GERMANY BUILDING AN AERIAL NAVY

Eight Dirigible Balloons Will Soon be in Service.

The Zeppelin Model is Favored—Present Plans are Chiefly for Experimental Purposes.

BERLIN, July 30—While County Zeppelin is preparing for his great trial with his aluminum airship, other experiments with semi-rigid and entirely flexible dirigible balloons are proceeding in various parts of the county was ng in various parts of the country unend of the year the military authorities will possess eight dirigible balloons suitable for war purposes. Two of these will be of the Zeppelin model, with a 113,000 and 176,000 capacity. The eighth is an enormous flexible balloon, now under construction at the Ziemens-Schuekart workshop here, with a capacity of 424,000 cubic feet. acity of 424,000 cubic feet.

The acceptance of the flexible balloons is conditioned on ability to pack and transport the entire balloon on wagons, so that after unpacking it can be filled from portable gas tanks whereever desired, while following in the train of the army

These acquisitions will form the base of further tests in order to decide \$52,000 which system is most useful for army, purposes. At the conclusion of experiments, a fleet of at least thirty will be constructed. Test will shortly be car-

TORPEDO NETS STOOD TESTS SUCCESSFULLY

NEWPORT, R. I., July 29.—Important secret tests were made at Coddington Cove and in Buzzard's Bay today with the new torpedo nets, a steel mesh claimed to be able to withstand the shock of torpedo fired at a close range. In Coddington Cove the torpedo boats Morris and Gwin fired torpedoes at different ranges and different speeds at the nets, placed above the waters and it is reported unofficially that the nets were not pierced. At Buzzard's Bay the tests were made by firing the torpedoes under water, the second submarine flotlila being engaged in the experiments. It is similarly reported that the tests in this instance were likewise satisfactory.

ALIENS NATURALIZED

OTTAWA, July 29—During the period from July 1, 1905, to December 31, 1907, the number of cliens naturalized in Canada was 17,714. Of these 7,279 were from the United States and 2,127 were Russians. The Japanese numbered 306 and the Chinese 233. Since the act came into force 87,404 aliens have been naturalized.
