The project to construct a Railway from point on the E. & N. A. Railway to Hopewell, in Albert County, is again revived. The leading men of the County and of Salisbury and Petitcodiac are taking an active interest in the scheme, and wil urge it on the people and the Legislature Hon. Senator McClelan and Dr. Palmer, M. P. P., are earnest supporters of the road, and most of the mill-owners and lumbermen of Albert are counted among its friends. There is a difference of opinion as to the point of connection with the E & N. A. Railway, some favoring Salisbury, others Petitcodiac, and a limited number preferring a compromise between the two. In the event of Petitcodiac Station being selected, the capitalists of this thriving town offer to take \$25,000 of the Company's stock. It is estimated that a line from Petitcodiac via Pollett River to Hopewell, say 33 miles, will cost under \$480,000, stocked, ready for working. By this route nine or ten lumber mills would be tapped; and the opening of the road would undoubtedly lead to the increased development of the product of these mills, and the building of many more.
