TO THE PUBLIC.

THE favourable manner in which the SAINT JOHN ALMANAC, and NEW-BRUNSWICK FARMER'S CALENDAR for 1830, was received, has encouraged the Publisher to make this second attempt; towards which, he now respectfully solicits the patronage of the Public.

As it is probable that this second number of the Almanac, will be in the hands of some persons who have not seen the first, it may be proper again to say—“The Astronomical Tables are calculated to apparent time. The Table of the Sun's Declination, extended to seconds, being computed for the Meridian of Saint John, which according to late observations, is in Lat. 45, 15, N. Long. 66, 6, 19, W., will be found more correct than the Declination inserted in Books of Navigation generally; and will answer, with little or no correction for the neighbouring Coasts, and to the West Indies, there being no great difference in the Meridians. To such Masters of Coasting Vessels, as are in the habit of using the Sun's Declination as given in Epitomes for Noon at Greenwich without any correction whatever, this Table will be particularly convenient and useful.”

A correct knowledge of the Tides is of great importance, to all persons who do business upon the water, and it is thought that the Tide Table here given, will be found to approach nearer to the true time of High Water, than any Table hitherto published in these parts.

THE Table of the Latitudes and Longitudes of the most prominent places in the Bay of Fundy, on the shores of Nova-Scotia, the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, Newfoundland, and Bermuda, as determined by a late survey, will also have its use.

THE Interest Table, the Table for exchange of Currency with the West India Islands, and the Table for measuring of Saw-Logs, will be found convenient to the Merchant, the Supercargo, and the Lumberer.

THE prosperity of New-Brunswick, however, as of every other country, can only become permanent in proportion to the developement and improvement made of its Agricultural resources. The suggestions submitted on that important subject, are intended to be adapted to our climate, and are in part at least founded upon some practical knowledge of that branch of our industry.

THE paramount importance of true religion, the education of all classes of the rising generation, the advancement of temperance, and a judicious system of practical economy of means and of time, have been glanced at, and are also subjects that claim serious and unremitting attention.

FEBRUARY.

A marked attention to the comfort of his cattle, is an essential trait in the character of a thrifty husbandman. In severe weather cattle should be furnished with a clean and warm stable, and plentifully supplied with food, but not so as to waste any. A few turnips or potatoes, each day, in addition to their hay, will always be in season. Have a convenient watering place, and give particular attention to the watering, daily, of calves, and young and weaker cattle. Many calves are lost or much injured in their growth from want of care in these particulars. Thrifty Steers, rising two years old, if provided with a light yoke, and a light sled, and carefully handled, may be easily inured to the yoke, and to the draught, and without any injury to their growth, may bring home firewood sufficient for the use of an ordinary family; but they should never be loaded to the full extent of their strength. Oxen are found to be more profitable upon a farm than many horses. Feed sheep in the open air, and furnish them with a shed under which to retire in stormy weather.

One of the great objects of education in that children, as is expressed in the Church Catechism, should learn and labour truly to get their own living, and to do their duty in that state of life, unto which it shall please God to call them.

MARCH.

VARIOUS signs of returning spring now appear; the days are sensibly lengthened, the snow and ice gradually melt away;—prepare to enter vigorously upon the business of the spring. If any remnant of grain remains to be threshed and cleaned, or flax to be dressed, dispatch it without delay.

Finish sledding, whether of wood, hay, or fencing stuff, as early in the month as possible. Travelling on the ice now becomes dangerous. Ploughs, harrows, carts, chains, and all the etcetra of farming utensils, should be put in the most perfect order, and seeds of all kinds intended for the field, if not on hand should be procured. The spring of last year, (1830) was remarkably early; in March, wheat was sowed in various parts of Nova Scotia, and of this Province. The grain thus early sowed grew and ripened well. The earlier wheat and oats are sowed, the better and more certain the crop; therefore be prepared, to sow your seed, as soon as the earth is sufficiently dry for the plough and harrow; by so doing you will have a longer seed time, which is a most important consideration.

Particular attention should be given to cattle, to prevent their falling off, or becoming weak; a little care now, will prevent much trouble and perhaps loss, hereafter. An occasional mess of potatoes or turnips, given to cows or sheep, through the winter will be good, but a daily mess will be better. Give working cattle corn on the ear. Once a month give a portion of salt to all.

APRIL.

A good garden is a necessary appendage to a farm. Earth of a consistence that will hold water longest without becoming hard when dry, is that of all others the best adapted for raising the generality of plants in the greatest perfection.

The great art of improving sandy or clayey soils, is to give to the former such dressings of clay, cow-dung, and other kinds of manure, as will have a tendency to bind and make it more compact, and consequently more retentive of moisture, and to the latter, coats of sandy earth pond mud, horse dung, &c.

Sow the hardy kinds of seeds, as soil site, and season will permit, that the plants may be firmly established before they are overtaken by the heat or drought of summer.

Plant some early-blue potatoes, in a spot of good ground near to the house or in the garden if more convenient. Do not allow cattle of any description, your own, or others, to go upon your meadow in the spring. Commence carting out manure.

Calves and pigs that come about this time will be in good season; but should the weather be occasionally cold, they will require a greater degree of attention and care.

MAY.

EARLY potatoes and oats, will sometimes answer to be planted and sown in April, but the principal part of the planting and sowing in the garden and in the field should be done in this month. Soak Indian Corn in copper water, and plant about the 20th, let the soil be well pulverized, and whether in hills or drills plenty of manure be applied. If the culture be good and the season favorable from 50 to 80 bushels may be raised upon an Acre.

The partial failure of corn last year should not discourage the farmer; but in order to insure a favorable issue, he should not depend so much upon any one article, as to be embarrassed if it partially or even totally fail. In proportion to the extent of his cultivation, and the quality and state of his soil, a proportional quantity of each of the different grains, which are suitable to the climate should be carefully committed to the faithful bosom of the earth; and if one kind fail, another will succeed. Potatoes always do well a farmer can hardly have too many of these excellent "apples of the earth." In order however to raise plenty, he must plant in proportion, and take proper care of them after they are planted. Great care should be taken in the selection, all seeds whether for the garden or the field; and some kinds of potatoes are vastly superior to others. Let him be sure to plant of the best kinds. The middle of May is the proper season for the dropping of lambs, and except a few intended for market, they should not come earlier.

JUNE.

POTATOES, are the main-stay of the New-Brunswick farmer. When good, they are but a very little inferior to bread for the table, and they make good pork, good beef, and plenty of milk and butter, &c. Therefore re-consider the matter, and think whether or not you have planted a sufficient quantity of seed, to warrant the expectation of a plentiful crop. Potatoes may be planted to the 20th of June, and they have matured when planted even later than that.

Lands that will answer for mowing, should not be pastured, if it can be avoided; and pastures should have a good start before cattle are turned upon them. Plant out cabbages, cauliflowers, &c. &c. in moist or cloudy weather, but not when the ground is wet and heavy. Cut and dry such herbs as have come to maturity for winter use. Look over grafted trees that you may ascertain whether the scion has united with the stock. Take off the clay, and loosen the bandages of such grafts as have succeeded; and rub off all superfluous, irregular, or ill placed shoots or suckers. The hoe, is a most useful instrument; a diligent and careful use of it will destroy weeds, keep the soil lively and will be richly repaid by a proportionate increase in the crop of corn and potatoes.

JULY.

Our western neighbours, recommend after corn has been hoed the first time to place about each hill a handful of ashes, or gypsum; or, that a mixture of both will be more fertilizing than either. Let some of our farmers make an experiment of this, and report the effect. If it be beneficial let the country know it. Hoeing is an operation of great importance, and should be done frequently and thoroughly. "Stirring the soil in dry weather, renders it more open and porous, so that it shall greedily drink in the nightly dews, and that rain may not run off, but readily soak in as it falls, and be retained."

Sow Turnips about the middle of July. "The time should be chosen, when the ground has the right degree of moisture to make the seed vegetate; and if this should happen a week earlier, or a fortnight later than the usual time, it need not be regretted; but the opportunity ought to be embraced."—*Abercrombie*

Hay cut in August will shrink less, and spend better than if cut in July. Nevertheless, if the quantity to be cut is large in proportion to the number of hands to be employed, a beginning may be made. Now is the time to carry the principles of the TEMPERANCE SOCIETIES into effect. Last year, several gentlemen in the vicinity of this City, cut and cured large quantities of hay, without giving any abundant Spirits to their workmen. And may, and so ought every farmer in the Country to do. Employ no man who drinks spirituous liquor.

AUGUST.

MORE labour can be accomplished in a month, or a year, under the influence of simple nourishing food and unstimulating drink, than through the aid of ardent spirits. The experiment has been made with much success, over and over again. Set this down therefore as a matter of fact, and govern yourself and your men accordingly.

Molasses and water, and some add a little ginger, or milk and water, is a cooling and comfortable beverage. Hay when salted in the mow, requires less drying, and is much more valuable; from 4 to 8 quarts to a ton is recommended. Clover hay, should not be stirred any more than is absolutely necessary; and if laid in the mow with alternate layers of straw, the mixture will be very acceptable to horses and neat cattle. The benefit of having paid proper attention to the garden will now begin to appear; but physicians caution against the use of cucumbers and unripe fruit. Dung-hills and Compost-heaps should, during the summer months, be kept free from weeds; for if the seeds are permitted to ripen and fall, the manure when carried to the garden or field, will disseminate seeds innumerable. Attend to plants set out for seed, and put stakes to such as need support. If thistles have not been mowed down in July, let it be done without fail, early in this month.

SEPTEMBER.

WHEAT should be cut, while the joints of the straw are green, the grain will be heavier, and will make better bread. If put in stack, it should be placed near the end of a barn, and a door or window made to throw it in. But if there be plenty of room over the barn floor, it will be more convenient. Small sheaves are better than large ones, especially if there be weeds or grass growing among the grain. Let grain be housed as soon as it is sufficiently cured, one heavy rain upon grain will occasion much extra labour, and perhaps much loss.

The following directions, for the selection of seed corn, are worthy of attention. "When the first ears are ripe enough for seed, gather a sufficient quantity for early corn or re-planting, and at the time you would wish your corn to be ripe, generally, gather a sufficient quantity for planting the next year, having particular care to take it from stalks that are large at bottom, of a regular taper, not over tall, the ears set low, and containing the greatest number of good sizeable ears of the best quality; let it dry speedily, and from the corn gathered as last described, plant your main crop; and if any hills should be missing, plant from the ears first gathered, which will cause the corn to ripen more regularly than is common."

Winter wheat and winter rye, should be sown early in September. Brakes, potatoe tops, weeds, loam, &c. if deposited in your pig sty or cow yard, may be converted into good manure.

OCTOBER.

DIG and secure your potatoes before they are injured by the frost, and if you have different kinds, particularly observe, which is best for the table, and of these which is the most productive, and the best adapted to the soil you cultivate; and govern yourself accordingly in the ensuing spring. Early in the month, if not previously done, transplant all kinds of hardy perennial, aromatic, and medicinal herbs, which will thus become well rooted before winter. It is recommended, to sow the seeds of dill, skirret, rheubarb, and sea-kale; for if kept out of ground till spring, many of them will not vegetate till a year after, but when sown in October or November, if the seeds are fresh and perfect, they will vegetate in the April following. If the manure which horses and cattle drop in pastures, be collected and carried to the pile of dressing, it will amply repay the labour.

FOR FATTENING SWINE.—Wash potatoes clean, boil and mash them while hot, mix in at the same time oat or peas-meal. Put the mixture into a large tub, which must stand until it becomes sour but not putrid, keep a quantity of this always on hand fermenting, and give it to your hogs as often as they will eat. It is said that pork may be fattened in this way, and a saving made of one third of the food and time consumed in the usual mode. Give each hog a lump of charcoal or a piece of rotten wood daily.

NOVEMBER.

LEY grounds and stubborn soddy soils will be improved by fall ploughing. Deep ploughing for a few years will render farms more productive. Drain, plough, and warm low lands, and they will soon produce good crops of grass, if not of grain. Secure the manure of summer, and have your compost heap well covered, every particle of its contents will be of value hereafter.

A frost-proof cellar is of the first importance to a farmer, therefore have your cellar well banked, to prevent the frost from entering among your potatoes and other vegetables.

If your crop of potatoes be large, carefully bury a part of them in a dry spot of ground, they will in that manner keep quite as well, if not better, than in a cellar.

Feed out husks and corn stalks to your cattle, that they may be in good heart to enter upon the winter; when the cold becomes severe their appetites will be keen, and then your poorest hay and even straw will be very acceptable. Calves of the last spring should be kept warm and separate from the stronger cattle. If carefully attended to the first winter, there will be but little danger of their not doing well afterwards. Every farmer should so manage as to have one good new milch cow, to furnish his family with milk during the winter. Examine carefully what quantity of fodder you have on hand for the ensuing winter, and if it be not sufficient, reduce your stock.

DECEMBER.

By this time, it is to be presumed, that all your implements of husbandry are carefully deposited in places of safe keeping, a comfortable place and a sufficient quantity of food provided for all your cattle, and your accounts at least in progress of settlement. Now, if not before, zealously turn your attention to the education of your children, and to the cultivation of their minds. Let every child, male or female, of a proper age, be supplied with books and sent to school. That man who by any possible exertion can procure for his children the means of instruction, and yet neglects to do so, however kind he may be in other respects, is neither a good parent, nor a good member of society. In every thing else be as economical as you please, but in the education of your children be liberal. Furnish them with opportunity, and other necessary means of learning, and sustain and give them due encouragement in their progress; then may you reasonably expect that they will be dutiful and affectionate, and that they will grow up useful and respectable members of society. By so doing you will be justly entitled to the lasting gratitude of your children, and you will also "deserve well of your country." Every house should have a small well chosen library of books, at the head of which should always stand the Holy Bible. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, and to depart from evil is good understanding." "Let all your works be begun, continued, and ended in Him."



RULE.—Cast off one quarter of the Diameter of each Log, measured at the small end, the remainder will be the square of the Log; and then reckon as many boards as there are inches in one side of the square.

FOR EXAMPLE—A Log 12 inches in diameter at the small end, by cutting off one quarter as above mentioned, leaves 9 inches for the square of the log, it will therefore make nine boards, each nine inches wide: multiply one board by the length of the log, say 12 feet, and it will be found to contain 9 feet; this multiplied by nine, the number of boards in the log, will give the contents of the log in board measure, say eighty one feet; and so of any other. By this Rule is the foregoing Table constructed. The left hand column is the diameter of the Log, the length in feet is on the top of each column, and at the angle of meeting, you will find the contents.

The calculations are made for straight logs, therefore, where logs are crooked, a line should be stretched on the side having the greatest bend, and allowance made for the number of inches which a straight line will reduce them.—All logs should be measured within the bark.

To reduce the currency of New-Brunswick into Guilders and Stivers, if the sum be pounds, multiply by 12, and the product will be guilders; but if it be a mixed sum, reduce the whole into pence, and divide by 20, the quotient will be guilders and the remainder stivers.

To reduce Guilders and Stivers into the currency of New-Brunswick—Reduce the amount into Stivers by multiplying by 20, and divide by 12 for shillings, and again by 20 for pounds.

Religion equally concerns the old and the young; the rich and the poor; the learned and the illiterate; the farmer, the mechanic, the merchant, the mariner,—men and women in all the various avocations and circumstances of life—the prince and the peasant. Let Religion then be the first and principal concern of the people of New-Brunswick. “*Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you.*” “*Godliness is profitable unto all things, having promise of the life which now is, and of that which is to come.*”

Like the sun which shines in the firmament of heaven, diffusing joy and gladness over the face of nature, so religion offers its blessings and comforts to every man; and none are excluded from its benefits, but those who obstinately, and by wilful unbelief exclude themselves.



NEWS PAPERS.

In this Province, there are seven News Papers published:—four in this City, one at Fredericton, one at St. Andrews, and one at Miramichi. Besides the news and general intelligence they contain, the different taste and talent with which they are conducted, give to each, something of a distinctive character, so that those persons who reside at a distance from the respective places of publication, can exercise their own choice in selecting the paper which they think will be most useful in the family circle.

They who are situated near the place of publication, are in duty bound to support the paper published in their own section; and afterwards as many of the others as they may think proper. Mercantile men may find it for their interest to take them all.

Within a short time past, a material improvement has taken place in the New-Brunswick papers generally; and if, instead of taking foreign papers, at, in some instances, more than double the price, certain persons were to encourage and support the Press of the Province, still more important improvements might be made. Every true patriot, will first support the Press of his own country, after which he can extend his encouragement to distant places, as his judgment or inclination may dictate.

Charity begins at home, but need not end there.

Every householder, and especially every man who has a family should consider it a part of his duty, and indeed an act of economy, to take a good News Paper. The curiosity natural to children, and which is no doubt implanted for wise and good purposes, will impel them to read a News Paper with avidity; and if it do not contain any thing improper to meet their eye, that curiosity may safely be indulged. They will then without effort acquire some knowledge of men and things, and of the affairs of the world in which they are hereafter to act a part; they will also acquire a facility and a love of reading, which may be transferred to other works, and in this view a News Paper taken into a family, will be nearly if not quite of as much service to each child of a certain age, as a quarter's schooling in a year.

AGRICULTURE.

Thou first of arts, source of domestic ease,
Pride of the land, and patron of the seas,
Thrift Agriculture! lend thy potent aid;
Spread thy green fields where dreary forests shade;
Where savage men pursued their savage prey,
Let the white flocks in verdant pastures play;
From the bloom'd orchard and the showery vale
Give the rich fragrance to the gentle gale;
Reward with ample boon the laborer's hand,
And pour thy gladdening bounties o'er the land.
New-Brunswick's sons, spurn not the rugged toil;
Your nation's glory is a cultur'd soil.
Rome's Cincinnatus, of illustrious birth,
Increased his laurels whilst he till'd the earth;
E'ven China's Monarch lays his sceptre down,
Nor deems the task unworthy of the crown.

The labours of the field rank first in point of utility. To these all classes of human beings, from the king on the throne to the peasant in the cottage, are indebted for the necessities of life. They also lay the foundation for National independence and wealth. Nor is agricultural labour, properly considered, less honourable than it is necessary and useful. It is an employment highly favourable to health, to self enjoyment, and morals; it affords the greatest variety of scenes and occasions for religious contemplation, and for raising the eye of gratitude to him who "giveth rain from the heavens, and fruitful seasons." Divers of the parables and other divine lessons of our blessed Saviour, were taken from rural scenes, and the employment of husbandry. A garden he chose as his place of resort on divers occasions, and

particularly at the commencing agonies of his passion. The varying seasons, the growth of vegetables, sowing and reaping, and other labours of the field he improved for lessons of morality and religion.

This calling is the least dependent of any and the least exposed to total accidents, and affords on the whole, the greatest sum of contentment. Gilbert Burns, of Scotland, himself a labouring farmer, remarks, in a letter written in the year 1800, "I have always been of the opinion, that if a man bred to the habits of farming life, who possesses a farm of good soil on such terms as enable him to pay all demands, is not happy, he ought to look somewhere else than to his situation, for the cause of his uneasiness." This Mr. Burns, a man of superior cast of understanding, was a small farmer on *lease land*:—and if such a situation afforded contentment and happiness to one of the first rate sense, much more so might a moderate farm in our country, free from incumbrances, and belonging exclusively to the occupier. A farmer in those circumstances, did he truly estimate his own lot in life, would see a hundred reasons of gratitude, to one of complaint. A practical farmer whose livelihood depends upon his calling, should make it the pinnacle of his worldly ambition to excel in it. If he neglects his farm for almost any thing else, he is generally a loser both in interest and credit.



HINTS TO YOUNG FARMERS.

Never be above your calling; nor be afraid of the *frock* and the *apron*.

Put off no business till to-morrow, which ought, and can be done to-day.

As soon as the Spring opens, and the frost is out of the ground, put your fences in order.

Plant no more ground than you can well manure and cultivate to advantage.

Never hire a man to do a piece of work which you can do yourself.

Every day has its appropriate duties; attend to them in succession.

Keep no more stock than you can keep in order, and that of the best kind.

Never contract a debt without a reasonable probability of paying it at the time agreed.

Remember *economy* and *industry* are the two great pillars of the Farmer's prosperity.

Should you take any *periodical Journal*, pay for it in advance.

Never carry your notes in your pocket-book, as the desk or trunk is a more appropriate place. Keep them on file, and in order, ready to be found when wanted.

Keep a place for your tools, and your tools in their places. Instead of spending a rainy day at the dram-shop, as many do, to their ruin, repair whatever wants mending; post your books.

Drive your business, and do not permit your business to drive you.

Never trust your money in the hands of that man who will put his own to hazard.

When a debt becomes due, pay it at the time, whether your creditor wants it or not. Never ask him to "wait till next week," but pay it. Never insult him by saying, "you do not want it." Punctuality is a key to every man's chest.

By constant temperance, habitual, moderate exercise, and unaffected honesty, you will avoid the fees of the lawyer and the sheriff, gain a good report, and probably add at least ten years to your life.

HINTS TO MEN OF BUSINESS.

Superintend in person as much of your business as practicable, and observe with a watchful eye, the management of what is necessarily committed to the agency of others.

Never lose sight of the powerful influence of example, and be careful in the management of your concerns, to recommend by your own personal practice uniform habits of active, interested and persevering diligence to those in your employ.

Be prompt and explicit in your instructions to your agents, and let it be understood by them that you expect they will execute the same in strict conformity thereto.

Let no common amusements interfere or mingle with your business; make them entirely distinct employments.

Dispatch at once, if possible, whatever you may take in hand; if interrupted by unavoidable interference, resume and finish it as soon as the obstruction is removed.

Beware of self-indulgence, no business can possibly thrive under the shade of its influence.

Do not assume to yourself more credit for what you do, than you are entitled to, rather be content with a little less; the public mind will always discover where merit is due.

Familiarize yourself with your books, keep them accurately, and frequently investigate and adjust their contents. This is an important item.

Cultivate domestic habits, for this your family if you have one, has a strong and undeniable claim; besides, your customers, will always be best pleased when they find you at home, or at the place of business.

Never let hurry or confusion distract your mind or dispossess you of self-command.

Under the influence of such habits as these, with a suitable dependance on Providence for a blessing on the labor of your hands, you will have a good foundation to rest your hope upon, for success in whatever business you may be employed in.

AXIOMS IN AGRICULTURE.—BY DR. COOPER.

1. Two crops of grain should never succeed each other; they should be separated by potatoes, clover, grass, turnips, beets, or carrots, for fall feeding.

2. Good agriculture requires no naked fallows; fallow-crops [any hoed crops] that compel you to keep the ground clean while they are growing answer the purpose.

3. Manure once in four years.

MANNER OF FEEDING CATTLE IN SCOTLAND.

The following description of the manner of feeding Cattle in Scotland, is furnished by a person who has had considerable experience in the business:—

Store Cattle, during winter are principally fed on turnips, and Oats and Barley Straw. At day-light, at noon, and in the evening, a mess of turnips is given, after each of which feedings they are fed with straw also. Before the feeding at noon they are regularly watered.

In addition to the above, Cows giving milk, get two other messes, composed of hay, hay-chaff, barley and oat chaff, with turnips cut in pieces, the whole of which is boiled together, and they are generally watered twice a day.

Beef Cattle, are fed with turnips five times, and with straw, three times in each day. At night, in addition to a little straw, a sheaf of oats is laid before them. Their fore stalls are generally kept full. The moisture contained in the turnips is supposed to be sufficient, on which account they are not let out to water.

Horses, when taken from grass, get a half leppy, (half a peck,) of oats and the same quantity of potatoes twice a day. Their hake full of oat straw at all times, and they are watered twice a day. In the spring of the year when taken out to plough, they are fed with hay, and get oats and potatoes three times a day.

In the south of Scotland, oats, barley, wheat, peas, beans and rye, are all mixed together, and soaked in a tub or cask for the purpose, with which they are fed three times a day. Some persons boil the mixture, but it is generally thought to be better when only soaked, as the boiling is supposed to weaken the effect.
