Nova Scotians Make Protest Against Pulpwood Embargo

GRAND COLONY SCHEME

NO SUPPORT SO FAR FOR EMBARGO

Royal Commission Hears Evidence at Halifax This Morning.

OPENING SESSION

Legislature Member Speaks for Whole of Guys-boro County.

(Canadian Press)

Halifax, Oct. 2.—Strong opposition to the proposed embargo on the export of Canadian pulpwood developed at the opening session of the Royal Commission to investigate the pulpwood resources of the Dominion, here this morning.

The commission is composed as follows:

Chairman, Joseph Picard, Quebec City; W. A. Austin, Vancouver; Joseph G. Sutherland, Clyde River, Shelburne County, N. S.; Apollin Bousquet, St. John's; and Robert W. McLaughlin, Fredericton. The secretary of the commission is E. H. Finlayson, acting director of forestry, department of the interior.

Mr. Picard said it would be the commission's aim to inquire into the actual necessities of the forest resources of this country, the extent of pulpwood resources and distribution of such resources with particular of ownership. It would be for the commission to recommend what may be done to expedite for the better conservation of the supply of pulpwood for present or future use.

Embargo Opposed.

Opposition to the suggested embargo on export of Canadian pulpwood developed immediately the Royal Commission opened its sessions. Support of the embargo had not been presented in any form up to noon.

At the request of several representatives of large pulpwood holders throughout not only Nova Scotia, but other Canadian provinces, the opponents to the embargo are calling themselves "the defense" and are being called "C. W. Anderson," head of the Scotia Lumber and Shipping Company, Sherbrooke, the first witness heard, protested strongly against the embargo not only on behalf of himself, but the people of Guysboro County who he represents in the Provincial Legislature.

If the embargo was put into force and the people deprived of the American market for their wood, he protested the entire depletion of the population of many parts of his country.

Mr. Thomas C. Bateman, of Annapolis Royal, a buyer and shipper of poplar, opposed the embargo as it would entirely wipe out any possible market for the small amount of poplar grown and cut in Nova Scotia.

No Conservation Expected.

Ralph Bell, of Halifax, representing American and personal interests, and especially the Nova Scotia Timberlands Company, Limited, the largest land owners in Digby and Yarmouth counties and one of the largest in the province, said that the company was formed especially for acquiring land in Nova Scotia for the purpose of exporting wood to its parent company in Maine. Mr. Bell questioned whether the embargo would mean conservation. The schedule of future hearings had not been decided at noon, but Mr. Picard, chairman, said he would take place in other Nova Scotia towns after the Halifax sittings.

TRUE BILLS FOUND

Trial of McLachlan and Livingston to Commence in Halifax Today.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 2.—True bills were found against James B. McLachlan, former secretary of the U. M. W. District 26, charged with spreading false tales and with sedition, and against Daniel Livingstone, former president of the same organization, charged with sedition, libel, and in the supreme court this morning. The McLachlan-Livingstone case, which arose during the progress of the recent strike of steel workers and miners in Cape Breton, was the first to be given to the grand jury today when the criminal sittings of the supreme court opened with Justice Methall presiding. The jury was out two hours. It is expected that the trial will commence this afternoon.

9 FISHERMEN LOST

Motor Boat, Out From New York Since Sunday, Is Missing.

New York, Oct. 2.—Police radio messages sent out last night to seek the 50-foot motor boat Gertrude, which set out on a deep sea fishing trip Sunday and failed to return to port. Motor boats and fishing schooners which returned yesterday brought back news of a stiff northwest gale and heavy seas threatening increasing apprehension for the safety of the nine passengers on the Gertrude.

NO APPLICATION FOR DOW SCHOLARSHIP

Honor Previously Was in Great Demand—R. B. Hanson, is City Solicitor.

(Special to The Times.) Fredericton, Oct. 2.—No application for the Asa Dow scholarship has been received at the University of New Brunswick this year. Those eligible must be males holding first class teaching licenses in New Brunswick and having passed senior matriculation. Formerly the scholarship was in great demand.

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the U. N. B., has received a cablegram from his daughter, Miss Edith M. Jones, announcing safe arrival at Liverpool. Miss Jones, who is a graduate of U. N. B., and who taught in the province, will enter Bedford College, London, one of the affiliated institutions of the University of London, for honor course in English literature.

R. B. Hanson, K. C., M. P., has been appointed city solicitor of Fredericton. He formerly held the office, which has been vacant for some time.

The U. N. B. has applied for connection with the city water and sewerage terminal facilities to be constructed here on land acquired from the city. This work was started months ago and stopped and now is being resumed. Roundhouse, transfer freight shed and trackage is included. It is believed that resumption of the work indicates further postponement of the construction of a new bridge across the St. John river here.

Wire Briefs

London, Oct. 2.—A Riff attack on the Spanish positions in Morocco began two days ago and is proceeding vigorously, says a Tangier despatch. The towns of Bu Hafra and Ben Tieb are being invested.

Oklahoma City, Oct. 2.—An election, unequalled in the records of the U. S., today was expected to bring to a climax the bitter struggle which began when Governor Walton opened his warfare on the Ku Klux Klan.

Fredericton, N. B., Oct. 2.—Municipal elections are being held in Sunbury County today. In four parishes elections were by acclamation. Contests are being held in Margerville, Sheffield and Northfield.

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—Lieut.-Col. Francois Gourdeau, former Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, 1896-1908, and a public servant for 43 years, died at his residence here last night.

WHEAT POOL WILL FAVOR VANCOUVER

Sending Grain Shipments West Will Mean 6 or 7 Cents More.

LOW OCEAN RATE

Vancouver Profits by Difference of 6 Cents to Liverpool.

(Canadian Press)

Winnipeg, Oct. 2.—At least 60,000 bushels of wheat will be handled by the Alberta Wheat Pool this year, according to private information received in Winnipeg from Calgary last night. It was stated this was a most conservative estimate, and was based on the 2,600,000 acreage signed up at present and on the yield per acre being only 24 bushels as against reports that the yield will be much heavier in a good many districts.

W. J. Jackson, one of the Alberta pool representatives in Winnipeg carrying on negotiations with elevator grain exchange and banking interests, declared last night that the Alberta pool planned to take full advantage of the western route for shipping wheat this year.

Mr. Jackson explained that the pool hoped in this way to get six or seven cents that at present went into the pockets of the grain dealer. While there is only a difference of half a cent a bushel in the railway freight rate to the coast as compared with the railway rate east, there is a difference of more than six cents on the ocean freight rate from Vancouver to Liverpool, Mr. Jackson pointed out.

KIND DEED LEADS SLEUTH TO QUARRY

Assists Surgeon as Ambulance Waits and Finds Patient is Fraud Suspect.

New York, Oct. 2.—Just before George Faust, 37, was taken from 124 Kilbuck avenue, Long Island City, in an ambulance he was arrested for alleged grand larceny. Detective Maher of the Hunter Point Station, on seeing the ambulance stop at the house, went to offer assistance. When the surgeon and he reached the sick room, where Faust was in bed with pneumonia, Maher recognized him as a swindling suspect he had been trailing for several days. He arrested him on complaint of Thomas Quinn, a local undertaker, who said Faust had made Maher believe he had secured cash advances on Faust's removal to St. John's hospital where a uniformed patrolman was stationed at his bedside.

On report of Faust's arrest, Simeon Wile, president of The Casket, a trade paper, notified twenty undertakers in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Long Island who have been similarly victimized in the last nine months. Each had cited costly experience with a man who had posed as an embalmer and secured employment, only to collect funds from customers and disappear, or else had secured cash advances which were not repaid. Faust is accused in the Long Island City charge of collecting \$300 while Quinn was out.

The trade publication distributed 10,000 circulars bearing Faust's picture and alleging the character of his methods. One circular fell into the hands of Detective Maher, who recognized Faust on the street several days ago, only to lose him in the crowd.

Little Damage In Bermuda Hurricane

Hamilton, Bermuda, Oct. 2.—A hurricane which struck Bermuda at two o'clock Sunday morning blew itself out during the early hours of Sunday night, doing no damage of consequence. The electric light and telephone plants suffered somewhat but did not suffer any craft at anchor in the harbor and a few buildings of a temporary nature were unroofed.

N. B. Woman Is Dead In Vancouver

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 2.—Mrs. Mary E. Stultz, widow of C. F. Stultz, of Newcastle, N. B., died here today. She has resided with her son Roy Stultz for the past two years. Her only other son is Dr. G. N. Stultz, dentist of Halifax.

Three brothers and two sisters also survive.

Bandits Blindfold Two; Take \$10,000

Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 2.—Chances of capturing three bandits who climbed into the second story window of the Right House, blindfolded John Gilroy and George Henry Grimsby, blew the safe, and made off with over \$10,000, were considerably slim last night when Detective Crocker and Chamberlaine completed several hours work on the case. No fresh clues were revealed and the only definite information available at the police station was that it was not Ryan and his gang of escaped convicts from Kingston penitentiary who recently staged the Toronto bank robbery.

CAR JUMPS FERRY HARVESTERS DROWN

Third Man in Automobile Saved—Victims Belong in Ontario.

Glidden, Sask., Oct. 2.—Two harvesters from Ontario, Peter Rogers and Charles Tucker, were drowned yesterday when a car in which they were riding with a third man went over the end of the Lemford ferry into the South Saskatchewan River. The third man managed to save himself. The bodies of the other two have not been recovered. Rogers and Tucker had come west from Ontario. The former is believed to have left a wife and family in his east.

SAFE WAS UNLOCKED

Post Office Robbers, Planning to Blow It, Were Saved Trouble.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—The post office at Queenstown was robbed some time between midnight Sunday and eight o'clock yesterday morning. The authorities believe the robbers entered the post office expecting to find a safe. Through some mistake the door of the safe had been left open, and the robbers did not have to go to any trouble. Registered letters and parcels were stolen.

Telegraphers Are In Session at Montreal

Montreal, Oct. 2.—Two hundred delegates representing locals of the Commercial Telegraphers Union all over America, met in convention yesterday disposing of routine business preparatory to the discussion of important topics today. The convention will continue until Friday.

The delegates were welcomed by J. T. Foster, president of the local Trades and Labor Council. Mr. Foster in his address dealt at some length with questions of general interest to organized labor, deprecating what he called the enviousness of some people to divide labor in this province on racial and religious grounds.

A. H. Montgomery and Son To Face Trial

New York, Oct. 2.—The trial of Austin H. Montgomery, his son, Austin H. Montgomery, Jr., Samuel Harris, Florence Herzog and several others, on indictment on charges of using the mails to defraud investors in the Communist and Fidelity Finance Corporation, which had been set for yesterday, was adjourned to October 15.

Mr. Montgomery, Sr., an American citizen visited Quebec City with his wife and children several days ago. His deportation was sought by U. S. authorities but Justice Gwynne, a Quebec judge, maintained a writ of habeas corpus in his favor, ruling he was not subject to deportation.

Later, however, Mr. Montgomery returned to the U. S. voluntarily to face his trial.

Delay Action To Buy Pulp Mills

Toronto, Oct. 2.—Bond holders of Clarke Bros. Limited, met yesterday to consider an offer of purchase of the company's property arranged by a Chicago syndicate of pulp and paper interests. But owing to a confusion in the proxies many were voided and a full quorum was not available.

It was therefore decided to postpone official consideration of the matter until Oct. 11. Colonel E. C. Phinney of Halifax spoke of legal difficulties encountered in the course of determining priority of certain mortgages.

Presbyterians on Way To St. John

Halifax, Oct. 2.—Twenty Halifax delegates to the Maritime Presbyterian Association conference at St. John left today for that city. Others will leave this afternoon.

Delegates include Professors Kent and Falconer, Fine Hill College; Rev. J. Y. McKinnon of St. John's church; Rev. Mr. Nicholson of Dartmouth, and J. C. Cass of Halifax.

IRELAND TO BE DEBATED AT PARLEY

Participation of Irish Free State Before Premier's Conference.

FISCAL QUESTIONS

Fair Proportion of British Credits Will be Asked For.

(Canadian Press Cable)

Dublin, Oct. 2.—The participation of the Irish Free State in the British Imperial Conference at London, it is felt here, will have a direct bearing on immediate Irish interests and the attitude to be adopted by the Irish delegation has been exhaustively discussed at a Cabinet meeting here.

It was originally intended to send Kevin O'Higgins, who is Vice-President as well as Home Secretary, to accompany President Cosgrave. Desmond Fitzgerald was to be present officially as Minister of Foreign Affairs.

However, Joseph McGrath, Minister of Commerce, was unexpectedly selected, and this is taken as an indication that the problem of unemployment will be one of those to occupy the attention of the Conference.

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Alarm Clocks Not Needed

TO SETTLE MILLION REFUGEES

Greek Govt. Will Have Help of Nations League to Float Loan.

A LARGE PROJECT.

Bank of England Will Advance £1,000,000 to Start Work.

(Canadian Press.)

Geneva, Oct. 2.—The vast humanitarian project of settling almost a million Greek refugees on Greek territory was launched yesterday when League of Nations officials explained the plan, made necessary by the displacement of populations following the Greco-Turkish war.

Morgenstern Director.

Henry Morgenstern of New York, former U. S. ambassador to Turkey, was selected for the post of director because of his knowledge and eminent services in Near East relief. Other members of the organization, which will be called the League settlement commission of the council of the League, will be Colonel John Campbell, Etienne Della and Pericles Agoropoulos. The last two men were designated by the Greek Government.

The project comprises a loan of from £2,000,000 to £5,000,000, which is to be floated by the Greek Government with the assistance of the League of Nations, the Bank of England making a provisional advance of £1,000,000. The Greek Government will hand over the Morgenstern commission 500,000 hectares of land, probably in Macedonia.

Refunding Loan IS ALL-SUBSCRIBED

\$25,000,000 Raised Daily for Issue to Retire 1923 Victory Loan.

Toronto, Oct. 2.—Having to pay \$80 a ton for coal for a winter which generally lasted 11 months of the year, and living for months on reindeer, caribou and seal, and seeing only a few white men during the year, were some of the experiences of Rev. W. H. D. Hoare and Mrs. Hoare, of Ottawa, Anglican missionaries to the Eskimos at Herschel Island in the Arctic ocean for the last three years. Mr. and Mrs. Hoare and two children arrived in Ottawa yesterday after having been on their way home since May 2. They travelled by dog train, canoe, steamboat and by train.

Handcuffed To Bride Prevents Kidnapping

New York, Oct. 2.—Earl B. Latham Jr., when dressing for his marriage to Miss Elizabeth Jane Burke of Palisades Park on Wednesday night, remembered the three of his friends to kidnap the bride as a humorous innovation immediately after the ceremony, and slipped a pair of handcuffs into one of his pockets. As the ceremony came to an end Latham quickly placed the handcuffs upon himself and his wife and turned triumphantly to the large bridal party. His acquaintances accompanied the newly wed pair to the ship which was to take them to Bermuda and gave them a merry send-off.

Italian Princess Shows Improvement

Rome, Oct. 2.—The condition of Princess Giovanna, second daughter of King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena of Italy, was still very grave today, according to advices from Raconig. The patient passed a quiet night, however, and the physicians saw some signs of improvement. Peritonitis has developed and there are serious intestinal hemorrhages.

Occupation Ends Allied Troops and Fleets Depart and Leave Turkey to Turks.

Constantinople, Oct. 2.—The allied occupation of Constantinople formally ended at noon today. For weeks transports have been evacuating troops and material, while one by one the warships have slipped away thus making today's function merely a brief military ceremony that lasted about half an hour.

Thus for the first time in nearly four years not an Allied uniform is to be seen on the narrow streets of the city. The historic harbor is untroubled by the great war fleets that made the Bosphorus and the Sea of Marmara seem to be one of the world's greatest naval stations.

One cruiser and two destroyers of each power will remain until December. The Turkish garrison will enter the city on Saturday.

U. S. Dirigible ZR-1 Starts Long Flight

St. Louis, Oct. 2.—The United States navy dirigible Z R-1, which is on its first long distance flight, from Lakehurst, N. J., was loosing along over Illinois early today en route here to the international air races.

Radio messages received from the dirigible early today reported all was well and that nothing had occurred upward on the cruise. The motors of the giant ship were running smoothly.

5,000,000 Bushels Booked From West

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 2.—More than 5,000,000 bushels of grain had been booked for shipment from Vancouver to the United Kingdom and the Orient between now and next February, it was announced last night at the Vancouver Merchants Exchange. This constitutes a great advance over any previous season.

Vancouver will be in a position to handle about 50,000,000 or 60,000,000 bushels during the coming season, port authorities stated today. Alberta and Western Saskatchewan have more than double that quantity of grain seeking a market.

The Board of Health in monthly session yesterday, ordered prohibition to be taken against two milk dealers who were not complying with the regulation and against one vendor, who was bringing milk into the city, in cans not properly sealed.

Dr. F. Fred Johnson, dairy and food inspector, reported on his visits to the slaughter houses. In all thirty-one visits were made to the two slaughter houses and conditions were found to be satisfactory.

Miss Alice Hegan in her report on the anti-tuberculosis work, told of 817 patients formerly registered and twenty-three new patients. In all 840 visits were made by the nurses. Twenty-six of the patients were discharged as non-tubercular and five were receiving free milk.





New York, Oct. 2.—Two hundred and fifty freshmen fought an equal number of sophomores to a draw in front of the Columbia Library on Saturday. The battle was not the annual classic rush, but merely an impromptu skirmish. Half a dozen scented yearlings were trying to accommodate their heads to the blue skull caps when a score of sophisticated sophs happened by and jeered the efforts. They further humiliated the newcomers by putting them "through the mill." This latter is the very essence of

disgrace. It is a process exactly opposite to leaping, and requires the victims to crawl and squirm their way under the doubled-up tormentors. The unhappy six were overwhelmed by numbers and went through the trial, but on being released rushed to the 116th street subway to meet other freshmen coming to class.



Ex-Crown Prince Years for Life of Ease in America

Indications Are He Will Be Exile For Many Years to Come.

Amsterdam, Sept. 1.—(By the Associated Press, by mail.)—Friends of Frederick Hohenzollern, at one time heir to the German throne, who have visited the exile on the little island of Wieringen, in northern Holland, say that he would like to go to the United States and begin life afresh. He realizes there is little chance of his being allowed to return to Germany, and on that account he would like to try his fortunes in America.

It is difficult to say how Frederick would get on in competition with other men, a thing he has never experienced. The life that would suit him best, his friends say, would be that of an American country gentleman. But the present indications are that he never will be anything for years to come other than an exile, something half way between a tourist enjoying an island holiday and Napoleon on St. Helena. Frederick has been living at Wieringen for five years. He is now 41 years old. His hair has turned completely gray since the war. His face is much fuller, but it is also more furrowed, and his forehead is more wrinkled. His eyes and his gestures are as lively as ever. He has the same abrupt way of speaking. His movements, too, are sudden and abrupt. His attitude toward life is simple.

He is not given to deep thinking. He takes things as they are without worrying over their ultimate consequences. He is relatively free from illusions, particularly from the illusions that fill the world in which his imperial father lives at Doorn.

The former Crown Prince is a convinced monarchist. At the same time he is not embittered because Germany is a republic. He does not meditate the overthrow of the republic, his friends aver. He accepts it with a shrug of the shoulders, although he believes the monarchy would be better for the German people.

The Prince is liked by the fishermen of Wieringen, and they never fail to greet him whenever he passes by. It often happens that when they catch a particularly fine fish they bring it to his house, and he buys it from them. His library consists mainly of American and English fiction. There is one bookcase with the inscription in capital letters, "My Works." It holds his own three books and the translation of them in numerous languages, his book on big game hunting, his war book and his memoirs.

The Prince is not allowed to leave the island except in a car and accompanied by a Dutch officer. When he is on the mainland he is not allowed to have the automobile. He is not permitted to pass through Amsterdam or The Hague, and when he goes to see his father at Doorn he has to make a long detour to avoid Amsterdam.




JUNIORS' NIGHT IN CENTRAL CHURCH



INSANE WITH POWER.
(Toronto Star.)
Premier Mussolini of Italy considers himself a man of destiny—a Napoleon, a Cromwell, a Musolini. He is nominally a premier, but as the head of an organization, that is another matter. He is in many ways that if it did not do what he wanted he would abolish it and rule without it. His right to rule is based on might, and he boasts of it.

The despatches speak of the stand Italy takes against Greece. It is Musolini, not Italy. This so-called premier's career has been a lawless one. On learning of the Janina murders, Musolini appears, without a moment's hesitation, to have rushed the Italian navy into war, shelling the innocent citizens of Corfu. There is no precedent in civilized history for this unprovoked and headlong plunge into war. Italy, like nearly all the powers, is a member of the League of Nations. The terms of the covenant to which Italy has subscribed there is a regular procedure which that country should have followed before having recourse to an act of war. Article XIII requires that Italy should have reported her grievance against Greece to the league for arbitration, and Italy is pledged "in no case to resort to war until three months after the award by

the arbitrators, or the report by the arbitrators, or report by Council."
Italy, it is said, will disregard the League of Nations and deal with Greece as she sees fit. If the first nation of any size which "sees red" can thus repudiate the league and ignore the whole structure collapses. It is to be hoped that it will not collapse in this way, but will find itself with such backing as will enable it to stay the hand of Musolini. New evidence has been given, if not a logical one, that the school board of that country should travel at the frightful speed of fifteen miles by steam. He would have forestalled it through His holy prophets. It is a device of Satan to lead immortal souls astray."

This was only ninety-five years ago and almost within the memory of at least a few still living, within the memory of a whole generation who may have heard such comments from men and women who had shared the view of that school board on the innovations of their day.

MUSIC LOVERS ARE GIVEN TREAT

Give Ovation to Dame Clara Butt and Associates at Opera House.

St. John music lovers enjoyed a real treat last evening when they had the pleasure of listening to the renowned Dame Clara Butt, famous contralto, and her accompanying artists, Kennerley Rumford, W. H. Squire and Ivor Newton, in a select concert at the Opera House. Dame Butt proved to be an artist of distinguished gifts in voice and dramatic expression, possessing much charm of tone and elegance of vocal style, also great impressiveness of dramatic characterization. She is in truth a contralto of the first order. Her voice has tones of bell-like clearness, which pour forth in glorious swelling power. Her audience was a highly appreciative one, ready to welcome and applaud at every opportunity, and the reception she received was such to impress deeply. Gifted with striking personality, poise and style, she held her audience enthralled. It was a treat that will not soon be forgotten by local music lovers, and one which will go down in the annals of musical achievements on a local stage with those of Madame Nordica, Madame Albani and other renowned artists. F. G. Spencer is to be congratulated on again giving St. John great pleasure in music.

In addition to Dame Butt, solos were well rendered by Kennerley Rumford, a baritone. He demonstrated that he has studied the best models and profited well and his singing throughout was enjoyed greatly.

W. H. Squire made a decided hit with his well chosen and beautifully rendered violin solo. He has an impressive style and brought out many beautiful passages with expression and great charm. His playing was a delight in every number.

Ivor Newton, in his accompaniments and pianoforte solos, showed a real artist. The perfection of his fingers during the period when the Italo-Greek crisis has been under discussion and I am anxious that the part played by the league in the settlement should not be misunderstood or misrepresented or obscured by the part played by the conference of ambassadors at Paris. The action of the league was not dramatic, but it has nevertheless been effective. The crisis is passed and the league has shown its usefulness. It is worthy of the settlement adopted by the conference of ambassadors and is almost identical with the proposals of the council of the league in other words, the way out of the mess was found here at Geneva and not at Paris. All of the important proposals of the league were adopted; some were amplified, and only one was changed.

Two things about the results already obtained should be emphasized: First, the demands of Italy have been greatly reduced and modified in form; and second, the more reasonable terms

have been obtained by public opinion acting through the League of Nations. The reasonableness of the settlement as compared with the original Italian demands is especially marked, and the difference is due to the existence and machinery of the league.

Italy's challenge of the competency of the council has solidified public opinion and has shown the vitality of the league. The way in which the small nations have rallied to the support of the council has been most impressive. In spite of French pressure, the representatives of Belgium and the Little Entente have spoken out in no uncertain terms. Switzerland, Holland, the Scandinavian and South American countries have asserted themselves with equal vigor. It has been an open secret that Italy and her French supporters have dreaded discussion in the assembly because they knew that their isolated position would be only too evident. The Swiss press has strongly supported the league, and the English Labor press has valiantly upheld the council's competency to act. The French papers have been divided; some have favored the league, while others, with the Northcliffe press, which is outdoing the most chauvinistic French papers, have scoffed at the league as an organization of idealistic fools.

The value of the league can be appreciated when one considers what happened in such cases before the league was formed and what would or might have happened if there were no league now. Italy could have done as she liked with Greece. With a vast number of precedents behind her for summary action without reference to what other nations thought or believed right, Italy could have demanded and taken whatever she saw fit. It is these facts are recalled that the work of the league appears in its true light. Not only has it settled the difficulties, but it has settled them in spite of the precedents which stood in the way. The Greek obligations have been determined and accepted by all parties and Italian aggression has been stopped. Before the war, if Italy had seized Corfu, England would probably have protested and Austria might have made a fuss, not because of any desire to protect Greece, but because their own interests were affected. Now 50 of the 52 nations of the league protest, strongly against the extreme demands of Italy and against the bombardment and occupation of Corfu, not because their own private interests are imperilled, but because the covenant and international peace are affected. This new attitude of the nations involves a fundamental change in the point of view. What affects one, affects all. In this crisis through which the league has just passed, the strength of that principle has been brought out. It has been shown that even the strongest nations cannot go their own way without regard to world opinions as reflected by the League of Nations. It has been demonstrated that the new principle of international interdependence is not just an idealistic theory, but is now, and hereafter will be, current practice.

Egyptians Would Discourage Inter- Race Marriage

Students at University Have Tendency to Marry Euro- pean Women.

When the Arabic press of Egypt allows itself a brief respite from political disputation, no subject more frequently engages attention than the constantly increasing number of marriages between Egyptian men and European women. These unions are looked upon with disfavor by the older generation of Egyptians, and the newspapers are, as a rule, severely critical of the young men who have sought wives outside their own country.

An Egyptian, just back from fifteen years spent in Europe, during which he had taken several university degrees, was the master in a nutshell when he said:

"When I marry I want a wife who can share my tastes and be interested in the things which interest me. At present I can take my choice between an Egyptian girl of that description, who will probably be homesick and whose sole interest will almost certainly be clothes and gossip. I prefer to marry a European girl."

That Egyptian is exceptional so far as his university degrees are concerned, but it is not atypical of his class. Not until public opinion in Egypt discards the century-old conception of women in life will there be any substantial change for the better.

Everything that happens in Turkey is followed with the keenest interest here. The Angora Government's prohibition law gave an immediate stimulus to the temperance movement in Egypt, which already has results to show for its increased activity.

PREDICTS BUILDING DROP.

Labor Leader Warns Trades to Pre- pare for "Rainy Day."

Portland, Ore., Oct. 2.—An unhealthy condition exists in the building industry in America and workmen engaged in it should prepare for the "rainy day" which must follow the collapse of the present boom, in the opinion of John Donlin, president of the Building Trades Department of the American Federation of Labor. Mr. Donlin sounded his warning in presenting his annual report at the convention of the Building Trades here.

"Prevailing conditions," the report said, "are not conducive to good. This boom will see its end before we are aware; competition will again assert itself among all the elements of the industry, material manufacturers will slacken production in accord with demand. Mechanics are being taught in great numbers. We are trying to satisfy a 300 per cent. abnormal demand. This demand will recede until we have reached 100 per cent. of normal, and consequently only one in each three will find work. We must prepare to meet that inevitable condition."
