At the beginning of the Verdun bat-tle Dumas was again facing the Germans. Once more he was wounded and the great battle proceeded with-out the aid of this determined veteran. But once more he recovered, and was in the front ranks when the battle of the Somme began last July. Near Clery he was wounded for the ninth time, and he died nine days later.

France delights to consider Dumas as typical of the French spirit and the French mation of to-day. 

Boats full of soldiers surrounded the steamer at Basra, but the girl ran across the deck, jumped into the Russian con-sul's boat and took refuge under the Russian flag. The consult aw her safe-ly on to the British India steamer, and she descended at Bushire, in Persia.
