Tour of Union Street Plant Discloses Interesting Processes in Making of Candy—Home

FORTY POUNDS of assorted confectionery for every citizen of Saint John, taking the population of the city as, roughly, 50,000, are manufactured by the Corona Co., Limited, Union street manufacturers, each year. Two million pounds is the annual output. What a time of it the 10,000 to 20,000 children of Saint John would have if they were confronted with a mountain of 2,000,000 pounds of chocolates, hard candy, Christmas candy canes, Easter chocolate roosters, etc., on December 31 of each year and invited

Materials Used When Possible

About 200 employes—and at the busy Christmas and Easter times 250—60 per cent. of them girls and women, are kept busy throughout the year turning out this huge output. The confectionery, beside having a big market in this city, is exported to St. Pierre, Newfoundland, New Zealand, Bermuda and the British West Indies. The Maritime Provinces consume the greater part of the Corona product and Canada has proved to be a consistently eager consumer.

Thus between September and December, while the factory employes are working night and day in order to fulfill their Yuletide contracts, Easter candy toys are drying on the racks awaiting packing. One of the best known products of the factory and one that has a big market is the famous brand of Dorothy Kingston chocolates. A great deal of this brand is sold in Saint John, although the Corona plant's other markets buy heavily of this type of confectionery. The high grade goods are dipped by hand. This process demands a very high class of help. A centre is lowered into the vat of chocolate and when raised, with a deft motion of the hand, various designs are described on the top of the candy. The Dorothy Kingston chocolates are placed on trays covered with waxed paper, embossed with the name. These hand dippers perform their duties with marked swiftness and their motions are exact and ime-saving to a degree. The candles are then sent to a department cooled by ammonia plant and are placed on the cooling trays, five in number, one above the other. The confectionery is set on the lowest tray, proceeds slowly along and is then automatically transported to the cooling tray above it. This process is continued until the last tray is reached. By this time, the chocolates are sufficiently cooled and are made ready for packing. The cooling process takes about 20 minutes in its entirety.

While the goods are kept in the cooling room after being cooled, they are placed in covered boxes to insure protection from various influences that may become damaging if the boxes are left open to the air. The finish of the chocolate is largely governed by the temperature at which it is handled. If confectionery is left unprotected from the sun in a store window it will in time take on a gray color. This will not detract from its pure food qualities, however.
