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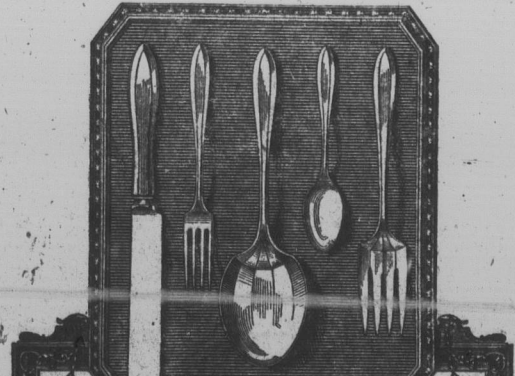

NEW LIQUOR BILL WILL SOON BE LAW

Passed in Quebec Assembly Last Week and Through Upper House.

Quebec, Que., Feb. 22.—The Quebec liquor bill, which was passed in the assembly last Thursday, will be presented in the upper house to-day. It is expected that the bill will go through the upper house promptly and it will then be sanctioned immediately. As soon as the bill is sanctioned the government will appoint the five members of the Quebec liquor commission.

BATHURST BOARD OF TRADE

Annual Banquet a Most Pleasant Affair—Visitors Present.

Bathurst, Feb. 22.—The board of trade banquet held here tonight was a very enjoyable and successful function. About 180 guests, including representatives of the different boards of trade throughout the province, were present. J. L. Ryan, past president of the local board of trade, presided and among the speakers were: R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the St. John board of trade; D. W. Jarvis, of Champlain; D. Champagne, of Campbellton; P. E. Morris, of Capreol; Major Burns, of Bathurst; J. B. Hachey, George Gilbert, Rev. J. A. Cooper, Rev. A. D. Archibald and L. L. Desroches, all of Bathurst. Several of the speakers referred to the proposed hydro-electric development in the northern part of the province and prophesied wonderful advances for Bathurst and the neighboring towns when the light stations are put in operation.

YORK FARMERS NOMINATE MAN

Candidate Will Run in York-Simsbury By Election for Commons.

Former Wardens Ernest W. Squires was nominated at Fredericton Saturday as a candidate for the United Farmers in the bye-election in York-Simsbury, the federal representation of which was made vacant by the death of Col. H. F. McLeod several weeks ago.

The United Farmers candidates is a farmer by occupation and a resident of the parish of Southampton, in the western part of York County. Until the last year he was a Conservative in politics, but in the last provincial general election he was one of the four men who composed the United Farmer ticket which in a three-cornered fight lost its deposit.

Richard B. Hanson, K. C., was nominated on Feb. 12 as the Conservative candidate.

The United Farmers convention was representative and was so largely attended that the county court house would not hold all.

Liberals Win In Rest. Protest Case

Course Pursued by Mr. A. T. LeBlanc Upheld by Judge Barry's Decision.

His Honor Judge Barry rendered his decision in the Restigouche Protest case yesterday afternoon.

The judgment was a lengthy document which dealt with all the questions at issue, and in every particular vindicated Mr. A. T. LeBlanc in his actions.

His Honor left no doubt in the minds of any person but that the nomination papers filed by LaBilloy and Duncan were worthless and should never have been accepted by the Sheriff. By this acceptance many electors were misled. He also said that the County Court Judge did entirely right in throwing out the ballots cast in the sub-districts created by the Sheriff contrary to the act.

The judgment continued as follows: "For the same reason that the first return was bad, the second one would also, I apprehend, be illegal and void; but inasmuch as it does not profess to make a return of any member or members elected, it is a harmless document and can work little injury to anyone. Here I may be permitted to remark that while I do not conceive it to be my duty to say what the returning officer should have done, or what he should not have done, it is plain, it seems to me to be quite clear that once his hand was stayed by the commencement of recent proceedings before the County Court Judge, he remained tied and he could do nothing until he was released by the certificate of the County Court Judge, or ordered to make a return by some Court of competent jurisdiction.

Looking at all the circumstances of the case, it would seem to me to be clear beyond any doubt that the County of Restigouche is today, in law and fact, without representation in the Legislature Assembly of the Province."

Dalhousie, Feb. 21.—In the contested election case today, James J. Arsenau, deputy returning officer at Bathurst, said that Bathurst station was divided into two parts on the advice of the sheriff and asked that the best man held one of the polls. The witness, name Joseph Bernard and the sheriff, said for them to make the sub-division to suit themselves. The Bathurst church was taken as the dividing line. The upper poll, with Joseph Bernard as deputy returning officer, was three miles from the poll where the witness was. The voters' list was in the box when he received it. He gave Bernard a list which witness got from the Campbellton committee rooms. He received votes from people living from the church up and Bernard from the church down. Two voters requested to vote at the witness poll, but as they lived in Bernard's sub-division witness refused them permission. They returned, accompanied by Henry Diette, an opposition candidate, and on his insisting witness allowed them to vote. He received a paper on the morning of the election containing a list of voters properly to be admitted from the voters' list from the Atholville sub-division, by calling Hon. C. H. LaBilloy. He being ill, the court adjourned to his residence to take his evidence. Hon. W. P. Jones, one of the counsel for the petition, asked the leave of the court to withdraw, he being compelled to leave for Ottawa to attend the supreme court of Canada. Leave was granted.

Hon. Mr. LaBilloy said that he only saw two or three persons sign his nomination, but all the signers were qualified voters. He couldn't say who prepared his nomination papers. It was very near to 12 o'clock when he deposited his nomination papers. He made no affidavits.

W. D. Duncan, one of the candidates, said that he did not see who signed his nomination paper. Witness handed it to the sheriff about three minutes before twelve o'clock. The sheriff told him that the affidavit was not

B., and Cross Point, Que., Mr. Marcell wants to know if the government has received any complaints and if the government intends to construct a highway bridge over the Restigouche river between these two points.

FARMERS WILL WIN IN WEST

R. W. E. Burnaby Says Three Provinces Will Elect Farmers.

Toronto, Feb. 22.—R. W. E. Burnaby, who has returned from the west where he was re-elected president of the Canadian Council of Agriculture, is so deeply impressed with the solidarity of the organized agrarian movement in Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan that he is confident the next general election will see three provinces sending farmers almost exclusively to the house of commons.

"With the exception of one or two constituencies," he said, "I believe that none of the other seats will go to the old line parties."

Tuesday Morning.
Dalhousie, Feb. 22.—Argument in the Restigouche election case was completed before Judge Barry kept this morning and the court adjourned until Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock when judgment will be delivered.

This morning's session was taken up with arguments by P. J. Hughes, K. C., representing the petitioner, F. M. Anderson, and Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., on behalf of the respondents, Messrs. Stewart and Diette.

Mr. Hughes argued that the law had not been observed; the sheriff had not been sworn; that an election clerk had not been appointed; that deputy returning officers at some of the polls had not been regularly appointed; at some places polls had been made which were not provided for by law; that there was no returning officer for the whole country; that some deputy returning officers made up their own lists; that in some places people were allowed to vote whether they were on the list or not, so that it was impossible to complete a recount, and that the nomination papers of LaBilloy and Duncan were not in accordance with the act and should not have been received and all votes polled for them should not have been received and all votes polled for them should not have been counted.

Dr. Baxter, in reply, while admitting that the act was not followed, argued that the result would not be affected in either case.

WILL LOOSE MORE MEMBERS

Maritime Provinces Will Have Representation Cut After Census.

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 22.—The effect of a possible further curtailing of the representation of the Maritime Provinces in the House of Commons in the event of redistribution is engaging the earnest concern of maritime members. In 1913 an amendment to the British North American Act provided that the representation in the commons should not be lower than that of the senate. Both New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are entitled to ten senators and Prince Edward Island to four.

Under the last redistribution New Brunswick was given eleven seats, Nova Scotia sixteen and Prince Edward Island four. While the island representation cannot be further curtailed it is possible that an increase in the population of Quebec without corresponding increase in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick may result in the first province losing one representative and the latter six. This would bring the total maritime representation down to twenty-four instead of thirty-one, as at present.

Quebec is entitled to sixty-five seats, and is the basis for the representation from other provinces. The unit in Quebec is now approximately one member for every 30,000 of the population and if this increase to 40,000, as predicted, without a corresponding increase in the other provinces, the maritime representation will have to come down.

Observers say that in addition to the natural increase in the population of Quebec many natives of that province who immigrated to the United States have returned owing to the industrial depression in that country. This would further swell the population. The same may also hold good of the maritime provinces men, but the fact remains that judges of the situation believe that the maritime have not kept pace with Quebec in population.

It is not likely that maritime members will endeavor to protect their representation further by again asking for an amendment of the British North American Act this session. It is felt that the situation will solve itself and that while a few seats may be lost, the maritime representation in the next parliament will be between twenty-five and thirty.

JUBILEE YEAR FOR SUN LIFE COMPANY

Encouraging Report of Huge Business Done in Past Year.

Among the annual reports submitted so far this year one of the most interesting available is that of the Sun Life Assurance Company which is now celebrating, with pardonable pride, its fiftieth anniversary. Somebody Lost Money.

Halifax Herald: The loss of the 12,000 bags of sugar stored last summer in one of the government warehouses at the Ocean Terminal was sold to a large chocolate manufacturing concern, the price being said to be around 9 cents a pound. When the sugar was in the warehouse last summer the prevailing retail price was as high as 27 cents a pound and at one time it was \$24.10 per 100 pounds wholesale. Somebody lost money on what was stored in this warehouse, sugar men state.

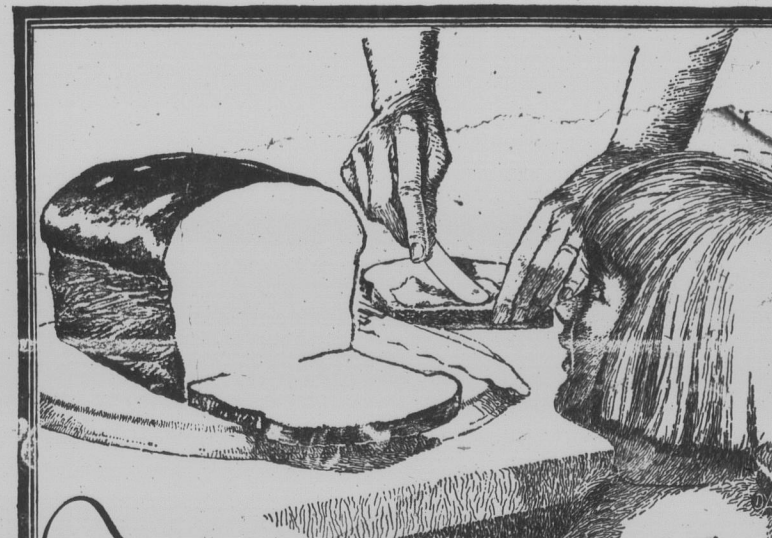

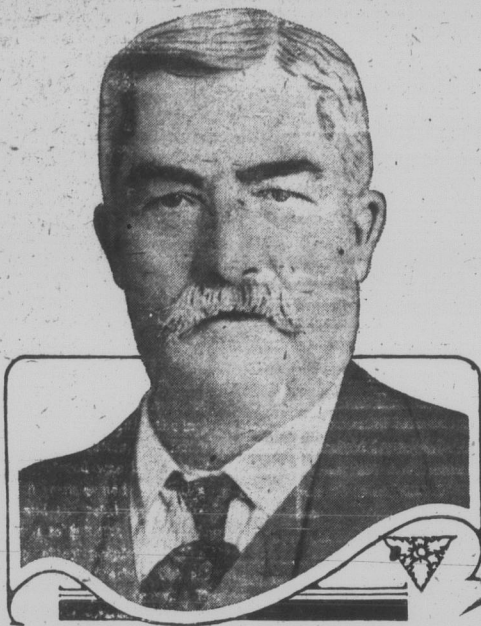

WILL USE PLANES IN FOREST WORK

Premier Foster Makes Announcement—Start With Two or Three Machines

Air patrols for the protection of the forests of New Brunswick will be used this summer by the provincial government according to plans now being considered, so Premier Foster announced this morning. Allowance for the expenditure is being made in the estimates for the coming year. The machines will be furnished by the Canadian Air Board and the province will provide the pilots, observers and mechanics.

This year's operations in this connection will be more or less in the shape of an experiment, the premier said, and on the success of the work will depend the permanent employment of a thorough system of air patrols. It is the intention of the government to start with two or three machines this year and add to the fleet later if the trial proves successful.

There are many parts of the province where a complete observation of the forests from the ground is impossible, and in the case of serious fires, particularly during the dry season, they are not detected until they have been burning for some time; consequently it is a more difficult undertaking to get them under control. The fire menace to the woods has always been a serious one and the local government is using every effort to prevent the destruction of our valuable timber lands. It is considered better in the interests of the province to conserve, rather than be compelled to reforest and it is felt that the saving effected by a system of aerial watermen will more than pay for the expense incurred.

It is expected that hydroplanes will be the type of machine used for the work.

DELIVERED LECTURE ON ITALY

Rev. Fr. Lacasse Lectured to
Two Hundred K. of C. at
Watertown

"Europe may be a wet continent, but I must say that during my travels in several of its countries, I saw but one man under the influence of liquor." Said Father Amadee Lacasse, M.S.C., priest at our Lady of the Sacred Heart Church, in an address given in the Knights of Columbus hall Monday night. The lecture was given in connection with the showing of a series of 100 stereoscopic slides of Italy, of the countries visited by Father Lacasse during the past summer.

John Conway, introduced Reverend Father Lacasse, to the audience numbering about 200 persons. The series of pictures is very interesting and entertaining, as well as dealing with the ancient and historic sections of cities in Italy, they include pictures of modern buildings and architecture.

Reverend Father Lacasse, says that many who visit Italy become disgusted after seeing a portion of the great ruins of buildings and structure of architecture. During Father Lacasse's trip which lasted four months, he said that there was nothing that so attracted his interest as the old ruins. Some of the most interesting of the pictures showed Mount Vesuvius, from several different viewpoints. One photograph was taken with the camera pointing down into the crater of the volcano. Father Lacasse said that he did not go up this mountain for several reasons, chiefly because of the intense heat. The potash and lava pouring down the side of this mountain ruin the shoes of those who climb it.

Father Lacasse said in telling the history of this mountain that at one time the top of it was a large plain nine miles across. An earthquake shook its base and so disturbed it as to form the crater and turn the peaceful mountain into a volcano. He told of the several noted eruptions of the live mountain and the burial of two cities and of several villages.

Post war conditions in southern Italy, as described by Father Lacasse, as being very bad, other sections of the country are not so serious. At the time Father Lacasse visited the country, coal was selling for the equivalent of \$35.00 a ton. The ordinary laborer earns this amount in just 90 days or three months.

Several pictures the most beautiful, of Naples, Venice, Rome and Genoa ended the series. The knowledge of the history of each of the old ruins of buildings, structures, art and architecture, possessed by Father Lacasse, made the lecture complete in every detail, instructive, entertaining and beautiful.

Father Amadee Lacasse is the son of the late J. S. Lacasse and Rose Delima Chenette, of Campbellton, he was born here and is a graduate of the Grammar school under the Professorate of the late Mr. Lewis.

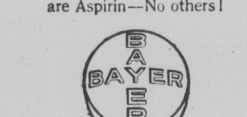

RESTIGOUCHE PROTEST.

So far as we know the Restigouche Election protest is the first case of its kind to be tried to a conclusion in this province.

The successful outcome from the Liberal standpoint is entirely due to the good work of Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, who to a great extent looked after the preliminary work of the case. Mr. LeBlanc's contentions as stated publicly have been amply sustained by the judgment as rendered at Dalhousie yesterday.

Restigouche has now no representatives, and when she elects such representatives she must see that the right ones are chosen; ones who will look after the best interests of the county.

It is probable that the election will be called on promptly.

THE DECLINE IN PRICES.

According to the Department of Labour index, wholesale commodity prices have fallen in the year to January 1921, by 16½ per cent. and those of retail food prices by 5-13 per cent. Wholesale prices declines in the United States have averaged 35 per cent. and retail prices considerably less. It is clear that in Canada prices have been much steadier, and that retailers in particular have not generally been forced to pass on to their customers the full benefit of wholesale price declines. This is one of the factors that have kept business improvement back. Occasionally a retailer will take stock of the situation and decide to mark all prices at replacement values, which is the policy of giving customers the full benefit of wholesale price declines, but frequently the policy adhered to is a determination to make the public take off the higher cost stocks at the old values. Dull business can be blamed on the holding up to inflation values somewhere in trade channels. The war time habit of looking for large profits and expecting people to be accommodating as purchasers, dies hard.

When the Liberal Leader declared that the present Government at Ottawa did not possess the confidence of the country, he was in good Tory company—for once in his life anyway. The Montreal Gazette, the Halifax Herald, the St. John Standard and other Tory journals have emphatically declared that Mr. Meighen's present cabinet lacks public confidence.—Ex.

With the whole North Shore of New Brunswick unrepresented in the Senate, the Government has appointed another Shediak man to sit in that body. Two Senators from Shediak and not one from Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche!—Chatham World.

A Weston man has invented a "magnetic" gun. There are too many of these things now, guns so magnetic that they can't lie around anywhere without magnetizing foolish folk into blowing down their muzzles or pointing them at other people's heads, with often fatal results.

ASK PATROL OF VALLEY LINE

Lumbermen's Protective Association Want Fire Patrol This Year.

On the 15th of February last Messrs. David Champoux, President of the east Division of the Southern St. Lawrence Forest Protective Association Limited, also J. D. Brule, Forest Engineer, and Manager of the Society, went to Moncton, N. B., to meet the authorities of the Canadian National Railways, for the purpose of obtaining immediate organization of a patrol on this road between Ste. Florence and Matapedia; and it is in view to prevent and fight the numerous forest fires which are lighted every season either by the locomotives or by passengers on the trains, who throw lighted matches, cigars or cigarette stubs, etc., and even by the section men and the employees of the railroads.

Several fires arising from these causes have been reported to the board of the Southern St. Lawrence Forest Protective Association Limited at Val Brilliant P. Que., since this Association have taken an active part in the protection of the forests against the fire in this District.

It is in view to remedy the danger which exists in this section that this system of patrol will be established in the near fire season.

The Officers of the Canadian National Railways at Moncton have promised the delegates of the Association that it was their desire to do all they could in the future to protect the forest along the different network of the railroad. It is understood that the transport of the forest product in all its form contribute a considerable source of revenue to the railroad of the east of the province and in all the Dominion.

The patrol will contribute in a large measure to preserve, not only the forest near the railroad but the picturesque character of the Matapedia Valley which has certainly its importance.
