U.S. AMBASSADOR TO GT. BRITAIN ACTED ON SPECIAL ADVICE

Political Editor of French Paper Refers To Certain Instructions.

WILSON'S ATTITUDE

President Wanted Some Time Before Dispatching

Paris, Feb. 21.—John W. Davis, United States ambassador to Great Britain last night spoke in London of "certain instructions" he had received from President Wilson, although the president's note to the supreme allied council has not yet arrived at the British capital, says "Pertiniax," political editor of the Echo De Paris.

"In order to properly follow the course of events," he writes, "it should be said that the note received by the council from President Wilson on February 13 was in answer to a statement sent to the state department in Wash-

"You are going much too far and much too fast. President Wilson cannot follow you."

Earl Curzon Drafts Note.

"Earl Curzon then drafted his note, which was intended to calm Mr. Wilson's anxiety, assure him that the greatest deference would be shown his views, and that Ambassador Wallace would be kept fully informed. Apparently after three weeks of patient waiting, President Wilson felt these soft words would not be enough. It can thus be seen the note of February 13 was not a 'bolt from the blue.'

"Knowledge of certain facts may also throw light on Mr. Wilson's probable policy relative to Turkish affairs. In October the American president formally asked the peace conference to postpone drafting the Turkish treaty until spring. He hoped, if the conference agreed to his demand, to be able to join in the task. Rapid developments in the Near East situation, however, prevented compliance with his wishes. It by no means follows, therefore, that Mr. Wilson will ratify all that has been elaborated without him. In one of the last meetings of the supreme council it was decided that before the treaty was communicated to the Turks it would be submitted for approval to 'our great associate."



If the German fleet got to sea first the chances of a meeting in waters favorable to the British would be distinctly less, and the work of the wireless stations was therefore vital to the success of the enterprise. We know from the records of the battle that the British fleet was able to take a position which, while not as favorable as could have been desired, was nevertheless, not as bad by any means as it might have been. Probably the best account we have of the battle as yet is that given by Lord Jellicoe in his book on the work of the Grand Fleet in the war, though it must be admitted that Jellicoe's own story is not convincing with regard to his own capacity for handling so great a fleet in so important an

engagement. The work of the wireless in directing air raids was also one of the great scientific achievements of the war. The German navy directed their Zeppelin raids from land stations, and according to British officers there was a egular superman in charge of the operating at the home base in Germany. On several occasions when nine or ten Zeppelins were in a raid over England, and, all could be heard frantically trying to communicate with the home base for bearings or otherwise, the wireless would get into an awful tangle. At that moment the superman would take charge and in a few minutes would have all straightened out.

VICTORIA PARK.

There is no lovelier city garden anywhere than Victoria Park, set like a brilliant emerald in the heart of London. 

It has the added advantage of being made, even by one who is not and. It requires a box and insulatexpert. It requires a box and insulating material to make nests inside for the utensils in which the food is cooked. The box for a family of five should be about 24x18x15 inches, and have a hinged cover—an old trunk will do. The insulating material may be hay, excelsior, ground cork, sawdust, or crumpled paper. For the lining of the nests inside use metal or granite pails and pack around and under them well with the around and under them well with the food is cooked. The outer pails should have lids and should be just large enough to hold the vessels in which the food is cooked. The outer pails should come within five inches of the top and fit snugly into holes in a cardboard or beaver board collar which in turn should fit the inside of the box exactly. After the heated food is placed in the pails, the space between the collar and the cover should be filled with a cushion, the cover closed, and the cooker will do the rest.

Some prefer the ready-made cookers will do the rest.







Moreover, the journey often injures

This misfortune was mainly instrumental in spoiling the results in 1919 from six lots received in good condition by parcel post from the same breeder. They together produced only 282 pounds of honey, while each wintered colony gave 187 pounds, two of the queens having died a day or two after arrival, and two more having been superseded a week or two later. A short breeding season before the honey flow contributed to these poor results.

A few unprincipled dealers have also appeared who have sent old bees or too large a proportion of drone bees, or virgin instead of fertile queens. One may expect, however, that as the trade in these southern bees becomes more stabilized, and after the transportation employees. tion employees become accustomed to recognize the very perishable nature of this merchandise, the losses will be less

requent.

FERTILIZERS FOR THE POTATO CHOP. Of all ordinary farm crops that of the potato is probably the most pro-ficably responsive to liberal feeding. The acceptance of this statement does not in the least ignore the fact that there are several other factors that play a very important part toward success in potato growing—type of son, character of season and the cultivation and spraying of the crop—but it means that with these factors favorable the crop is a very responsive one to applications of plant food, and that the cations of plant food, and that the yield will be approximately commensurate with the available plant food

supply.

It is generally conceded that there is no better preparation for the crop than a clover or alialia sod well man-ured (10 to 20 tons per acre), and plowred (10 to 20 tons per acre), and plow-ed in the late summer or early autumn.

the decay of the sod and manure, and
provides a good supply of humus,
which is so useful in keeping the soll
moist, and at the same time allows for

But with a fairly good soil, from a well manured clover sou as described, we should consider 350 to 700 pounds of 3:9:6 commercial fertilizer would represent the limits that may be deemed desirable and profitable. This would mean an application of nitrogen 10½ to 21 pounds, of phosphoric acid 31½ to 63 pounds, and of potash 21 to 42 pounds, per acre. If the ingredients are purchased rather than the ready mixed fertilizers (generally the more economical plan), the amounts would be nitrate of soda 75 to 150 pounds, and sulphate of potash 40 to 80 pounds, per acre. On light and very poor soils scantily manured, the maximum amounts here given may be somewhat raised, dressings to 1,000 pounds or more per acre frequently y good soil, from a well manured clover pounds or more per acre frequently proving profitable. For soils rich in nitrogen, as from clover and liberal manuring, the nitrogen in the above recommendations may be cut down one recommendations may be cut down one-third. On clay loams the potash may likewise be reduced one-third.

It is considered good practice by many experienced potato growers to supply a part of the nitrogen in the form of an organic nitrogenous fertili-zer, as dried blood. MONTREAL, Feb. 20.—Dr. Elsear Pelletier, secretary of the superior board of health, reports today that there are 68 municipalities in the province of Quebec which have reported the outbreak of influenza. On the whole the disease is confined to the district between Montréal and Levis and along the line of the Eastern townships, though there is one municipality on the Upper St. Lawrence where there are nealy two hundred cases reported. In other municipalities the average is from ten to forty. At Lachine there were 75 new cases today, making 250 in all, and two deaths.

HYDRO COMMISSION MUST PAY BUSINESS TAX ON ITS HAMILTON OFFICE, DECISION

Appelate Division Decides Against Ontario Power Body On Case Submitted by Judge Snider of Hamilton -Liable To Business Tax On Value of Land Only.

TORONTO, Feb. 20.—The appellate division held against the Hydro-Electric Power Commission this morning on a stated case submitted by Judge Snider at Hamilton. The question raised was as to the liability of the commission to a tax of \$970 in respect of the office premises occupied by it in the Bank of Hamilton Building at Hamilton Hamilton Building at Hamilton Ham ton for its maintenance of way depart-ment. A question raised was whether the commission was a "person" carry ing on the business of distributing

"I am unable to agree with the argument of counsel for the commission," says Sir William Meredith, "that the commission is not a 'person' within the meaning of section 10. It was argued that it is not liable to the hystress assessment insemble, as this rgued that it is not liable to the usiness assessment inasmuch as this business assessment inasmuch as this tax must be paid out of the property of the commission, which is exempt from taxation. At its session this morning the association passed a resolution to be presented to the provincial secretary to the effect that, as the Ontario fran-chise act of 1917, providing for the pre-paration of the voters' lists in cities, has been superseded by the Ontario voters' list act and changes are necesvoters' list act and changes are necessary in the publication and distribution of voters' lists for municipal purposes, the Government be requested to introduce at the legislature a short practical voters' list act to govern the preparation and distribution of the voters' list for various cities and municipalities to which the Ontario franchise act supplies, and further that the city clerks of Toronto, Hamilton, London and Ottawa be requested to present this application to the attorney-general.

Biection in December.

Another resolution was to the effect that the municipal act be amended to have municipal elections held on the first or second Monday in December and nominations ten days prior thereto. A resolution aimed at preventing loss of business and income taxes in cities owing to removal or giving up of business was that the assessment act be amended so that taxes due for business income may be levied for the year in which the assessment is made, and the time for collection be different from the time for collecting taxes on realty. Other suggestions were to provide Other suggestions were to provid for an optional system of municipal government for cities and towns.
