Russia has already disarmed, and all will be useless until the great masses of gold, which really belongs to all countries, shall be distributed fairly, instead of being concentrated in the hands of a few nations.'

Emil Gluckstadt, Danish delegate, who was a member of the commission which investigated the financial situation in Austria, urged the imperative necessity of returning rapidly to the gold standard as the real basis of world currency, and thus bring about equilibrium in the budgets. He emphasized the necessity of adopting special measures to restore credit in countries like Germany, Austria and Hungary.

Montreal, April 12 .- That one result of the building of good roads was consequent speeding up of motor traffic which, combined with reckless driving, constituted a large proportion of the accidents at railway level crossings, between motors coulding with trains and vice versa," was a statement by S. J. McLean, assistant chief commissioner of the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada, in an address here last night.

In 1921, there had been 243 fatalities and 1,928 injured in level-crossing accidents, and out of 189 highway crossing accidents, 114 were motor accidents. Four-fifths of those killed and two-thirds of those injured were in the class of automobile casualties.



SIR KEITH ARRIVES LATE

London, April 13 .- Sir Ross Smith, the Australian aviator, who, with his brother, Sir Keith, had planned to start from Croydon on April 25 for an attempted flight around the world, was killed when his plane crashed in a practice flight at Brooklands today

Lieut. Bennett, an engineer. was planning to accompany Sir Ross and his brother on their around-theworld flight, also was killed.

The machine which crashed was the one the Smiths intended to use their flight. Capt. Conkerill of the Vickers Company had previously flown it for a half hour, then handed it over to Capt. Smith.

As the machine was approaching the airdrome to land it got into a spin and the fatal crash followed.

The accident occurred fifteen mir utes after Capt. Smith and Lieut Bennett began their flight. Sir Keith Smith had intended to make the trial flight with them, but he arrived at the airdrome too late, and was among the crowd that witnessed the trag-





It is almost impossible to define the bond that holds Canada to Britain, that makes it part and parcel of the Empire, that stems all tides that start to run with the purpose of driving the two lands apart.

In brief, SIR CLIFFORD's conclusion is that according to law and constitution, Canada is in a subordinate position, and that the claim that this country is on an equal footing with Great Britain has no foundation in fact. We are not a separate international entity. But he pointed out that certain factors have arisen of late that give to Canada a place in international affairs, which, considered in relation to the utterances of public men here and in other parts of the Empire, demonstrate that the Dominion has reached a point in its political growth that entitles it to the right to have the subordinate

It is not said to be a parable; and in no parable is an individual named, while here we have both Abraham and Lazarus named. We must conclude, therefore, that the Lord spoke of real individuals.

2. "Interested" says, "I wonder if our friend knows that 'hell' is taken from the Greek word 'hades,' and 'hades,' when properly translated means 'grave''? We were well aware that "hell" was the usual translation for "hades" in New Testament scriptures, and for "sheel" in the Hebrew Old Testament, but never before were told that "hades" should be translated grave. For such is emphatically not true.

Dr. Strong in his Exhaustive Concordance, defines "hades" as the place, (state), of departed souls; Dr. C. I. Scofield defines it as the unseen vorld; and so all lexicographers.

Moreover, the uses of the word in scripture emphatically preclude any possibility of "hades" 'grave." In the scripture before us, whether literal or parable, it is stated that the rich man spoke, suffered, remembered, saw, heard and reason-By no stretch of rational imagination could this be considered as symbolic of unconsciousness death. It teaches rather the fact that the wicked dead are actively conscious in hell, remembering the past, able to reason, speak and suffer. QUEBEC, April 13.—His Eminence, Cardinal Begin, is opposed to woman suffrage and since his arrival here from Rome, on Tuesday, he has permitted the publication of a letter which he wrote in Rome n March last, to His Grace Mgr. Roy, auxiliary bishop of Quebec, in which he says:
"The entry of women into politics, even by the vote alone, would be a misfortune for our province. It is not justified by anything, neither by natural right nor by social interest. The Roman authorities approve our views, which are shared by all our Episcopate.


