THE REFUSAL TO INVESTIGATE THE CHARGES BY E. S. CARTER

Correspondence Between Mr. Carter and Mr. Commissioner Chandler Regarding the Liquor Hold-Up, the "Patriotic" Potatoes and Other Matters.

At the last session of Royal Commissioner Chandler's court of inquiry E. S. Carter, the opposition organizer, laid certain facts with respect to the purchase of the patriotic potatoes and the expenditure of \$150,000 before him and said that he would make the charges formally before his next meeting.

Mr. E. S. Carter, St. John, N. B., August 25, 1915.
Dear Sir—I find that business matters which require my immediate attention will make it impossible for me to devote much more time to investigations as commissioner. The best I can do is to wind up the matters into which I have already inquired and take the evidence of those witnesses whom Mr. Veniot desires to have examined.

Under these circumstances I shall not be able to take up any new matters for investigation and therefore cannot do anything with respect to the matter to which you lately called my attention.

Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of yours of the 20th inst. and to note the reasons you give why you will be unable to investigate the expenditure of about \$150,000 for the purchase of patriotic potatoes, to which I called your attention at the last session of your court.

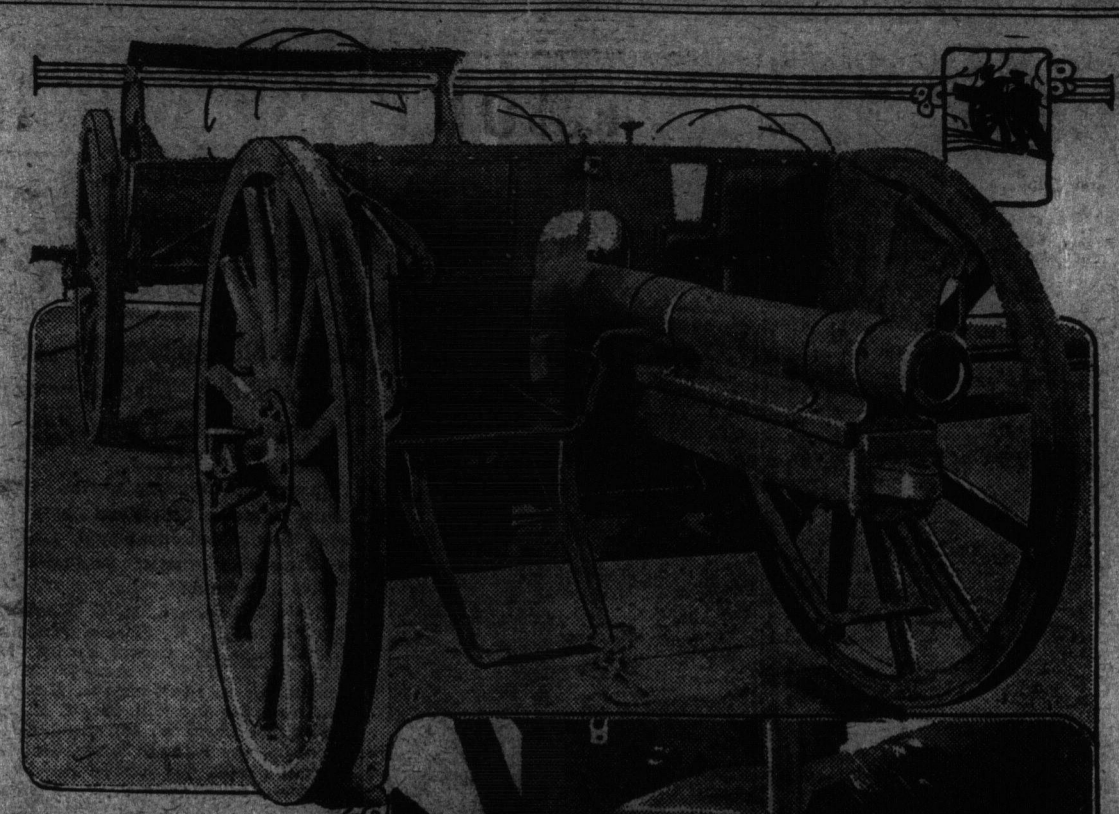
I am much surprised and disappointed for your acceptance of the appointment of royal commissioner led me to believe that you would continue the work until it was completed. I have asked you to investigate several charges and you have only consented to inquire into one of them—the Dalhousie Lumber Company stampage payment—and even that you at first refused.

One charge that the former superintendent of sealers was bribed by lumbermen; another that individuals and firms licensed by the government to sell liquor were asked or compelled to pay large sums of money by close friends of the government, while legislation affecting their interests was under consideration, you refused to consider, and this charge—most important of all—that the large sum of \$150,000 given to use Governor Wood's own words in his report, "as a token of the loyalty of the people of this province to the motherland," was improperly expended and largely wasted and diverted for the profit of men friendly to the government, you say you will not be able to take up because of other engagements.

Once more let me remind you of the words of the premier of the province, when he introduced you to the people of New Brunswick his first speech in the legislature when he said "this court was open to every man, woman and child who had any complaint to prefer."

Also let me quote the words of the first law officer of the province and the crown, Hon. Attorney-General Baxter, when at your first sitting after your authority as royal commissioner had been read, he addressed you and those present, and through the press, the people of New Brunswick, saying:
"If any person has reason to believe that there is anything wrong in any of the departments, although he may not have any knowledge himself which will bear out his belief, he will be welcome to communicate his belief or what he has heard to the commissioner and every facility will be given for the complete probe of any such reports. Even if there is but a suspicion of wrong the commissioner will be glad to have that suspicion communicated so that persons who may have knowledge may be summoned to the stand. He will not be bound by the strict rules of evidence but the commissioner has authority to use any methods he may deem to be in the public interest. If there are any charges or beliefs or suspicions now is the time to make them known."

My associate, Mr. Veniot, has had no trouble getting you to investigate charges which concerned operations in the public works department, one into a farm settlement board purchase, and one into a stampage matter. But these larger and more important matters, to which I have directed your attention, you refuse to inquire into.

ROBLIN CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY TO DEFAUD MANITOBA

Winnipeg, Aug. 31.—The expected sequel to the report of the Mathers commission on the parliament buildings scandal occurred this afternoon when four ministers of the late government, Sir Rodmond Roblin, premier; Dr. W. H. Montague, minister of public works; James Howden, attorney-general, and George R. Caldwell, minister of education, submitted themselves to the authorities at the city police station.

They were released on \$50,000 bail each, \$25,000 being personal security. For Sir Rodmond, Aime Benard, present leader of the Conservative party in the legislature, and Dr. E. Sprague, ex-chief of the police, were bondsmen for the other \$25,000; for Dr. Montague, W. H. Cross and J. W. Montague; for Mr. Howden, George Hamilton, of Neepawa, and Stephen B. Stonehouse, and for Mr. Caldwell, Alex. Reid and Andrew Simpson.

The ex-ministers will appear in the city police court tomorrow morning to answer the charge of conspiring to defraud the public. They will then be remanded.

An early date will be set for the preliminary hearing. More charges may, and very likely will, be laid, according to E. A. Bonnar, K. C., who is acting for the prosecution.

Warrants had been issued for the arrest of the men, but as they came forward voluntarily they were not served. All of the formalities of bail and bond signing were conducted behind closed doors in Deputy Chief of Police Newton's office, and extreme secrecy was observed in connection with the whole proceedings.

R. A. Bonnar, seen after the proceedings were finished, explained that the ex-ministers had been admitted to bail and that they would appear in court tomorrow morning. A remand would then be asked for by the defence, and a date set for the preliminary hearing, which would likely be soon. The present charges were for conspiring to defraud the public, and other charges, possibly including destroying public documents, might be laid later.

COW TAIL HOLDER.
In summer time a cow's tail is a source of annoyance to the milker. This holder is designed to keep the tail at rest. It is made of channel iron and has jaws at each end.

ORCHARD HEATER.
The improvement claimed here is in the method of admitting air to the heater. The air inlet consists of two tubes, one inside the other, which have slots of equal size. At the beginning these slots are placed opposite each other and the air passes through them to the burning oil. When, however, the oil has burned down until the lower end of the tube is exposed, the slots are closed and the air reaches the oil through the lower end of the inlet. It is claimed that this gives a strong blast of air directed against the surface of the oil and facilitates the burning of the low grade residue.

DRAINAGE SYSTEM.
In some cases land can be drained by running the water down through the surface non-porous layer of soil to a porous layer beneath. The invention shown here describes a method of doing this. The surface drains end in a concrete box from which a vertical iron pipe carries the water down to the porous layer.

FENCE STRETCHER.
As shown here, the handle of the fence stretcher is broken away. It turns two sprocket wheels, one of which engages the bicycle chain and the other the pawl which holds both wheels in any position. The stretcher is attached to the fence post by means of an anchor chain and brace, and three hooks. The fence clamp engages all the horizontal wires of the fence so that when the bicycle chain is tightened the wires are stretched evenly.

OVERSHOES FOR HORSES.
It is stated that this overshoe will fit any ordinary horseshoe. It consists of an attaching device and a tread which holds four sharp cleats and two cleats. The cleats pass up over the edge of the horseshoe and hold the overshoe in place. The tread is roughly rectangular in shape and has two transverse bars. The attaching device passes over the front bar and under the hind bar, and carries a bolt which passes through the hind bar. When this bolt is tightened the attaching device is forced forward against the toe cleft and the tread is forced back. This causes the cleats to grip the upper edges of the horseshoe and hold the overshoe in place. The bolt carries a split washer which locks it in any position.

FOLDING CRATE.
A poultry crate which can be folded facilitates storage and return shipment. The crate shown here has a solid wooden bottom to which the slatted sides and ends are hinged. The slatted top

CHOLERA RAGING IN GERMANY IN EIGHT DISTRICTS.
London, Sept. 1, 2.03 a. m.—According to official warnings issued by the Spanish government to the governors and sanitary officers of frontier towns and posts, copies of which have been received here, cholera exists in the following districts: East Prussia, including Königsberg and Gumbinnen; West Prussia, including Danzig and Marienburg; Posen, including Schneidmühl, Nakeland and Bromberg; Silesia, including Breslau, Appeln and Neisse; Brandenburg, including Landsberg, and at Berlin, Leipzig and Hanover.

MASTER BLAMED FOR LOSS OF STR. SILVER WINGS.
Halifax, Aug. 30.—Captain Edward O'Toole, commander of the British steamer Silver Wings, which wrecked on Sable Island, August 17, has had his captain's certificate suspended for a period of one year from August 30, 1914 to August 30, 1916. The court, however, recommended that he be given a mate's certificate during the period under suspension.

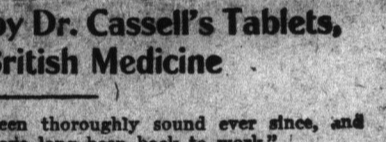
