I resilize, however, that in view of the Young Emergency Tariff Bill going into effect our Administration will have to be governed in their taric legislation accordingly, but I hope they will not increase the duty, for instance, on fertilizers, with which we grow potatoes, because we have to pay that import duty, and also the duty of our potatoes going into the United States. Somebody will say: That is not logical; if we pay the duty on the fertilizer coming in, why will we pay the duty on the potatoes going out? The explanation is simply this, that our export trade in potatoes to the United States compared with ine quantity of poatoes they grow is a very small factor in fixing the price in that country. For that reason, we being the little fellow, the price is practically set by the big fellow. In that connection a duty of 25 cents a bushel is being imposed on our potatoes entering the United States, while their potatoes enter Canada free to-day. I think under these circumstances our home market for potatoes should be reserved to Canadian growers. 



T. W. CALDWELL (Continued from page 2) much revenue. The very fact of our immense debt makes it clear that Canada had no money to lend least of all to a bankrupt country from which there is very little prospect of ever getting either the principal or interest.

That interest was to have been paid twice a year, but already nearly a milion and a half is overdue, and I doubt very much if it ever will be paid. Not only have we thrown this \$23,000,000 away; but the people of Canada will-have to pay interest on t until the Victory bonds through which we ob-tained this money to squander are redeemed. I think it would have been a good thing for this country if the revenue in the past few years had not been quite so large; the Government would not have been quite so ready to squander it in loans to bankrupt countries, nor to apply the closure in countries, nor to apply the closure in this House very recently in order to vote \$8,000,000 to build ships for the Canadian Government Merchant Ma-rine at exorbitant prices. If I am nor mistaken—the Minister of Marine (M: Ballantyne) will correct me if I am wrong—the price paid for the building of vessels in Canada recently has been \$191 a ton. I believe that a firm in Montreal bought a couple of vessels very recently for somewhere in the neighborhood of \$50 a ton. Of course, we realize that that does not represent the cost of building the vessels, but there are numberless ships idle today and no doubt the owners of these were in difficult innancial circumstances and were glad to realize money on them at any price. I believe that a number of this firm made the statment that very soon it would Ballantyne) will correct me if I am

impossible for any succeeding govern impossible for any succeeding government to take advantage of, namely, Victory bonds exempt from taxation, amounting in all to \$1,358,000,000. 



that the sales tax will affect the conumen least, because it is the consumthat who pays that tax. Mr. Stewart er who pays that tax. Mr. Stewart admits that the wholesaler does not absorb it, so he must pass it on to the consumer. I quote again:

"The new budget provisions bring a welcome relief to the ardent card player, to whom the high cost of cards has been a source of frequent complaints. The tax on cards not exceeding \$24 a gross, dis reduced from 15 cents a pack to 8 cents, and that on cards costing over \$24 a gross, drops from 25 cents a pack to 15 cents."

"I suppose that the ardent card player, the people who have leisure to indulge in card playing, and the card sharper who fleeces the innocent vicitim out of his money at cards, will no doubt benefited by the Budget provision this respect, but I do not know whether it is in the best interests of the country or not. When you take out the taxpayer and the business man, who is left to pay the taxes? It is evidently the consumer who owns no property, according to this man, because it is the non-taxpayer, and not the business man. It is the poor laboring man who is working in a mill or on the railroads for \$2 or \$3 a day, trying to support a large family, who is raising the revenue by paying a tax on everything that he and his family eat and wear. If that is a sound method of taxation, I will admit that I do not know very much about economics. My idea of equitable taxation is to raise the revenue by taxing the men able to bear it, the men who own property, or who make big profits out of business. It has been said that the reason why the business profits tax was abolished was because there were no profits. If that were the case no harm would be done by leaving the tax in force.
