A BAD ONE FOR SIR WILFRID

Winnipeg Labor Party Calls the Premier Down for Leaving Winnipeg Vacant

THEY WANT A WRIT ISSUED NOW.

Said to Be a Corner in Apples in Manitoba—The Fight in Kildonan.

Winnipeg, Sept. 29.—(Special.)—The Labor party has passed the following resolutions: "Resolved, that this party protest against the action of the Government in having failed to call for the election of a member to represent this city in the Dominion Parliament during the last eight months.

"That we regard it as aagrant imposition on the rights of this constituency, as well as a breach of plain duty, and in avowed opposition to the principles of government.

Resolved, also, that we declare our unqualified disapproval of the manner of disfranchising a constituency in this manner, for an indefinite time, to suit mere party exigencies.

Resolved, also, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Premier Laurier requesting that a writ be issued forthwith for the election of a representative for this city."

What Fisher Does Not Know. Hon. Sydney Fisher passed through the city today en route for the Dominion election matters, when asked, Mr. Fisher said: "I am in time of peace prepare for war, and Sir Charles is welcome to do his preparing."

"When will there be an election in Winnipeg?" asked the reporter. "I do not think any of the bye-elections will take place before a month."

Mr. Fisher had hoped that Mr. Sifton would be able to accompany him, but matters in his department detained the Minister of the Interior in the East, and might detain him for two or three weeks. Mr. Fisher has not been in the West since his tour with Sir Wilfrid in 1890, and he intends to look over the country pretty carefully. He will address several meetings in Manitoba on farm subjects on his return.

The Fight in Kildonan. D. F. Reid will contest Kildonan and St. Andrew's in the Liberal interest. Mr. Black, previously nominated, was shelved at the second convention.

A Corner in Apples. It is rumored in the trade that one commission house in the city has secured a corner on apples. The firm has, it is said, already disposed of 5000 barrels at a heavy profit in advance of the last year, and the price is likely to go up still further.

The Douks May Eat Meats. The Doukhobors intend holding a conference to discuss the advisability of eating meats in the winter season.

WILL THEY AMALGAMATE?

A Movement is on Foot to Join the Toronto and Standard Mining Exchanges.

Mining brokers are talking of the advisability of amalgamating the Toronto Mining and Industrial Exchange (mining section of the Board of Trade), and the Standard Mining Exchange. It is thought by many that it would be in the interest of the mining business to have only one set of quotations issued from Toronto, as at present the variations of prices on the two exchanges is very confusing to the public.

Statements From Golden Star. Following the plan of the Mikado management the Golden Star will on Monday next give out a statement outlining the future policy of the company and will on Oct. 10 issue a financial statement, showing the receipts and expenditures since July 1.

English Deal a Success. D. F. Maguire & Co. have a letter from the American-Canadian Company (Alice A.) stating that Col. Hillier had written under date of Sept. 27 that the English deal would be a complete success and that work on the property is progressing rapidly. This will be good news for the entire share-holders, who have been anxiously awaiting further information respecting the progress of the deal.

Nothing Done Again. A convocation meeting of graduates of the Toronto University was held last night in the Biological Building. Very few persons were present. The purpose of the meeting was a plea on the part of the graduates to retain residence.

The matter was discussed, but nothing done.

THE FOREST CITY

Increase of 327 in Population for the Past Year—Increase in Property Assessment.

London, Ont., Sept. 29.—The Assessment Commissioners have just completed their report. The population is 28,902, being an increase for the year of 327. The total assessment for real estate is \$15,077,229.72 and machinery \$304,800, an increase of \$546,011.72 over last year. On both personal property and income there is a marked decrease, owing to the loss on the assessed property of loan companies, banks and the Street Railway Company. The total for personal property this year is \$1,656,829 for income \$946,612. The total assessment shows a shortage of \$297,957.23 as compared with last year.

New York, Sept. 29.—Day and night for three weeks a strange man dogged the steps of George W. Haas. Haas is an employe of the New York Steam Heating Company, and lives at No. 342 East Ninth-street. So persistent did the stranger become that Haas appealed to the protection of a policeman Wednesday night, and had the man locked up on a charge of disorderly conduct. He gave his name as Henry Dougherty, and yesterday in Centre-street Police Court told Magistrate Zeller that he had been employed by a private detective agency to follow Haas.



FIGHTING IN VENEZUELA.

The Encounters Between Government and Rebel Troops Resulted in a Defeat of the Former. Washington, Sept. 29.—The State Department has received a despatch from the U.S. Consul at Puerto Cabello, Venezuela, under date of the 13th inst., in which he gives a summary of the several encounters between the Government and the rebel forces in the country.

The first encounter between the forces of the rebel general, Castro, and those of the Venezuelan Government occurred near the city of San Cristobal, near the Colombian boundary line. The Government forces engaged consisted of between four and five hundred men under the command of Gen. Leopoldo Sarria. The rebel force was considerably larger, but the actual number is not known. The rebels defeated the Government troops and captured their leader, Gen. Sarria.

The second battle was in San Cristobal. The one thousand troops of the Government, commanded by General Penabaz, engaged 2000 rebel troops, commanded by Gen. Castro, eight or nine days, resulting in Gen. Castro withdrawing his men, he having learned that Gen. Fernandez was on his way there with about 7000 troops of the Government.

The Battle of Isandula.

It was on the 22nd of Jan. 1879, that one of the saddest disasters on record befell the British forces under the command of General Lord Chelmsford, at Isandula, in South Africa. On that morning Lord Chelmsford marched off at dawn from the camp at Isandula in the enemy's country in order to reconnoitre the Zulu strongholds in the Ntabelazi Mountains, leaving the camp in charge of the 1st Battalion of the 24th Regiment, which was commanded by Lieut.-Colonel Bullen, who received strict but indistinct instructions to defend the camp. Colonel Bullen, who was at Rorke's Drift, was ordered to join Colonel Bullen, and at about 10 in the morning he arrived at Isandula with a party of 250 mounted natives and a rocket battery and assumed the command. The total number in camp now amounted to about 700 white and 800 natives. Early in the morning large bodies of Zulus had been seen on the tops of distant hills; various reports came in at intervals, and by the time Colonel Bullen arrived it was stated that the enemy were retiring in all directions. Durand therefore requested Bullen to let him have two companies of the 24th, but to this he objected on the ground that his instructions were "to defend the camp."

Durand left without any detachment of the 24th, and proceeded for about five miles towards the hills, where he discovered a Zulu regiment and fired upon them. It was not intended by the Zulus to attack until the morning. Durand's action was a fatal one, for the British were not in a position to resist an attack at the time the hostilities commenced. But the storm was raised, and sweeping down upon Durand and his men came the enemy in swarms like bees. When Bullen saw the extreme peril of Durand he ordered out the infantry and upon them on all sides, the Zulu force numbering from 20,000 to 25,000. If distinct instructions had been given, and Durand had stuck by the camp and the wagons been properly packed—in short, had there not been a series of terrible misunderstandings throughout, the catastrophe might have been avoided. As it was, the Zulus extended their flanks for three miles on each side and gradually closed in upon men, who stood back to back and fired until the guns they held blistered their hands. Some who were near the sprouts dipped their rifles into the water to cool them. They had 70 rounds of ammunition each man; as long as they lasted they kept the Zulus at bay. The enemy fell by hundreds at every volley, but still came on like waves succeeding waves, and dashed against the few white troops as the breaking of the sea against a rock. Then, when the ammunition was exhausted, came the last order, "Fire bayonets, men, and die like English soldiers." Fearful was that struggle,

gallantly they fought, as only British soldiers can fight, and nobly they die. But it was a massacre—the most ghastly that had ever happened; the Zulus bore down upon our men by thousands, and with the assault completely overwhelmed and slaughtered them where they stood, with the exception of a few mounted men, who managed to escape and swim the river.

And so perish nearly 1000 of our brave British soldiers and over 500 of our native allies.

Denver, Col., Sept. 29.—Tommy Ryan is ill in this city, and he announced today that he would be unable to fight Joe Choynick and Jack Root in Chicago next week. He has also cancelled his match with Jack McDonough for Friday night in this city. All other contests announced by the Colorado Athletic Club have been called off.

A Permanent Knock Out.

Grass Valley, Cal., Sept. 29.—As a result of a prizefight here last night between Jim Pendegast of Sacramento and Charles Hoskins of this place, the latter is dead. Hoskins was knocked out in the tenth round, and although the physicians worked on him all night, they could not save him. The referee, Pendegast, and all the seconds were placed under arrest.

IN DEADWOOD CAMP, B.C.

World Man Pays a Visit to the Morrison and the Mother Lode Properties There.

VERY EXTENSIVE BODIES OF ORE.

Morrison Tunnel Cuts Through 77 Feet in Three Leads and Has Another - Mother Lode, Sunset, Buckhorn, Etc.

Pacific Mining Letter No. 16-Relating to Deadwood Camp.

Greenwood, B.C., Sept. 16.-One of the several aggregations of mineral localities in the Boundary Creek district which lie nearest Greenwood is known as Deadwood camp. It is situated two or three miles west of the town, and is reached by a good wagon road.

I have to-day paid a visit to the Mother Lode, Sunset and Morrison properties, and the latter of these I will first take up.

Owing to the fact that Morrison stock is held largely in the east the property is one of the best known to World readers. It consists of a full claim of 62 acres, to which the owners have a Crown grant title. The Morrison is situated in a good known as the south section of the camp, and a good wagon road connects it with Greenwood.

Four Leads Opened Up. Good camp buildings, including sleeping and dining cabins and smart house, have been built on the property and the plant consists of a 40-horsepower boiler and a hand drill run by steam.

Three Shafts and a Tunnel. On leaving shaft No. 1 the management followed the lead some 300 feet to the northeast and there started a second shaft. The lead at this point showed a great surface width, and the shaft which was started on the hanging wall continued in line to the 100-foot level, where the working cut through the foot wall and the dip of the vein took it out of the shaft.

Having thus found two parallel veins of considerable proportions, Mr. Peterson began his tunnel at the base of the hill with an idea of getting both sides of the deposit to 200 to 300 feet. This tunnel proved the making of the property for it brought to light a third and fourth ore body, of which the company had not known before, the outcrop being covered by surface wash.

Within 65 feet from its mouth this tunnel intersected the first previously undiscovered ledge. From this point the tunnel was continued for nearly 250 feet through a body of quartzite or crystallized lime, and then the second new ledge was come upon. This deposit proved to be 5 feet in width and the management drifted upon it for 25 feet in ore all the way.

On the other side of this second ledge a tunnel was run for 122 feet in diorite, and then struck the foot wall on the big ledge originally opened up by the 100-foot shaft from the surface. The foot wall of this deposit carries upon it several inches of soft talc. Through this ore body the big tunnel was pushed forward for nearly 60 feet before crystallized lime was again met with.

From this tunnel an upraise of 68 feet has been made through the 60-foot ore body to connect with the bottom of the 100-foot shaft before described.

The tunnel here will be driven about 200 feet further in order to catch the fourth lead further up the hill, the outcrop of

which was test pitted to the depth of 12 feet as before indicated.

In this main tunnel the company has a total width of 77 feet of ore, and when the fourth lead is reached this should be increased to 82 feet.

The company has now about a hundred tons of shipping ore on its dump, and it is now blocking out portions of its deposits with a view to being ready to stop it against the completion of the railway connections with the smelter.

As to the names on the Morrison it may be said that much of the vein matter is low grade, and that high grade ore is found in chutes or bunches. Some of the ore is said to run as high as 10 or 15 per cent. in copper.

However, the question of average ore values from the property will soon be settled for in a short time the ore will find its way to the smelter. It may be remarked in conclusion that the ore contains an excess of iron over siliceous and is very desirable as a flux for the copper ores of the neighboring camps. I am informed that the Morrison property has been offered to purchase the dump as it lies.

The Mother Lode property, which is located in Deadwood camp, was one of the first staked out in the belt, and it is also one of the most famous in the district. It lies within three or four miles of Greenwood, being connected therewith by a wagon road and the C.P.R. is already indicated in this letter, is building a spur road up to within a few feet of the collar of the Morrison shaft.

The claim was bonded in 1896 by Messrs. F. L. Underwood, James S. Kitchener and Col. John W. Wood of New York, and in March, last year, these gentlemen formed the British Columbia Copper Company. These same parties, by the way, are behind the enterprise which Mr. Paul Johnson has under control in the town.

The Mother Lode is equipped with good buildings, two 60-horsepower boilers, a 20-hp. steam engine and a full complement of other machinery.

The ore deposit which the company is

The parade was one hour and fifteen minutes in making its way. The vessels moved at about eight knots an hour.

New York, Sept. 29.—The betting on the America's Cup races has taken a turn. For some time there has been little disposition to place a wager on either of the Columbia yachts.

There has been quite a lot of Shamrock money about, but the Englishmen have been holding off for better odds. They claim that the Columbia yachts will not be able to make the water.

After the water was pumped out of the big dry dock, the Navy today is to compare her with the challenger.

The Shamrock's underbody is practically finished, so far as washing is concerned. When the Shamrock is ready to go to sea, everyone was of the opinion that the underbody was polished off. It was seen that the hull was covered with a coating of red anti-corrosive paint.

The work of polishing the Columbia's hull will take at least another day.

O'Brien Whipped Kearns. New York, Sept. 29.—Jack O'Brien of this city whipped Jim Kearns of Boston in a contest of insensibility at the New Broadway A.C. tonight. The men met for a 25-round bout at 100 pounds, but Kearns received his quills in the 10th round, after having had all the sunset of the American pugilist's gloating. O'Brien put all over him in the last six rounds, and punished him unmercifully. O'Brien frequently had his opponent in a groggy condition. He was on the verge of collapse half a dozen times. It was the final round Kearns was so badly beaten that he dropped his guard, and O'Brien swung his right to the mark. Kearns dropped helplessly, and it was five or ten minutes before he regained consciousness.

O'Brien is now in Berlin to go with Frank Erne of Buffalo for the lightweight championship of the world. A match will soon be arranged between them, and it is probably to take place at the Lenox Club.
