Schemes to Make Niagara Park Self-Sustaining.

Debate on the Matter of Educating Farmers' Sons-Tory Election Tactice ment-First Division of the Session.

[Special to the ADVERTISER.]

TORONTO, March 30.—The sixth report of the commissioners of the Queen Victoria Niagara Falls Park was presented to the House to-day. Owing to the lack of funds no new works of improvement were undertaken last war. The ordinary maintenance taken last year. The ordinary maintenance expenditure was \$14,588, the revenue \$7,041, leaving a deficit of \$7,546. To this should be added the interest on the park debentures amounting to \$21,000. To meet this deficit and to provide funds for future improvements the commissioners sold the franchise to build a high-level electric railway from the Fails to Queenstown to Messrs. E. B. Osler, H. S. Hammond, William Hendrie, R. B. Angus and others for \$10,000 per annum, and also gave them an option on a franchise for an electric railway on the low level below the bluffs, which, if accepted, will bring \$7,500 per annum in addition. These sums are to be paid quarterly, beginning Sept. 1, 1892. Should certain English capitalists avail themselves of the option they now have to lease the waters of park debentures amounting to \$21,000 English capitalists avail themselves of the option they now have to lease the waters of Niagara for electrical purposes, the income of the park will be increased by an additional \$25,000 per annum, so that it seems probable that the park will no longer be a charge on the Province, but will soon be on a self-supporting basis. There were 272, 485 visitors to the park, as compared with 251,923 the year before.

He left for Howick, taking away considerable of the furniture to a farm he had there, but immediately returned assuming the control of the farm in Minto. She objected and notified him to leave her in quiet possession. He refused, and abused her until she had to leave, and she brought this action to recover possession. The verdict was for the defendant without costs, the chief justice holding that the plaintiff having been married between 1859 and 1872, and having received the lands during coverture from the husband, could not eject the husband.

It is rarely indeed that the Bench is im It is rarely indeed that the Bench is impeached in Parliament. Judge Elliot, of London, attains a very unusual notoristy. Intrusted with the dispensation of justice to his fellow men, almost the most sacred trust that can be placed in the hands of a human being, Judge Elliot is accused of willfully, deliberately, and for low and mean ends, violating his sacred trust. This which he is accused of doing is a far grave erime than any ordinary felony. If the accusation is proven in Parliament to be well-founded, the petition which a Liberal member, Mr. Lister, offers calling for a declaration of Judge Elliot's unfitness to remain on the bench, should neither be disregarded nor dodged by the Conservative majority.

The facts as we understand them are as

During the revision of the voters' list in During the revision of the voters list in London last November, the Liberals entered protests against several hundred names which the revising officer proposed to place on the list. By the Franchise Act, the Liberals were required to state the grounds on which the protests were entered. With regard to this, the Liberals first simply gave the words "not qualified" in a large number of cases, those, we believe, of number of cases, those, we believe, of persons claiming the right to vote on in-come.

The Concervatives, one would imagine, were right about this. The revising officer thought so. He notified the Liberals on Nov. 10 that their protests were not fairly made. But he also took the fair and equitable course of giving the Liberals an opportunity to put in proper protests. He gave them three days to amend their pracests. As there were several hundred protests, it will be imagined that the Liberals had to hustle. But they did it, and by Nov. 13 mailed and amended protests not only to the revising officer, but to each Conservative whom they protested, as by law they were bound to do.

This settled the question with the revising officer. He proceeded to hear the protests, holding court on Dec. 4. A number of protested Conservatives did not appear. They appealed to the Court of Appeal at Toronto, and meanwhile they took the liberty of staying away from the revising officer's court. By the Franchise Act a revising officer may strike off the name of a challenged person who does not appear to answer a protest against his

on record as on their side. Two hundred and twenty-nine Conservatives who had refused to appear before the revising officer on the ground that the Liberal protests were invalid, or who for other reasons failed to appear, and had been struck off by the revising officer, now asked Judge Elliot to replace them on the voters' list. These men had attempted by a legal technicality to burk inquiry in the first place; when the legal technicality was settled, they had still tried to burk lair investigation of their standing; in attempting to do this, they had defied the law both of the revising officer and of the Court of Queen's Bench; and now they harked back to Judge Elliot, evidently trusting that he too would defy the Queen' Bench.

Ludge Elliot hesitated. The appeal came

before him on Dec. 31. He declined to hear evidence on either side, stating that inasmuch as the 229 Conservatives whose cases were in question had appealed from the Queen's Bench to the Court of Appeal, he would reserve his judgment until the Court of Appeal had spoken. You will observe that all this is a pretty knotty complication, and that it is little wonder there is so much to be said on one side or the other, and so many loopholes for the escape of an honest verdict.

The Ccurt of Appeal speke on Feb. 18. Practically it indorsed the Court of Queen's Bench, vindicated the Liberals and confirmed the Conservative defeat; technically, it gave Judge Elliot an opportunity to have his own way. The Court of Appeal gave no formal judgment. It held there was no necessity to do so, inasmuch as the revising officer had acted on the order of the Court of Queen's Bench, and had dealt with the disputed names. The judges of the Court of Appeal, however, expressed their personal opinions, or at least three out of four did. Judge Osler did not say anything. The other three, Chief Justice Hagarty and Justices Burton and Maclennan, personally remarked that Queen's Hagarty and Justices Burton and Maclennan, personally remarked that Queen's Bench was right, and the original Liberal protests quite sufficient. Judge Maclennan said that it would be "an intolerable scandal" if such technicalities as that claimed by the Conservatives were allowed to prevail. Chief Justice Hagarty added that even if the original notices were insufficient the revising officer had power to allow and did allow them to be amended.

The Conservatives promptly took objection. They held that the Liberais had not the right, either by equity or the Franchise Act, to force electors to appear before the revising officer to answer so vague a charge as "not qualified." The Conservative counselneed not have been afraid; Judge Elliot was perfectly safe—for him. Despite the adverse opinions of the six judges of superior courts—of every other judge who had spoken—despite the fact that it was only too apparent that all along the Conservative aim had been to burk investigation and yote by hook or by crook—Judge Elliot calmly decided the Liberal protests invalid, the Conservative votes good, the Hon. John Carling a legal representative of London in the House of Commons. His judgment concluded:

If they did vote, I hold their votes must be treated as good votes, and the declaration of the returning officer as to the result of the poll does not require any change as far as I am concerned.

There was no legal appeal against this. Nothing remained for the Liberals but the step which Mr. Lister is attempting in Parliament—the impeachment of the judge. 

Committed to the Dust.

The remains of Walt Whitman, the poet, were interred yesterday afternoon in his tomb at Hart Cemetery, Camden, N. J., after impressive funeral services which

were attended by a large throng of people, including many well known in literary circles. The plain casket was almost hidden beneath the floral tributes of affection which were showered upon it by Whitman's numerous admirers who filed past the body in a constant stream as it lay in state at his

in a constant stream as it lay in state at his home for over two hours. No services were held at the house and the mourning procession moved in silence to the cemetery, while crowds of sympathetic spectators lined the walks. At the tomb Francis Howard Wilson, of Philadelphia, read selections from the Scriptures and the poet's writings. Dr. R. M. Bucke, of this city, Whitman's biographer, spoke at length on the life and character of the dead poet as shown by his works. Thomas B. Harned and Dr. Daniel G. Brinton also made addresses and the ceremonies were concluded by an address from Robert G. Ingersoll, the intimate friend of Whitman. The Sixtieth Anniversary.

The Sixtieth Anniversary.

Sixty years ago Mr. and Mrs. Andrew
Thompson were made man and wife at
Kelso, Roxburgh. Scotland, and the recurrence of the anniversary of that happy event was commemorated yesterday by a family reunion at their residence, 433 Ridout street. Both Mr. and Mrs. Thompson are still hale and hearty, and are splendid examples of those vigorous qualities of body and mind which characterize the natives of auld Scotia. Mr. Thompson was born in Kelso on Sept. 8, 1808—over 83 years ago—though his sturdy frame and mental activity would scarce lead one to believe he had attained that ripe age. He well remembers when the battle of Waterloo was fought and won, and how the bonfires blazed on the banks of the Tweed in joyous celebration of the victory. "That was a sample of Grit loyalty," he remarked with a smile. When 15 years of age Mr. Thompson started to learn the trade of the millwright, and in the fall of 1842 removed to Canada, settling at the Humber. Mr. event was commemorated yesterday by a

Thompson started to learn the trade of the millwright, and in the fall of 1842 removed to Canada, settling at the Humber. Mr. Thompson engaged extensively in the mill building business and he has constructed many of the largeat establishments of the kind in Western Ontario. He built mills in the Humber district for Messrs. W. P. Howland, Wm. Gamble, Fisher and other prominent persons; and for Messrs. Haggart (father of the present John Haggart) and E. W. Thompson, near the Welland Canal. In 1846 Mr. Thompson removed to Beachville, Ont., and continued in business. Among the well-known mills contracted for by him in this district are Devinney's, at Eyron, erected in 1851; Carroll's, at Woodstock; Reynard & Shaw's, erected in 1854 at the foot of Wellington street, city, and Hunt's mill, built in 1856. Mr. and Mrs. Thompson have seven surviving children—Robert, of Woodstock; Walter, of Mitchell; Charles, of Tilsonburg; Henry, of London (Gartley & Thompson); Mrs. Saunders, of Tacoma, W.T., and Miss Agnes Thompson, city. Twenty-two grandchildren are also living. Like most of his fellow-countrymen, Mr. Thompson is a staunch Liberal; he has taken the Toronto Globe since its earliest days, when that journal was known as the Banner. Many congratulations and hearty wishes for returns of the day were showered upon the venerated couple by their posterity and by friends.

PRESBYTERIAN HOME MISSIONS

The Committee Meets in Toronto—
Claims for Augmentation.

The Home Mission Committee of the Presbyterian Church met in Toronto on Tuesday. Rev. D. Cochrane the convener, occupied the chair, with Rev. Dr. Warden, clerk.

Claims for mission work in the different Presbyteries for the past half year were passed to the amount of \$21,048 48.

The claims for augmentation for the past half year amounted to \$13,889 71. It having been ascertained that the augmentation fund could not pay in full this amount, even with the addition of a bequest of \$6,000 given during the year, and what might be given by congregations prior to May 1, 1892, the following resolution was adopted:

"That in view of the state of the fund, the sum of \$30 be deducted from the grant due for the six months ending March 31, 1802, to each settled charge on the fund in Ontario and Quebec, and the sum of \$40 from the grant due to each charge on the fund in the Synod of Manitoba and the Northwest."
