BRITAIN AROUSED AT LAST BY HORRIBLE STORIES OF **BRUTALITY TO PRISONERS**

People Have Been Infuriated and Germany's Chances for Mercy Are Slim-No Mitigation of Peace Terms Since This Has Become Known.

London, Nov. 21—Great Britain is horrified and staggered by the stories of the treatment of British prisoners which are inflaming public opinion to an extent only equalled by the worst submarine outrages.

That Germany would behave with traditional brutality to the prisoners after the signing of the armistice seems never to have occurred to anyone. The majority were anticipating not merely the immediate release but the best of treatment on their return, but instead we have the pittiul procession of ragged starving men, like skeletons walking, many of whom are not reaching the border of France.

This has aroused public fury which has dashed to the ground any lopes the Germans may have of early food supplies, or mitigated peace terms. The war cabinet here anticipating public decision, has already arranged for the care and comfort of survivors, but the impression is made unforgetable.

How others ravaged with disease and tortured on the march were flogged almost to death, yet endured their existence, is absolutely indescribable.

London, Nov. 21.—The steame London, Nov. 21.—The steamer Campania, once Queen of the Seas, has sunk in the Firth of Forth, Scotland, during a sele. All on board were saved. The Campania broke from her mooring during the cale and collided with a fall seatile. The date of the sinking of the vessel has not been made public.

The Campania, a former Cunard Line trans-Atlantic filer, for several years has been the mother ship for seaplanes in the British navy. In 1893 the Campania made a then record voyage from New York to Queenstown in five days, twelve hours, and seven minutes, cutting the time of the American Line steamer City of Paris by two hours for the eastward trip.

The Campania was a vessel of 12.
The Campania was built in Glasgow in 1892. When the war began the vessel was in the hands of ship dismantiers. All the solid Spanish mahogany fitting in her saloons and cabins had been removed and sold. The British admiratty bught the steamer at a good price before the engines, bollers or hull had been tampered with.

During the war the Campania had seen considerable active service. She was in the Jutland fisht, and also took part in the operations by the Allied fleets at the Dardanelles.

Germany Warned **Against Bolshevism**

New York, Nov. 21.—Warning against the danger of Bolshevism in the process of democratizing Germany was given by the Socialist newspaper Vorwaerts as long ago as October 18 in an article urging support of the new government under Prince Maximilian, which had been formed with Socialistic co-operation.

"The working classes must use their power to break down the propagand of Bolshevik resolutions of confused, irresponsible persons who endeavor to incite the workmen to senseless strikes against the new government," says an article in the newspaper of the date given, received in this city.

"Not through creation of a Bolshevik chaos, or the unchaining of a civil war, can the internal requirenation of Germany be brought about. Only by means of a peaceful revolution do we intend to effect the transition to democracy. Until the conclusion of peace and even after, the serious times still are in store for us. We will weather them in the safe consciousness that the future belongs to the reconciliation of the nations, to democracy and socialism."

IMPERIAL LEAGUE MEMBERS OBJECT

Claim That at Least Two Returned Soldiers Should Have Been Appointed District Commissioners.

Canadian Imperial League a spirited discussion on the recent appointment discussion on the recent appointment of four district commissioners took place. The members of the league claimed that at least two of the positions should have gone to returned soldiers and that the names of six qualified men were submitted to the claiman of the Board of Assessors. The secretary was instructed to sead a letter to the mayor and commissioners asking them to give their reasons for overlooking the claims of the returned soldiers when these appointments were made and requesting an immediate reply.

London, Nov. 21.—Although the probability of President Wilson visiting Europe already has been discounted by repeated rumors the official announcement of the president's early arrival is causing a certain amount of commotion. Personally all classes, both high and low, will, be delighted to see the president but his coming raises the question of the status of the meetings of the peace conferences.

The president's "freedom of the seas" point taken in conjunction with the discussion of this question by the democratic New York World made certain sections of opinion here fearful lest President Wilson is coming to urge interpretation which might be unpalatable to England. The diplomatic correspondent of Northcliffe's Evening News reassures the people against the suggestion that President Wilson would be found to be Germany's friend on two points wherein she was most interested, that is, freedom of the seas and no economic war after the war.

"If the Huns imagine President Wilson will be a German advocate at Versailles the indulging is the most grotesting of all the miscalculations whereof they have been guilty since 1614. Mr. Wilson brought America into the war to combat Germany for the next few months.

Montreal, Nov. 21.—Montreal's loss is to be St. John's gain in the matter of shipping for the next few months. The ending of the war comes simultaneously with the close of navigation in the St. Lawrence, and so the enormous cargoes which will go from Canada now to help rebuild war-ridden Europe will for the next six months to a very large extent to through the winter port of Canada, St. John. Shipping men are a unit in predicting a record season. While the materials which have been going in an endless flow from here to Europe to make war will no longer be carported, the reconstruction needs of Europe will make exceptional demands on Canada and for the corning six months St. John will share largely in the prosperity.

The veil of censorship, which has enshrouded the movements of ships from this port has been lifted so recently as to permit of only a cursory review of activities at this port during the past four years, but when the story is told it will make surprising reading.

Money Paid to Secure Freedom of Draftees.

Quebec, Nov. 21.—In an editorial yesterday "Le Soleil," this city, says that the military exemptions in Quebec district have been many and scandalous. It starts with a comment on the revelations that sprang out of the Montmagny exemption scandal and says that should the government look into things in Quebec city and other districts, it would find a good many irregularities in the granting of exemptions from military service.
