ROBERTSON MOTHERLAND TO CARE FOR CANADIAN GRAVES

Ottawa, March 9—The motherland is providing for the burial in single graves of all her overseas sons who die in Great Britain. The land required is being acquired and it will be held in perpetuity at the cost of the imperial army funds. All possible care will be taken of the graves. All expenses of burial and of the future care of these silent witnesses to the loyalty, heroism and devotion of the empire's sons who die from wounds or sickness in the motherland, will be borne by the people of Great Britain.

In a despatch from London received by the Canadian government announcing the above, it is stated that the British government is confident that it will be the unanimous wish of everyone in the United Kingdom that the British people should be privileged to undertake this charge and insure in this way that the last resting places of the dominion soldiers be not unworthy of their services and of the cause for which they have given their lives.



All controversy does not hinge on whether the war is going to continue to that end, but whether it is being carried on in the most effective manner. All Russia's domestic difficulties turn on that question.

"The Russians are confronted with peculiar and special difficulties. Cut off from their western allies by the blockade of the Central powers, they are almost entirely dependent on their own resources, which are enormous potentially, and quite inexhaustible, but which have not been developed so highly as those of Britain and France. Russia also has little access to foreign supplies. With her it isn't the will to win nor the strength, but how to get her full weight on the oars.

Washington, Mar. 10—Daniel Willard, president of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, will be made permanent chairman of the Advisory Commission to the Council of National Defense. In this capacity he will have general supervision over the activities of this commis sion of seven business and professional men, recently created to mobilize the inmen, recently created to mobilize the industrial resources of the nation in preparation for war in active co-operation with the council composed of six cabinet members, including the secretaries of war, the navy, interior, agriculture, commerce and labor.

GERMANS LOST HEAVILY IN RETREAT

British Headquarters in France, March 9, via London—Blizzard conditions have prevailed on the western front for two days, holding the military operations within a very small compass. Coming after a ten days' thaw and the apparent approach of an early spring, the renewed cold has been keenly felt. Howling March gales, accompanied by heavy falls of snow, have interfered with nearly every phase of modern war activity, except the persistent roar of the British guns, which fire continuously, day and night, and regardless of weather, husling death, destruction and confusion behind the enemy's lines.

They "search out" roads, pound communication lines to cut off supplies, way attention" to places where reliefs are likely to take place, and otherwise harrass the Germans with scarcely a moment's respite. It is increasingly evident that carrying out their retirement in the Arras and Somme Areas, the Germans sacrificed a large number of their very best soldiers. Carefully selected from various regiments they were given certain posts with instructions to hold them against all odds, a majority of them having no idea whatever that they were fighting a rear guard action. Prisoners taken represent the highest type of the German army.

London, March 10—It is announced that the minister of munitions, by arrangement with the minister of agriculture and the food controller, is assuming control of all fats, oils and oil seed and their products, including oil cake, soap and margarine. For this purpose a new branch of the ministry of munitions has been organized under Alfred Bigland, memmer of parliament, who for a year has had charge of the work of the ministry of multions in the matter ministry of muitions in the matter of oils and facts required for extracting glycerine for use in the manufacture of explosives.

London, March 9—The Russian

government has called a special con-terence to meet immediately to deal with the food problem in Petrograd, which is said to be extremely urgent, which is said to be extremely urgent, according to a Reuter's despatch from the Russian capital.

The members of the conference will include the premier, the minismerce and agriculture, the mayor of Petrograd and representatives of the Duma, the council of the empire and

the Zemstvo assemblies. London, March 9-"Thus far only fragmentary reports of the remarkable de-bate in the Prussian Diet on the food crisis have been printed in the German newspapers," says a despatch from Reu-ter's Amsterdam correspondent. The situation is much more serious than has been admitted. The number of suicides is increasing, and parents are killing their children owing to their inability to obtain food for them. Yet the price of potatoes, which long ago became generally scarce, is to be increased."

ARABS HELP IN CONQUEST ON TIGRIS

New York, March 9—The Associated Press tonight sends out the following:
"The British advance in Mesopotamia, which has covered more ground in a
short period than almost any other movement of the war, has been assisted materially by extensive defections of the native tribes from Turkish rule, according
to private mail advices received in New York from Asiatic Turkey. Last
month the Turks apparently were entrenched securely on the Tigris below Kutel-Amara, where they had held the British since the capture of General Townshend's army at Kut.

The new offensive on the Tigris has developed with such speed that since the

The new offensive on the Tigris has developed with such speed that since the recapture of Kut, on February 26, the British have advanced nearly 100 miles, and are now within a few miles of Bagdad. This has been made possible, it is now reported, by the fact that the Turkish troops are menaced not only by the British but by strong forces of Arabs, organized by the British as their allies, who are harrassing the fleeing Turks.

The collision occurred off the Isle of Wight on Feb. 21. The escort's searchlight could not penetrate the fog, but the survivors were rescued by passing vessels. Twelve European officers and 191 natives were saved. Ten Europeans and 616 natives were lost. Difficulty in obtaining authentic information caused the delay in making the announcement public."

The Mendi was a British steamer of 4,230 tons gross, built in Glasgow in 1905, and owned by the British and African Steam Navigation Company, Limited, of Liverpool (the Elder, Dempster Company.) The last entry in shipping records regarding her movements was on Dec. 27 last, when she was reported arriving at Port Natal from Dar-Es-Halaam.

BUY ENTIRE

WHEAT CROP Ottawa, March 9—The British government is negotiating for the purchase of the entire 1917 wheat crop of Canada, it was announced here tonight.

Ottawa, March 9—(Special)—The government, acting in co-operation with the imperial authorities, has under consideration some radical measures for conserving and marketing Canada's western wheat crop next autumn. While nothing definite has been decided upon as yet and all official information is for the present nationally withheld, it has leaked out that private conferences have been held with representatives of the Grain Growers' Association relative to a scheme for fixing prices for wheat delivered at the head of the lakes.

The prices, it is understood, would be fixed by the imperial government, acting for the-Allies, who would practically control the whole wheat market, being themselves the world's largest customers and, with the exception of the Argentine and the United States, in possession of the exporting producing areas.



The Nipigon is 40 miles long, with nu-merous lake expansions and surging rapids; its width, 800 to 400 feet; water of the purest, clearest kind, and of the coldest temperature; there are nine por-tages on it, the two longest being two and one half miles, and one and one-half miles—the rest are short; it is near these portages the best fishing is to be had.

Lake Nipigon, from which the river flows into Lake Superior, is also the home of the whitefish and lake trout, some of the latter having been caught with the rod weighing from 30 to 40 pounds. The lake is beautiful, being studded with numerous islands offering pleasant camping places, and many tourists who visit the Nipigon spend a time on the lake, which can be safely traversed in the large bark canoes used on the river. The climate here is particularly enjoyable; the delicions coolness of the air has wonderful recuperative powers, and refreshing sleep under warm blankets is the lot of all.
