CURTAIN SOON TO BE RAISED London, Oct. 2—A correspondent of the Central News at Calais, after a cour in the vicinity of the allies' left, says: "Without disclosing military secrets I can say that I have seen many things to remove any misgivings as to the outcome of the battle. The moment is near when the curtain will be lifted

"The position of the German right wing on Wednesday was such that a ortion lying between Lassigny and Chaulnes was in extreme danger. "On Sunday a German patrol was captured near Shaulness. The fate of the Germans was due to a shortage of horses. The men said that they had had nothing to eat for some days. They belonged to General Von Kluck's command.

"It has been apparent throughout that General Von Kluck's right was made more precarious by the crowding on him of reinforcements from the centre and the left by the German general staff. His commissariat failed. This might have been avoided if the Germans had been prepared to sacrifice their carefully selected position in the Noyon region, but they staked everything, as

ANTWERP IS BUT

correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, wiring from Antwerp, under date of Thursday noon, says:

"From the top of a gas tank at Hoboken (three miles southwest of Antwerp) last night, was witnessed a scene of sombre grandeur. The line of attack on the city was defined very sharply in the clear night air by flashes of the enemy's great siege guns. Similarly the line of defense was shown in points of light which stabbed the night from the Belgian forts. It was almost possible occasionally to see the effect of the falling shells.

"The artillery duel continued throughout the night. The German fire seemed to be directed chiefly toward emptying the outlying villages and every road into Antwerp was choked with refugees.

"There is no doubt that many alarming reports of the German operations will creep across the frontier to Holland. 





> All the museums of Paris have been closed since the beginning of the war, and, so far as possible, the chief treasures were deposited in iron cases in vaults, a precaution that has proven only too well advised. One of the aeroplanes that recently flew over the city dropped a bomb when immediately above the Louvre, but fortunately the aviator did not allow sufficiently for forward velocity, and the bomb fell into the Seine close by.

The Bibliotheque Nationale had a still narrower escape, which was recounted by one of its librarians. He with three other persons, saw one of the aerial visitors drop a bomb when exactly over the manuscript room and the missile only missed the building by twenty yards. This aviator was afterwards chased and caught by one of the French air patrols and found to be a man who had lived for years quite near the famous library, showing that the attack on the unique collection of valuable manuscripts was not accidental.

The disorganized state of the postal service, which seems to be getting worse instead of better, has given rise to complaints on all sides and all kinds of suggestions have been put forward, with a view to limiting the evil. 
