Disaster In Malay Archipelago Early in June Just Reported.

VOLCANIC ERUPTION.

HALIFAX, July 24.—A Glace Bay despatch from the collieries and banks was 10,230 tons, the largest since the strike began and 73 tons better than the previous day. Of the above 5,442 tons were freshly mined, the balance being from the banks.

Yesterday's production from underground is just what obtained before the strike. All the shipping is being given quick clearance, the piers this morning being clear and the company arranging to charter back some of the steamers put into other business a week ago.

More men are at work today, including a number of strikers.

FULL TEXT OF HON. MR. FLEMMING'S LICENSE REPORT

Matter Fully Set Forth in Report to Government of His Work While in Campbellton—Reasons For Changes Cited.

LICENSES RECOMMENDED.

To the Honorable J. D. Hazen, Premier and the members of the Legislative Council, of the Province of New Brunswick.

Sir,—I have the honor to submit to you the evidence taken by me as commissioner appointed to add investigation into the operations of the Liquor License Act in the Town of Campbellton and to investigate the conduct of all or any of the officials charged with the enforcement of the said Act, under commission issued by the Lieutenant Governor on the 1st day of June, A. D. 1923.

Complying with instructions of said commission I proceeded to Campbellton and held an investigation on June 17th and 18th last. Mr. J. H. Taylor, Chairman of the Commission, Mr. S. J. Abington and Mr. F. C. Russell, Commissioners, Mr. W. P. Gray, the Lieutenant Governor's commissioner appointed to investigate the operations of the Liquor License Act in the Town of Campbellton, and to investigate the conduct of all or any of the officials charged with the enforcement of the said Act, under commission issued by the Lieutenant Governor on the 1st day of June, A. D. 1923.

MANY STRIKERS BACK TO WORK

Quantity of Coal Mined Keeps Increasing and Strike Likely to End Soon.

STRIRERS LEAVING.

VICTORIA B. C. July 24.—News was brought by the Norwegian steamer "Tronoy", which passed in passing from South Bay, B.C., of a disastrous earthquake on the coast of Sumatra, the second largest island in the Malay archipelago in mid-June. According to the report received by the "Tronoy", 200 lives were lost.

The earthquake followed on the heels of the volcanic eruption which has been reported to be an active volcano since the coast has been almost entirely covered by lava flows and large lakes.

Following the eruption of the volcano all the villages and towns were abandoned. The lava flows were so close to the coast that the people were obliged to leave their homes and seek refuge in the mountains.

RICH COAL MINES IN CANADIAN NORTH

Montreal and New York Capitalists Interested

EDMONTON, July 22.—A party of engineers and prominent financial men here yesterday to inspect the coal deposits controlled by the Pacific Coast Coal Company which is regarded as a grand trunk Pacific enterprise, and which has 25,000 acres of very rich prospects near the head of the waters of the McLeod and Penobscot rivers. The beds are known to be exceptionally rich and some will be known to develop them. Machinery is now on the way, and the company proposes to install a plant which will be capable of mining 3,000 tons daily. The coal is excellent anthracite, better according to some authorities, than the Pennsylvania product. The capitalists interested are mainly from Montreal and New York. The plant will go out on the first train to be operated over the new steel of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

RAILWAY TO GASPE

Isolation of Quebec District Will Soon be a Thing of the Past

MONTREAL, July 25—That the isolation of Gaspé will soon be a thing of the past is the announcement made by Mr. C. B. K. Carpenter, the managing director of the New White Company, Limited, which is building the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway in the peninsula. He says that as soon as the system is finished and linked up with the Intercolonial at Metapedia, arrangements will be made with one of the fast steamship lines, running out of the St. Lawrence of New York, to place a fast boat on the Gaspé route for the purpose of ascertaining the exact time to be made between Liverpool and the harbor of Gaspé. It is believed the journey can be made by a fast boat running between Liverpool and Gaspé harbor in three days and a half.

Excellent progress is being made with the construction of the line. The last sixty miles from a point 20 miles beyond Port Daniel are being pushed forward and although there are 26 bridges on the last hundred miles, the company expects to have trains running to Gaspé early next summer. Already the road is practically completed to Fabou, twenty miles below Port Daniel, and there are 1,800 men at work all over the remaining sixty miles.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


