### \$15,000,000 IN SHIP CONTRACTS

Improvement in Shipbuilding in the United States is Shown by Figures.

New York, March 10 .- Contracts for new ship construction in January and February amounted to \$5,000,000, and

February amounted to \$5,000,000, and additional orders are in sight to bring the total up to \$15,000,000 by the first of May, according to a statement from the Atlantic Coast Shipbuilding Association. A report from the Department of Commerce states that on February 1, 1923, 236 steel ships of 302, 047 gross tons, were building, as compared with 218 vessels of 251,858 tons on January 1, 1923, an advance of seventeen ships of 50,000 tons.


In addition to the contracts for new wessels, considerable sums will be spent for conversion, repairs and reconditioning of ships, the association reports. While the amount of business already placed and contemplated this year seems large in the aggregate, it is small considering the facilities available to build ships. The association records show that there were at least 850 shipyards, boat building plants and repairy yards doing business in this country during the war, and while more than two-thirds of the number have either shut down or engaged in other lines of activity about 240 are still in operation or would start up immediately if contracts were to be had. The great majority of these plants are equipped only for repair work or the building of barges, tugs and small wooden ships, but much of the work now being placed is of that type. The contracts for new construction awarded thus far this year are divided among seventeen firms, of which only five belong to the class of shipyards capable of building the larger type vessels. 





Franklin, La., March 10-Bulletpierced and trampled by booted feet, the bodies of Wesley Crain and Wiley Pierce, deputy sheriffs of Washington Parish, slain by moonshiners they had captured at a still in the swamps eight miles east of here, were found buried in a shallow grave a quarter of a mile

in a shallow grave a quarter of a mile from the destroyed still.

The carcass of a cow had been dragged on top of Cain's body. The body of Pierce had been pressed down in eighteen inches of mud and slush.

John Murphy and Gideon Rester, two of the men rounded up by a posse, are accused by the authorities of the crime. An official statement, credited to the Franklinton authorities, is that both men confessed.

Sheriff J. E. Bateman of Washington placed a guard of heavily armed men around the jall here, in which, besides Murphy and Rester, are confined ten other suspects taken into custody during the last few days.

The bodies of the two deputies were found buried a few feet apart, that of Pierce having been mutilated with an axe or some other sharp instrument.

It is very necessary for us so to conduct ourselves that there will be no need for the organization of groups to counteract and resist the United States."










