SHOT IN FIGHT BY LIOUOR THIEVES

Guard Gets Bullet Near the Heart-Were Surprised Tapping Drums.

(New York Times.) A battle between negro bootleggers who had been stealing alcohol from New York Central Pier 3 in Weehawken, York Central Pier 3 in Weehawken, and a railroad patrolman and United States customs guard took place on the pier last night, and the customs man was shot through the chest near the heart. One of the negroes was shot, and the railroad patrolman's coat was riddled by hullets on one side.

The unwounded negro escaped, but the railroad police force was puzzled last night to account for the disappearance of the body of the other bootlegger. Kunz, the railroad man, said that his bullet tore the negro's head open, but when he went back to look for the body after a went back to look for the body after a vain pursuit of the second man, it was gone. Whether the body was taken away by companions who remained hidden during the fight or whether it was thrown into the river or whether the man was not killed and recovered in a few minutes sufficiently to get away, was

There is always some alcohol stored on the big pier waiting export shipment, and negroes have been going over from New York and filling bottles with alcohol from the drums. They sell the alcohol for \$20 a quart and evidently feel compensated for being shot at occasionally by railroad men, who have had many fights with them.





FLEEING HUSBANDS WILL BE PURSUED

Quebec Govrenment Gave Assistance in Bringing Family Deserter from Ontario.

(Montreal Gazette.) A resolution expressing appreciation of Premier Taschereau's co-operation in effecting the arrest in Ontario of a man who had deserted his family and who was brought back to Montreal for trial, was adopted at yesterday's monthly meeting of the board of trustees of the Society for the Protection of Women and Children, which was held at the offices, 207 St. Catherine street west. The accused man, who had already appeared in court, had, it is alleged, deserted his family over a year ago, leaving his wife and four children utterly destitute and, consequently, objects of public charity.

The S. P. W. C. regarded this action of the provincial government as highly important, inasmuch as this was a test case. The ease with which men could skip their martial and family obligations owing to the fact that they could not be brought back from other provinces at the public expense, had proved a great handicap to the S. P. W. C. in its efforts to follow up such deserting husbands. 



BOARD OF HEALTH ESTIMATES PASS THE COMMITTEE

Decision was made yesterday by the finance committee of the municipal council to assess for the needs of the local board of health for the year 1922. The board of health for the year 1922. The committee had previously gone on record as being opposed to issuing a warrant for that purpose, but yesterday it reversed its decision in regard to the matter. Morning, afternoon and evening sessions of the committee were held and lengthy and careful consideration was given to the estimates of various county. lengthy and careful consideration was given to the estimates of various county institutions in an effort to keep down expenditures. Mayor Schofield was in the chair and others present were Warden Bullock, Councillors Jones, Frank, Thornton, O'Brien, Donovan, Campbell and Golding, and the county secretary,

At the morning session Joseph Likely and E. L. Rising, on behalf of the Anti-tuberculosis Association, asked that a grant of \$1,200 be made towards the salaries of officials of the association. This

was refused.

It was decided to assess \$175 for the valuators' fund, to meet a balance due on a revaluation of the county, conducted at a cost of \$20,000.

It was also decided that the parishes should charge themselves with a total of \$470 for revising voters' lists for the house of assembly. ed at a cost of \$20,000.

The question of provision for persons of unsound mind came up and it was pointed out that previous to 1921 the county was assessed \$4,400 for that item. The law was changed in 1921 and the county is now required to pay for 100 cases at the rate of \$2.50 per week. It will be necessary to issue a warrant for Will be necessary to issue the Provincial Hospital item in 1922. The assessment for 1921 was \$10,150 and of this there was collected \$8,527; out of this the county paid the government \$7,695, which included arrears for 1920. There is still owing to the government \$6,720 for 1921. The warrant of \$19,887.50 does not allow for defaults in collection.
