

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BARRIE, ONT., February 15th, 1892.

*John Milne, Esq., Grand Master Workman,**Ottawa :*

DEAR SIR AND BRO., :—

I regret that I am unable to be present at Grand Lodge, having taken a fresh cold while attending the funeral of my father-in-law, at Windsor, on the 10th inst., and having had an attack of influenza—la grippe—I fear to take any risks, when so many have succumbed to this insidious epidemic. I regret being absent very much at this time, as I consider Grand Lodge has under consideration the most important question that has had to be dealt with since its organization. The interest of probably (100,000) one hundred thousand people are involved, taking, as an average, four persons to each of our members' families, and the importance of the question cannot be exaggerated. The question should be dealt with without any excitement or attempt to lead the Grand Lodge into any dangerous position, or to take any action that will divide the membership of so great a body as the Grand Lodge of Ontario. Canadians are generally careful and cautious, and possessing a keen regard for honor and uprightness I feel assured our members will do what is right and just. Wishing you a pleasant session and deeply deploring my inability to be with you,

(c) After some correspondence I appointed Bro. J. C. Walker, of Guelph, as a special organizing agent for the Eastern Provinces. He proceeded to his field of labor, but was immediately called home on account of his wife's sickness, and was not able to continue the work. I regret that more progress has not been made in that territory; I believe special agents should be placed in that field and also in Manitoba and the North West. There are fine opportunities in either of them for a large addition to our ranks.

(d) Bro. H. H. Reeve, D.D.G.M., of Lanark, removing from that field, tendered his resignation, which, under the circumstances, I accepted, and appointed in his stead the former Deputy, Bro. Henry Taylor, of Perth, to complete his term.

The D.D.G.M.'s have organized the Lodges in their districts, excepting in a few instances, where I appointed a special agent to complete the work.

INCREASE.

(3) Our increase in membership, although not quite up to last year, shows that we are making a sure and steady progress. CIRCULARS.

(6) Immediately after last Grand Lodge, I issued circular :

No. 1, which was a general call to the officers and members to enter upon the work of another year with energy.

No. 2 was issued April 6, calling upon the Lodges throughout the jurisdiction to join in a service of Praise and Thanksgiving on the anniversary day of the birth of Our Illustrious Sovereign Lady, Queen Victoria. Never was a circular more heartily responded to than this. I am fully assured that on that 24th day of May over 20,000 of our Brethren joined in giving thanks

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and praise to our Heavenly Father for the blessings He has showered on our land. I trust this will meet with your approval.

No. 3, issued June 22nd, was a formal promulgation of the new constitution and laws, passed at our last Grand Lodge meeting, after the same had been approved by the Supreme Master Workman.

No. 4, issued July 30th, was a general synopsis of instructions to the membership, and especially to the officers, quoting to them the various clauses of our new constitution, and defining their several duties. I am convinced this did much to bring our Lodge Officers into good working order, and saved much annoyance that might have arisen from the adoption of a new constitution. I invite your approval of the same.

No. 5, issued Sept. 1st, was a call to the officers and members for an active campaign during the fall months, to increase our membership. To this some Lodges responded nobly, but there are some who appear to make no effort to increase their numbers. Some means should be devised to wake them up.

No. 6, issued Oct. 1st, was for the double purpose of bringing before our Lodges more prominently the new emblems, as decided upon at last session of the Supreme Lodge, and also to encourage active work amongst them. I submit the same in full for your approval.



WHO WILL BE THE CHAMPIONS?

To the Officers and Members of the A. O. U. W.:

DEAR BRETHREN,—At the session of the Supreme Lodge held last June in Detroit, a special and uniform system of emblems for the Supreme, Grand, and Subordinate Lodges were adopted.

The design for the Subordinate Lodges in Canada is as follows:



This will necessitate some changes in our Subordinate Lodge badges. It will not, however, be compulsory on Lodges now having badges to go to the expense of procuring new ones, unless they desire to do so, but those contemplating new sets will see that they conform to the new design. As an encouragement to active work amongst the brethren for the closing months of the year, I have concluded to offer

FOUR COMPLETE SETS OF OFFICERS' BADGES WITH THE NEW DESIGN.

One set to the Lodge numbered from 1 to 100 inclusive (meaning the first 100 Lodges) initiating the greatest number of new members between Oct. 1st and Dec. 31st, this year.

One set to the Lodge numbering from 101 to 200 inclusive (meaning the second 100 Lodges) initiating the greatest number of members during the same time.

One set to the Lodge numbering from 201 to 300 inclusive (meaning the third 100 Lodges) initiating the greatest number of new members during the same time.

One set to the Lodge numbering over 300 (meaning Lodges in the fourth 100) and including the Lodges in Manitoba, N. W. Territories, Quebec and the Eastern Provinces, initiating the greatest number of new members during the same time.

These sets of badges will be presented at the next Grand Lodge to the Representatives of the Lodges entitled to receive them.

Now, Brethren, work with energy. There is plenty of material at the control of every Lodge. Let us roll up our membership and close the year with a grand record.

I think it would pay the Grand Lodge to make such an offer each year.

(7) At last Grand Lodge it was decided that the matter of separation from the Supreme Lodge should be fully discussed in our Subordinate Lodges, after the distribution of the report of the Supreme Representatives. Thinking that the best legislation on so important a question could only be secured by the Lodges fully discussing it from the information before them, and sending their representatives not pledged to vote yes or no without regard to the arguments brought out by the wisdom of all the representatives, but coming as a representative of his own Lodge, knowing their sentiments on the matter, and free to vote as he considered his Lodge would vote, if they were there as a body, I therefore issued this circular; not to bias the mind of any one, or to dictate in any way, but merely to put a few questions to the brethren for their consideration. In public press I find the meaning of some of my expressions in that circular was misunderstood; I have replied to some of the articles in the same press. My only object in this was the best interests of the Order, and to prevent Lodges arriving at too hasty conclusions. I submit the circular in full for your approval.

SEPARATION

To the Officers and Members of the A. O. U. W. :

DEAR BRETHREN,—

I see that some of the Lodges are freely discussing the question of Separation from the Supreme Lodge on account of our Relief Calls.

It is not my purpose in this circular, as your Grand Master Workman, to argue this question or to attempt in any way to check a full and free expression of opinion on so important an issue, but I consider it my duty as your executive officer to warn you against coming to hasty conclusions and passing resolutions that will bind your representative at next Grand Lodge.

Remember that in your discussions in your Lodge rooms you may not have all the facts before you, and if you bind your representative to vote either for or against a separation it might be that to carry out your instructions he would have to vote not only contrary to his own convictions, but contrary to what you as a Lodge would do after hearing all the facts brought out.

The question of separation in all its bearings will be very fully expounded at next Grand Lodge. Therefore I ask you to leave your representative free to vote just as his conviction will direct him after hearing both sides of the question; putting your faith in him that he will cast his vote for the welfare of the Order.

The following are a few points to be carefully considered in your Lodge discussions :

1. What led to the establishment of the Relief Law, and was the principle involved therein a reasonable and just one?
2. Has the Supreme Lodge ever refused to grant to Canada any reasonable request made by our representatives to change or modify the Relief Law? or has she been oppressive or inconsistent in her demands upon us?
3. If we separate, will it affect the value of the guarantee for the payment of the Beneficiary Certificates now in force?
4. If the Grand Lodge should by a majority vote decide to separate, would there not be a large minority that would stand by the Supreme Lodge? If so, would not this split lead to the establishment of two Grand Lodges in Ontario antagonistic to each other? Would not such a consummation be disastrous to our now prosperous Order by helping to fulfill the prophecies of our enemies?
5. We have been, during the thirteen years of our existence as a Grand Lodge, very successful. Our assessments, including Relief Calls (averaging during that time about forty-five cents per member), have not been oppressive. Will the financial saving per member be worth the risk of jeopardizing the success of our Order?
6. At the next triennial adjustment by the Supreme Lodge in 1893, under the proposition adopted at the last Supreme Lodge session in Detroit, the maximum for Canada, now twenty, will likely be sixteen, certainly not over seventeen. May we not be liable in a few years to have to make a call for relief? Other jurisdictions have under similar favorable circumstances done so. It would only require a call for an amount equal to three assessments to get back all we have paid.
7. At the altar every member has taken an obligation to render allegiance to the Supreme Lodge, and abide by its constitution and laws. How can we get over this unless by an arrangement with the Supreme Lodge to allow us

to separate. Such an arrangement in reference to the Relief Law might be arrived at in a few years.

8. We are now doing nobly—no association has succeeded like we have. May it not be wise to let well enough alone? Is there any danger that by our trying to save a few dollars we would undermine the foundation of the grand structure we have built? Is the stability and success of so noble an Order to be considered only by dollars and cents?

9. Our mottoes are "*Charity, Hope and Protection.*" Will we lay aside the *Charity* and *Protection* we owe to our neighboring jurisdictions? Should we not rather be glad and thankful that we are so blessed with a low death rate that we can easily help our more unfortunate brethren, and cast our mantle of *Charity* and *Protection* over them?

Now, in conclusion, dear brethren, having a burning desire only for the welfare of an Order that has done so much good, I have placed the foregoing few points before you for thought and consideration. *Weigh, ponder and digest* these questions carefully before you arrive at a final conclusion. Send out of your Lodge a representative who will be untrammelled and prepared to give an honest unbiased decision upon this all-important question, and cast his vote to protect and advance the best interests of the Grand Lodge of Ontario.

No. 8 was issued Dec. 22nd.—Having received a circular from the Supreme Master Workman, J. W. Kinsley, proclaiming Jan. 18th as the first memorial day of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, that being the date of the death of the founder of the Order, John J. Upchurch. In compliance with his circular I issued mine proclaiming Jan. 18th as a memorial day, and asking that the Lodges where practicable would hold services in memory of their departed dead, on the evening of that day. I am glad to report that I have had many letters from all parts of our jurisdiction, announcing that they had complied with the request. I trust this will meet with your approval.

DECISIONS.

(8) My official decisions this year have been chiefly explanatory of our new constitution, and have entailed a vast amount of correspondence. There are however a few which have so often been submitted for my decision, and as often answered, that I thought best to submit to you for your consideration.

(a) Q. Bro. Welch, of Blyth Lodge 145, was suspended July 29, 1890, reported reinstated Jan. 2, 1891, examined Jan. 27, 1891, approved Feb. 3-1891 was 53 years of age Sept. 28, 1890 Can he be reinstated?

Ans. No. A member over 50 years of age, suspended from the Order cannot be reinstated. This brother was over six months' suspended before his examination was approved.

I understand this Bro. will send an appeal to this Grand Lodge, and if so I have all the correspondence to lay before you.

(b) Q. If Financier, P. M. W., and Guide retire to collect fee and obligate candidate, is it necessary for them to work their way back the same as any member coming into Lodge?

Ans. No. These officers having given the pass-words at the opening of the Lodge, do not require to work their way back, but simply give the raps and announce their rank.

(c) Q. Can a man with a cork leg be taken into the Order?

Ans. Yes, if he can pass the Medical Examination. The loss of a leg or other physical defect does not disqualify one from becoming a member of the Order, provided the defect is not such as would shorten life, render it more uncertain, or prevent him from earning a livelihood for himself and family.

(d) Q. Can a Lodge ballot for two or more candidates at the same time, when done so by resolution of the Lodge?

Ans. No. Balloting for members must be had upon each applicant separately. See Pro. S. L. 1880, page 188. See Digest, page 50.

(e) Q. When P. M. W.'s chair is vacant, who should fill it?

Ans. The M. W. can place any other P. M. W. in the chair. If none present he can appoint any other member from the room pro tem.

(f) Q. Is Recorder who has represented his Lodge and received the Grand Lodge degree a P. M. W. of his lodge, or must he pass the chair?

Ans. He is a P. M. W. in his own Lodge, and entitled to all the honors.

(g) Q. If a committee bring in an unfavorable report, should the candidate be balloted for?

Ans. Our constitution states: "If the report be unfavorable the candidate shall be declared rejected." He should not be balloted for.

(h) Q. Can I make beneficiary payable to my lawful heirs?

Ans. Yes, if it is worded to read as follows: "To my lawful heirs within the meaning of the statute of distributions." That would bring the beneficiary under the clause of blood relations, and be in accordance with our constitution, but would not advise any beneficiary made payable in that way, as it might cause a great deal of trouble to prove who were all the heirs. They might be in foreign lands and cause much delay and some risk of not all being found.

(i) Q. Can a member over 50 years of age who is in arrears over three months and less than six months be reinstated?

Ans. Yes, by passing a medical examination and the ballot of his Lodge, and paying all arrears.

(j) Q. Can a D. D. G. M. enter a Lodge, take the chair and conduct the business of the Lodge, when a quorum is present, but no M. W., P. M. W., or Financier is present?

Ans. Yes.

(k) Q. Can a Lodge receive a proposition card and \$3.00, and appoint a committee, without the medical certificate being handed in then?

Ans. The constitution requires the certificate to be there. See Const., page 47, Sect. 4.

(l) Q. Can a subordinate Lodge appoint as their representative a P. M. W., who is not a member in their own Lodge?

Ans. Not any of the subordinate Lodges in Ontario can do so. Permission is given to the Sub-Lodges in the Provinces and the Territories. See G. L. Const., sec. 5.

(m) Q. An applicant was balloted for and rejected. The Brothers who cast the black balls sometime afterwards said they were sorry for it, and wished the chance to change the ballot. Can the applicant be balloted for at our next meeting?

Ans. If an error is discovered at once, the M. W. may allow a second ballot at the same meeting. In the above case there was no error and the candidate was rejected. He will have to wait the six months.

DISPENSATIONS.

(9) The Grand Recorder has issued Dispensations to the different Lodges for certain privileges when directed so to do by me, and will give a full record of the same in his report.

BY-LAWS APPROVED.

(10) Upon the recommendation of the chairman of the Committee on Laws I have duly approved by-laws, or amendments to by-laws, from the following Lodges:

Peninsular No. 2, Oxford No. 17, Maple Leaf No. 27, Temple No. 55, Royal No. 60, Amity No. 61, Barrie No. 77, Lisle No. 90, Valetta No. 96, Cobourg No. 121, Stayner No. 134, Morrisburgh No. 174, Madoc No. 195, Elora No. 209, Gananoque No. 247, Trinity No. 278, Castleton No. 323, Mattawa No. 324, Woodbine No. 331, Welcome No. 334, Milne No. 336, Dominion No. 342, Civic No. 354, Federation No. 244, Metropolitan No. 4, Quebec No. 11, Fort Garry No. 8, Prairie No. 9.

OFFICIAL VISITS.

(11) I have officially visited and addressed public gatherings upon the aims and objects of our order at the following places, viz.:

Valetta, Norwich, Dundas, Trenton, Belleville, Tweed, Peterboro, Stouffville, Sutton, Brampton, Walkerville, London, St. Thomas, Woodslee, Tilsonburg and Woodstock.

These visits have, I believe, resulted in much good, not merely from the new life and energy instilled into the membership, to increase their numbers, but they have in some cases been the means of settling discords that had crept into the Lodges. Such visits also do a great deal to educate the public concerning the Order, and bringing it more prominently before those who should avail themselves of its advantages. These visits bring the members in harmonious touch with the executive head of the Order, and create a confidence and assurance that is productive of solid progress. I must here acknowledge that in all of them I have been enthusiastically received, far surpassing my anticipations and proving the loyalty the brethren had for their chief officer. The recollections of these meetings will never be effaced from my memory. I have also endeavored at them to instruct the officers in their duties and upon the proper method of keeping their books. The actual outlay in these visits in excess of what, in some instances, the brethren very kindly insisted upon paying, amount to \$127.50. I have not placed this bill before the Finance Committee, believing it was an item the Grand Lodge should deal with direct.

GENERAL SUPERVISION.

(12) Our order has reached such a magnitude that it is impossible for any Grand Master, however desirous he may be, to give it the supervision it requires. The correspondence during the past year has been so large, that to do it justice would almost take a man's whole time. It is not simply the answering of plain letters, but matters arise in connection with the work that to have a perfect and complete mastery of it require solid study and calculation. No Grand Master who has other interests to attend to, can do this, unless he allows his own business to suffer. I believe the time has come in the history of our Order here when we should do as some other Societies do, place an Officer in the field who will devote his whole time to the general oversight of the work. This man should make the benevolent and the line systems of life insurance his whole study. He should be a workman and

nothing else. Other Grand Lodges have done this with remarkable success. Such an officer would of course be under the control of, but would also be the adviser of the Grand Master. It will take every new Grand Master one year to get fairly introduced to the requirements of his office, and at the end of two years he is just beginning to be master of the situation, therefore, he will require the counsel and advice of just such an officer to make the supervision of the work complete. Is it economy to carry fifty millions of insurance without some such supervision? It is a matter worthy the careful consideration of this body.

ADVISORY BOARD.

(13) Several matters of importance, chief amongst which was the annexation of British Columbia to this jurisdiction, had been laid before me for action. Believing this to be a matter of such importance as required consultation with the other officers, I called the Advisory Board together as provided in the constitution. The Board met at the Rossin House, Toronto, Nov. 19th. The result of their deliberations will be stated under their respective heads. I trust this call will meet with your approval.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

(14) Several of the Lodges in British Columbia belonging to the Grand Lodge of Oregon and Washington made application to be annexed to the jurisdiction of Ontario. The Supreme Lodge had given consent to this union if agreeable to the Grand Lodge of Oregon and Washington, and upon such terms as might be agreeable to Ontario.

I had some correspondence with several of the Lodges in reference to this matter. In September I received the following from the Supreme Master Workman:

HELENA, MONT., Sept. 24, 1891.

JOHN MILNE, ESQ., Grand Master Workman, Ontario.

DEAR SIR AND BROTHER,—I am in receipt of a petition from the Five Lodges in British Columbia, asking that they be transferred to the jurisdiction of Ontario. The same is accompanied by copies of the action of the Supreme Lodge and the Grand Lodge of Oregon and Washington authorizing the transfer. The way is now open for the transfer of these Lodges to Ontario lawfully, and it now remains for Ontario to say that she is willing to accept them. Please let me hear from you at once, when we will arrange for some conference to prepare terms of transfer.

To this I at once replied that I would lay the matter before my associates. In order to have reliable data for our guidance I wrote the Grand Recorder of Oregon and Washington for information on a number of important points. He promptly responded to all my enquiries as will be seen from the following letter:

I hereby certify that the above statement of membership pertaining to the Lodges of the A. O. U. W. in British Columbia and belonging to the jurisdiction of Oregon and Washington, is true as shown by the records of this office.

I, as previously stated, called the Advisory Board and the following resolution was unanimously passed after fully considering the matter :

“That in the opinion of this Board the matter of annexing the Lodges in British Columbia to this jurisdiction should be deferred until the next session of the Grand Lodge, and in view of the fact that the membership is rapidly increasing in the Province of Manitoba, and with every reasonable probability that a Grand Lodge will in the near future be constituted there, it might be considered more advisable not to interfere or encroach at present upon a territory which would properly belong to Manitoba. This Board would therefore advise that no action be taken in the matter in the meantime.

I at once communicated this decision to the Supreme Master Workman, to the Grand Lodge of Oregon and Washington, and also to the Lodges making application. I learn that these Lodges are now included in the new jurisdiction of Washington.

The above action is now before you for your consideration.

APPEALS AND GRIEVANCES.

(15) By an omission of the Executive Committee at its meeting immediately after last Grand Lodge, no committee on Appeals and Grievances was appointed. I submitted this to the Advisory Board at its meeting and they by resolution constituted the committee on laws as a committee on appeals and grievances until meeting of Grand Lodge.

There were only two cases submitted to them.

(a) Bro. E. J. Ryan vs. Bro. John Miranda, of Gananoque Lodge, No. 247,

This was a charge that the brother was guilty of the excessive use of intoxicating liquor, becoming drunk, and conducting himself unbecoming a workman.

The proceedings were regular and the sentence of the lodge was that the brother be expelled.

The committee considered the sentence too severe from the evidence adduced. In the meantime I wrote the brother privately, in reply to which he acknowledged his guilt but promised a reform. I therefore allowed him to stand under suspended sentence for a period of six months. I understand that he has carried out his promise of reform.

(b) Bros. Bennet et al vs. Bro. C. F. Straubel, of Maple Leaf Lodge, No. 27.

The charge was false statements against one or more of the members of the Lodge.

The proceedings were regular, and the brother found guilty.

The verdict of the Sub-Lodge committee was, 1, that the brother be reprimanded by the M. W. 2, that he be removed from office, and 3, that he be disqualified from holding office in future. I referred the papers to the committee on appeals. Two of them recommended that I order a new trial or quash the conviction. The other two were of the opinion that they had no jurisdiction in the case. Having now to deal with the matter myself, I got a full report of it from the Lodge. I read the evidence very carefully, and believed that Bro. Straubel had been too hardly dealt with, when the three penalties were inflicted. I found that he had been reprimanded, also that he had willingly given up his office, thus completing the first two penalties. I therefore reversed the third one, leaving him eligible to election for office if the Lodge should see fit to do so.

(c) Re Bro. Archibald Taylor.

This brother, a member of Queen City Lodge, No. 225, removed to British Columbia, leaving his daughter Kate Bell Taylor to pay his assessments, and by an arrangement with the Financier, Bro. Pattinson, he was to be kept in good standing. Through the death of Bro. Pattinson and the daughter not knowing, as she says, to whom to pay, Bro. Taylor became suspended on the 29th of May, and his certificate was annulled on Nov. 29. In the meantime the daughter had paid up all assessments, and now appeals for the reinstatement of her father, who is now over 60 years of age. I have laid all the correspondence in my possession before the Executive, who will make a recommendation for your approval.

LITIGATION.

(16) I am happy to state that we had no litigation during the year. Still some expense was necessary in consulting the solicitor in reference to the payments of death claims. The peculiar ways in which members make their beneficiary certificates payable render it a very difficult matter to determine their legal status. I have ever found Bro. Totten ready and willing to render all the advice required, and I believe he has not made any charge for one half of the cases submitted to him, and on the others his charges have been very light. Our legal expenses have been remarkably small, for the advice in paying out over \$300,000.

RELIEF CALL NO. 12.

(17) Under the provisions of Article XI. of the General Laws of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, the Supreme Lodge Relief Board met at Chicago Ill., on the 12th January, and fully considered the applications of the dit

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ferent Grand Lodges for relief. I have received official notice of the result of that meeting, which may be summarised as follows :

Amount Relief required \$174,324.36

To meet this sum of \$174,324.36 a call is made on all the Grand Jurisdictions for an amount equal to sixty-five cents per member. I trust this Grand Lodge will loyally respond to this call. This is really a part of our beneficiary obligation, and I would recommend that no special assessment be made to meet this call, but that it be paid out of our Beneficiary Fund and assessments made in the regular way when that fund requires it.

MANITOBA.

(18) I have had repeated letters from various parts of Manitoba and the N.W. Territories, from our Ontario brethren living there, desiring that Lodges be organized in their towns. Bro. Ferguson, whom I have had at work there, has done good service, but the towns are so far distant from each other that unless a man can devote all his time to the work he cannot accomplish what should be done. I would suggest this Grand Lodge to consider the advisability of placing an energetic man there to work up the territory, even at a greater cost than has been given to our organizing agents. There has been an abundant harvest in that country, and now is the time to occupy the various towns there. We love our Manitoba brethren and gladly hail them to our Grand Lodge meeting; yet I am of opinion that if they were sufficiently strong to constitute a Grand Lodge of their own, and thus more thoroughly control their own territory, it would be much better for the order there. I trust the matter of more speedily and thoroughly developing that Province will receive your careful consideration.

INTEMPERANCE.

(19) I would again urge upon the brethren the great importance of guarding the portals of our Lodges, by not admitting into membership those addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors. At the last Supreme Lodge it was enacted "That no person shall be admitted to membership in the order who is engaged in the sale by retail of intoxicating liquors as a beverage." This being an important change in our constitution I did not think I was warranted in promulgating it as the law of the jurisdiction until it had received the sanction of this Grand Lodge. I think it a wise provision, and lay it before you for your action thereon.

SEPARATION.

(20) This important matter has been prominently before the Subordinate Lodges since we last met. I am glad to know that during the last few months the members have been carefully studying it. I trust that every representative will come fully prepared to weigh the arguments for and against Separation, at the same time having regard to the opinions of his own Lodge on the question. Let every member accord to his brother the right to express his opinion, in accordance with the dictates of his own conscience. I trust that this discussion will be conducted with entire harmony and good

feeling. Let no personalities be indulged in, keep to the direct question at issue, and let us eventually be guided in our vote by the sole desire to do only that which will be for the solid advancement of our noble Order.

ASSESSMENT NOTICES.

(21) The issuing of our Assessment Notices monthly has imperceptibly grown to be a large item of expense. Although only on post cards, yet the cost of these cards, the printing and mailing, will foot up to over \$3,500 yearly, and will keep on increasing. Some of the grand lodges of other benevolent institutions have a uniform payment of say \$1.00 per month, and only make an assessment when there is a necessity for a double call. I think we might devise some scheme by which we might largely reduce this item of expense. It is worthy of your consideration.

DISTRICT DEPUTIES.

(22) I have met with many of these officers during the past year. I have ever found them ready and anxious to further the interests of their fields of labor. These men cannot afford to give their districts the oversight they should get, especially when they are only paid their actual expenses for only one trip to each Lodge. Many of them to my own knowledge have sacrificed their own interests to further the cause in their own districts. They need to be visited and encouraged as well as the Lodges. Their work could be made much more efficient by co-operation with a head officer continually in the field. I have to thank the Deputies for their assistance in my work. My associations with them the past two years have been of the most pleasant character. I trust the representatives will exercise the greatest care in their choice of Deputies. They should choose the best man in their several districts if they can get him.

GRAND RECORDER'S OFFICE.

(23) I have several times officially visited the Grand Recorder's office and have examined how the work was done. I have only to reiterate what has before been said, that the work there moves on in a thorough and systematic manner. Bro. Carder can at a moment's notice lay his hands on the documents that will answer any inquiries that may be made pertaining to the business of his office. I have always found him ready and willing to impart any information to the humblest brother of the order.

ADDITIONAL INSURANCE.

(24) I have been frequently approached upon the matter of giving the brethren an opportunity for an additional insurance in the A. O. U. W. Bro. Spry in his report of 1889 made a suggestion to give an additional \$2000, but it did not meet with the approval of that Grand Lodge. The idea was a good one. It has occurred to me that we might with good results establish a branch giving an insurance of \$1000. Many of the working men in the country think they cannot carry \$2000, but believe they could easily pay a 50 cent call for a \$1000 certificate, and thus make some provision for their families. We could then allow the older members to also carry that additional \$1000. In this way we could divide our certificates into three classes, viz.: \$1000, \$2000 and \$3000, paying on assessments respectively 50 cents, \$1.00 and \$1.50. I believe this would meet with the general approval of the brethren, and would be an additional means of increasing our membership. I submit this suggestion for your careful consideration.

RE JARVIS LODGE, NO. 65, VS. LYNN LODGE, NO. 28.

(25) In accordance with the recommendation of last Grand Lodge I instructed the Grand Recorder to interview Dr. Tripp and others, get what

information he could in reference to this matter, and report the same to me. He did so, and from all the facts I can gather I arrive at the following conclusions, viz. :

1. That the Schuyler Bros. were honest in their statements to Dr. Tripp.

2. That Lynn Lodge did nothing unconstitutional in admitting them as members of their Lodge, the medical report being satisfactory, and there being no Lodge Jurisdiction.

3. That Jarvis Lodge, conscientiously believing that Lynn Lodge had acted unconstitutionally, was justified in calling the attention of Grand Lodge to the fact.

Therefore as Lynn Lodge desires to have an amicable settlement of the matter, Jarvis Lodge having presented the facts to the Grand Lodge, but not wishing to make any charge against Lynn Lodge, and also wishing a speedy settlement of the difficulty, I recommend that this case be now closed, and that the Schuyler Bros.' standing as members of the Order be confirmed.

CONCLUSION.

(26) In closing this my second year as your Grand Master, let me thank the officers and brethren for the aid they have given me in the discharge of my arduous duties. Much of the success of the order during these two years can be attributed to the prompt and energetic manner in which my requests have been responded to by the officers and members. My correspondence during the past year, for reasons I cannot fully explain, has been nearly double what it was the year before, and has taken up a large portion of my time, yet it has been a pleasant task to me. I have endeavored to answer every communication, from the highest officer to the humblest member, fully and promptly. Now as I resign the gavel at this session, let me ask that if I have not fully sustained to your expectation the trust you honored me with two years ago, you will draw the mantle of charity around my shortcomings, and let it be written, "The heart indeed was willing but the flesh was weak." Let me further ask that you will accord to my successor the same loyal support you have so freely given to me. May the deliberations of this Grand Lodge, and the decisions arrived at, be guided by wisdom from on high is my earnest prayer.

GRAND RECORDER'S REPORT.

ST. THOMAS, DEC. 31ST, 1891.

To the Grand Lodge A. O. U. W. of the Province of Ontario :

I take pleasure in presenting to you my annual report for the fiscal year ending December 31st, 1891, and in doing so feel confident that you will rejoice with me that I am able to report that the Order has had a most satisfactory and prosperous year.

As an evidence of the general interest which is manifested by the members in the advancement of the Order, I might say that the increase in the membership has been general, as 353 Lodges have recorded an increase during the year. No special efforts were made until the latter part of the year to increase our membership. In October last the G. M. W. offered special inducements to Lodges to add to their membership, and the results show that by a little effort our Roll Call may be greatly enlarged. With an average of thirteen assessments for thirteen years, and a steady, healthy growth, the Order in Canada has more than fulfilled the expectations of its founders, and has furnished ample encouragement for the future.

BONDS.

In my report of last year I suggested that the Grand Lodge become a guaranteeing body and make all Subordinate Lodges take out Bonds for their officers, which suggestion was recommended by the Committee on the State of the Order in their report, and was adopted by Grand Lodge. Bro. F. G. McCrady, P. M. W. of Brockville Lodge, No. 175, presents an amendment to the Constitution tending to the adoption of my suggestion and the report of Committee. This is a matter that should receive some consideration of Grand Lodge, and a definite and uniform plan of security for Subordinate Lodge Officers decided upon. It is no reflection upon the character and fidelity of an officer to be compelled to give bonds, but it shows to those who are connected with the Order that we want to conduct the business of Subordinate Lodges in a safe and business-like manner, as well as that of the Grand Lodge. Therefore I urge upon Grand Lodge to take some action at the present session.

OUR GROWTH.

Our Jurisdiction covers a large tract of territory, and Lodges are being planted all over this Dominion. Some of these are located many hundred miles from this office, and mail facilities in some localities being limited, makes it difficult for them to comply with the law as to the remitting of funds and reports within the time required, therefore I am inclined to think that it is advisable that an effort be made to increase the membership in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories sufficient to warrant the setting aside of these Districts as a separate Jurisdiction. Owing to the bountiful harvest in the Northwest the present would seem to be an opportune time to make this effort. The same remarks will apply with equal force to Quebec and the Eastern

Provinces. In case of the establishment of these Jurisdictions we would have three Grand Lodges in Canada, which would be a source of strength to the Order. We have now about 23,000 members in the Province of Ontario; a good sized Jurisdiction of itself, and plenty of material and openings for Lodges to make it a Jurisdiction of 30,000. I only offer this as a suggestion in order to bring the matter before Grand Lodge.

BENEFICIARY FUND.

I have had considerable difficulty during the past two years in reference to satisfying applicants who have no relatives or dependents as to how they should make their Beneficiary payable. Our Constitution, Sec. 8 A, page 81, says:—"Each member shall designate the person or persons to whom the Beneficiary Fund due at his death shall be paid, who shall in every instance be one or more members of his family, or who shall be related to him by blood, or who shall be dependent upon, or who shall be his affianced wife." Now this seems to be a hardship to some who apply for admission to our Order not having any relatives or any one dependent upon them. Where such cases present themselves I have had them make their Beneficiary payable to "their heirs," but some have thought it arbitrary and have declined to remain members of the Order. I think Grand Lodge should make some provision for these exceptional cases.

The following table will show the gross annual increase in membership, and the annual cost per member to carry the two thousand dollars beneficiary, in this jurisdiction for the past thirteen years:—

The total cash received from all sources during the year just ended, as shown in Exhibit A, is \$361,301.12.

The total cash received on Beneficiary Fund is \$302,768.00, this, with balance on hand Jan. 1st, 1891, \$15.00, makes a total of \$302,783.00, out of which we have paid 151 death losses, \$302,000.00, as per Exhibit B, leaving a balance of \$783.00 in the Imperial Bank to the credit of the Grand Receiver.

The total cash received on General Fund is \$25,212.22, this, with balance on hand Jan. 1st, 1891, \$8,381.56, makes a total of \$33,593.78, out of which there has been paid, as per lists of warrants, Exhibit G, \$26,287.75, leaving a balance of \$7,306.03 in the Imperial Bank to the credit of the Grand Receiver.

Total cash received on Relief Call No. 11 is \$33,319.90, out of which there has been remitted to the Supreme Lodge \$33,085.05, leaving a balance of \$234.85 in the Imperial Bank to the credit of the Grand Receiver.

There have been 23 Lodges organized during the year, 5 in the Province of Quebec, 7 in the Province of Manitoba and N.W.T., and 11 in Ontario, with an average of 22 members.

The total number of Beneficiary Certificates issued to date is 30,481, an increase of 3,326 for the year.

There have lapsed by annulment 465, by death, 161, suspended 523, making a net increase of 2 346 for the year, as shown by Exhibit J.

The total number of Beneficiary Certificates in good standing, December 31st, 1891, 24,743, total number suspended 523, making in all 25,266 certificates in force at this date.

The average duration of membership of members who have died during the year, as per Exhibit J, was 6 years, 1 month and 27 days. The average age of members who have died during the year was 45 years and 7 months.

REPORT
OF THE
GRAND MEDICAL EXAMINER
FOR THE YEAR 1891.

*To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of Grand Lodge, A. O.
U. W., of Ontario:*

I have the honor to submit my eleventh annual report as Grand Medical Examiner of the order for the year terminating December 31st, 1891.

APPLICATIONS.

The total number of applications that reached the Medical Department during the calendar year 1891 was 4,001. This, though somewhat under the figures of 1889 and 1890, necessarily indicates a high state of prosperity. Had it not been for the derangement of all kinds of business resulting from the general elections to the Dominion Parliament last spring, I think the number would have exceeded that of any former year. As it is the increase in membership cannot but be considered as entirely satisfactory. There were 546 more applications than in 1888, 1046 more than in 1887, 1354 more than in 1886, 1897 more than in 1885, and 2204 more than in 1884. These 4001 applicants asked for insurance to the amount of \$8,002,000, of which no less than \$7,694,000 was accepted, and \$308,000 rejected.

MEMBERSHIP, DEATHS AND DEATH RATE.

The monthly bulletin or statement issued by the Grand Recorder, dated January 1st, 1892, gives the membership in good standing in this jurisdiction as 24,580. Add to this the temporary suspensions in the various lodges—averaging probably five or six per lodge—and we have an actual membership of not less than 26,000. As the number of deaths that occurred during the year was 151, the death rate would be a fraction under six per thousand. The number of assessments, as stated above, was only thirteen.

CAUSES OF DEATH.

In the new constitution adopted at the last meeting of Grand Lodge, but which did not come into force until the first of July, an important change was made. Previous to that, all death reports had to be sent to the Grand Medical Examiner for investigation and approval. This imposed upon me the duty of making full and careful enquiry into the causes of death, and afforded ample opportunity for making the death statistics comparatively accurate and valuable. The new constitution relieves me of that duty, except in special cases; and as a consequence I have not been called upon to enquire into the cause of any death that has occurred during the past six months. This necessarily makes the following statistics less reliable than corresponding ones in former reports.

REPORT
OF THE
Supreme Lodge Representatives.

To the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of the Province of Ontario :

Your Representatives attended the late Session of the Supreme Lodge held at Detroit, commencing June 16th, and closing its labors on the 23rd, and as required by resolution make our report to the Grand Master Workman for promulgation.

All of the twenty-five jurisdictions were represented. Notwithstanding the ravages of "La Grippe" and the extraordinary and unprecedented mortality of 1890, no year in the history of the Order has been more successful. The record for the year shows a net increase of 20,057 members. In 1874 the average membership of the entire Order for the year was 5,194, with a mortality rate of 13.66. There was seventy-one deaths, making the average number of assessments twenty-four. In 1890 the average membership was 241,833, with a mortality rate of 10.32. The number of deaths were 2,496, and the average number of assessments twenty. The total number of death losses since organization was 1,660, and the amount paid Beneficiaries \$33,248,339.75. In 1890 there was \$4,762,157.09 paid to widows and orphans. The lowest average death rate per 1,000 members for twelve years was in Kansas 5.70, and Ontario comes next with 6.05.

From the beginning of 1881 to the end of 1890 there were ten Relief Calls made on the Order to assist overburdened jurisdictions, which amounted to \$529,110.24. This year the ravages of La Grippe necessitated a Call of \$414,690.00 which was paid within four months.

The total income of the Order for 1890 was \$5,117,385.92. Of this amount \$4,762,157.09 was paid to Beneficiaries, and \$355,228.83 was paid out in expenses.

The following legislation was adopted, which is submitted for your approval:—

The Committee on "Good of the Order" reported recommending a system of exchanges of rejected risks between the A.O.U.W. and the other fraternal beneficial societies monthly, who conduct their business through the medium of Subordinate Lodges within such jurisdiction; but reported against a system of exchanges from territory without their respective jurisdictions. The representatives of the various jurisdictions were requested to bring the matter before their Grand Lodges for such action as in their wisdom shall seem best.

The course pursued by the Supreme Master Workman in visiting Grand Lodges where he considered it advisable was heartily endorsed, and the

incoming Supreme Master Workman was recommended to adopt the same course for the future.

Your Representatives as directed by Grand Lodge brought before the Supreme Lodge the question of providing a more equitable adjustment of the Relief Law so far as it relates to this jurisdiction, and

RELIEF LAW.

Special Committee, consisting of John D. Vincil, Daniel Spry, S. Eccles, jr., C. M. Boush and C. C. Genung, presented the following report, which was adopted:—

To the Supreme Lodge, A. O. U. W.:

In the report of the Supreme Master Workman, attention was called to certain matters connected with the Grand Jurisdictions of Ontario and New Jersey. Said matters were referred to the undersigned committee. We beg to present our findings respecting the subjects submitted to us.

ONTARIO.

Your Committee cordially endorse the complimentary terms of the Supreme Master Workman as applied to our brethren of Ontario. It affords us pleasure to record our appreciation of the zeal, loyalty and conservative character of the membership of the Grand Jurisdiction so justly complimented by the Supreme Master. Any complaints or appeal for redress arising among, or coming from such a Jurisdiction, should the more readily be considered and fraternally determined. We gather from the address of Supreme Master Wilson that there is dissatisfaction or "restlessness" in the Jurisdiction of Ontario "growing out of the Relief Law." Said law to many of the members in Ontario, "seems to be oppressive." These brethren, having a very low death rate, regard the frequent and heavy Relief Calls as oppressive, in view of the continued outlay on their part, without compensative returns. In consequence of what is claimed to be the excessive and oppressive operation of the Relief Law as affecting our Ontario brethren, they have shown dissatisfaction, as brought to our attention. The Supreme Master Workman informs us that "a proposition was introduced at the last session of the Grand Lodge of Ontario looking to separation." This proposition is now pending in the subordinate lodges of that Jurisdiction. You now have a simple statement of the case as presented to and considered by your Committee.

It now remains for the Supreme Lodge to meet these complaints by devising more liberal and satisfactory methods for the application of the principles and purposes contemplated by the Relief Law. Your Committee freely express the opinion that the present system of arriving at the maximum of assessments is open to criticism and may be improved. The law should be endowed with such flexibility as to justify its adjustment to new and changing conditions. We therefore call the attention of the Supreme Lodge to the necessity of giving immediate and serious consideration to this subject.

We submit the recommendation that the Supreme Lodge at the Triennial adjustment, in 1893, so alter our present method of Relief Assessments as to secure more just and equitable results. We believe that a satisfactory system of average death rate can be reached, and agreed upon this wise: Take the average of the death rate of the five years previous to our next triennial adjustment, with 25 per cent. added, as the basis of arriving at the maximum

assessment for the following three years, but in no case should the maximum be less than sixteen, nor more than thirty.

These suggestions are submitted as the sense of your Committee, for consideration. We ask that our views be printed for information. As the Committee on Relief Law is charged with the consideration of the general subject, we therefore ask to be discharged from the further attention of this matter submitted to us, believing that ample justice will be done by this body, and meet the demands of all our jurisdictions. In the meantime we counsel, on the part of all, moderation and conservative obedience to our present law, which provides such an abundant and sufficient remedy for the emergencies incident to our organization. No other benevolent Order in the land is so well fortified with relief provisions as ours. In the operation and application of laws it will be found that the lessons of experience do much to relieve said laws of objectionable features. Thus time and the workings of our legislation will bring results, in the end, beneficial and just. Such, we believe, will follow proper obedience to our present law, and a patient continuance in well doing.

Considerable discussion was had upon the Relief Law and the best method of raising a Fund to meet its necessities, so that when Jurisdictions were overburdened and needed relief they would receive it at the earliest possible moment. This fund can be raised by Grand Lodges by direct assessment or taken from their Beneficiary or General Funds as they may deem best. The following is the amendment adopted to Section 1, General Law XI, and which goes into effect July 1st, 1892 :—

“The Relief Fund shall consist of a sum equal to one dollar for each and every Workman Degree member in good standing upon the 30th day of June in each and every year, and shall be raised by each Grand Lodge prior to the 31st day of December, 1892, by an assessment or assessments upon each Workman Degree member of the Order under its jurisdiction. The Relief Fund thus raised shall remain intact in the hands of the Grand Receivers of the various Grand Lodges, or in such other depository as the Grand Lodges may designate, until it is needed by the Relief Board, when such portion as may be required shall be forwarded to the Supreme Lodge treasury in the manner hereinafter specified. Should the amount needed by the Relief Board exceed the sum total of the Relief Fund in the hands of the Grand Lodges as aforesaid, then the excess required shall be immediately raised by an assessment, and forwarded as other Relief Funds are forwarded. Whenever the Relief Fund is depleted or reduced to a sum less than one dollar for each Workman Degree member as aforesaid, then the amount necessary to replenish the fund shall be raised by an assessment or assessments made upon the members in the manner herein provided. Assessments for the Relief Fund shall be levied and collected in the same manner and under the same laws, rules and regulations as ordinary assessments for the Beneficiary Fund and all laws of the Order in regard to suspensions for non-payment of Beneficiary Fund assessments or reinstatement of members, shall be applicable also to assessments made for the Relief Fund. Grand Lodges may raise or replenish their Relief Fund from their Beneficiary or General Funds, and Subordinate Lodges may pay Relief Fund assessments for their entire membership from their General Fund : *provided*, that whenever a Grand Lodge which raises or replenishes its Relief Fund from its Beneficiary Fund is an applicant for relief, then the amount of Beneficiary Fund transferred to its Relief Fund shall and must be accounted for and applied to the payment of beneficiary claims by the Relief Board before such Grand Lodge is entitled to receive relief. The sum total of the calls made by the Relief Board upon the Relief Fund in the treasuries of the various

Grand Lodges shall in no case exceed the sum of three dollars per member, in any one year."

ORGANIZATION AND DIVISION OF JURISDICTIONS.

The following amendment to Sec. 25, Constitution of Supreme Lodge, was adopted:—

"By authority of the Supreme Lodge, and subject to the Constitution and General Laws of the Order, Grand Lodges are organized and exist in such states, districts, territories and countries as have been, or may be determined by this Supreme Lodge.

"The Supreme Master Workman may, by dispensation, authorize the formation of a Grand Lodge in any state, or part thereof, district or territory in North America, over which no existing Grand Lodge has control, and set the same apart as a Separate Beneficiary Jurisdiction, said dispensation to be in force until a charter shall be granted by the Supreme Lodge, or the dispensation revoked by the Supreme Lodge.

"The territory comprising a Grand Lodge Jurisdiction may be divided by the Supreme Lodge, at a stated meeting, into two or more Grand Lodge Jurisdictions, with consent of Grand Lodge and thirty days' notice to Subordinate Lodges."

VITAL STATISTICS

The Committee appointed to consider the suggestions of the Supreme Master Workman, and the Chairman of the Committee on Vital Statistics, relative to the collection of data, and information concerning mortality rates and percentages of suspensions at different ages, between 21 and 50 years of age, recommended "That the Committee on Vital Statistics be and are hereby instructed to secure and prepare this information, which shall be submitted to the Supreme Lodge at its next session, and that the necessary expense to obtain the same shall be paid out of the General Fund of the Supreme Lodge."

The question was finally referred to the Finance Committee to report the expense at the next Supreme Lodge session.

NEW RITUAL

Wm. H. Barnes, Wm. H. James and E. M. Forde, the Special Committee appointed at the previous session and intrusted with the duty of preparing a new Ritual, presented the following report:—

"That immediately upon the adjournment of the session of 1890 they entered upon the said duty, and herewith present the result of their labors.

"It has been our endeavor to accomplish the following results:

"1st. To produce a series of changes appropriate to the Order and practical in their teaching.

"2nd. To do away with what, in our judgment, was inappropriate.

"3rd. While preparing a Ritual that could be worked by the smallest and poorest Lodge without the expenditure of a single dollar from its treasury, to also present a series of ceremonies upon which money could be expended for display, if desired, from \$50 upward.

"We have therefore presented what we term the 'standard' and the 'improved' work. The latter is designed and arranged to be placed in the Workman Degree, and is an addition to or extension of the same, said Degree being entirely complete with or without said improved addition.

"Realizing also, that in a number of instances there is a desire for what may be termed 'military movements,' in addition to arranging simple forms for the retiring and entering of Officers for conferring the 'improved' work, we have also designed and arranged a series of more intricate and fancy movements for the floor, requiring practice and drill. These latter, however, are merely optional, and as in the Ritual work, the Degree is complete without them.

"We have also taken into consideration the fact that many of the Lodges are now in possession of what is known as 'paraphernalia,' or 'apparatus,' and some have only recently purchased said goods; and we did not feel at liberty to say to such Lodges that they should throw such 'apparatus' away, and thus entail large aggregate loss. Therefore an additional section has been placed in the 'improved' work looking to the said use of said 'apparatus,' if desired, but leaving it optional with Lodges to use or not to use it.

"We do not deem it necessary to give in detail the many suggestions received in regard to the work from Brethren throughout the entire jurisdiction, all of which have been carefully considered, and for which we return our thanks to those who sent them to the Committee.

"We have endeavored to faithfully discharge the trust confided to us and perform the honorable duties with which you have complimented us to the best of our ability. That it is perfect we cannot claim, but that we have desired to make it so we can honestly claim. We submit it to your inspection and approval with our unanimous endorsement, feeling assured it will receive at your hands kindly and fraternal treatment, and that in any event your verdict will be that we have faithfully endeavored to perform the duty with which we have been honored by you."

But definite action was postponed until the next meeting of Supreme Lodge.

MAXIMUM AGE.

An effort was made to reduce the maximum age of admissions to the Order from 50 to 45, but it was not adopted.

EMBLEM OF THE ORDER.

The recommendation of the Supreme Master Workman, W. Warne Wilson, as to the emblem of the Order and its detail, was adopted. It is as follows:—

"The Supreme Lodge has adopted as the emblem of the Order the Anchor and Shield, with the letters "A O U. W." thereon, and surrounded by the sun's rays. No attempt has ever been made by the Supreme Lodge to describe in detail the emblem, except to provide that the stars and stripes should not be incorporated in the shield. In consequence of this omission, there is the greatest diversity of usage relative to the position of the Anchor, the shape of the Shield, and the position of the letters 'A. O. U. W.' thereon. There ought to be no opportunity for this diversity of usage. The emblem of the Ancient Order of United Workmen should be well defined and everywhere the same. But more than this, the Ancient Order of United Workmen should

have a uniform and complete system of emblematic designs worthy of its prominence and rank, as the largest society of its kind in the world. It should also have a motto that is descriptive of its work and suggestive of its mission. Such a motto was attached to the Anchor and Shield when first used, viz.: "Alterum, Alterius, Auxilio, Eget"—"the one needs the assistance of the other." In my opinion, no better motto than this could be selected for the Ancient Order of United Workmen. I would therefore recommend the adoption of the following as the emblem and motto of the Order, and recommend that these emblems and designs, if adopted, be copyrighted in the name of the Supreme Lodge."

DESCRIPTION.

The armorial bearings of the Supreme Lodge are as follows: A shield, argent (silver); on a bend sable (black) the capital letters A. O. U. W., or (gold); on the sinister side an eye proper rayed azure (blue) surmounting an open book, proper, whereon are the words "Holy Bible," gules (red); the whole within a border purpure (purple), whereon are as many stars argent (silver) as there are Grand Lodge Jurisdictions, plus one for the Supreme Lodge. The shield is rayed gules (red) and is displayed upon an anchor, sable (black), attached to which are a chain and a scroll argent (silver), the latter showing the motto of the Order, "Alterum, Alterius, Auxilio, Eget." (See Design No. 1.)

The armorial bearings of each Grand Lodge are the same as those of the Supreme Lodge, save that the border is azure (blue), and that in place of the eye and book a special symbol, emblematic of the particular jurisdiction according to the schedule following, is displayed proper:

The armorial bearings of each Subordinate Lodge are the same as those of the Grand Lodge in whose jurisdiction it lies, save that the border is gules (red), and that on the dexter side appear the Arabic numerals gules (red), indicating the number of the Lodge. (See Design No. 3).

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

"Proper" means that the object is depicted in its natural color.

Purple (purple) is represented by diagonal lines running downward from right to left. 

Azure (blue) is represented by horizontal lines. 

Gules (red) is represented by perpendicular lines. 

Gold is represented by dots upon a white ground. 

FLAG OF THE ORDER.

The Committee on "Good of the Order" reported, recommending the adoption of the proposition of the flag of the Order introduced by the Representatives from California, as follows :

Resolved, That a flag be adopted for this Order, the proportions of which shall be the same as those of the flag of the United States. The said flag shall be a white field, upon which shall rest the emblems of the Anchor and Shield, on which shall be the letters "A.O.U.W.," and below said emblems may be inscribed the name of the lodge or jurisdiction. For Subordinate Lodges the colors of the emblems and letters shall be scarlet ; for Grand Lodges, blue ; for the Supreme Lodge, purple.

INTOXICATING LIQUORS.

The Supreme Medical Examiner recommended in his Report that those persons engaged in the sale of intoxicating liquors by retail, as a beverage, be not admitted to the Order. The following resolution was adopted :

"That this Supreme Lodge embody in its constitutional law the principle that no one engaged in the sale, by retail, of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, can be admitted to membership in the Order."

NIAGARA DISTRICT.

The D. D. G. M. W. of Niagara District presented his report as follows :

To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A. O. U. W. of Ontario :

BRETHREN,—As D. D. G. M. of Niagara District I beg leave to submit the following report on the condition of the Order in the Niagara District. There are fifteen Lodges in this district. I regret to say that through circumstances that I could not control I was unable to visit all of the Lodges.

I have, however, visited nine out of the fifteen.

March 15. Visited Niagara Lodge, No. 46. I went over the books and found that there had been no half yearly report sent in or any bonds for the officers. No board of general purposes appointed on installation night, or the books audited for the last half year.

April 28. Visited Lincoln Lodge, No. 48. Books not well kept, no preparations for paying relief call No. 11. Gave them all the advice I could, which the officers were very thankful for.

May 5. Visited Chippawa Lodge, No. 70. Found the books well kept, the officers very energetic in their work.

September 16. Visited Square Lodge, No. 69. Found the Lodge flourishing, gave W. degree. Books in good order, officers very anxious to get along. The membership risen from ten to nineteen.

September 28. Visited Summit Lodge, No. 41. Found books in good order. Officers gave bonds to the Lodge, and the Lodge prosperous.

October 2. Visited Charity Lodge, No. 45. Found the books well kept, but the Lodge not making any progress. Advised the officers to rouse themselves and try to add to their membership.

October 9th. Visited Ridgeway Lodge, No. 59. Presided, conferred the W. degree. Found the books in good order, but meetings not very regular.

December 22. Visited Lincoln Lodge, No. 48. by request of the Grand Master Workman. Found the Recorder's and Financier's books in bad shape, no proper returns sent to the Grand Recorder for the year. It was Lodge night, I presided and gave the officers and members to understand that they must pay the Financier more promptly and the Recorder send in the monthly reports at the proper time, so that the Grand Recorder could make out his monthly returns.

January 3. Visited Chippawa Lodge, No. 70. Installed the officers. Had a pleasant time with the officers and members, advised them to better themselves and try to increase their membership.

Visited Clifton Lodge, No. 44, fourteen times. I am sorry to say that the attendance was very bad ; out of ninety-two members the largest number at any meeting was fourteen, the average number eight. The night of installation only seven members were present. The Recorder's, Financier's and Receiver's books are well kept. The Lodge is prospering, but had attendance.

Visited Park Lodge, No. 43, ten times during my official year. January 13. Installed the officers and am pleased to report them the most efficient officers in any Lodge I have visited in the District; but all through the year the attendance has not been good. On the night of installation, one member took the J. W. degree, and two members the W. degree. The Master did the work from memory.

I tried to resuscitate Pennington Lodge, No. 40, Welland. I found most of the old members had joined some other fraternity.

There is one thing I strongly recommend, that is, the suggestion of Grand Recorder, M. D. Carder, as to the bonds of the officers, namely: The Grand Lodge to act as a guaranteeing body to compel all Lodges to procure bonds for the Financiers and Receivers.

In conclusion, I have to thank the officers and brethren for the kindness shown me in the Lodges I have visited. Hoping my successor will receive the same kindness and be able to attend to the duties of D. D. G. M. better than I have.

The D.D.G.M.W. of Hamilton District presented his report as follows :

To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, A.O.U.W. of Ontario:

BRETHREN.—In presenting this report at the close of my term of office as D.D.G.M.W. for the Hamilton District, I desire to return my hearty thanks to the brethren of the various Lodges throughout the District for the kindly manner in which I was received by them on the occasion of my visits, and to many of the brethren both in the city and District for their assistance and co-operation. The eighteen Lodges in this District are all meeting regularly, with the exception of a few Lodges for a month or so in the summer when it is impossible to get a quorum. The growth of the Order in this District has not been what we could wish, but taking into account the many removals from some of the Lodges it is gratifying to note a slight increase in membership.

Dundas Lodge, No. 76.—This Lodge was the first one visited by your D. D., and he was very kindly received. He was grieved to see there was trouble amongst its members, which proved to be of such a serious nature, he deemed it advisable to ask the Grand Master to pay them a visit, which he did, and was successful in healing all troubles, and I believe his visit did good to the Order, not only in Dundas but in the District. When I again visited then I was pleased to note an entire change in their work. They initiated four candidates and received six applications, and from the reports of some of the members I anticipated they would keep on with the good work. I was not disappointed, as they have done nobly since then. I have no doubt these brethren are convinced that success depends upon united effort.

Elm Lodge, No. 139, Flamboro.—Your D.D. next visited this Lodge. It is in a thriving condition, its members all seeming to unite to build up our Order. They have done well during the year. The fraternal feeling of these brethren was very marked, not only upon the occasion of my visit to them, but the very valuable assistance rendered me on other occasions when visiting Lodges in their vicinity.

Dunville Lodge, No. 167.—The next visit of D.D. was to this Lodge. This is an A1 Lodge, nicely furnished, and the brethren seem to be much interested in the work. Their gains would be considerable if they did not lose so many by removals. This Lodge is the only one I ever knew to wear white aprons as well as the badge.

Selkirk Lodge, No. 132.—Your D.D. next visited this Lodge and he was kindly received. He was also pleased to see they were anxious to make additions to their ranks. He initiated a candidate for them. This seemed

very acceptable, as they do not often get an opportunity to see the work done by others. They have made a few memqers since then. I hope they will persevere in their work, as they have a good territory.

Copetown Lodge, No. 131.—Your D.D., accompanied by Bro. Birrell, P.M.W., visited this Lodge, and he found a fairly comfortable Lodge room. They have suffered very much by removals. They need to put forth strenuous efforts to build up their Lodge, as their territory is rather limited, being surrounded by Lodges at short distances.

Jerseyville Lodge, No. 95.—Through the kindness of Bro. Field your D.D. was enabled to visit this Lodge. It is the smallest in the District. Would like to see more enthusiasm displayed by its members, and have reason to hope from the way they expressed that there will be good work done by them this year.

Lynden Lodge, No. 102.—This Lodge is in a very good condition. Your D.D. initiated a candidate for them and think they intended to bring in more during the winter months. They gave your D.D. a right royal reception, more so, I am afraid, than his services were worth to them.

Security Lodge, No. 62.—Your D.D. had the pleasure of visiting these brethren, and he found a Lodge of which this District may be proud, composed of good members, officers well up in their work, the Lodge room very nicely furnished. Your D.D. will not soon forget the kindly and fraternal welcome extended him on the occasion of his visit to them.

Jarvis Lodge, No. 65.—Upon the occasion of the visit of your D.D. to this Lodge he initiated two candidates, apparently young, healthy men. The officers of this Lodge seem very careful in the conduct of their business, and your D.D. regrets they have not met with the encouragement he thinks they deserve from Grand Lodge, as he feels that in the matter of the Schuyler Brothers they were in the right, although perhaps they did not present their case in proper form. This Lodge uses the paraphernalia in all its initiations.

Cayuga Lodge, No. 147.—Upon a very disagreeable night your D.D. visited this Lodge, and he is convinced from the energy displayed in the past, that as soon as they have recovered from the misfortunes they met with a few years since, good work will be reported from this Lodge. They have some excellent members; they are also Past Masters in the art of extending a fraternal welcome to a visitor.

Caledonia Lodge, No. 165.—Your D.D. will not soon forget his visit to this Lodge, as it was his first outing after being confined to bed with La Grippe. The brethren here have a fine room and a good membership. Your D.D. conferred the Workman degree on a candidate; their reception of your D.D. was kindness itself, and he arrived home feeling better for his trip.

Waterdown Lodge, No. 94.—Together with a number of brethren from the city your D.D. visited this Lodge, and with the assistance of the above named brethren publicly installed the officers for 1892. The ceremony was not as interesting to the audience as it would have been had the Master Workman-elect been well enough to be present. These brethren are doing the best they can to build up a strong Lodge.

Gore Lodge, No. 88.—This is a strong Lodge and its members take a great interest in all that pertains to the Order, the officers do their work well and they have made very respectable showing for the year 1891.

Dixon Lodge, No. 237.—Your D.D. has nothing but words of praise for this Lodge, as they have made the most members for 1891 of any Lodge in

the District. Their officers are painstaking and membership energetic, and the treatment of your D.D. all he could desire.

Hamilton Lodge, No. 49.—This was until recently called the banner Lodge of the Jurisdiction, and the one to which your D.D. belongs. Its growth has not been what its officers and members would wish; its officers all memorise their work and its members take interest in the prosperity of the Order. The Lodge extended to me a most fraternal welcome, and made me feel that nowhere in the District have I any warmer friends than in my own Lodge.

Concord Lodge, No. 291.—This Lodge is noted for its rapid growth, and on the occasion of his visit, your D.D. was pleased to note the excellent manner of conducting their business. I was to have installed their officers for 1892, but was unable to do so owing to an attack of La Grippe.

Acacia Lodge, No. 320.—Your D.D. has not visited this Lodge officially, owing to La Grippe, but have often done so informally, and wish to express appreciation for the efforts they have made to build up their Lodge, their senior P. M. W., Bro. Lyman Lee, and the other officers doing their best in its interests. Your D.D. will, if possible, pay a visit before the meeting of Grand Lodge.

Rockton Lodge, No. 298.—In company with a good Brother from Dixon Lodge, your D.D. drove out seventeen miles to this Lodge. He found they had made preparations for his visit, a number of their ladies being engaged preparing a supper. Your D.D. suggested to have an open installation and invite the ladies, which was done, and I trust that they will assist in making known the grand work in which our Order is engaged. The Lodge is composed of very good material, and its officers seem to be well up in their work.

When I was elected D.D.G.M. four years ago there were eighteen Lodges in the District. There are now twenty-six, three of which I had the pleasure of organizing during the year, namely : Paterson, Huron and Baxter. I am also pleased to state that Bro. Kelly, P.M.W. of Hamilton Lodge, succeeded in organizing a Lodge at Southampton in December, making four new Lodges in this District this year. I have visited sixteen lodges during the year, installed the officers in eight of them, exemplified the secret work, and rendered such assistance as circumstances required, to the best of my ability. I am pleased to report a decided improvement in some Lodges in the performance of lodge work, as many of the officers have acted on my advice (last year) and have memorized their portion of the ritual, and therefore perform their duties in a creditable manner. I am also pleased to state that the Order has made fair progress in this District during the past year. It is also very gratifying that no trouble of a serious nature has arisen to mar the harmony that at the present time prevails in all the Lodges in the District. I regret, however, that the officers are not more encouraged in the discharge of their duties by a better attendance at lodge meetings on the part of the members, many of whom seem to think that if they attend and cast their votes at the annual elections they have fulfilled their duties to the Order. As I have already stated, there are twenty-six Lodges in the District, extending from St. Marys in the county of Perth to Wiarton on Colpoy's Bay. It is entirely too large for any one man to superintend properly, and consequently I would strongly recommend that it be divided. In conclusion I wish to thank the brethren of Huron District for the honor they conferred on me by electing me their D.D.G.M. for the fourth time, and I have endeavored to advance the interests of our noble Order at every opportunity. I desire also to acknowledge the promptness with which my applications for information or advice have at all times been met by the Grand Master and our Grand Recorder.

SIMCOE DISTRICT.

The D. D. G. M. W. of Simcoe District presented his report as follows:

To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, A. O. U. W. of Ontario:

BRETHREN,—According to the requirements of the Constitution of the Grand Lodge, I have the honor to submit my report as to the condition of the Order in the Simcoe District. There are twenty-four Lodges in this District, all of which have been visited with the exception of Waubaushene, Coldwater, Hillsdale, Barrie, Minesing and Creemore. I exceedingly regret that on account of pressure of business I was unable to visit the above Lodges.

April 17. I paid my first official visit to Cookstown Lodge, No. 228. They have a membership of sixty-seven, which is large considering the size of the village (between 300 and 400 inhabitants), yet they have done comparatively nothing for the last two years in the way of increasing their membership. This I was informed was owing to an unfortunate trouble that for some time had existed between two of the officers of the Lodge. The trouble was referred to me for investigation by the Grand Master Workman, and I am happy to say has finally been disposed of, and I anticipate better results from this Lodge for the coming year. They meet in a comfortable hall, but not very suitable for Lodge purposes, being used for almost every other purpose in the village, such as concerts, lectures, etc. The books are well kept and the work fairly done. They reported \$361 on hand, but unfortunately \$160 of this amount was invested in a promissory note, and I regret to say has been lost.

June 1. I visited Lefroy Lodge, No. 227. They have a membership of forty-three, average attendance ten to twelve. Three meetings had been missed up to the time of my visit. They have a comfortable hall. The work is fair and the books well kept.

June 12. I visited Georgian Lodge, No. 280, Stroud. Their membership is twenty-three, average attendance nine. Only one meeting was missed since January. The work is fairly well done and the books are well kept.

June 15. I visited Lakeview Lodge, No. 229, Ivy. I was very much disappointed with this visit, having driven twenty-three miles through a heavy rain, and did not find a light in the Lodge room. I waited a considerable time, when finally three members turned up. I, of course, had no opportunity of seeing the work done. Their membership is twenty-six, average attendance six to eight. Three meetings had been missed up to the time of my visit. They are making no progress and the books are a discredit to the Lodge.

I visited Friendship Lodge, No. 74, Alliston, on July 23rd. This Lodge is reported to meet every Thursday night, and have changed their meeting to every other Thursday without notifying the Grand Recorder. The night of my visit there was no meeting on account of the hall they meet in being occupied by another society their own hall being destroyed by the recent big fire. I examined the books and found them well kept. Since my visit they meet in a new and comfortable hall, and I believe are doing good work.

On August 4th I had the pleasure of visiting Stayner Lodge, No. 134, and was greeted with a splendid attendance. Out of a total membership of

Lisle Lodge, No. 90, New Lowell. This Lodge was visited, but owing to the very stormy weather there was a small attendance. They have added three new members during the year. The work is well done and the books well kept.

Bradford Lodge, No. 82. This Lodge, while situated in a village with only 1,000 inhabitants, can boast of the handsome membership of 133, all in good standing, and is one of the most prosperous Lodges in the District. Fourteen new members have been added during the year, which is the greatest increase made by any Lodge in the District. The hall is a credit to the village being very comfortable, well furnished and with splendid ante-rooms. The members are active and very energetic. As to the working of the Lodge, it is certainly the best worked Lodge I had the pleasure of visiting, each officer having his work thoroughly memorized, and the ritual is entirely dispensed with. The books are neat and very correctly kept. The average attendance is thirty to thirty-five. A large increase may be expected from this Lodge next year. On the whole the Order is progressing favorably in this District.

I find that with the exception of Bradford Lodge, not a Lodge in the District that I have had the honor of visiting, has conformed to the requirements of the Constitution in regard to the officers giving bonds. I have tried strongly to impress the necessity of the officers giving bonds, of the officers memorizing their several portions of the Ritual, of a larger attendance on the part of the members of the different Lodges, and to the best of my ability have endeavored to advance and promote the interests of our noble Order.

In conclusion I thank the officers and members of the Subordinate Lodges of Simcoe District for the kind manner in which I was received when paying official visits.

GEORGIAN BAY DISTRICT.

The D. D. G. M. W. of Georgian Bay District presented his report as follows:

*To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge,
A. O. U. W., of Ontario.*

BRETHREN,—I have once more the honor of submitting a brief report of the general condition of the Order in my District.

This District consists of thirteen Lodges, one of which was instituted this year, and because of the distances apart the task of visiting them is by no means an easy one.

Together with six others I had the pleasure of visiting Spry, No. 193, and Byng Inlet, No. 284, which, because of their isolated position, have not been visited (except once) by a D. D. G. M.

I visited Spry Lodge on the 17th September, when ten members were present, and I had the pleasure of assisting in the initiation of two candidates.

forty-nine, twenty-three were present. I initiated a candidate in the Workman degree. They meet in a very comfortable and well-furnished Lodge room, and appear to be in a flourishing condition. Their meetings are well kept up and their average attendance is sixteen. The books are splendidly kept and their work a little above the average.

Penetanguishene Lodge, No. 222, was visited on December 7th. They have made an increase of two, and on the whole the Lodge is progressing. The books are well kept and the average attendance good.

On Thursday, December 8th, Elmvale Lodge, No. 223, was visited. This Lodge is in a very prosperous condition, all of the members being alive to their work. They have made an increase of seven, and the books are well kept.

I visited Tottenham Lodge, No. 89, and found them meeting in a very comfortable hall. They have added six new members, four by initiation and two by card, their membership now being thirty-nine, average attendance ten. The books are well kept, and I look for a large increase in this Lodge another year.

On December 14th I visited Beeton Lodge, No. 87. This was a very pleasant and profitable meeting. Out of a membership of forty-three, fully thirty were present. Six new members were added during the year, and on the night of my visit there were five new applications. This is a good showing for a Lodge that only a few years ago was almost defunct, but thanks to Bro. Fenton, it is now in a prosperous condition. The meetings are well attended, the work is well done and the books are well kept.

December 21. Bond Lodge, No. 83, Bond Head. This Lodge is progressing slowly, but surely. They have increased their membership three, and have an efficient set of officers. I initiated a candidate in the Workman degree. Out of a total membership of forty, fully twenty were out the night of my visit. Their average attendance is ten. Books are well kept and work fair.

January 12. I visited Midland Lodge, No. 306, and had the pleasure of installing their officers. They have a membership of forty-nine, average attendance fifteen. They have only increased their numbers by two, which is very little for a flourishing town like Midland. The work is above the average, and the books are neatly and correctly kept. They have a very comfortable hall.

January 14. Visited Orillia Lodge which ranks fourth in point of numbers District, their present membership being 121. During the year they have added fourteen new members, eleven by initiation and three by card. They meet in a very fine hall and are in a very prosperous condition. The work is well done, and to say the books are well kept would scarcely be doing the officers in charge justice. They have, without doubt, the most systematic and best kept books I had the pleasure of inspecting, and reflect great credit on the Lodge, particularly on the Recorder, Financier and Receiver. There were twenty-five present the night of my visit, and I installed their officers. Average attendance about fifteen. No meetings missed.

Anchor Lodge, No. 124, was visited on the 18th January. They have certainly the finest hall in the District, being built specially for lodge purposes, and I must say have a very enthusiastic set of members. Their membership is 143, being the largest in the District. Nine new members have been added this year; eight by initiation and one by card. This Lodge never misses a meeting. The work is well done and the books were a pleasure to inspect, and are kept in a very business-like way.

This Lodge is steadily increasing its membership, and as usual is sustained by the earnest endeavor of a few willing workers. I was highly pleased with the courtesy shown me, and predict a prosperous future for No. 193.

Byng Inlet Lodge I visited on the 19th September, when eight members were present. The Foreman presided the M. W. being ill. I must confess I was delighted with the management of this Lodge. The majority of the officers know the S. W. by rote, and delight in having the work of the Lodge room well performed. The position of this Lodge prevents any rapid increase of membership.

I mention these two Lodges in particular because of their isolation and not having visited them previously.

On the first day of February I had the honor of instituting, at Schriber, Superior Lodge, with 22 charter members. I am indebted to Bro. H. Nolan, a former member of Sudbury Lodge, for the establishing the Order in this place. The Lodge here is composed of good material, the members are enthusiastic, and are aspiring to the position of "banner Lodge" of the District.

While none of the Lodges of the District have made marked progress, nevertheless none are retrograding and many making fairly reasonable advancement.

I am sorry to again have to apologize for being unable to visit several of the Lodges in my District. I can assure them, however, that because of circumstances over which I had no control I was prevented from doing so rather than by lack of interest for the prosperity of the Order.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the brethren for the courtesy shown me while visiting, and also to the representatives for having elected me as their D. D. G. M. for three consecutive terms.

DUFFERIN DISTRICT.

The D.D.G.M.W. of Dufferin District presented his report as follows:

To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A. O. U. W. of Ontario:

BRETHREN,—As D.D.G.M.W. of Dufferin District I have the honor to submit the following report of the progress and position of the Order in this District for the past year.

There are fourteen Lodges in this District, and I have visited twelve of these during the year.

December 18th. I visited Lakelett Lodge, No. 270, which is the youngest Lodge in this District, and shows very satisfactory progress. They have fifty members on the roll, twenty of whom were added during the past year. I find the Lodge in excellent working order, the brethren well up in their work, and the books well kept. Too much praise cannot be given the officers for the efficient manner in which they have filled their respective positions.

December 21. Visited Markdale Lodge, No. 141. This is one of the best Lodges in the District, having a membership of fifty-five, of whom nine were added during the year. They have good officers, who have their work well memorized. The meetings are held regularly and are well attended, and great interest is taken in the welfare of the Order. I had the pleasure of conferring the W. degree on two members.

December 28th. I visited Priceville Lodge, No. 140. This Lodge has twenty nine members in good standing, but shows no increase during the year. They have now got into a Lodge room of their own, which was a great drawback in the past, and they are much more efficient as regards keeping the books and in the secret work of the Order, and I think they will in another year render a good account of themselves.

December 28. Visited Durham Lodge, No. 198. I found the officers well up in their work, and the books of the Financier, Receiver and Recorder in excellent order. I initiated one candidate in the J.W. degree, and witnessed the Master confer the W. degree, which was well and ably done, and shows a marked improvement. The increased interest now taken by the officers and members will not only prove satisfactory to themselves, but should any Grand Lodge officers visit this Lodge, they will find it a credit to the Order. They have a membership of twenty-six.

January 4. I visited Shelburne Lodge, No. 149. They added seven to their number during the past year, and have now a membership of sixty. This Lodge is in the hands of P.D.D.G.M.W. Bro. Thos. Allen, whom it is needless for me to flatter, as his zeal for the welfare of the Order is exhibited by the working of the Lodge and the large attendance of the brethren at the regular meetings. The Lodge room is handsomely furnished, and the books, especially of the Receiver and Financier, are well kept. I received, as usual, the utmost kindness from the officers and members of Shelburne Lodge, who closed the Lodge, and escorted me in a body to the depot.

January 4. Visited Flesherton Lodge, No. 142. Reinstalled the officers and found them fairly well up in their work, but they are not holding meetings as regularly as I would like. The Receiver and Financier were not present at the meeting, consequently I did not see their books. I trust that the present officers will be punctual in their attendance at the meetings, which will be a great incentive to the members to attend and take an interest in the work, and the results will be very gratifying to themselves and the Order. The present membership is thirty-two.

January 8. I visited Rosemont Lodge, No. 279. This Lodge has twenty-one members on the roll, and although composed of good material, is not in the best working order. I installed the officers and strongly urged upon them the necessity of holding and attending the meetings regularly, and I think by the way my remarks were received that increased interest will be taken in the work, and a decided improvement made in another year. The only books I had for examination were the Recorder's, which were fairly well kept. The Receiver and Financier were not present.

January 12. Visited Mansfield Lodge, 218. I had the pleasure of being accompanied by P.D.D.G.M.W. Thos. Allen, in making this visit. There are forty-nine members on the roll. I installed the officers for the current year and found them well up in their work, and am sure that with Bro. Love as M.W. this Lodge will still continue in a prosperous condition. The books are well and cleanly kept.

January 13. I visited Meaford Lodge, No. 152. I installed the officers and found a membership of twenty-three. While the brethren of this Lodge are most excellent men, there is an apathy existing which they cannot overcome, but I am satisfied that the renewed life and vigor which the well-known ability of Bro. Main as M.W. will infuse into the Lodge, will make an improvement which will redound to the credit of the Order. The Recorder's books, the only ones I had access to, are well kept.

January 15. I visited Camilla Lodge, No. 332. This Lodge has a membership of thirty-two. I installed the officers for the year, who are well up in their work, and the members show a great interest in the Order. The books of the Recorder, Financier and Receiver are exceedingly neat and well kept.

January 18th. Visited Grey Lodge, No. 133. I installed the Officers for the current year. They cannot be excelled in any part of the jurisdiction. The Lodge is worked between the members of Thornbury and Clarksburg. The officers this year are from Clarksburg. The number of members on the roll is forty. The books are neatly and well kept, those of the Recorder being worthy of special notice.

Owen Sound Lodge, No. 151. This is my own Lodge, and am pleased to state is the largest Lodge in the district. There is a membership of 137, of whom ten were added during the year. The Recorder, Financier and Receiver are paid for their work, which is very well done, their books being in excellent order.

I regret very much that I have been deterred through sickness, contracted in making these trips, from visiting two Lodges,—Orangeville, 124 members, four added during the year, and Dundalk, whose numbers I have not learned, but I hope to be able to overtake them before the meeting of the Grand Lodge.

I have observed during these visits that those Lodges having semi-monthly meetings are the best attended. When the meetings are held monthly there is a lack of interest evinced, and the attendance is small. I think it would be in the interest of the Order to make semi-monthly meetings compulsory. In the twelve Lodges visited I have found a marked improvement, which is very gratifying. I would earnestly urge on my successor to make at least one visit to each Lodge, as it is a great incentive to officers and members to attend the meetings regularly and get up the work of the Order. I desire to return to the officers and members of all the Lodges in Dufferin District my sincere thanks for their kindness and courtesy extended to me on my visits, and the hearty manner in which they have assisted me in my efforts to advance the interests and prosperity of the Order during the two years I have filled this office.

BRETHREN,—As D.D.G.M.W. of Durham District, I beg leave to submit the following report on the condition of the Order in the District :

I have visited all the Lodges excepting one, which I intend to visit before Grand Lodge meets.

I visited Castleton Lodge, No. 323, on May 5th. I found them in fair working order. The By-laws of their Lodge had just been approved by the Chairman on Laws and confirmed by the Grand Master Workman. I made other visits to this Lodge during the year 1891, also on January 5th, 1892, accompanied by Bro. H. S. Keyes, of Paith Lodge, No. 123, when I installed the officers, and am confident that the new officers will bring this Lodge to the front.

On my visit to Brighton Lodge, No. 122, on July 9th, I found a difficulty existing between them, which was easily rectified. This Lodge had a successful picnic at Pres-quiet Point on July 30th, being the tenth year since they were instituted. At that gathering there were about 2,000 people present, fine day, grand speeches, and everything a success. I also visited them on November 26th, found them in fair working order, books fairly kept, directed them to procure new books for their Financier and Receiver. I visited them again on January 14th, when two candidates were initiated in the J. W. and W. Degrees, and I installed the officers.

Orono Lodge, No. 161—On my visit of October 6th, I found a good attendance and their books well kept. They meet in a fine large hall and nicely furnished. Every member of this Lodge tried to make my visit pleasant and profitable. The prospects of this Lodge are excellent.

I visited Safety Lodge, No. 101, on October 7th. It rained nearly all day and night. I found a very small attendance, but the officers had their work well up, especially the M. W. The books of this Lodge were well kept. I also visited them on January 6th, when one candidate was initiated in the W. Degree. I installed the officers, found good attendance, and had a pleasant meeting.

I visited Havelock Lodge, No. 309, on January 11th. This Lodge has made some progress during the year, and from the staff of officers I installed I believe it will be one of the foremost lodges in the District, as at every meeting they have a large attendance. Books were in good shape.

Peterborough Lodge, No. 135, sit in as fine a hall as there is in the Province. The members take an interest in the Order, as they try to find any members of the Order that are in Peterborough on their night of meeting to give them a special invitation to visit their Lodge. I visited them on January 12th, and found members from six different Lodges present ; found books in

good shape. I installed the officers for the ensuing term, also explained many parts of the Constitution to them, and had a pleasant visit.

Wednesday, January 13th, visited Norwood Lodge, No. 257, accompanied by Bro. Jos. McClelland, of Peterborough Lodge. I gave both Degrees to two candidates who were in waiting to be admitted; also installed the officers elect, found the books fairly kept, large attendance at meeting, and spent a pleasant evening.

Visited Campbellford Lodge. No. 259, on January 25th, and found the Lodge prospering and books well kept. I installed the officers, and explained many parts of the Constitution to them. From the interest taken by the brethren of this Lodge there is no fear for the future.

Cobourg Lodge, No. 121, I visited on January 26th, and must say that this is the banner Lodge of the District. The books were in excellent order. One of the great features of this Lodge is that they work the Relief fund, and paid out the sum of \$103.00 to their members who were sick during the year 1891. I believe this is the only Lodge which provides by their By-laws a stated sum to be paid weekly to a sick member.

My official visit to my own Lodge, Faith Lodge, No. 123, was made January 28th. This Lodge has not been able to come to last year's record, but is steadily increasing. The books are kept excellently. This Lodge had an open meeting on January 21st, when we were favored with addresses from P. G. Masters Taylor, Miller and other distinguished brethren, when good seed was sown, and this Lodge will reap the benefit during the present year.

I am pleased to report that the Grand Master Workman visited Peterborough Lodge, No. 135, in September, 1891. He gave an address which was appreciated by the brethren that heard him.

In conclusion, I have to heartily thank the Grand Master and Grand Recorder for their promptness in answering my correspondence; also to the officers and members of Durham District for the kindness shown to me during my term of office, and am assured that my successor will receive the same.

I regret to say that the hand of death has removed several of our brethren during the year, but in each case the kindness and attention of the brethren to the bereaved ones, and the promptness with which the beneficiary claims were paid, have elicited the warmest encomiums from many, even amongst those who were formerly by no means friendly to our Order.

I cannot express my opinion more effectually, than by saying that the A. O. U. W. has taken deep root in this district, that it stands in the very front amongst all kindred societies, and that its future is as bright as the most optimistic promoter of the Order could wish.

In conclusion, I heartily thank the officers and members of this district, for the kind, cordial and fraternal greeting which I have always received from them, and the promptness and willingness with which they have accepted and carried out any suggestions I have made to them, and I feel it my duty, in this connection, to specially mention the names of Past D. D. G. M. W. Porte, of Picton, and P. M. W. Denmark, of Belleville, and to thank them for the valuable and unselfish assistance they have rendered to me, whenever called upon.

KINGSTON DISTRICT.

The D. D. G. M. W. of Kingston District presented his report as follows :

*To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge,
A. O. U. W. of Ontario :*

BRETHREN,—In accordance with the requirements of the constitution I beg leave to submit my report as D. D. G. M. W. of Kingston district, for the past year.

At the beginning of the year there were fifteen Lodges in my district, and since then I have, with the assistance of other brethren, instituted two new Lodges, namely : Kingston Lodge, No. 357, with seventy-five charter members, located at Kingston, and Collins Bay Lodge, No. 361, with sixteen charter members, located at Collins Bay, and there is another Lodge that will be ready to start in a week or two at Inverary, with good prospects.

During the past year I have visited all the Lodges in the district, some of them twice, and found them all in good working order, the books well kept, and the officers well posted in their several duties. I make special mention of Centreville Lodge, No. 182, which has nearly doubled its membership during the past year, and that was owing to the Lodge giving a bonus of \$1.50 to members bringing in a candidate. I think the idea is a good one, and have advised the other Lodges to adopt the same plan. When visiting that Lodge, I had the honor of conferring the Workman degree on sixteen candidates, and of installing the officers.

On my visits to the different Lodges I found very little printed literature that could be handed to gentlemen, to induce them to come into the Order.

The leaflets which were printed on my suggestion, last Grand Lodge, I found of great service in soliciting members to start Kingston Lodge, and had it not been for them I would not have been able to organize with seventy five charter members ; and, instead of sending only two or three copies to each Lodge, in my opinion there should have been two or three hundred sent. Don't spare the printer's ink ; it will come back to you tenfold, and I would strongly recommend the printing and circulating of one hundred thousand leaflets with the latest report in them.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the officers and brethren of Kingston District for the honor conferred on me by electing me their D. D. G. M. W. for the second term, and for the kind, cordial and fraternal greeting which I received throughout the District, and to the members of my own Lodge for their valuable assistance in the discharge of my duty.

I now lay down the gavel to my successor, trusting that he may perform the duties of the office with more advantage to the Order than I was able to do, so that our noble Order may continue to flourish in its good work.

BRETHREN,—It is with much pleasure that I herewith submit my first report as D.D.G.M.W., of the District of Ottawa, for the year 1891. I have visited all the Lodges in my District (eight in number) several times, and some of them almost every night, but only once officially in the middle of the year, when I found the Lodges generally doing well. I also found their books as a rule well kept, but the attendance in most of the Lodges not so large as it might be. This seems to be the general complaint everywhere. I have to report with pleasure that there did not arise any question requiring a reference to me for settlement. I also take pleasure in testifying that when any project was proposed for the benefit of the Order I found all the Lodges ready and willing to do all in their power to make it a success. I take pleasure in reporting that all the Lodges are very prosperous financially, and that they are carrying out the noble principles of our grand Order by helping worthy, needy brethren from the funds of their Lodges when necessary. I had the pleasure of installing the Officers of all the eight Lodges this month for the ensuing year. Although I cannot report such an increase in members for the past year as my worthy predecessor did for the previous year, yet I think all things considered we did fairly well; but cannot hide from myself the fact that we might have done better, and am of the opinion that more will be done this year than was done in the past, as I feel that our noble Order is taking a firmer hold on the hearts of the people year by year, and more especially this year as the Grand Lodge meets here in February, which I think will have the effect of giving the Order a great boom in this end of the grand Jurisdiction.

BRETHREN—In accordance with the requirements of our constitution, I beg leave to submit my report as D. D.G. M. W. of Brant District for the past year.

December 3rd, visited Oxford Lodge, No. 17, and found it in first-class working order. The books of the Recorder and Financier are well kept. The officers are well posted in their duties, and the members are active in the interests of the order.

December 15th, visited St. George Lodge, 148. I wrote the Recorder that I would visit them on the above date and to try and get the members out, as that was their regular night of meeting, but unfortunately it was a very stormy night, and as most of their members live in the country there were only three at the meeting. I find that the members take no interest in the order, as they have held no meetings for three months.

December 17th, visited Woodstock Lodge, No. 38. This is one of the best Lodges in the District. The meetings are well attended by active members. It has good officers and well posted in their work. The books are well kept and in good order. They have a very nice and comfortable Lodge room.

December 21st, visited Oak Lodge, No. 120. I wrote the Recorder that I would visit them on the above date, but on arrival was told that there would be no meeting, as they have held no meetings for several years. I called on some of the members at their homes or places of business and tried to infuse some life in them; some of them promised that they would try and do better in the future. They seem to have no interest in the order, and joined it for the insurance only.

December 23rd, visited Scotland, Lodge, No. 64. This Lodge is not in very good working order. I found a very good attendance at their meeting. The books are fairly well kept, but the other officers are not well posted in their duties, on account of having so few initiations. I conferred the Workman degree on two candidates. I gave them words of encouragement and tried to stir them up to their duty as Workmen.

December 24th, went to Brantford on my way from Scotland Lodge, with the intention of visiting Brantford Lodge, No. 71, as this was their regular night of meeting, but found they had held a special meeting on the 22nd, and had elected their officers for the ensuing year. I called on the Recorder and Financier and found that this Lodge was in a prosperous and healthy condition, having made a gain of forty members during the last year. This is still the banner Lodge of the district.

January 1st, Hope Lodge, No. 37, my own Lodge. I attend all their meetings. This Lodge is well up in the work of the order. The officers confer the degrees without the use of the ritual. The meetings are well attended. They purchased a library last summer for the use of its members, which has helped to increase the attendance of the members.

January 4th, visited Burford Lodge, No. 75, and installed their officers. This is a first-class lodge and is doing good work. The members seem to take a great interest in the work of the order. The officers are well up in their duties. The books are well kept and in good shape. There is a good attendance at Lodge meetings.

Paris Lodge, No. 79. I did not visit this Lodge at a regular meeting, but called on the Recorder and Financier and found that everything was in good shape. They have not added many members during the last year, but their members are all in good standing at the end of the year.

January 5th, visited Princeton Lodge, No. 153. This Lodge has made great progress during the year having initiated twenty-two members. This Lodge was at a standstill for several years, and at one time they talked of giving up their charter, but new life has been infused in the members. This Lodge had the best attendance of any of the Lodges I visited. Out of a membership of forty there were thirty-three present. I installed their officers and exemplified the secret work of the order. The books are well kept, and the officers well versed in their duties.

January 7th, visited Otter Lodge, No. 335. This is the infant Lodge of the district, and has made very good progress during the year. There was a fair attendance of members, some of them living four and five miles away, which speaks well of the interest they take in the order. The books are well kept and the officers fairly well up in the work. I installed their officers and exemplified the secret work of the order.

January 8th, visited Zion Lodge, No. 119. This Lodge is in first-class working order. This being a country Lodge and composed of farmers they deserve great credit for their attendance at Lodge meetings, which is good. The officers are well up in their duties. Both officers and members take an active interest in the work of the order. They own their Lodge room which is very neat and comfortable. The books are well kept.

January 11th., visited Norwich Lodge, No. 36. This is a first-class Lodge, the attendance at Lodge meetings good, and the members take a lively interest in the work of the order. The officers are well up in their work. There were two members advanced to the Workman degree. They have now one hundred members. I examined the books of the Recorder and

Financier and found them well kept. I installed their officers for the present year.

January 28th, visited Jubilee Lodge. This Lodge I found in very good working order, although there was not a very good attendance of members on account of a number of them being sick, but I believe their average attendance is very good. This Lodge has good officers. The books of the Recorder and Financier are neat and well kept. They have made a gain of twelve members during the year.

I am pleased to say that harmony and good-fellowship prevail in all the Lodges, and I look forward to a prosperous year for 1892.

QUEBEC DISTRICT.

The D.D.G.M.W. of Quebec District presented his report as follows :

To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge A. O. U. W. of Ontario :

BRETHREN,—I beg to submit the following report, as D. D. G. M. W. of the Province of Quebec.

The number of Lodges has increased in this District during the past year from 11 to 16, the following having been instituted during the year 1891 :

The three first-named Lodges were organized chiefly by the exertions of Bro. T. Chambers, Grand Inside Watchman, St. Francis being the work of Bro. P. M. W. Woods, of Mystic Lodge, and Clarence of Bro. John Roach, its present Financier. It is not impossible that by the time Grand Lodge meets I may have to report the institution of two more—one in Longueuil, and another in Chambly—brethren in both places being actively occupied in their organization at the present time. Others are also working in different parts of the Province, and I hope the coming year may show a still more rapid increase of the membership of the Order in this District.

Other fraternal organizations, however, with somewhat the same objects as our own, are actively pressing their respective claims in every town and hamlet of the Province ; and I would strongly urge that more strenuous efforts be put forth to bring our Society before the public. Its advantages only need an energetic advocate to induce members to join us, but it is difficult to find men willing and able to give their time and talents for this purpose.

The actual officers of each Lodge generally work well, and if the ordinary members would, as a body, attend Lodge meetings regularly and bring in all eligible friends as members, they would benefit the latter as well as the Order at large. That we are not at a standstill, however, is plainly shown by the following table of Lodges and their membership during the past three years :

I would strongly urge on Grand Lodge the serious consideration of some change in the Constitution by which the interests of P. M. W. in the active work of the Order might be perpetuated, and the machinery of Grand Lodge itself rendered less cumbersome.

It is an established custom that the retiring M. W. becomes the G. L. Representative of his Lodge, thus changing the personnel of G. L. each year. P. M. W., not representatives, have neither vote nor voice, so that they have no inducement to attend its meetings, and such experience as the first meeting gives them is lost unless, or as soon as, they cease to be G. L. officers—and they therefore quickly lose interest in the work, which is carried on by the few who remain in office and the great bulk of new members unused to the work. It seems to me that if each District had a District Lodge the cost of attending this would be but little, and these District Lodges could elect Representatives (according to membership) to the Grand Lodge, which would thus be worked at much less expense.

I made somewhat of an experiment in this direction in my District this year by holding quarterly meetings of the M. W. and P. M. W. of the District, and these meetings have added a good deal to the interest taken in the Order.

I installed the officers of six Lodges, two—Montreal and Prince George—being public, of which the first was well attended and the last fairly. Prince George, having but just removed to its present place of meeting, has not got fully under way in its work, and having abundance of good material in the immediate vicinity of its new quarters, I look to see a large increase in its membership the coming year.

Of the old Lodges, Federation still heads the list, having made seventy-eight new members this year. The others are doing fairly well, especially Stanley. Of the new Lodges, Mystic has nearly doubled her membership. The last Lodge instituted last month (Clarence, No. 16) had over fifty names on her charter list, forty-nine of whom have been initiated.

Upon the question of separation from the Supreme Lodge, we are a unit against such a departure, though all consider that at the meeting of the Supreme Lodge in 1893 a vigorous effort should be made to have the maximum of assessment arrived at in a more fair manner by taking the average of the deaths in each junior dictum for the previous five years, and adding the same percentage to each to establish such maximum.

The total membership on the 31st of December, 1890, was 573, and on the 31st of December, 1891, 662, showing an increase of eighty-nine. While I feel proud of the increase during my term of office, I cannot help thinking how much more might have been done had the brethren generally taken a deeper interest in the cause, instead of leaving it practically to a few earnest workers.

The new Lodges, Inkerman and Aultsville, are doing well, they have neat Lodge rooms and excellent officers, who are well up in their work.

During the year I visited all the Lodges in the District, and was enabled to install the officers of Cornwall Lodge, No. 214; Newington, No. 343; Inkerman, No. 355; Aultsville, No. 351; Osnabruck, No. 304, and Winchester, No. 176. As many of them meet on the same night, it was impossible for me to install the officers in all of them. In some, the installation was public, which was well attended and fully appreciated by the large gatherings present, and I think will prove beneficial to the Order.

I visited all of them on their regular meeting nights, with one exception, that was North Williamsburg; to save expense I had to call a special meeting in nearly every case. They had candidates to initiate. South Finch is the only weak Lodge in the District, and if special efforts are put forth during the present year, its membership could be doubled, for it is located in a thriving village with a good country surrounding to back it up.

There is yet room for a few good Lodges in this District, but it takes considerable time to work them up, with the keen competition of similar organizations. I have made a start on two more and hope to see them organized soon.

Morrisburg Lodge still leads the District in point of members, but Cornwall is working hard for first place, which they may yet reach, for they are taking a deeper interest in the work.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the brethren of the District for the honor done me in electing me as their D. D. and for the kindness shown by the officers and members when visiting the Lodges.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE ORDER.

T. L. L. Lewis, chairman of the Committee on the State of the Order, presented the following report, which was adopted :

Your Committee beg to report that after conferring with the D. D. G. M. W. of the several districts thus affected by this proposed redistribution, we beg to recommend the following :

1. That the Counties of Ottawa and Pontiac be transferred from the Quebec to the Ottawa district, which will make Quebec district fourteen and Ottawa ten lodges.
2. That Arthur, Mount Forest and Grand Valley lodges be transferred from the Guelph to Dufferin district, making Guelph district twenty lodges.
3. That Bay View, Tara, Port Elgin and Saugeen lodges be transferred from Huron to Dufferin district, making Dufferin district nineteen lodges.
4. That St. Mary's and Baxter lodges be transferred from Huron to London district, making London district sixteen lodges.
5. That Rosemont and Mansfield lodges be transferred from Dufferin to Simcoe district, making Simcoe district twenty-one lodges.
6. That Orillia, Coldwater, Wabashene, Midland and Penetanguishene lodges be transferred from Simcoe district to Georgian Bay district, making Georgian Bay district eighteen lodges.

Your Committee recommend that the County of Prescott be attached to the Ottawa district.

In reference to the memorial from Manitoba and the North-West Territories, asking the privilege of appointing a D. D. G. M. W. for that territory, your Committee recommend that the privilege be granted to them upon the condition that if he attends the meeting of Grand Lodge the lodges of said District pay his mileage and per diem.

The Grand Lodge was called to order pursuant to adjournment, by the Grand Master Workman, John Milne.

Rev. G. G. McRobbie offered prayer.

DOCUMENT NO. II.

Past Grand Master Workman Dawson, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, presented the report of his Committee, which was taken up seriatim and adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE OF FINANCE.

To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, A. O. U. W., of Ontario.

Your Finance Committee are again permitted to meet this Grand Lodge and to congratulate the A. O. U. W. on a year of brilliant success as a Benevolent Beneficiary Order. While 1891 has been the most trying year experienced by all classes of insurance and beneficial societies, the Ancient Order of United Workmen stands in the front rank, and is the peer of all societies. The amount of good it has accomplished cannot be estimated in

this world. Thousands of widows and orphan children have cause for thankfulness that John Jordan Upchurch was inspired to start this Order, and the success it attained was the glory of his declining years. Our increase has been marvellous. With a membership of 25,000 in Canada, we have been enabled to pay out to our beneficiaries the immense sum of \$302,000. To accomplish this required only \$13.00 from each member.

1. Your Committee met regularly the first week in each month, going carefully through the receipts and disbursements of the Grand Recorder's Office. The expenses of the office have not increased in proportion to the volume of business transacted. Our gross receipts were nearly \$18,000 in excess of the previous year, while our expense account was only greater by \$500.13.

2. We regret that there is so much difficulty in getting the returns in promptly from Subordinate Lodges. From two to six Lodges are suspended monthly, affecting a very large number of members, sometimes as high as six hundred. No Lodge should fail to remit before the 28th of each month. As it is a rule that the books be closed on the last day of the month it is of the utmost importance that the delegates present should impress this fact upon their Lodge officers.

3. The following table shows the receipts, expenditures and balances during each month of the year on account of Beneficiary Fund :

4. We collected during the year \$302,768 on Beneficiary account. For this purpose we made thirteen assessments. We paid 151 death claims, amounting to \$302,000, leaving a balance of \$783.00 in our Beneficiary Fund. The largest amount expended in one month was in December, 1891, which amounted to \$54,700.

5. We had eight more deaths in 1891 than in 1890, which is a low death record for so large a membership. We have been very guarded in settling claims, and where there was the least doubt on the ground of legality we invariably referred them to our Grand Lodge Solicitor, and are pleased to report no litigation or disputed claims. His written instructions were carefully given, and the utmost despatch always observed.

The following claims were referred :

Daniel Kinnee, Sherwood Lodge, No. 274, Maple, who died on the 2nd June, 1891. Beneficiary payable to his wife and children. The wife having

died, a will was made directing payment to John Stephenson Kinnee, his son, with instructions to pay debts due by him (Daniel Kinnee). Claim paid in August.

George M. Ross, Preston Lodge, No. 92, Preston, who died on the 31st day of July, 1891. Beneficiary made payable to his children. Referred with reference to payment to son-in-law. Claim paid in October.

Aaron Friendly, of Capital Lodge, No. 50, Toronto, who died in Milwaukee on the 15th day of April, 1891, of poison, aged 53 years. Beneficiary made payable to his wife, Rosa Friendly. Some doubts having arisen in connection with the proofs of claim, payment was delayed until these were made satisfactory. Since paid.

Thos. Mearns, of Walkerville Lodge, No. 33, Walkerville, who died on the 17th day of August, 1891, of hemorrhage of the bowels, aged 48 years. Beneficiary made payable to his legal heirs. No will. Referred to solicitor as to claim of wife, whether she is an heir.

John F. H. Gunn, Walkerton Lodge, No. 196, Walkerton, who died on the 17th day of August, 1891, of acute alcoholism, aged 42 years. Beneficiary made payable originally to his wife, Mary Ann Gunn. He changed his direction and took out a new certificate making Beneficiary payable to his legal heirs. Paid in December to his wife as originally directed.

Chas. S. Iler, Kingsville Lodge, No. 30, Kingsville, who died on the 13th September, 1891, of chronic bronchitis, aged 56 years. Beneficiary made payable to his wife, Esther Iler. It appeared that Brother Iler was 50 years of age on the 23rd November, 1884, and received his Workman Degree on the 1st of December, 1884, some six or seven days afterwards, so that he became a Beneficiary in violation of our established law, but clearly under a misapprehension of the facts in the case. Claim paid in January, 1892.

Quite a large proportion of the deaths during the year were men well advanced in life, one-third of the whole number being over the age of fifty years. The previous year seventeen died under the age of thirty, while this year we have only nine.

In reviewing the death record we find that 34 deaths, or over one-fifth of the whole number, were caused from pneumonia, consumption and lung troubles, many of them following la grippe. Only eight were from accident, against nineteen the previous year. The epidemic of la grippe is again a very serious factor in deaths all over the country at the present time, especially among old people.

We are now carrying over \$50,000,000 in beneficiaries, which increased the last year by about \$6,000,000. The twelve Canadian Companies only increased their business in 1890 unitedly to the amount of \$758,846. The British and American Companies doing business in Canada decreased \$1,136,527. The thirty Companies combined doing a Life business in Canada show a decrease in the amount of policies new and taken up of \$377,681. That shows a falling off in one year of within a fraction of \$3,000,000, and 1891 will exhibit a worse record. Thirteen Canadian Companies paid in the aggregate for 1890, claims, including matured endowments, \$176,562, or an average of \$90,506. Fourteen British Companies combined paid in Canada \$650,196, or

an average of \$46,442.50, and fifteen American Companies \$1,282,527, or an average of \$85,502. The Ancient Order of United Workmen paid in 1891 to their Widows and Orphans \$302,000.

7. Twenty-three new Lodges have been added to our roll during the past year: 11 in the Province of Ontario; 5 in Quebec; and 7 in Manitoba and Northwest Territories.

Our membership has made a net increase of 2,336 and our total membership is 24,743. The average number of members to each Lodge is 65, an increase of three to each Lodge during the year.

9. We have had a prosperous year both numerically and financially, although the balance in the General Fund is not as large by \$1,000 as it was in 1890. Our expenses this year have been a trifle over \$2,000 more than last year. This Grand Lodge, having decided to meet in Ottawa, the expenditure for mileage and per diem will be nearly double what it was last year.

15. The Canadian Life Companies paid out in Canada to policy-holders in 1890, \$2,081,236.02, and paid in general expenses \$1,006,697.66. The British Companies paid to their policy holders \$694,009.57, and in general expenses, \$196,342.18. The American Companies paid to their policy-holders, \$1,670,422.03, and in general expenses, \$551,504.03. In the aggregate, 41 Life Companies doing business in Canada paid out to their policy-holders \$4,445,667.62, and paid in general expenses, \$1,754,543.87. Thirty of those Companies had an excess of income over expenditure of \$3,386,153.24, while eleven companies showed the reverse, amounting to \$221,152.43. The government returns show that it cost them nearly one dollar to pay out every two dollars to the policy-holders. They collected over \$3,000,000.00 in one year from the pockets of the policy-holders more than was required.

The A. O. U. W. in Canada paid out \$302,000, and it cost \$26,000 for expenses, so that our Beneficiaries have the advantage of receiving the cheapest protection in the way of insurance in existence.

16. In examining statistics published by the Spectator Company, of New York, embracing sworn reports of the officials of the various Life Insurance Companies transacting business in the United States, covering a period of ten years, beginning with 1881 and ending with 1890, inclusive, we find the following results: In 1881, the 26 old line companies had in force \$1,492,637,000 of insurance, with a total income of \$77,066,960. The actual cost of insurance for that year was therefore \$51.63 per thousand. The same year dividends were returned to the policy-holders of these companies, amounting to \$12,332,317, thus showing that \$8.26 in dividends per thousand of insurance in force, was actually returned to the policy holder. It is therefore but just that \$8.26 per thousand be deducted from the gross cost above named, \$51.63 which leaves the absolute net cost of insurance per thousand \$43.37. We will now ascertain the results for the year 1890, the 10th year thereafter. The total insurance was \$3,432,602,400, with an income of \$182,976,326, or a gross cost per thousand of \$56.22. The dividends aggregate \$14,119,847, or \$4.11 per thousand, which being deducted from the gross cost \$56.22, would leave the net cost \$52.11 per thousand of insurance in force for 1890. Thus it appears that while the net cost per thousand of insurance in force in these old line companies was but \$43.37 in 1881, it actually increased, until in 1880 it was \$52.11, an increase cost of \$8.74 per thousand in ten years. In 1881 these companies declared dividends of 16 per cent., as compared with their income; in 1890 this percentage had dwindled to less than 7 $\frac{3}{4}$, thus showing a decrease in dividends returned to the members of more than 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. For the purpose of comparison we place before you a few statistics from our own experience:

In 1881, with \$9,674,000 of insurance in force, we had a gross income of \$60,022.39. The cost per thousand in that year was \$6.50. In 1890, with \$44,808,000 insurance in force we had an income of \$318,538.28, and the cost to the members carrying this insurance sum was only \$7.00 per thousand. Our actual increase in cost, therefore, during the past ten years, has been in this Order only 50cts. per thousand, while during the same period the cost per thousand in the 26 old line companies aggregated \$8.74. The additional burdens on these companies was not caused by the increased mortality, for their statistics proved that their mortality had decreased 15 per cent. in the period named. But when we turn to the expense account a very different state of affairs exist. In 1881 their expenses were \$7.30 per thousand, and in 1890 \$9.80, or an increase of 30 per cent. for conducting the business alone. The above facts come from unquestioned authority and prove conclusively that the A. O. U. W. is to-day a blessing. Every man of 21 years of age should show his good judgment by becoming a member.

17. In conclusion, we desire to congratulate this Grand Lodge on the splendid record shown as a fraternal beneficiary Order, and to express the hope that wisdom and harmony may prevail our deliberations. As a United Order we stand at the head of all benevolent protective associations in existence, and let us therefore continue in the same course. Our membership in Canada has increased in twelve years from 1,150 to 25,000. Our average death rate per thousand has not increased with our age, and our cost of management per member has steadily decreased.

Your Committee on Laws to whom was referred clauses 7, 9, 14, 15 and 24 of Grand Master's Report, beg to submit the following :

With reference to clause 7 on pages 9 and 10, which contains the official decisions of the Grand Master, your Committee recommend that they be approved. In decision "D" there is a clerical error, the year given as 1888 should be given as 1880.

As to clauses 9, 14 and 24 with the exception of sub-section C of clause 15, your committee recommend their adoption and congratulate the Order on the manner in which the various matters have been settled.

Clause 14, paragraph B, was, on motion referred back to Committee on Laws to confer with the representatives of Maple Leaf Lodge.

With reference to sub-section C of clause 15, your Committee have not the necessary information to enable them to report at present but will bring in a further Supplementary Report thereon.

DOCUMENT No. 16.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

T. L. L. Lewis, Chairman of the Committee on State of the Order presented the following report, which was adopted:

Your Committee on State of the Order beg respectfully to report on the several matters in the order of reference as follows:

1. The Committee approve of the action of the Grand Master Workman in the appointments made during the year, and congratulate the Order at large on the success attending the labors of the several officers so appointed.

2. Your Committee consider the increase in Lodges during the year satisfactory and the average number of members (22) at institutions sufficiently large, but your Committee beg to note that in two cases Lodges were organized with only 10 members each. The Grand Lodge from time to time has expressed an opinion in this matter and advised that not less than 15 members shall be the minimum number. It is but fair to state that the Lodges referred to have been organized in conformity with the constitution. We recommend that hereafter no lodge be organized with a number less than 15 approved charter members, and that this clause shall stand for notice of motion at next Grand Lodge.

3. Your Committee consider that, taking into account the depression in financial circles and the large number of competitive societies, the progress made in the growth of membership is most satisfactory; at the same time the Committee join in suggesting, as other committees have done, that the energies of the associations should be principally directed in building up and making strong the lodges already in existence rather than creating new lodges.

4. We are pleased to note the statistical tables. They are very instructive and should be very carefully considered by our members. Where the increase has not been large we would urge more activity and at the same time commend those who have done so well.

5. Your Committee heartily endorse the action of the Grand Master Workman in issuing the several circulars and particularly refer to number 2 thereof. We recommend services such as referred to in number 2 shall be conducted whenever a suitable opportunity presents itself.

6. This matter will be referred to under head of Grand Recorder's report.

7. Your Committee note with pleasure that the Grand Master Workman has given so much time to the work of visiting, and we are sure the Order at large has been greatly benefited by his visits. Such work must in the near future bear great and beneficial results. We very cheerfully recommend the payment of \$127.50, being amount of expenses incurred.

8. We report approval of action of Grand Master Workmen in calling Advisory Board *re* British Columbia. The decision of Committee in reference thereto, has been referred to another committee.

9. Your Committee approve of remarks *re* Manitoba, and recommend that the matter be referred to the Executive, to arrange for such a system as shall be deemed best for the extension of the Order there, and would suggest that the fee and necessary supplies be given to such person as may be selected.

10. We hereby concur in the enactment of the amendment of the constitution, passed by the Supreme Lodge, and recommend that such change be approved of and promulgated by this Grand Lodge. This clause stands as a notice of motion for next Grand Lodge.

11. We endorse with pleasure the sentiments expressed by the Grand Master Workman in his report and would here repeat his last sentences as follows:—"I trust the representatives will exercise the greatest care in their choice of Deputies; they should choose the best man in their several districts."

The Committee have had under consideration all of the reports which have been sent in to the Grand Recorder by the D. D. G. M. W., numbering only sixteen; seven of the Deputies so far have not as yet sent in their reports.

In the opinion of your Committee it is not necessary to enlarge to any very great extent upon the contents of these reports, but to state shortly and generally that as to the whole of them, the D. D. G. M. W. have performed their duties with eminent satisfaction, nearly the whole of them, unless prevented by unavoidable circumstances, visited the various Lodges within their districts, the report of each of them has set forth fully the visits which they have made as well as the inspection of the books of the financial officers, and also the attendance and non-attendance of the members at the various meetings, and the performance of the duties of the several officers.

Your Committee, however, regret to be obliged to report that in some few cases there are Lodges which have wilfully violated the Constitution and Laws of the Order, notably in not holding Lodge meetings in some cases for months, and in one case particularly for two years. In these cases we observe that the membership has not increased in the slightest; such Lodges and their membership are nothing more or less than barnacles upon the ship; they are in the Order solely and purely for insurance. This of course is in direct violation of their obligation. We therefore strongly recommend that the G. M. W. should resort to vigorous action in remedying such an evil, and that he should in such cases call upon Lodges of that character to report to him semi-monthly when meetings are held thus, or monthly when they are held monthly, that they are holding their meetings in accordance with the Constitution. In the event of their not so doing or not observing the Laws of the Order, then the G. M. W. should call upon them to show why the charter of their Lodge should not be surrendered and their beneficiary certificates cancelled, and in default of showing sufficient cause that the G. M. W. shall put the Lodge upon trial under the penal clauses of our law and if found guilty of the offence that the charter be cancelled and the members expelled from the Order.

12. Your Committee in closing its report, *re* Grand Master's report, beg to place on record its high appreciation of the faithful work done during the past two years, and bear cheerful testimony to the marked ability, the untiring zeal and energy, and ceaseless activity of our Brother Milne in prosecuting the work assigned to him by this Grand Lodge.

Re Grand Recorder's report.

Your Committee join in the congratulations of the Grand Recorder in the fact of the year's business being most satisfactory and prosperous, and that all claims have been met with thirteen assessments.

The matter of bonds having been submitted and referred to Committee on Laws, your Committee deem it unnecessary to refer to it further

The matter of "our growth" has already been referred to in this report.

Re Beneficiary Fund.

Your Committee recommend that this matter be referred to Committee on Laws for their action therein. We deem it of sufficient importance to give this subject the most careful consideration.

Your Committee desires to express their appreciation of the statistical tables presented in his report and also to place on record their sense of the satisfactory manner in which he has performed his difficult and onerous duties.

We recommend that all financial matters contained in the reports of Grand Recorder and Grand Receiver be submitted to the Finance Committee.

Each of the recipients thanked the Grand Master Workman on behalf of their Lodges.

J. Earl Halliwell, D. D. G. M. W. of Quinte District, also presented Thurlow Lodge, No. 313, and Moira Lodge, No. 317, a set of similar jewels for the splendid efforts made by these Lodges to increase their membership in the same time. The former Lodge had increased thirteen members and the latter seventeen members. Both Lodges were in a very weak state, and by the extra efforts put forth have become vigorous and healthy. REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

To the Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Ancient Order of United Workmen of the Province of Ontario :

BROTHERS,—Your Special Committee, to whom were referred clauses 11 and 19 of the Grand Master's Report, beg respectfully to report:—First, as to clause 11. Your Committee call to remembrance that nearly all Grand Masters have made similar recommendations in this matter and we are of opinion that such an officer is essentially necessary to the welfare, growth and extension of our Order, especially as at present there is very strong competition arising from the energy of sister societies who have found it necessary and have put in practice a system of work such as is recommended. Second—That, as to clause 19, inasmuch as there appears on the paper of proposed amendments a notice of motion by a member of one of our subordinate Lodges, specially instructed to deal with the question, this Committee is of the opinion that it would be lacking in courtesy if it should attempt to usurp or encroach upon the privilege of any member giving notice of an intention to deal with a matter on the subject of which he had no doubt made himself thoroughly familiar, and therefore we must courteously surrender to our Brother who gave such notice of motion all the honor and credit to which he would be fairly entitled, and this Committee would respectfully ask to be released from making further report on said clause 19.

"That section 3 of the constitution be amended by striking out the word 'fifty' in the third line and inserting the words 'forty five.' Any other sections of the constitution referring to the same matter to be amended so as to conform thereto."

Representative J. B. Donaldson, of Riverside Lodge, No. 326, presented the following amendment to the Constitution :

Add to section 3, Constitution for Subordinate Lodges, "Provided that no Lodge in this Jurisdiction shall have a greater proportion than five per cent. of its membership engaged in mining operations."

Representative M. W. Williams, Cobourg Lodge, No. 121, presented the following notice of motion :

That this Grand Lodge endeavor to make such arrangements with the fraternal press of Ontario as will enable them to furnish a copy monthly of such journal as they decide upon to every member of the order in this jurisdiction in lieu of the monthly assessment notices now used.

Notice of motion by Rep. O. W. G. Dettmers, seconded by Rep. John Hyde :

Whereas it is in the interest of the order that the work should be prosecuted with vigor in the Province of Quebec. And in order to carry this out properly it is necessary that constitutions should be printed in the French language. Therefore be it resolved that 5,000 copies of the Constitution be printed in French.

REPORT OF INCIDENTAL COMMITTEE.

W. P. Cole, Chairman of the Incidental Committee, presented the following report, which was adopted :

BRETHREN,—Your Incidental Committee beg to report on clause 13, page 11, Grand Master Workman's Report, as follows :

Your Committee have carefully examined clause 13 and find that 422 members belong to the five lodges mentioned therein, as per statement of Newton Clark, Grand Recorder, Portland, Oregon, dated October 29th, 1891.

In view of the fact that there is no doubt the membership will increase in said above-mentioned section, and also a steady increase of membership in Manitoba, therefore your Committee would not recommend any action to be now taken to annex said Lodges, but would recommend that special efforts be

made to increase the membership in Manitoba and the Northwest, so that at an early date Manitoba, the Northwest and the Brethren of British Columbia could be brought together as a Grand Jurisdiction.

The Grand Lodge of Ontario, believing that the interest of the Order in Manitoba will be subserved by the formation of a Grand Lodge, do hereby give its consent to the organization of a Grand Lodge, composed of the Lodges in Manitoba, or with their consent in conjunction with the Lodges in British Columbia, whenever ten or more Lodges in Manitoba may petition the Supreme Lodge, or Supreme Master Workman, for the organization of such a Grand Lodge.

Your Committee consider it advisable and would recommend that a special organizer be appointed by Grand Lodge to work up the Order in Manitoba and Northwest Territories.

Your Committee has carefully considered the appeal of Maple Leaf Lodge, No. 27 (which is practically an appeal from the Grand Master Workman's decision; see his report, sub-section B, page 13), and having heard all the parties, are of the opinion that the decision of the Grand Master Workman should be confirmed.

2. That with reference to the case of Archibald Taylor, referred to in sub-section C, of clause 14 of the Grand Master Workman's report, page 13, and the case of Edward Welch, of Blyth Lodge, referred to at the bottom of the Executive Committee's Report, your committee are unable to make any recommendation, as the evidence is not sufficient and would suggest that the Committee on Laws be authorized to receive evidence during the interim and report to the Grand Master Workman, and that the Grand Master Workman have power on such report to reinstate or reject the said Taylor and Welch. Further, that the report of the Executive Committee re Welch be withdrawn.

3. With reference to the case of J. D. Hentig, from the documents placed before us, your committee cannot recommend that any action be taken by this Grand Lodge, as Mr. Hentig was legally suspended.

4. With reference to the case of Richard Massen, as all the requirements of the Constitution, except balloting (which, through the Lodge not having had a quorum, did not take place until after the six months had elapsed), were complied with, your committee recommend that he be reinstated.

Your Committee to whom was referred the Grand Medical Examiner's Report, beg to report as follows:

1. It gives us pleasure to note that despite the ravages of la grippe, typhoid fever, and the largely increased membership, the death rate in this jurisdiction is, as last year, the lowest of any jurisdiction in the Order, with one exception.

2. We note the remarkable increase of deaths from general debility, paralysis and apoplexy, and would suggest that special care be taken by the local Medical Examiners in examining candidates who are likely to be subjects of such diseases.

3. We would recommend that the cause of death, printed on the Assessment Cards, be in plain terms, so that the general public may understand the cause of death.

4. As an evidence of the carefulness of the local examiners, it is satisfactory to note that the candidates rejected by the Grand Medical Examiner are yearly growing less.

5. The concise and interesting reports of the Grand Medical Examiner, from year to year, are evidences of his care and interest in the Order, and his fitness for the very responsible position which he holds.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LAWS.

D. F. MacWatt, Chairman of Committee on Laws, presented the following report upon questions submitted, which was adopted :

1. Q.—Can a Subordinate Lodge of the A. O. U. W. remove from the office of Medical Examiner one who has been an Examiner for a number of years, who has been and is now a member in good standing in said Lodge, and resides near their place of meeting, and elect in his place a member of another Lodge, who resides seven miles away ?
A.—No, but they can elect more than one Medical Examiner.
2. Q.—Should the District Deputy Grand Master Workman, in visiting Subordinate Lodges, examine the books of the Lodge ?
A.—Yes. See sub-section 3, section 31, page 18, Grand Lodge Constitution.
3. Q.—Is it within the jurisdiction of the G. M. W. when any or all of the lesser penalties, viz., reprimand, removal from office, and disqualification to hold office, has been imposed by a Subordinate Lodge upon a brother found guilty after a legal trial of violating his obligation, to make the penalty imposed by the Lodge lighter, even if the penalty imposed by the Lodge may be severe ?
A.—Yes.
4. Q.—*Re* section 22, sub-section 10, page 51, Constitution, when M. W. votes at election of officers and vote is tie, how is election decided ?
A.—See decision 44, page 857, Proceedings 1890.
5. Q.—Can the officers elect of a Subordinate Lodge resign on the night of installation, not having given any previous notice to that effect ?
A.—Yes.

6. Q.—When a Subordinate Lodge reports a member suspended, say, for two months, and the suspended member afterwards pays up and the Subordinate Lodge receives him again, and reports the same to the Grand Recorder, what assurance has he that his Beneficiary Certificate is valid and that he is in good standing with the Grand Lodge? Should the Grand Recorder notify the Subordinate Lodge of his reinstatement?

A.—The receipt of the Financier will be sufficient to show his good standing?

7. Q.—If a brother is suspended for non-payment of assessment, and reported to the Grand Recorder, can he pay at any time within the following month and be reinstated previous to the monthly report being sent to the Grand Recorder, or, in case of payment, is the Recorder obliged to send a special report to the Grand Recorder, or is the Grand Recorder obliged to accept such a report?

A.—This is clearly explained in section 34, pages 90 and 91 of the Constitution. No special report should be made, merely include in next monthly report.
