FOUR FISHERMEN LOSE THEIR LIVES

Was Dropped in Buffalo Saloon Overwhelmed by the Breakers Before They Had Got Fairly Started.

May Get Big Steel Plant Halifax, Oct. 13.-It is reported here

that the United States Steel Corporation is seriously considering the establishment in Canada of a large plant in Canada for the manufacture of steel rails and steel generally. Its agents are col-lecting data regarding output, consump-tion, etc., as well as selecting a location for the proposed works. When this work is finished the question will be settled. The new duty of \$7 a ton on steel rails completely shuts out the American man-ufacturers, and as their Canadian market is becoming a very important one, the only way out of the difficulty is to build a manufacturing plant in this country. Experts say that a plant such as the Steel corporation would like to put up, would cost from twelve to thirteen milion dollars.
