SECOND LOCARNO CONFERENCE ADVOCATED

MEETING WOULD BE LIMITED TO FOUR POWERS

Great Britain, France, Italy and Germany Mentioned

PRESS IN FAVOR

Definite Report Expected After Chamberlain's Visit to Paris Thursday

Man Behind

PARIS, Nov. 29.—The proposal for a second Locarno conference of Europe's four largest powers, finds a responsive chord in the Paris press, and while the Quai d'Orsay prudently takes the position that nothing has been decided as yet, the arrival here of Sir Austen Chamberlain, British secretary for foreign affairs, this week, is expected to bring affairs into the open.

The Temps says: "The idea of an active and permanent collaboration of France, Great Britain, Italy and Germany for the maintenance and consolidation of peace, is the big idea within the framework of the policy of reconciliation. It remains to be seen how it can be practically realized."

BERLIN REPORT

Sections of the Paris press give prominence to a Berlin despatch quoting the Lokai Anzeiger's announcement that Great Britain is preparing to send to Italy the British African Kenya colony, in order to ease the Italian problem of colonial expansion. It is admitted here that France also has the greatest interest in seeing Italy satisfied from a colonial point of view. If the Berlin report is correct, it easily would be possible for France to agree with Italy regarding the rights of Italian immigrants in her North African territories, especially Tunisia, which borders on Italian Tripoli. The question of a four-power conference is not at yet being accepted in all sections for French political opinion.

EXPRESS DOUBT

Two factions have appeared, one for and the other expressing doubt regarding whether the British Foreign Minister for Foreign Affairs, Sir Austen Chamberlain, is strong enough to hold his own against the broad colonial demands by both Italy and Germany. Gustave Stresemann, German Minister of Foreign Affairs, also will find a strong ally in Benito Mussolini for an early cessation of inter-allied military control in Germany. While Mussolini's acceptance to participate in the new Locarno meeting is not certain, it has been advised by Ambassador Avezovo re-embarked and M. Briand, Signor Avezovo leaves Paris today for Rome to consult with his chief, and an answer probably will be known when Sir Austen arrives here Thursday.

PLUCKY RESCUE BY FREDERICTON GIRL

Miss M. Mackinnon Saves Life of 3-Year-Old in Icy Waters of River

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 29.—Ebel Scott, three-year-old daughter of Ralph Scott, of Devon, was rescued from drowning in the icy water of the St. John River at noon today, by the plucky action of Miss Mabel Mackinnon, 16, employed in the Scott home. The child with others had been playing in the vicinity of the river between 11 and 12 o'clock, near the wharf in front of the residence of Arthur Sewell. At noon, Miss Mackinnon went to call the child home for dinner, when she was alarmed to hear the child's cries coming from the direction of the wharf from which she had fallen into the river. Miss Mackinnon quickly scrambled down the face of the wharf into the icy waters and clinging with one hand to the piling, managed to keep the child above water until employees of Stanley Douglas Sons mill pulled the two from their precarious position.

Cardinals to Receive \$1,600 A Year Now

GOLD SHIPMENTS TO CANADA HEAVY

United States Banks Sent \$10,000,000 in The Last Week

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—Shipments of \$10,000,000 in gold were made to Canada by United States banks during the last week, when the Canadian dollar stood at 8-16 premium in the United States market. The swing of gold towards the Dominion was caused by the rush of Canadian wheat down the lakes to be sold before the close of the shipping season, resulting in large demand for million in Canada. There is some talk in Wall Street of the loss of London gold to the Dominion because of the large seasonal export of Canadian products.

TO END WEDNESDAY

157 Witnesses Called Since Hall-Mills Trial Began

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Nov. 29.—The trial of Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall and her two brothers, Henry and Willie Stevens, for the murder of Mrs. Eleanor Mills, probably will end Wednesday, just one month after it began, defense and prosecution counsel believe. Clarence E. Case is expected to sum up for the defense, taking perhaps half a day for it, while Special Prosecutor Alexander Simpson representing the state, will take about two hours. He will dwell on the circumstantial evidence he has presented against the defendants. Before court opened today 157 witnesses had been called to the stand, 87 by the state, and 70 by the defense. The state had 12 witnesses for rebuttal. With her direct testimony already completed, Mrs. Hall today faced the major part of her cross-examination as a conclusion to the defense's case, the exception of two or three minor witnesses.

WANTS GENERAL ELECTION

We ought to now concentrate on making public opinion alive to the position of the country and consequently to demand that this government should abandon its attitude. The leader of the opposition has passed mainly in Africa, on medical orders. Claiming that he met this feeling everywhere he went, and that it has grown enormously during the last two years, Mr. MacDonald charged that it has increased largely as a result of the work of the present government.

TAMPERS WITH RIGHTS

"We can tolerate a minority government that knows its limitations, and in a constitutional way applies them, but this minority government proposes to tamper with the rights of organized labor and to gerrymander the House of Lords so as to make it a permanent bulwark of reaction. This is intolerable and our propaganda should be directed towards putting an end to this condition of things which in its essence is unconstitutional as the rule of any dictatorship."

LEADERS MEET MARIE AT PARIS ON SITUATION

Bratiano Says Flatly He Opposes Return of Crown Prince

STAND OF ARMY

Russia Ready to Move on Bessarabia in Case of King's Death

PARIS, Nov. 20.—With the expected arrival here tomorrow of Queen Marie of Rumania from her North American tour, it is considered not impossible that the trouble over the Rumanian dynasty growing out of the serious illness of King Ferdinand may be composed in the French capital. Former Premier Bratiano, whose political influence in Rumania is most powerful, and Nicholas Jorga, leader of the opposition, will be in Paris. Former Crown Prince Carol already is here, and has announced that he again will meet his mother. Bratiano is opposed to Carol returning to Rumania so as to be ready to head the Hohenzollern dynasty in case of the demise of Ferdinand. On the other hand M. Jorga, who is head of the National Party, is favorable to Carol becoming king.

MARIE'S STAND UNKNOWN

What Queen Marie's ideas of the situation are, have not been stated. Rumanians in Paris friendly to her openly say that if the former Crown Prince, who is declared to be extremely popular in Rumania, should openly say that he would have something to say to the Rumanian people, also summary justice in Rumania. In some quarters this is considered "find legal obstacles in his path and also summary justice in Rumania." Bratiano's political affairs, Carol asserts that he has had no relations with M. Bratiano, whose abrupt declaration of opposition to the former Crown Prince came somewhat as a surprise. "Y" WORKERS NOT CIVILIANS DURING WAR

Not Eligible For Recovery of Damages Against Germany

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29.—(A.P.)—Y. M. C. A. workers during the world war were not "civilians" or "a part of the civilian population of the United States" within the meaning of the Treaty of Berlin, and therefore are not entitled to recovery for damages against Germany for loss of property in the war's prosecution.

ELIGIBLE FOR BONUS?

The question immediately arose as to whether the Association workers, in the light of the decision, might lay claim to benefits under the veterans bonus act.

The case decided by the claims commission was brought by Arthur Elly Hungford, an American national, who was the leader of a group of 67 men recruited by the Y. M. C. A. for service with the A. E. F.

The party sailed from New York April 18, 1918, on the British steamer "Dromas," which was sunk by a German submarine in the Irish Channel.

Judge Parker's decision was based primarily on expressions in official publications of the Y. M. C. A. detailing the war work of the organization.

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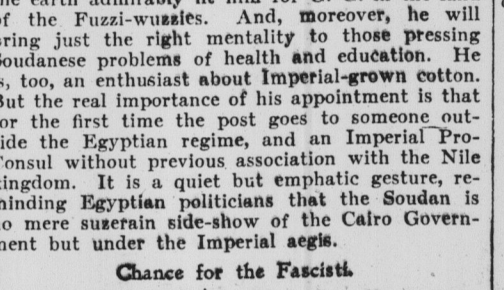

Can a Friendship Between a Girl and a Married Man Remain Beautiful or Should It Be Broken Off?—The Plight of a Penniless, Abused Wife—Why Are Some Girls Eternally Attractive to Men?

DEAR DOROTHY DIX—The object of my devotion is a married man of 31. He is moral, honest, refined, good-natured and generous. I am 25 years of age and single. We are both employed by the same firm and have been acquainted nearly four years, but it has only been within the last four months that we have really known that we loved each other.

DOROTHY DIX

As long as you can keep your friendship on the platonic lines on which it seems to be running at present and as long as it brings added happiness to the three persons vitally concerned, there seems to be no reason why it should be broken up.

Just how much a man and woman who are not free to marry may safely care for each other is a matter of individual temperament. There are men and women who never know anything but a physical love. There are other men and women capable of a deep spiritual love and who can give to each other a sort of glorified friendship that enriches the lives of both and makes no one the poorer.

Yours appears to be such a case as this. You give the man the companionship he craves, you inspire him, you make him better to his wife, and so you rob her of nothing. But the danger lies in passing over this platonic line and turning the friendship into the kind of love that is a sin.

Perhaps the danger that you fear is imminent and that it is safest to break off your friendship while it is still pure and undiluted. In that case you are right to bring an end to it swiftly. But there is no way in which you can do it without hurting the man. You cannot break hearts without pain.

Don't try to disillusion the man about yourself. Leave him at least his love-dream unmarred as a comfort. And don't imagine that you can put a bar between you by marrying some one you don't love. The only thing you can do is to leave the place where you are working and where you see him daily, and give him a chance to forget. Time and absence do work a cure at last.

DOROTHY DIX

DEAR MISS DIX—I have been married two years and have two babies. My husband has a terrible temper. I do everything I can to please him, but he finds fault with everything I do. It seems to me that he only comes home to see what else he can quarrel about.

I don't want my home broken up. I love my babies and my husband. I have no money and no place to go, but I can't stand this any longer. What shall I do?

ANSWER: Poor, sick, worn-out, overworked mother with too many babies and a fault-finding husband, I could cry with you to think how sad and how hopeless is your lot, for what can you do but endure it?

If you had money you could take your children and go away from your fault-finding and abusive husband. If you had parents to whose home you could flee as to a city of refuge, you might be free from him, but you have neither. They curse them, they insult and revile them, they will if you were wandering the streets with your babies in your arms, with no roof to shelter you, listening to them crying for food that you could not give them.

A poor woman with little children is as absolutely in her husband's power as the slave ever was in the power of his owner. He can treat her as he will and she has to endure it for her children's sake.

And I know of nothing that reflects so harshly on human nature as the fact that so many men use the knowledge that their wives cannot defend themselves to treat them worse than they would a dog. They curse them, they insult and revile them, they beat them, and the poor creatures cannot leave because they cannot desert their children.

There is no way to make a fault-finding husband quit fault-finding, nor is there any way to make him treat you kinder, because if he were not cruel by nature and did not enjoy tormenting a helpless thing he would understand that you were worn out with taking care of two babies that have come too close together and that you are sick and nerve-wrecked, and he would be tender and patient and kind to you.

But stop crying. It does no good. Wipe your eyes and brace up and make the best of things. Quit worrying over your husband's fault-finding. Don't listen to it. If you try you can become as indifferent to it as to the buzzing of gnats about you.

DEAR MISS DIX—I am young. I am good-looking. I dress well. I have an interesting line of conversation. I am not proud. Why is it that girls less attractive than I am can walk right in and take any man who is paying me attention away from me?

ANSWER: Neither Solomon nor the seven sages can answer that question. The way of a snake on a rock is a man and a maid are two of the insoluble riddles of the ages. We can only say that it is a matter of personal magnetism, and when we say that we substitute one mystery for another.

One woman has that intangible something about her that draws men to her as a magnet draws steel. Men swarm about her as bees about a honey pot, and she may take her choice of a husband of a score of men.

HEALTH SERVICE Disease Is Handmaid of Crowded Conditions

By DR. MORRIS FISHBAIN THE accumulated studies of sociologists and hygienists have an important bearing on health. The relationship of proper housing to the dissemination of disease is undoubted. Crowding of people in tenements and slums, with improper accommodations for sewage and water must inevitably result in the carrying of infection from one person to another. The Medical Research Council of Great Britain has just issued a special report as a part of its series of child life investigations on the manner in which the children live in the cities and in the rural districts of Scotland. Extensive measurements were made of the height and weight of these children and the type of clothing worn, and the methods of assessing their nutrition and growth. The study indicated that there was some delay in the rate of growth of the average town child between birth and 18 months, but that after that date the growth proceeded as rapidly in the town as in the country child. It also seemed likely that the growth impulse represented by heredity carried the child on to the average size of its parents, even though its impulse to grow was delayed at birth. The average diet of the city child was sufficient to supply the material and energy required for such growth. Apparently the major portion of the

Fashion Fancies Black Lace Over Flesh Chiffon Makes This Unusual Evening Frock.



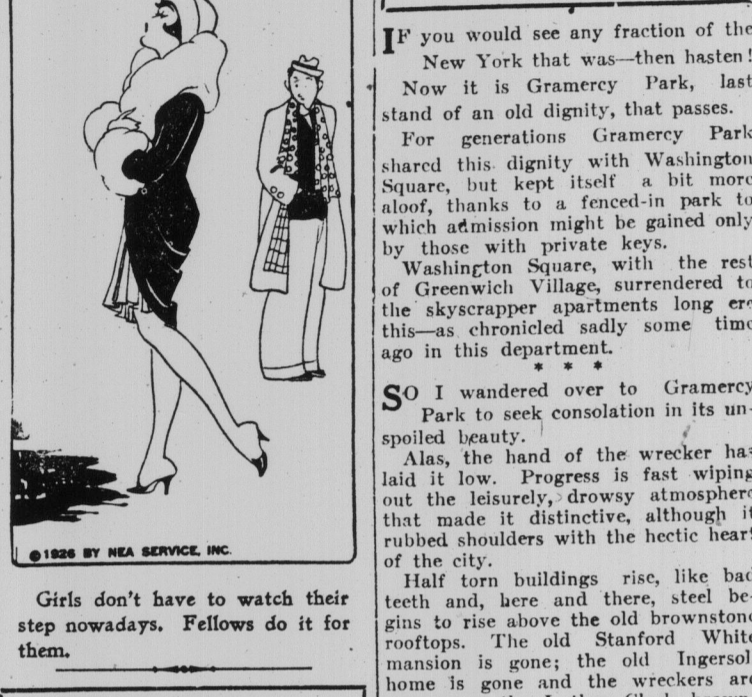

### DEVELOPING OF MOVIE FILM IS DELICATE TASK

Many Processes Needed Before Final Print is Made

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Nov. 29.—The life of the celluloid strip in which is confined pictured comedy and tragedy passes through its critical period in the virtual darkness of the studio laboratory.

In the hands of one man, whose workshop is a small room illuminated with two or three red lights, is the destiny of millions of feet of film drama that issue annually from a big motion picture studio. His job is the development of the film and its preparation for printing. Upon his skill depends the attractiveness of the images that later will animate the screen.

day. An average of 15,000 feet daily is sent to the laboratory of one of Paramount's studios.

In the dark room, the negative is wound on racks in 200-foot strips and cleaned and softened. Next is the most important step—the immersion of the still unborn drama in a 900-gallon chemical bath that gives it life and permanence.

With the aid of a red hand-light, the laboratory man examines the negative as the yellow opaque emulsion wears off and the image begins to appear. His knowledge of the time required to develop various degrees of exposure, such as a sunlit exterior, a dim night scene or a close-up, determines the length of time the negative shall be left in the tank for proper development.

**CUT AND SPLICED**  
Another dip in cold water, "fixing" is a chemical solution that treats further development, and still another washing completes the process that leads to the drying room, which is kept at a high, dry temperature to prevent deterioration of the negative.

leaving the developer, the film goes into an assembling room where it is cut and spliced in accordance with numbered sequence. It is re-wound in 20-foot rolls and sent to the printing room, marked with the length of time each section should be exposed for the first printing.

In the printing room the negative is exposed against raw positive stock which eventually will pass through the projection machines in theatres. The positive print is sent to the director for cutting, sub-titling and assembling. Then a master print is made from the original negative, followed by thousands of copies that are distributed to exhibitors.

### BOSTON SPEAKER GIVES ADDRESS IN IMPERIAL

Prof. H. S. Hering Speaks on Christian Science and World's Redemption

"Christian Science and the World's Redemption" was the subject of a lecture before a large audience in the Imperial Theatre yesterday afternoon by Professor Hermann S. Hering, C. S. B., a member of the Board of Lecturers of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston. John Paterson was chairman. In part, Professor Hering said:

"At the outset it should be clearly seen that Christian Science is a discovery, not an invention nor a formulated theory. This discovery was made by Mary Baker Eddy in the year 1866, and came about in this wise: Mrs. Eddy, as a child, had been taught by her mother that God could and would heal the sick. She learned to believe implicitly in the Bible teachings and in the supremacy of spiritual power, and she never lost this conviction.

"When trouble came upon her through the loss of her dear beloved mother, her husband, the subsequent plot to take her child, and later through domestic unhappiness, poverty, and invalidism, she still clung closely to the Scriptures, constantly seeking an explanation of the Bible healing. She carefully investigated many curative systems and looked into anything that promised to explain how the so-called miracles of the Bible were performed, but she found nothing to satisfy her search.

### FIREMAN DIES IN BLAZE AT SYDNEY

Chief Also Hurt When Bakery Burns Down—\$25,000 Damage

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 28.—Fred A. Hunter, 36, call fireman, was instantly killed this afternoon, when the top floor of a blazing building collapsed, burying him under the debris.

H. Mesereau, fire chief, was injured when a falling board struck him over the eye.

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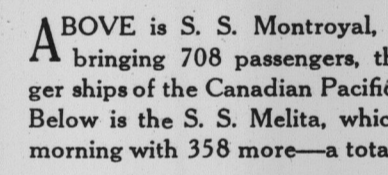

## AIRSHIPS TO BE BOARDED NOW DURING FLIGHT

Experiments of R. 33 Recently Watched With Interest

LONDON, Nov. 27.—The day when passengers, in the hurry to travel across the world to keep a business appointment, can join and leave an airship in full flight on one of the recognized routes between England and the Far East is in sight.

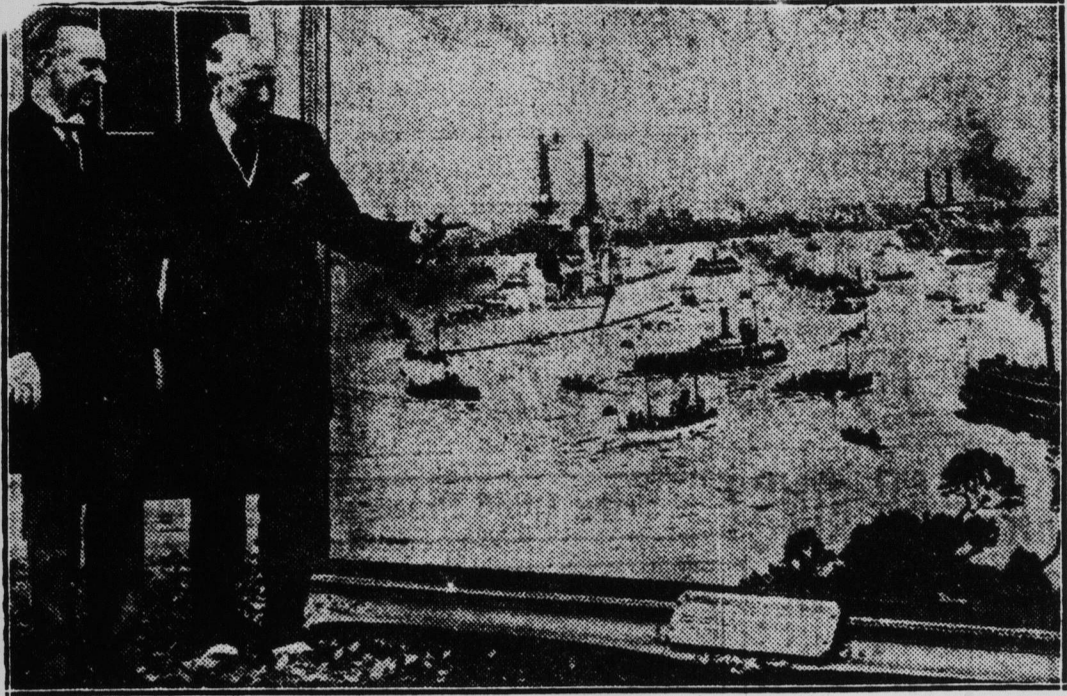
Such is the meaning of experiments which are being carried out with the airship R-33 at Falmouth, Norfolk. If everything is successful the giant airship R-101, which is being built at Dardington, Bedford, for the London-India-service, will be equipped with the required apparatus.

A business man anxious to reach any point on the route followed by airships will merely have to leave his armchair in the cabin of the airship, take a seat in an aeroplane suspended beneath the hull, and then come down to earth.

### TIME SAVED.

The time taken by the airship to reach the ground, and unload mails and passengers could not at the most, exceed 10 minutes. Allowing 10 minutes for passengers and mails to be loaded into the airship, and a further 20 minutes for the airship to leave the ground and overtake the airship, the airship would only be away from the airship for, roughly, three-quarters of

## DALHOUSIE ROAD BEING IMPROVED

Steep Hills Eliminated Will Prove More Attractive to Tourists

DALHOUSIE, Nov. 25.—Construction of the McGregor bridge, at the eastern approach to the town, of which Dexter & Richards are the contractors, is progressing. By cutting down the top of the hill and straightening the road, the grade is made much easier and safer. No contract has been given as yet for the Stewart bridge, which has been condemned, but if the work on that is carried out in the same manner it will make the hills leading into town much less formidable and more attractive to tourists.

The seawall built along the El River has withstood the severity of the easterly storms this autumn. This has been not only a great boon to residents and motorists, but also served to protect one of our great natural beauty spots, the scenic beauty along this sand bar being unsurpassed.

## FARMERS DO WELL

Charlo and New Mills farmers have gone extensively into the potato business and have had a very successful season, some fields netting them thousands of dollars, and everyone in that section of the county appears to be enjoying great prosperity. It is estimated that about 150,000 barrels have been shipped from Restigouche, the greater portion of which has been from the two points named above.

## REV MR BONNELL GIVES THIRD OF SERMON SERIES

Subject at St. Andrew's "Can the Dead Speak to Us?"

Rev. J. S. Bonnell, speaking in St. Andrew's church last night, gave the third in a series of special evening sermons and his theme was: "Can the Dead Speak to Us?" He took two texts, first, "I shall go to him, but he shall not return to me," and the second the word of Jesus, "I will come again and receive you unto myself, that where I am there you may be also." He pointed out that the 20th century at its beginning was strongly materialistic, because of the tremendous engineering achievements and mechanical developments. The war brought a great change of thought. In France alone there were over a million homes in mourning and in England 700,000, and there was the feeling that these multitudes of young men who had passed into the beyond had not finished their lives. Their lives were uncompleted.

During the war spiritualism had its highest point of interest. Mr. Bonnell traced its beginning from 1848, when two daughters of John D. Fox, from a little town in New York State, evidenced psychic powers and there were continuous rappings in their house. They finally became professional mediums, operating in New York city. Three medical men exposed them and proved that the alleged spirit rapping was caused by semi-dilatation of certain joints of the body.

## QUESTION OF AUTHORITY

Turning to the fact that great men like Sir Oliver Lodge, Conan Doyle, Sir William Crookes believed in the genu-

ineness of the manifestation of spirits, Mr. Bonnell stated that because they were famous in science did not make them an authority on the subject of spiritualism. In fact a conjuror had been always more effective in exposing mediums. Marriot and Houdini both showed scientists how often they had been deceived. Mr. Bonnell referred to the great attempt made to prove communication from the dead by means of a sealed message left behind by Meyers in the possession of Sir Oliver Lodge, ten years before his death. It was deposited in a vault of a bank. Ten years after his death a noted medium stated that she had received this message. It was proved there was no similarity between the sealed message and the one she had purported to have received. Her attempt was a failure.

Mr. Bonnell pointed out two objections against spiritualism, first that it actually endangered the sanity of nervously inclined people, and secondly that it pictures the future life as purely non-moral, the good and evil hereditarily indistinguishably together. In closing he told of a spiritualistic service which he had attended in the city of Boston, where messages were given to more than 20 people purporting to come from their relatives. One gentleman from Truro, N. S., was given a message which was the most remarkable of all. It was supposed to have come from his father, who had been killed in a railroad accident, even the name of the father was given by the medium. After making some investigations at the close of the meeting, Mr. Bonnell had found that this man from Truro had been a member of that church for two years, in all that time personally acquainted with the medium who knew all the facts of his life.

## TRUE OF OTHERS

The same was true of a number of others present who had received messages. Mr. Bonnell pointed out that the text of the sermon taught that the spiritual world, or heaven, was wherever Jesus dwelt, and that, as was pointed out in the teaching of the Church, in the communion of saints there could be fellowship with those who had passed over to be with Christ. The experience of Stephen and Paul showed how near Christ was to his people, and also how near the loved ones who had gone must be. This realization, Mr. Bonnell said, should

give courage and faith to complete bravely the journey of life until they were met again.

The church was thronged, nothing but standing room being available at a quarter of an hour before the service began. Mr. Bonnell announced that the final sermon in the series would be given on the night of Dec. 12, when he will make a positive statement regarding the whole series of addresses and will speak on the subject "My Religion."

Mr. Bonnell will be absent from the city next Sunday when he will give the Sunday afternoon lecture for the people of Halifax and the Dalhousie students in the Halifax Y. M. C. A. The pulpit of St. Andrew's Kirk will be occupied that day by Rev. J. M. Shaw, of Pine Hill College.

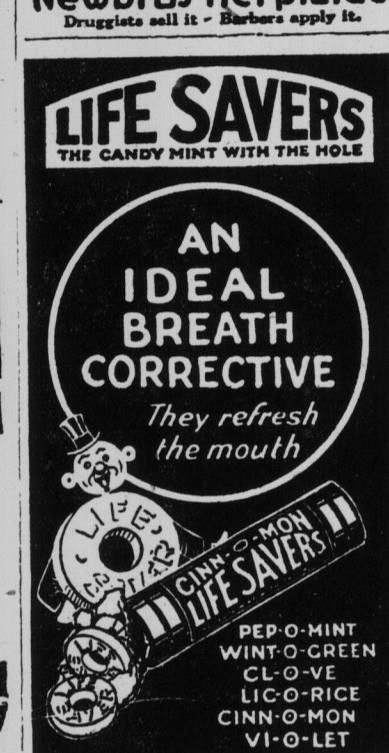

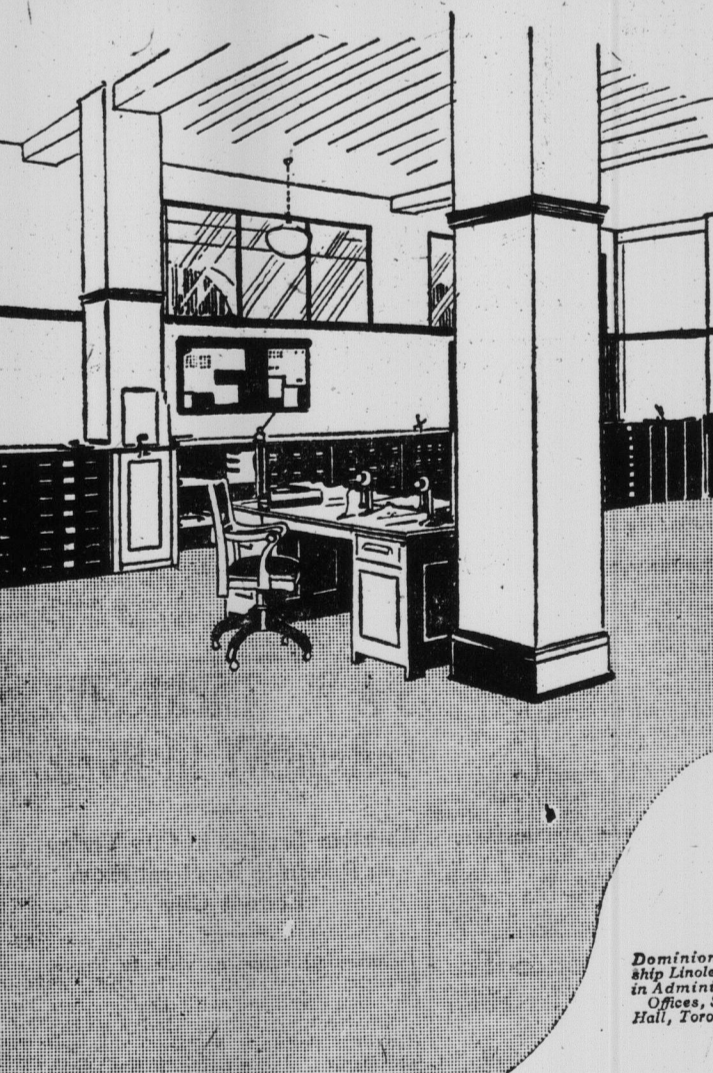

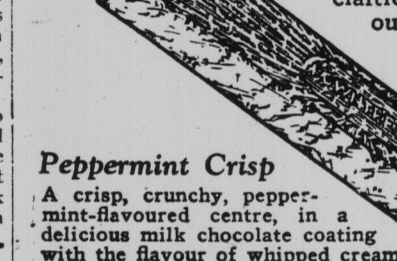

FOUR ELEVENS CONSIDERED IN RACE FOR CROWN

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—The climax of a record-shattering football season of thrills and spills, has left a legacy of greater dispute over mythical national championship honors than any campaign in years.

Where Notre Dame's "four horsemen" reigned victoriously far and wide in 1925 and Dartmouth's famous aerial artists decorated the heights without controversy in 1926, the close of the regular 1926 season ushers at least four outstanding elevens in the title debate. Rebutals from two or three others further complicate the situation.

In spite of its spectacular tie with the Army in Chicago's record-breaking service classic, the Navy still regards itself as very much in the running when the laurels are passed around. Simultaneously the army's claims would seem to be on the same level but the cadets tasted one defeat at the hands of Notre Dame, while the Navy up to its final tussle, sank all opposition in nine consecutive games against some of the most powerful outfits of the east or midwest.

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—Football, with a toll of eight deaths and 200 serious injuries, in the United States, proved less fatal during the season just closed than in 1925, when 29 youths died of hurts received on the gridiron. The badly injured number only 20 in 1925, however.

The average age of youth who died from football hurts is again 19 years as in previous seasons. While formerly at least one man has died each year on the gridiron, each death occurred in a hospital in 1926. A broken neck, once considered fatal to cause death, was less fatal this year, three persons recovering from the injury. One youth, in upper New York, completed this season after suffering a broken neck a year ago.

The bulk of major injuries that forced players from contests for three weeks or more, consisted of broken shoulders, arms, legs, ankles, wrists and ribs. Regular physical examinations tended to reduce the number of deaths resulting from physical defects.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 29.—Connie Mack, Manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, has confirmed the announcement that Dudley Brannom, the Kansas City Blues first baseman, will come to the Athletics next year in a deal that will send Joe Hauser, first baseman, and Bill Wambagans, second baseman, to the American Association club. This deal, it is said, cost the Philadelphia manager about \$50,000 in cash, in addition to the two players.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 29.—The referee and the boxing commission refused to render a decision in a ten-round bout between Tommy White, welterweight champion of Mexico and Pinky Mitchell of Milwaukee, Saturday night, saying both boxers had been guilty of unfair tactics. The commission fined the boxers 500 pesos each.

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 29.—Centrefielder John Conlan and third baseman William Conroy of the Rochester club of the International League, have been purchased by the Newark club of the same league.

JAPANESE TAKING TO JAZZ. Jazz is becoming popular in Japan. The wave of American music that has been rising in the Oriental country for many years is turning toward syncopation, and many instruments from this country are being mastered in place of the koto, shakuhachi and samisen.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Sale of the vessels Eastern Mariner, Eastern Light and Eastern Admiral, for the sum of \$175,000 each, to C. P. Stewart, of New York, subject to certain conditions affecting the financial arrangement, was approved by the Shipping Board.

Mr. Stewart proposes that the vessels be operated in the coastwise trade by a new concern, The American Merchant Marine Steamship Corporation is a subsidiary of Frank B. Hall & Co., Inc., an insurance brokerage house of which Mr. Stewart is president. The purchase would be guaranteed by the Hall Co.

The three vessels are of 10,545, 10,705 and 10,585 d. w. t., respectively. They were built by the Asaka Iron Works—two of them in 1920 and one in 1918. Each is equipped with a triple-expansion engine of 2,500 i. h. p. and 3 Scotch boilers, designed to steam about 10.25 knots per hour on a ton of coal a day. Mr. Stewart's total offer of \$525,000 for the three ships was submitted following the rejection by the board of an offer of \$440,000.

### OCTOPUS FASTENS ON ARTIST'S LEG

Sailor's Timely Intervention Saves Life of Seascapist Painter

LONDON, Nov. 29.—An Italian seascape artist, Mario Menchetti, was out early on the breakwater at Leghorn, Italy, painting a water colour of the outgoing fishing fleet. With his paper pad on his knees, he sat and dangled his legs over the side. He failed to observe a huge octopus creeping up and curling a tentacle around his ankle, but he began to notice when the devil-fish began to gain a hold on the calf as well.

Throwing away his pad, the artist tried to pull his leg away from the leathery peril, but the octopus was in fighting mood, and, now half out of water, brought into play all its eight tentacles in an effort to strangle the painter. Yelling lustily, and rolling over on to the stone break-

water, Mario fought for his life. One of the tentacles of the monster was perilously near his throat when a sailor rushed up and dexterously threw a knife at the monster's head. This forced it to release its hold. A few more minutes and the painter was released, while the dead octopus was being carried in procession to the port office.

### Italian Scientist First With Chemical

URBANA, Ill., Nov. 29.—The new chemical element, 61, named Illinium, discovered by three University of Illinois instructors last spring, was found two years ago by Dr. Luigi Rolla, of the Chemical Institute of Florence, Italy, but he failed to announce it then.

Dr. Rolla's discovery was accepted by the Congress of Scientists which met at Bologna, Italy. He named his discovery Florentium in honor of his city, while Prof. B. Smith Hopkins of the University of Illinois named his discovery Illinium in honor of the university and the state. Dr. Rolla now has agreed to relinquish all claims to its original discovery.

DEERFIELD, Mass., Nov. 29.—Mrs. Estella Woodward, 68 year old widow of Joel Woodward, a retired capitalist, eloped on October 6, it was learned yesterday, with her chauffeur, Herman Latourneau, 21 years old.

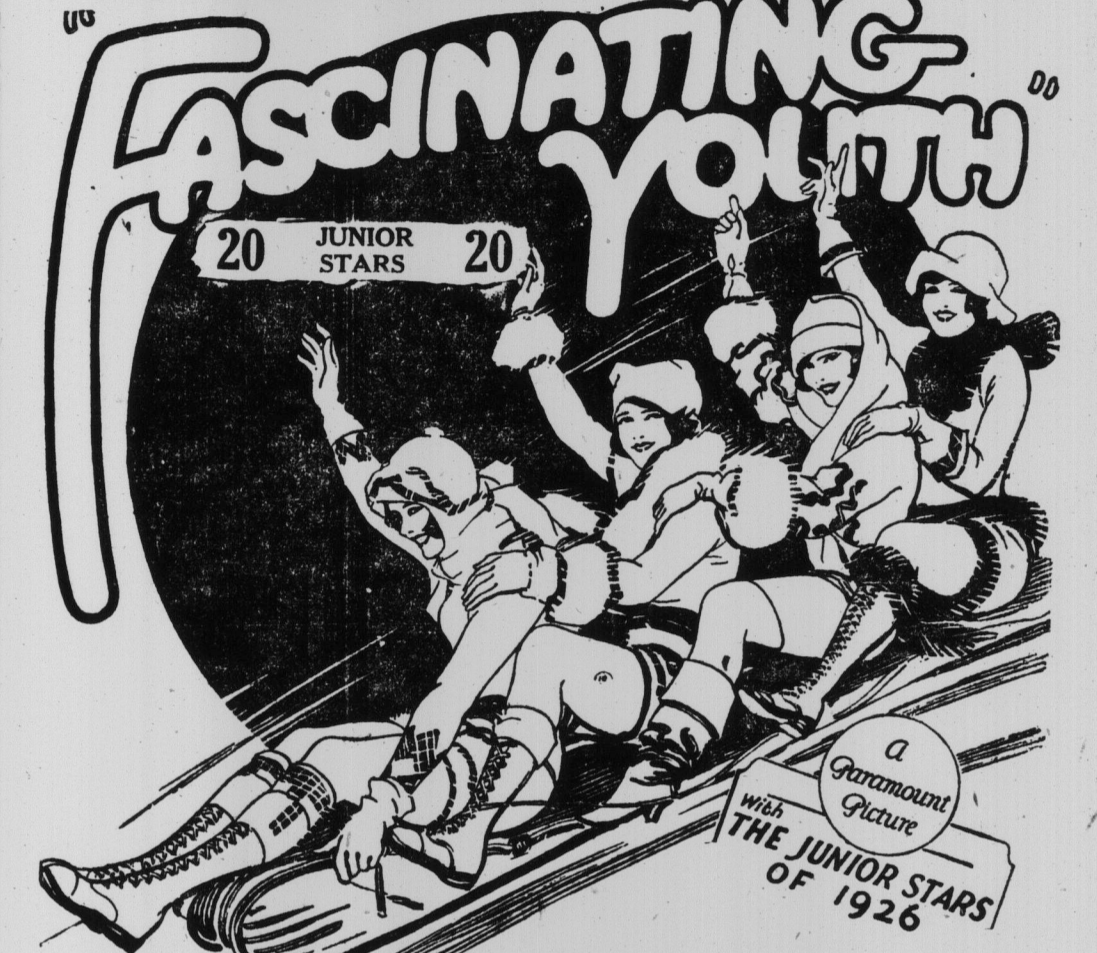
### Roumanians To Add To Naval Strength

These destroyers will carry five large calibre guns. Likewise the firm is to deliver the latest type of submarine with mothership in 32 months. It is reported that the arrangements were made for additional armaments at the time of the visit of the Italian mission headed by Marshal Badoglio.

Seven miles of scenic roads touching points of interest now inaccessible to automobiles are to be built in Kilauoa National Park, Hawaii.

BISHOP URGES OBSERVANCE OF ADVENT SEASON

Penance, Prayer and Almsgiving—Cathedral Altar Fund \$18,255

Yesterday was the first Sunday of Advent and in the Cathedral His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc devoted his sermon to this subject. This holy season was a time of special preparation for the great feast of Christmas and also it commemorated the 4000 years during which the world awaited the coming of the Saviour.

The Church, he said, urged its members to penance, prayer and almsgiving in a special manner during the weeks preceding Christmas. As acts of penance he spoke of confession, the curbing of the passions, guarding the tongue from uncharitableness, closing the eyes to evil and shutting the ears against wrongful things; also disciplining the appetite in eating and drinking. In connection with the latter His Lordship said that the drinking habit was not so prevalent now in older days but still there was much of it and the taste for drink was only too easily acquired under a belief that stimulant was necessary at times.

As to alms giving, His Lordship pointed out yesterday's collection for the work of St. Vincent as Paul Society for the poor of the parish as an excellent means to exercise this other way to give for the care of the children under the supervision of the Sisters of Charity and the Nuns of the Good Shepherd.

ALTAR FUND

It was announced that the collection, was taken up on the third Sunday of November for the altar fund, amounted to \$699.20 and that the total to date for the procuring of the new altar for the Cathedral was \$18,255.

The appeal of the Society for Prevention of Tuberculosis was commended to the people at the Masses yesterday. A novena in honor of the Immaculate Conception will be held in the Cathedral this evening and will continue until Dec. 7.

CHILDREN OF MARY

The Children of Mary of Assumption church held their annual meeting yesterday afternoon at 8 o'clock. The officers elected were: President, Miss S. Murphy; vice-president, Miss Mary Kelly; recording secretary, Miss Annie Ring; financial secretary, Miss Joan Cormier; fiscal committee, Misses Winnie Graham, Nellie Sullivan and Elly Kane.

It was decided to hold a public reception the first Sunday following the Feast of the Immaculate Conception. It will be admitted to the society. The annual reports showed the past year's work, reports of the past president, Miss Patricia Hennessey, being especially commended.

The spiritual adviser, Rev. H. Ramage, gave a short address during the meeting.

IN ST. ROSE'S

At St. Rose's church yesterday Rev. Wilfred Mallette celebrated 8 o'clock mass. The pastor, Rev. M. T. Murphy, celebrated 10 o'clock, the sermon being preached by Father Mallette. The sermon was taken from the gospel of St. Luke the first Sunday of Advent, chapter 11, verses 28-33.

SIXTY-EIGHT WERE CONFIRMED HERE

Bishop Richardson Administers Sacrament Morning and Evening Sunday

The sacrament of confirmation was administered by His Lordship Bishop Richardson to 61 candidates in the Mission Church St. John the Baptist last evening. The candidates were 22 girls and women and 19 boys and men and a few were from the parish of Simonds, of which Rev. C. W. Follett is rector.

The large congregation filled, not only the church, but a very large part of the Sunday school also. Rev. J. V. Young, priest in charge, was assisted in conducting the service by Mr. Follett who read the lessons. The Bishop in his address told of the scriptural authority for confirmation and explained the obligations which the candidates assumed.

He laid special stress upon the importance of Holy Communion and said that if years ago it had been regarded as the chief service of the church as it should be, the number of Anglicans in New Brunswick today would be five times as great.

Bishop Richardson also administered confirmation at the 11 o'clock service in St. Paul's church, when 17 candidates were presented by the rector, Ven. Archdeacon A. H. Crowfoot.

As Hiram Sees It

"There's a feller that seems to be spyin' out the land," says I to the town feller, pinta' in the patch of moonlight on Long Beach.

"That," says he, "is the ghost of James Simonds, from Haverhill, Massachusetts. Between 1919 and '21 he looked over a lot of Nova Scotia—down the river from Haverhill, Massachusetts. He liked it best as a place for a tradin' and fishin' station. He got the promise of a grant of 5000 acres; but him an' his brother Richard settled at the mouth of the river. Capt. Francis Peabody was already there—livin' at Portland Point. He lived in a house with an oak frame that they say was brought from Newburyport. He sold it to James Simonds in 1785 an' moved up to Maudersville. The Injuns was friendly yit—an' Richard Simonds lost his life in that year—determind' the tradin' company's property when the redskins tried to carry it off. Peabody an' the Simonds brothers were settled at the mouth of the river afore the folks come to settle at Maudersville in 1782—but Peabody was one of the signers for the grant up there—an' was appointed their agent to go to Halifax an' fix things up. James Simonds got to be quite an important feller afore he died. That was his ghost we jist seen in the moonlight on the river."

PROSPERITY VISIONED FOR GREAT BRITAIN

British Trade Commissioner at Winnipeg Arrives Here From England

A coming era of prosperity was predicted for Great Britain by A. M. Wiseman, British Trade Commissioner at Winnipeg, who arrived here yesterday on the Canadian Pacific steamer Montreal from England en route to Winnipeg.

In an interview, Mr. Wiseman said that it was very difficult to form an adequate opinion of conditions in Great Britain at the present time owing to the disruption caused by the coal strike. Considering the difficulty under which manufacturers had been laboring, their production has been surprisingly high, said Mr. Wiseman, and export, particularly of manufactured products, had been maintained to a much greater extent than the most optimistic had hoped for.

While it was true that statistics showed that imports into that country had increased largely, this was mainly due to the large importations of coal, made necessary by the strike. The same reason was true of the falling off in exports, the complete stoppage of the exportation of coal causing the decline in these figures.

SPEAKS OF STRIKE

Speaking of the strike, Mr. Wiseman said that it did not show on the surface and that life among the general people had been very little affected by it. When he left England men were returning daily to the mines and there was every prospect of an immediate resumption, he said.

The general opinion held by business men in Winnipeg was that other than the coal production became normal that country was in for a greater period of prosperity. Satisfactory orders were being placed in England, especially in engineering, and it could be assured that the work could be carried out without too much delay there were many municipal and foreign governments who would place orders in England.

IN ENGLAND SINCE JULY.

Mr. Wiseman has been British Trade Commissioner at Winnipeg for the last three years, and previous to that had been for three years assistant commissioner in Montreal. He had been in England since July, mainly on a holiday, and as a consequence was not in touch with conditions in the West but said the last year a great many loans held by banks had been paid off, and that the country as a whole was in a prosperous condition.

Speaking of his trip across from the other side, Mr. Wiseman said that the first three days out were very rough but the remainder of the voyage was very pleasant, and that the Canadian Pacific had maintained its recognized standard of comfort and efficiency.

Mr. Wiseman departed on the special train direct for Winnipeg.

WORK OF ANTI T. B. SOCIETY ENDORSED

Ministers of City Churches Stress Importance of Supporting it

Earnest pleas for support of the Saint John Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis were made from the pulpits of the city churches yesterday, when practically all of the clergy acceded to the request of the directors of the society to bring the matter to the attention of their congregations.

Rev. Hugh Miller, speaking in St. David's church, said the society was striving to bring about a better understanding of tuberculosis as a preventable disease and was endeavoring to have the people observe the laws, which would help in control and prevention in the interests of general health.

Mr. Miller said he felt that everyone was well aware of the splendid work which the society was doing and he pointed out that this work was financed solely through the sale of Christmas seals.

He asked that the seals should find ready and willing purchasers.

COMMITTEE AT WORK

By most strenuous work the members of the committee in charge of the Christmas seals have nearly completed their task of getting 9,500 of the 81 sheets of the seals ready to send out to as many prospective purchasers. The first portion of these 8,500 letters will be sent out on Wednesday and further lots will be mailed on Thursday and Friday. It is hoped that all of them will have been dispatched by the end of the week.

The committee has a practically unlimited supply of the seals and it is intended later to have some of the seals on sale in the lobbies of the local hotels.

DOG IS SAVED.

A dog, trapped near the foot of Mecklenburg street by the incoming tide Saturday afternoon, was rescued from drowning by a man who, attracted by the Policeman Duffy to the scene, called on two other men for assistance. A ladder was got and the animal saved. The dog's paws were cut in its efforts to escape and were attended to by its rescuers.

WAS WANDERING.

A four year old boy became lost in Charlotte street Saturday afternoon. He was taken home by Policeman Duffy to his headquarters for safety. Later he was called for by his mother, Mrs. George Dixon, Dwyer street, who explained that the boy had been to a movie show with an elder brother and they had become separated.
