report. Rome, March 3.—In the Chamber of Deputies to-day, Admiral De Canavero, Minister of Marine, replied to a question on the subject, confirmed the report that the Government is taking steps at Peking to secure a lease of San-Mun Bay, Province of Che-Kiang, China, and has given notice of its intention to the other nations interested in China, all of which, he said, were friendly to the Government's project.

London Will Know Where to Place the Blame for Any Outbreak. London, March 3.—The papers to-day are showing uneasiness at threats of certain French papers that if the Queen visits Peking at this time, she will be the victim of outrages. The Times says that if any unfortunate incidents occur, England will know where to place the blame.

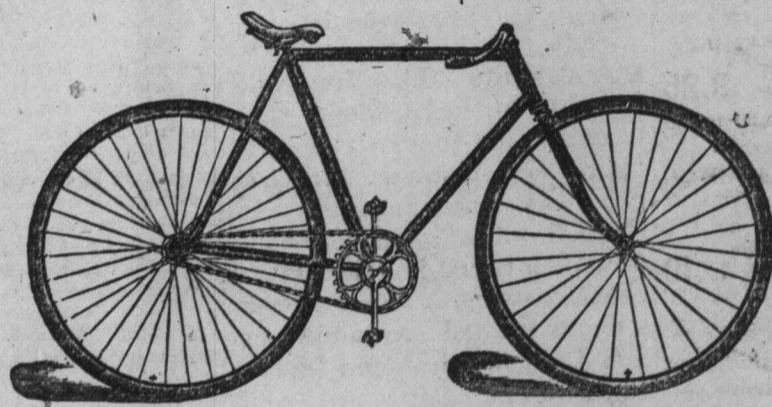
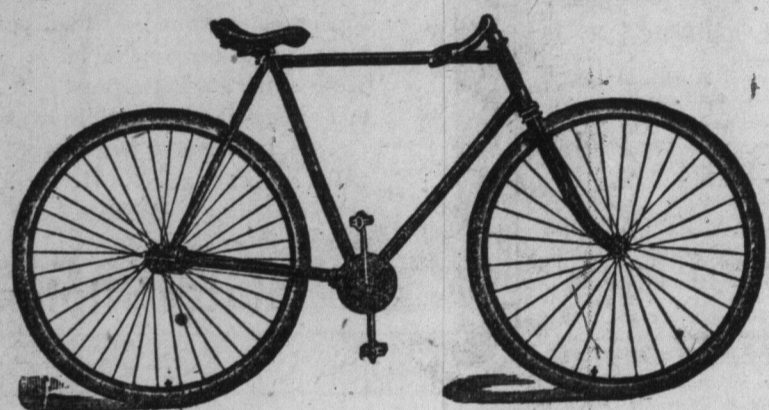

PROGRAM FOR THE HORSE SHOW.

Entries Close With Secretary Wade on March 25--Classes for Then All

Entries for the fifth Canadian Horse Show close Wednesday, March 23, and should be addressed to Henry Wade, secretary, Parliament Buildings, Toronto. In the breeding classes no horse will be allowed to compete in more than one class or section, except when competing for sweepstakes prizes. This restriction does not apply to other classes. The program:

Thoroughbred Stallions—Four years old and up, 3 years old and up, 2 years old and up, stallion calculated to improve breed of the race.

Special Class for Half-Breds—Three years old: CARRIAGE OR COACH STALLIONS (16 hands)—Four years old and up, up to 3 years old; Standard-Bred Roadster Stallions—Four years old and up, 3 years old and up, 2 years old and up (over 15 hands 2 inches), up to 3 years.

Hackney Stallions—Four years old and up (over 15 hands 2 inches), up to 3 years; Hackney Stallions and Mares—Mares up to 3 years, high-stepper mare or gelding (not under 15 hands); sweepstakes, stallion any age; sweepstakes, mare any age; sweepstakes, mare or gelding by an imported sire and out of an imported dam; sweepstakes, stallion or entire, by an imported sire and out of an imported dam.

Shire Stallions and Mares (pedigree required in Canadian Book)—Stallions 3 years old and up, shire mare, any age; Clydesdale Stallions (pedigree required in Canadian Stud Book)—Four years old and up, 3 years old, 2 years old, 1 year old; Hackney Stallions and Mares—Mares up to 3 years, high-stepper mare or gelding (not under 15 hands 2 inches); mare or gelding (over 15 hands 2 inches); mare or gelding (not under 15 hands 2 inches); wheeler to be over 15 hands.

Four-in-Hands—Team (not under 15 hands) Saddle Horses—Saddle horse, mare or gelding (15 hands and over); mare or gelding (over 14 hands 2 inches and not exceeding 15 hands 2 inches); mare or gelding (over 15 hands 2 inches); lady's saddle horse (not under 14 hands 2 inches); hunters and jumpers—Qualified hunters (heavyweight), up to carrying 180 lbs.; qualified hunters (lightweight), up to carrying 150 lbs.; green hunters (heavyweight), up to carrying 180 lbs.; green hunters (lightweight), up to carrying 150 lbs.; jumping, open to all; for the best performance over six jumps; Conformation classes, open to hunters, horses must be ridden by members of some recognized hunt; special prize for some recognized hunt; members of some recognized hunt.

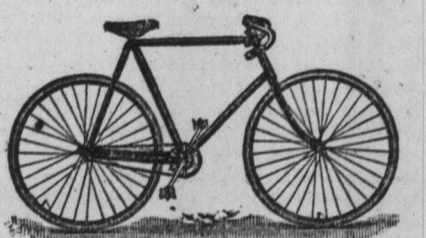

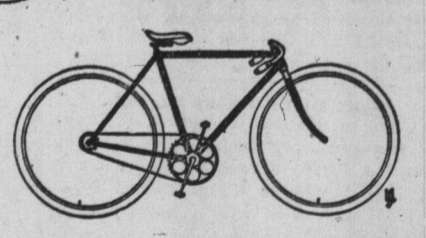

A Remarkable Old Lady of Irish Nativity Has Just Died at Omence, Ont.

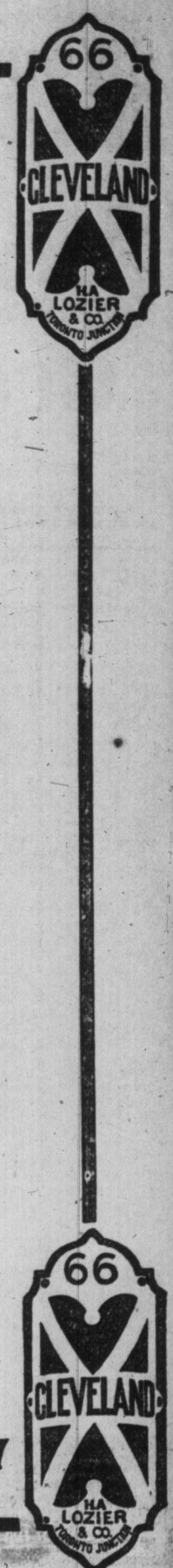
