

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



DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

The Directors would call attention to the Superintendent's Report, which gives interesting information concerning the School, and to the Treasurer's Report which gives a clear idea of the several items of income and expenditure.

This is the first time for a while past in which the total expenses of the year have been set forth in the Financial Statement and the large amount paid out namely \$5575.00, indicates the cost of the Institution and shows the wisdom of a remark made by a member of the City Council, "that it was much cheaper for the City to supplement private charity than to undertake to run a reformitory of its own."

An increase in the contributions for 1894 is urgently needed in view of the several sources of revenue that for the present will not yield anything. No boys are now employed in the Shovel Factory and competition keeps down the returns from the sale of Kindling Wood, then the Cottage was found to be in need of extensive repairs and some \$650 at least will be required for that purpose which will have to be borrowed and gradually paid off as the rent comes in.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Board of Directors of the Protestant Industrial School:

Gentlemen :--

In submitting my report of another year's work in connection with the several departments under my supervision, I am glad to be able to state that the year has been on the whole, a comparatively successful one. Fourteen boys left the School during the last twelve months, four of whom were committed as truants. The balance are all in Situations were obtained for some of them good positions. on the expiration of their term and good references were given to others whereby they were enabled to obtain situations for themselves. They are at present engaged as follows: One learning Printing, one in Office of Wholesale Druggist, two learning to be Carpenters, one learning Mason Work, one Cutter at Taylor's Shoe Factory, two are in private Hotels, one in Shoe Factory at School, as Superintendent's Assistant, one Boy who met with a painful accident to his left hand in the Shoe Factory is being educated at Whiston's Business College at the expense of the Directors of this Institution, One, Charles Neal, we regret to have to record was drowned at Chocolate Lake while skating the week before Christmas. He was one of our brightest and best and is greatly missed and sincerely mourned at the School.

We began the year with 41 boys on register and the number of inmates at close of Dec., 1893 was 34.

The boys employed in the several departments are as follows: In Shoe Factory, 11 in bottoming and lasting

room and 5 in cutting room, 14 in kindling wood department and farm, 3 house boys and one engine driver.

The boys in the Shoe Factory are kept profitably employed with skilled workmen to instruct them. This department of our work is under the management of Mr. C. Downie who thoroughly understands all the details of the business and whose object is to train each boy so completely in some branch of the trade that he will be able to obtain employment as a skilled laborer and begin life under favorable conditions for earning an honest living. Owing to the wetness of the season the value of the crops raised on the School Farm is not equal to the previous year. The aggregate value is \$393.66.

I am much pleased to report that the general health of the Boys has been exceedingly good. No contageous disease visited us and no accident of any seriousness occured, save the one already referred to at Chocolate Lake, for which of course the School was in no way responsible.

As heretofore the boys attend one of the Protestant Churches once each Sabbath, and each afternoon Sunday School is held at which the International series of lessons is studied. I am thankful to report that I now have the valuable assistance of Mr. W. Robertson, junior, in conducting the exercises of the Sunday School.

Attention is given during the summer months to the recreation of the boys in out-door games. In winter and on wet evenings the reading room is available and is much used. The conduct of the boys during the year has been all that could be expected.

Mr. Kennedy our painstaking School Teacher wishes me to report that in the school room the attention to lessons has been good and no better years work has been done during his acquaintance with the School. Several boys show a commendable desire to obtain the rudiments of an English education before their term expires.

In looking back over the year, while Mrs. Norman and myself have met with some disappointments and discouragements yet there have also been many things to stimulate and cheer. Although the year was not all sunshine yet the bright days far outnumbered the dark and we can heartily thank God and take courage.

We wish to express our thanks to the Chairman and Board of Directors for the ready and earnest attention given to the wants of the School and also for their unvarying kindness to and sympathy with ourselves personally.
