SIR CHARLES DILKE'S VIEW

London, Nov. 20.-The American correspondent submitted the data of the Kaiser's interview to night to Sir Charles Dilke, perhaps the highest authority in England on international politics. He examined it with greatest interest, but acted like a man already familiar with the contents. After reading it he said:

"Thanks, but I must decline to discuss the Kalser, his words or his works. On the general subject matter of the interview I can only say that England's alliance with Japan was a policy arranged after considerable thought and consideration. England is in a better position to judge of its efficacy and value than any one else. The observation that by the Anglo-Jap treaty England may lose her colonies is a pure matter of prophecy of which time will demonstrate either the truth or the falsity. As to the 'yellow peril,' the idea is, to my thinking, extremely crude. The 'yellow peril' in order to become menacing presupposes a division of the world into two parts, with all Asiatic nations, forgetting all separating differences and grouping themselves together against a similar group of white nations. The idea of a 'yellow peril' is, as I say, extremely crude. As a man of some experience in national affairs, I will say that the talk of national crises and of war seem to me to have less basis at present than for many years past. There are always some difficulties on the horizon of international politics, but these at present seem less than usu-



Canada is only 41 years of age in its national life, and is only beginning to take self-conscious shape. The Anglo-Saxon element of Canada is only beginning to the shortage of cars in which to move realize the historical continuity which alone gives Canadians the right to reorders for all lines of goods are brisk cognize themselves as a nation. The history of the United States goes back 300 years. Its early settlers were for the most part men of culture, bringing with them from the old land definite ideals and principles, along with many of the richest traditions of the mother

Conditions in Canada. In English Canada there have not been the same conditions or experiences. The farther reach of Canadian history, as a self-conscious organism, dates back barely a hundred years. Canadian people are gifted with a sense of high moral order, and a high intellectual potentiality, but they have not had the high social and political advantages that stand behind the United States. Nor can they compare themselves with them, without doing themselves a grave injustice.

The life that has developed in Canada has certain definite characteristics, the inheritance of a glorious ancestry, and Canadians do well to consider the forces, those near at hand, and those that come as far echoes of the distant centuries, that mold and fashion their national life.

A nation to be a nation should have a fine physical basis. The variety, the vastness and the grandeur of the inheritance of Canadians, leave their mark on the national life, in an inspired imagination and a stimulated national sentiment.

But a physical basis is only one of the minor qualities. THE DUST OF A BISHOP

TOMB OPENED SEVEN CENTUR-IES AFTER DEATH AND A PHOTOGRAPH MADE.

Workmen at the minster in Basel Switzerland, while installing a new heating plant a short time ago discovered in an interior crypt a tomb, which has been made the subject of a curious investigation.

The proceedings following this discovery were somewhat remarkable. A photograph of the open tomb with the body in it was taken with great difficulty, for it was almost impossible in that narrow underground hole to make a clear picture.

For the purpose of thorough examination the body was taken from its bed of centuries to a room in the museum of the city. This was difficult to do, for the slightest touch was likely to crumble anything in the tomb t dust. The examination required two

The most striking results of the investigation were the photographs, twenty-three in number, of the cloth and embroidery patterns, the tattered leather sandals and the tomb. Some of the embroidery patterns are of re-

markable beauty and intricacy. There was great difficulty in fixing the sandals so that they might be photographed, for they were little more than dust that a breath would blow away. They had been fitted to the feet of a dead man nearly three hundred years before Columbus discovered America.

We know of the remarkable scrutiny that has been given to the mummified remains of the ancient kings and queens of Egypt; this is probably the first time that the dust of a Christian prelate has been subjected to similar investigations.






