The estate really comprises three contiguous farms, ach having its own house and barns. Together they run to a thousand acres, of which 460 are arable and the rest either capable of cultivation or covered with timber of varying value.
Torty miles west of St. John and forty-two east of Frederiction, the New Bruns-wick capital, the situation of the estate is extremely pleasant, and, from the point of view of the boys, strategic. The markets are accessible by water without undue delay, while the distance for large towns keeps temptation out of reach.
We of course, sampled the fruit and inspected the stock. In a year below the average for apples, Mr. Cossar has a more than midding crop. On one of the farms alone are five hundred trees, Many of them bowed under their goiden or roy burden. "Weathier," "Valencias," "Gravensteins," "Duchess," and other well-known varieties, abounded Most of them will reach the British market.

Most of them will reach the British market. We saw polatoes that are averaging fourteen tons to the acre, sound and clean. Though not, perhaps, as good in quality as most farms in this favored province, the land, says Mr. Melklejohn, is equal to that at fifty and sixty shill-ings an acre in Scotland. The stock at present excels in quality rather than quantity. There are 27 "Bor-der Leicestershire" sheep, 14 shorthorn cows, and a pedigree bull, from Clydes-dale and six native farm horses, and 12 Yorkshire sows and a boar. Poultry is lacking, but there are two hives of bees.
