# STATE OF WAR ENDS RUSSIANS DECIDE; DEMOBILIZE ARMIES **BOLSHEVIKI ORDERS**

Petrograd Govt. Declares War Is Over Be- United and Unswerving, They tween Russia and Central Powers-Peace Agreement Signed-All Fronts Ordered Stripped of Russ Forces.

Amsterdam, Feb. 11.-Russia has declared the state of var to be at an end and has ordered demobilization of Ri sian forces on all fronts, according to a dispatch rece ved here today, dated Brest-Litovsk on Sunday.

The dispatch follows: 'The president of the Russian delegation at today's (Sunday's) sitting stated that while Russia was desisting from signing a formal peace treaty, it declared the state of war to be ended with Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria, simultaneously giving orders for complete demobilization of Russian forces on all fronts.

# THIS SOUNDS FISHY.

London, Feb. 11.—The remarkable statement that France and Great Britain have recognized the Ukraine repub-lic and sent diplomatic representatives there is contained in an official statenent sent out by the Russian Wireless News Agency and issued here through a press bureau. U. S. President Says Hertling Is Too Vague in Statements But Czernin Is Friendly-Will Use Nation's Fullest Strength in Struggle for Emancipation.

Washington, Feb. 11. -President Wilson, addressing Congress in joint session at 12:30 o'clock today, replied to the recent speeches by German Chancellor von Hertling and the Austrian foreign minister, Count Czernin.

Chancellor von Hertling's state-ment, the president said, was very vague and confusing, and leads to practically no conclusion. It was very different in tone from Count Czernin's, which, the president said,

had a very friendly tone. "Czernin seems to see the funda mental elements of peace with clear eyes and does not seek to obscure them?" said the president. He prob ably would have gone much farther had it not been for the embarrassment of Austria's alliances and of her dependence on Germany." In War To Limit.

1. Each part of the final settlement must be based upon essential justice to bring a permanent peace. 2. Feoples and provinces are not be bartered about like chattels to establish a balance of power.

. Territorial settlements must be for the benefit of the people con cerned, and not merely adjustment of rival states' claims. 4. Well-defined national aspiration must be conceded all possible satis-

faction. "A general peace upon such foundations can be discussed," said the president. 'Until such a peace can be secured we have no choice but to

These general principles, the preident said, have been accepted by everyone except the military autocrats in Germany. Hertling's Way Impossible.

The president said that Chanceller von Hertling, in his reply of January 24 to the addresses of the British prime minister and the president of the United States of January 5 and January 8 respectively, had indicated that after a settlement all around, effected by individual barter and concession he would have no objection to a league of nations which would undertake to hold the balance of power steady against external disturbance. # HOW PARCELS MAY BE SENT TO PRISONERS OF WAR, AND WHAT THEY MAY CONTAIN

The British war office has sanctioned an arrangement whereby one parcel which does not contain other than specified articles may be sent than specified articles may be sent-each three months by private indi-viduals in Canada direct to prisoners of war other than officers interned abroad. The parcel must be packed and dispatched through the post-office by the relative or friend of the prisoner and must bear a The next of kin has first right to the coupon and can designate to whom it may be given if they do not wish to use it. Persons wishing to wish to use it. Persons wishing to send parcels under this scheme should apply for the necessary coupons, if they have not already done so, as early as possible. Coupons for parcels intended for prisoners belonging to the Canadlan forces are supplied by the prisoners of war department, Canadlan Red Cross Society, 14 Cockspur street, London, S. W. 1, and in the case of prisoners belonging to the Imperial

Every form of preventible local disease Dr. Warthin explained in letail. He said that there was a time when the subjects which he discussed were denounced as unfit to listen to. However, the time is past, the speaker loped when such a narow, bigoted flow of one of the greatest problems besetting the human race is taken.
