My friend was telling me about this arrangement. "How much time will she give you?" I asked. "Oh, I don't know," said the lady airily. "I suppose she will help me whenever I need her."

"Can't you see trouble ahead for those two?" I can. If there is anything on earth that makes for dissatisfaction and misunderstandings any more surely than an indefinite arrangement like that, an exchange in which it is not nominated in the bond exactly what each party gets, I have yet to find it.

Usually one party is badly cheated and invariably both parties think they are.

Two old neighbors of mine used to be very dear friends until one summer they foolishly entered into a compact that the horse of the party of the first part should be occasionally allowed to graze in the field of the party of the second part, in exchange for the occasional use of said horse by the party of the second part. Needless to say these two dear friends no longer speak.

Daily Hints For the Cook


SPICE LAYER CAKE

Three cupsful of flour, 5 eggs, 2 cupsful of dark brown sugar, 3 teaspoonfuls of all-spice, 1 cupful of butter, 2 teaspoonfuls of ginger, 1 cupful of sugar milk, 1 teaspoonful of soda, 1 wineglassful of brandy, 2 teaspoonfuls of clear thick white icing, 3 teaspoonfuls of cinnamon. Cream the sugar and butter and add the sour milk in which the soda has been dissolved. Beat the whites and yolks of the five eggs separately, and add the latter to mixture, then mix in the spices and brandy and add the flour. Bake in layers and when done spread between them a thick white icing.

Adel, Ga., Oct. 16.—The bodies of M. A. Crosby, cashier of the bank of Adel and his wife were found in their bedroom here by their six-year-old son. The woman was on the floor, with a revolver in her hand and a bullet through her brain. Crosby was on the bed, shot through the right eye. At the inquest it was decided that Mrs. Crosby had killed her husband as he slept and then killed herself. They lived happily so far as known. The will of the dead man was found in a bureau drawer. It left everything to his wife and children. Crosby was the wealthiest man in this section of Georgia.

Creator of Sherlock Holmes Interested in "Mystery of the Murdered Spinster"

London, Oct. 16—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, creator of that remarkable detective, Sherlock Holmes, has published a book in defence of Oscar Slater of Glasgow, whom he is attempting to free from a sentence of life imprisonment. Sir Arthur was largely instrumental in having the original death sentence commuted.

The case, which might be called "The Mystery of the Murdered Spinster," is a real life story fully interesting as Doyle ever wrote. Sir Arthur maintains there was not enough evidence produced to incriminate Slater in the murder of Marion Gilchrist, twenty, who was found on December 21, 1908, on the floor of her apartment with her head battered in and her jewelry, valued at more than \$2,000, missing.

There was only the testimony of a servant, Helen Lambie, who said that on the night of the murder a well dressed man came out of one of the bedrooms, approached her pleasantly, and passed down the stairs. The police learned that Slater had offered for sale a pawn ticket for a diamond brooch belonging to Miss Gilchrist.

On December 29 Slater and a French woman sailed for New York, where they were arrested. Sir Arthur was aided in his first fight by 20,000 persons.

The London Express says: A valuable cow belonging to R. Brown, of Blue State Farm, Foxbridge, on being frightened by boys yesterday jumped into the canal and swam through a tunnel more than a mile long, emerging at the Colne end. On the way it met a steam tug towing an empty boat, and it is supposed that these went over it, as there would not be room enough for them to pass each other. The swim was very much exhausted by its swim, and had to be helped out of the water, but it recovered.

Creator of Sherlock Holmes Interested in "Mystery of the Murdered Spinster"

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The case, which might be called "The Mystery of the Murdered Spinster," is a real life story fully interesting as Doyle ever wrote. Sir Arthur maintains there was not enough evidence produced to incriminate Slater in the murder of Marion Gilchrist, twenty, who was found on December 21, 1908, on the floor of her apartment with her head battered in and her jewelry, valued at more than \$2,000, missing.

There was only the testimony of a servant, Helen Lambie, who said that on the night of the murder a well dressed man came out of one of the bedrooms, approached her pleasantly, and passed down the stairs. The police learned that Slater had offered for sale a pawn ticket for a diamond brooch belonging to Miss Gilchrist.

On December 29 Slater and a French woman sailed for New York, where they were arrested. Sir Arthur was aided in his first fight by 20,000 persons.

AROSTOOK'S POTATO CROP

Three-Fourths Harvested But Shipments Less Than Third of Amount in 1911

Houlton, Oct. 16.—According to a view of the potato situation in Aroostook taken by A. G. Rich, an extensive buyer, the crop here is about three-fourths harvested. The shipments, however, have been much lighter than last year. Up to Oct. 1, 1911, the shipments by the Bangor & Aroostook from that season's crop aggregated practically three and one-half million bushels, while from the 1912 crop the shipments up to Oct. 1 were somewhat under one million bushels.

The acreage in Aroostook county, according to Mr. Rich, is probably slightly in excess of 1911, and while the yield of Cobscook is larger than last year as a rule, yet the yield per acre for Green Mountains is not as heavy; they will probably run seventy to ninety barrels to the acre. The quality, however, is extra fine and the size being medium they will suit the trade better than last year.

The demand for seed potatoes from the south for both Cobscook and Blue has been good and buyers from that section have been in Aroostook the greater part of the fall and are now shipping and storing for their spring trade.

The price at present for Green Mountains ranges from \$1 to \$1.50 and for Cobscook \$1.10 to \$1.20 a barrel, according to the quality. It is thought that the movement of potatoes through November and December will be much heavier than corresponding months of last year, so that by January 1 the shipments will show as much difference in the two years as at present.

As to the quality of the Aroostook potato is better than usual both as regard size and cooking qualities, it is thought there will be a steady demand at fair prices through the entire winter.

EIGHTY CENTS AT HARTLAND.

The best offer from Montreal was \$1.25 landed there, which would leave, after paying freight and expenses, a profit of four cents to the dealer. Farmers are finding great difficulty in harvesting their potatoes as most of the available labor has been attracted to Maine where they receive \$4 a day and board.

John Downie, a well known resident of Torriburn, passed away at his home this morning after a brief illness. He was sixty-five years of age and leaves two sons and five daughters. The sons are John and James, and the daughters are Margaret, Nellie, Sarah, Emma and Myrtle, four of whom are living in the state. The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon at 2 p.m.

MONTGOMERY MAN PROMOTED BY COAL COMPANY

George McSweeney to be Assistant Superintendent at Springhill

Montreal, Oct. 16—George McSweeney, formerly of Montreal, now of the Dominion Coal Company's staff here, has been appointed assistant superintendent of the company's Springhill district. He had been playing fine football for the M. A. A. team.

TWO SYNODS TO BE MADE OUT OF ONE AT MONTREAL MEETING

For the first time in nine years, the Synod of the Church of England, Province of Canada, will meet on Thursday next in Montreal. Ten bishops will be present, the gathering being presided over by the Archbishop of Ottawa.

This meeting will be a historic assembly, marking an important epoch in the development of the Church of England in Canada. It will probably be the last meeting representative of the ecclesiastical province as now constituted, the principal business to be transacted being the completion of the division of the province of the present Province of Canada into two parts.

Just now the province comprises the whole of Eastern Canada from Nova Scotia to London, Ont. Soon the territory will include two provinces—the Province of Canada from Montreal eastward, including the dioceses of Montreal, Quebec, Fredericton and Nova Scotia, and the Province of Ontario, embracing the dioceses extending westward to and including the diocese of Huron. After the formal division is made, the important matter of the appointment of a new archbishop will come up, though it is not expected this will be discussed at Thursday's meeting.

On Friday, in the cathedral, the solemn consecration of the new Bishop of Japan will take place.

Several Anglican clergymen and laymen in the city and other centres of the province have left or will leave today for Montreal to attend the meetings of the synod. Archdeacon Raymond is now in Montreal for the sessions, while others who will go are Rev. A. Kuhling, Rev. G. F. Scovill, Rev. H. A. Cady, F. D. L. Clements and W. H. Fisher. Rev. Canon Hamilton of Hampton, will probably attend also.

STANDARD PLEASE COPY

Potatoes are being rapidly harvested. They are coming to the track freely for seventy cents per barrel.

FURS STILL DEARER

London, Oct. 16—It is an undoubted fact that furs are becoming more expensive every season, and the present one is no exception, as may be seen by a few instances given here.

A seal jacket which eighteen years ago cost \$200, today will bring almost \$750, while chinchilla has risen 300 per cent during the last ten years. Ermine, astrachan, musquash and mink have risen about 100 per cent in the same period. With the great increase in price of the best furs, imitations have come greatly into vogue, and certainly of all imitations musquash—which nowadays can stand alone on its own merits—is easily first favorite.

So closely does "seal" musquash resemble genuine seal that not even an expert can tell the difference without a fairly close examination. Coney skins, practically rabbit skins, are also extensively used as seal substitutes, and they are as good an imitation today as musquash was ten years ago.

ST. JOHN FANS HOME

Found No Trouble Getting Seats at Boston Games

Many of the St. John fans who journeyed to the States to see the big league games have either returned to their homes or else are on the way today. A few others, inspired with enthusiasm, even left yesterday to witness the final battle in the series today. It is certain that a great many other local admirers of baseball would have gone to Boston or New York to see one of the games had it not been thought that the chance of securing seats were slim, indeed, but this has now been recognized as a fallacy, or as one of the 200 local fans who did as Steve Brody did once upon a time, and on his return yesterday "the scare about not getting seats is all sheer humbug." St. John fans will not be fooled in this way again. While speculators on the eve of the series were offering reservations from \$60 downwards few paid this price and those who did realized their mistake later. In Boston there were 20,000 "rags" seats selling at moderate prices and it was no great difficulty to get to these, even though many thinking otherwise sniped outside the grounds all night to be first in line.
