Awful Alternatives

The Victoria's Men Faced Death in Threefold Form.

Drowning, Scalding and Mangling by the Terrible Screws.

A Vivid Description of the Appalling Disaster.

Fearful Experience of Those on the Doomed Vessel-Similar Disasters Within the Past Thirty Yoars.

London, June 27.—A special cable dispatch from Tripoli, Syria, says:

About 3 o'clook last Thursday afternoon the English fleet came in sight of Elmina, the port and town of Tripoli. It was coming from the northeast and making directly for the harbor. The five big iron-clads—Victoria, Camperdown, Edinburgh, Nileand Sanspareil—were drawn up in full front. The Victoria was in the center, the Camperdown was on her left and the Edinburgh on her right. When they were within five miles off shore Vice-Admiral Sir George Tryon signaled to turn and FORM IN DOUBLE LINE.

This meant that the Victoria and Camperdown were to go ahead a little and describe a turn—the Victoria turning to the left and the Camperdown turning to the right—then they would advance side by side in the direction from which they had come, the others would swing into double column order, and advance

had come, the others would swing into double column order and advance two and two behind the leaders. When two and two behind the leaders. When the order was given the distance between the ships was less than two cable lengths. The execution of the order was easy enough for ships further away from the center, but extremely difficult for the Victoria and the Camperdown, who, in turning their bows, would pass within a few faxhoms of each other, even if the movement was executed with the greatest precision. This movement is rarely made, and is chiefly for the purpose of training ship commanders to move expeditiously away from shoaling waters.

AN OCEAN COLLISION.

The Cunarder Servia Sinks the Big Sailing Ship McCallum.

The Latter Impaled on the Servia's Boy

NEW YORK, June 28 .- The first detailed New York, June 28.—The first detailed account of the collision wherein the big sailing ship Alexander McCallum was sunk by the Cunarder Servia was fold yesterday, when five men who formed a part of the McCallum's crew reached this port on board the steamship Alaska, of the Guion Line.

Collaj Anderson, able seaman, gave a reporter a graphic recital of the mishap which sent his vessel to the bottom.

The night of June 7, he said, found the ship in latitude 48°, longitude 69°, or about 60 miles south-southeast of Nantucket. With midnight came a fog which brought the horizon within a stone's throw of the vessel's side, and it so increased in density that all hands were called on deck for lookout purposes.

The men, 22 in number, were straining their eyes, when suddenly a faint point of light was seen to hover a moment on the statboard quarter. An instant later a huge shadow was evolved, and then came a shock and the noise of splintering timbers

A Teacher Arraigned Before the Fi-

nance Committee

Charged With Punishing a Pupil Too Severely — Evidence Pro and Con-The Committee's Verdict.

The finance committee of the Beard of The finance committee of the Beard of Education met last evening to consider certain charges made against Miss Coyne, principal of Colborne street school. Mr. Harry Thorne accused the teacher of having administered an uncalled for and too severe thrashing to his 11-year-old boy. The lad's arms, he said, were badly marked and blood was ozing from one of the marks.

Mas Coyne explained that the boy refused to obey her and that she whipped him a tine arms to make him submit to a thrasting with the regulation rubber strap on that ands.

Inspector Carson explained that the boy was shown to him, and said that he considered the punishment had been too severe. On account of the oflense the boy should have received a whipping, but not such a severe one.

severe. On account of the offense the boy should have received a whipping, but not such a severe one.

The lad himself acknowledged that he should have been punished.

Mr. Carson further stated that the regulations would not permit of such a thrashing. The rule provides that if a pupil does not submit to corporal punishment he should be sent home until he is willing to take such punishment.

Miss Coyne explained that the reason she had sent for the lad, Thorne, to come to her was that he had struck little boys over the hands with a piece of wire. The boy refused to obey her, and she took him by the coat-collar and forced him into the school. Here he again refused to obey her, and she struck him over the arms with the strap. She punished him, and he appeared quite penitent. She then ordered him to go into his room, and he ran out of school with the other boys. Miss Coyne said she could not have been in a temper when she whipped the boy.

Dr. English was present and explained that both arms were bruised in numerous places. He saw the lad two days after he had been punished, and thought that the whipping had certainly been severe. No child should receive such a punishment.

Miss Tabilleock explained that she had shut the door and that over a dozen of the pupils were in the room. The boy was "hollering" and kicking, and the punishment was not too severe. The boy was habitually disobedient.

Miss Yates said she had witnessed the boy's disobedience.

Misses Johnson and McCutcheon, two pupils, stated that they had seen the boy striking smaller boys with the wire, and had also seen him disobey Miss Coyne.

Dr. Campbell—According to the regulations the teacher has evidently exceeded her liberties.

Mi. McRobert said that no such punishment would likely be seen outside the Central Prison.

Mr. Alexander moved that Miss Coyne's ttention be drawn to the regulations and nat she be cautioned against a repetition

A CENTURY OF MEETING PLACES A book that will be of permanent value* has just been completed and published by Mr. Frank Yeigh, of Toronto. The recent structures. 

Begins Its Fortieth Annual Session. Two Hundred Delegates Present-Reports of the Chief Templar and

Grand Secretary. Hamilton, June 27.—The 40th annual session of the Grand Lodge of the Canadian Independent Order of Good Templars opened this morning, with F. S. Spence in the chair and about 200 delegates representing every section of Ontario present.

REPORT OF CHIEF TEMPLAR.

The report of F. S. Spence, G. C. T., refers to the important work accomplished by the Good Templar Order during the 40 years of its existence. The Ontario plebiacite is referred to as one of the most notable steps in advance yet taken by the Ontario Legislature, and it is expected that it will be instrumental in creating a large revival of temperance sentiment between now and Jan. 1, when the vote will be taken. The royal commission had not received the indersement of the Good Templar Order, yet it was the opinion of the grand chief templar that the forthcoming report would embody a great deal of valuable information. Reference is made to the action of the recent Liberal convention in declaring in favor of a plebiscite for the Dominion, which is taken to mean that if the Liberal party are returned to power and a vote favorable to prohibition were taken, then the party would be bound forthwith to enact a prohibitory law for the Dominion. Considerable missionary work had been done during the year, but the work had been hindered to a large extent for want of funds, consequent upon the reduction of the per capita tax from 12 cents to 8 cents. The grand chief strongly recommends the adoption of the district system as the best for the furtherance of mission work in the order.




