

### HEALTH BOARD

The Board of Health in monthly ession yesterday, ordered proceedings to be taken against two milk dealers who were not complying with the regulation and against one vendor, who was bringing milk into the city, in cans not properly sealed. They ordered that a house in West St. John be closed, unless within fifteen days the owner had tollets installed.

The reports presented were carefully considered. Dr. H. L. Abrahamson, in his report of his examination of the city water supply, showed that conditions were satisfactory and in view of the drought this season, this report was especially gratifying.

Dr. T. Fred Johnston, dairy and food inspector, reported on his visits to the slaughter houses. In all thirty-one visits were made to the two slaughter houses and conditions were found to be satisfactory. The number of animals slaughtered was 3071. The month had been exceptionally busy.

Miss Alice Hegan, in her report on the anti-tuberculosis work, told of 817 patients formerly registered and twenty-three new patients. In all 340 visits were made by the nurses. Twenty-six of the patients were discharged as nontubercular and five were receiving free milk.







Very few of these marriages take place in Egypt. Hundreds of young Egyptians go annually to Europe to complete their education. At least 75 per cent. of these students go to British universities and as a consequence the majority of the foreign wives brought back are English women.

Comment in the native newspapers on these marriages uses them as an argument for the rapid improvement of educational facilities in Egypt, so that it shull no longer be necessary for young engineers and doctors to go to Europe. Marriages in Egypt are still almost invariably arranged between the families of the prospective bride and bridegroom.

The emancipation of Egyptian women is making great strides, but hither to progress has been mainly on the lines of greater personal freedom. While educational facilities for boys are being constantly and rapidly improved, nothing of the kind is being done for girls and young women. The number of girls' schools is pitifully small. Only 1.8 of the women of the country can read and write, and there is not a single higher educational institutions which can be said to provide anything approaching a modern education
