

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 12-With a view to arriving at an understanding of what motive power, rolling stock and other essentials for railway operation will be required during the coming year, a con-ference was held today by Hon. J. D. Reid, railways minister; Hon. H. C. Mewburn, minister of militia; Sir Thos. White, minister of finance; President Beaty of the C. P. R.; President Kelley, of the Grand Trunk, and President Hanna of the C. N. R. It is recognized that with the closing of munition plants and other war in-dustries many men will be thrown out of work in the near future, and it is the intention of the government, working in
