

Chambers the minister of commerce pointed out that French commerce with Canada had risen from just over \$2,500,000 in 1897 to more than \$10,000,000 in 1909, thus showing that Canada's market was of great importance to France. Under the terms of the new treaty Canada will receive all the minimum rates of the French tariff, with the exception of the rate on eattle fattened for slaughter which will pay the general tariff. 


