(Special to the Sun.) OTTAWA, Sept. 29.—The die is cast. At today's meeting of the cabinet it was definitely decided to dissolve parliament, subject to his excellency's approval, and the dates of nomination and polling were decided upon.

Nominations Thursday, October 27th. Polling Thursday, November 3rd. The writs will be returnable on December 15th.

ONLY SKIRMISHES.

Two Armies Keeping in Touch With Each Other.

Kuropatkin is Getting Reinforcements

From the North—No News of Port Arthur.

Outpost skirmishes constitute the sum total of disclosed activities on the Liao and Taitse rivers in Manchuria. General Kuropatkin is reported to be keeping in close touch with the Japanese front. Russian scouts report that the main Japanese force is centered in the vicinity of the Yental mines.

It appears that General Rennenkampf's movement to the southward on September 19 extended beyond the distance indicated by first reports. His Cossack made a rapid sweep on September 22 and struck a Japanese force at Benzpu threatening their communications and causing considerable excitement.
