LARGEST CLOCKS IN NEW YORK NOW

Big Ben" of London Overoped by the Gigantic Timeece in Metropolitan Tower Its Dials Are to be 27

around from left to right with such rapidity that the eye could scarcely follow it.

The Hall of Records has one of the most expensive clock movements in the country. The diameter of the dial is four feet, and that is so far above the street that a glass is necessary to distinguish the time of day from City Hall Park. The cost was about \$35,000. The movement is what is known as a master, and controls all the clocks in the several departments in the building. It stopped one day a year ago at 4 e'clock in the afternoon, and the clerks in the registrar's office worked eleven minutes overtime before they realized they had been cheated.

Cooper Union has the best timekeeper in New York. It operates a system in the different offices in the building and does not vary twenty seconds in a month.

The Lackawanna Railroad has a self-winding clock in its Hoboken terminal, with a dial diameter of twelve feet. It is regarded as one of the most perfect pieces of clock work of its kind in America.





Captain R. E. McKiel Who Died at Victoria Had Sailed the Pacific Over Twenty Years.

(Victoria Colonist.)

The passing of Capt. R. E. McKiel yesterday morning removes one of the best known of the former scaling captains of Victoria. Capt. McKiel, who had been lying ill for some months at his residence at 709 Craigflower road, followed the scaling business from the time he brought the scaling schooner, Mary Taylor from the Atlantic coast to join the Bering Sca fleet in 1886, until he was recently appointed pilot for the newformed Clay-equot company. It was expected that the operation of the mills at Mosquito harbor would result in bringing many ships to Clayoquot Sound, but during the year the late Capt. McKiel had but one steamer, the Earl of Douglas, which took lumber from Clayoquot.

In 1890 Captain McKiel took the E. B. Martin and after a cruise in Bering Sea on that vessel, went to Halifax to bring out the schooner Maud S., in which he was engaged in Bering Sea and off Copper Islands until 1893.
