The Auditor-General Presents His Case to the Public Accounts Committee.



Ottawa, June 14. - There was a large attendance at the public accounts committee today to hear Auditor-General McDougall make his statement in reference to amendments which he has been from time to time suggesting to the audit act. The auditor was examined by Mr. Bergeron. He said that one of the amendments which he desired secured to the audit act was that the annual report should be ready in time for presentation to Parliament shortly after the opening, so that it could be taken advantage of. 





The Result.

The result of the election in Londor is gratifying for more reasons than one. The friends of Mr. Hyman are pleased for personal reasons; the friends of the Government are pleased for political reasons; and there are many who are pleased because London will continue to be represented in Parliament by a cabinet minister.

But apart from all local and personal considerations, every true friend of Canada must at heart be pleased with the rebuke that a Protestant community had administered to those who would raise a sectarian issue, and bring strife between people of different

creeds. The policy adopted by the enemies of Mr. Hyman in this campaign would have been most disastrous for Canada had it been successful; in its failure it will only be disastrous for themselves.

At first they declared the issue was not one of separate schools; it was simply provincial rights. It was soon found that nothing could be made of that cry, and the firebrands of the party-the Sproules, and Hughes, and Cockshutts, and Sheppards, and Bennetts-started a "no-popery" war. Kingdom - Wages Poorer Last Year. London, June 13. - Some interesting facts as to the lives of that section of wage-earners in the United Kingdom popularly known as the "working classes" are given in the annual abstract of labor statistics for the last
