





SIR CONAN DOYLE TRIES TO WIN SLATER'S FREEDOM

SUFFERERS FROM PILES!

Zam-Buk Has Cured These!

Creator of Sherlock Holmes Interested In "Mystery of the Murdered Spin ster"

London, Oct. 16—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, creator of that remarkable detective, Sherlock Holmes, has published abook in defence of Oscar Slater of Glasgow, whom he is attempting to free from a sentence of life imprisonment, Sir Arthur was largely instrumental in having the original death sentence commuted. The case, which might be called "The Mystery of the Murdered Spinster," is a real life story fully interesting as Doyle eyer wrote. Sir Arthur maintains there was not enough evidence produced to incriminate Slater in the murder of Marion Gilchrist, Seventy, who was found on December 21, 1908, on the floor of her apartment with her head battered in and her jewelry, valued at more than \$20,000, missing.

There was only the testimouy of a servant, Helen Lamble, who said that on the hight of the murder a well dressed macame out of one of the bedrooms, approached her pleasantly, and passed down the stairs. The police learned that Slater had offered for sale a pawn ticket for a diamond brooch belonging to Misse Gilchrist.

On December 28 Slater and a French woman sailed for New York, where they were arrested. Sir Arthur was aided in his first fight by 20,000 persone.
