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

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

MR. MAYES VINDICATED.

MR. MAYES VINDICATED.

The settlement of the case Mayes vs. the King, in the Exchequer Court in favor of Mr. Gershon S. Mayes, is something more than the mere settlement of a claim in favor of a contractor against the Dominion government. Whatever hardships Ireland suffered in old times from English hands, every one knows that they have been amply atomed for by British statesmen of recent generations. 


