


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
PREFACE TO VOL. III.

DELAYS, for which the Editor is not responsible, have prevented the issue of this volume as early as was anticipated. It will, nevertheless, be found full of information of interest to the Churches. The Historical Sketch of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society, for which we are indebted to the Rev. Dr. Wilkes, is a document which will be of permanent value in after years. The Calendar has been made more complete, as an ecclesiastical and ministerial register of events and occurrences among us in Canada. The operations of our great Religious Societies, both British and American, are more fully presented. The Official Lists, and the names of the Congregational Ministers and Churches of the Dominion, which have been brought together into one place, will be found useful for reference. We hope to make it still more complete in the future. The Statistical Tables of the Churches of Ontario and Quebec, which cover only the Calendar year of 1874, present, on that account, apparent discrepancies, as compared with the Report of the Missionary Society, which covers the *Ecclesiastical* year; but this will be easily borne in mind. It will not occur again, the rule of the Union, with regard to such returns, having been changed at its last meeting. The YEAR BOOK being the only form in which the Reports of most of our Societies are to be published, we trust the Churches will give it a wide circulation.

We regret a slight inaccuracy in the Official List of the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec, on page 8. The Committee will be found to be correctly given on page 41.



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


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
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
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

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ANNUAL MEETINGS.

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THE ANNUAL MEETINGS OF 1875.

The assembling of the Union in Hamilton, in 1875, will long be remembered as one of the most pleasant, harmonious and effective gatherings we have ever enjoyed. There were present 35 ministers, 44 delegates, and about 30 visitors, mostly ministerial. The address of the Retiring Chairman, the Rev. Joseph Unsworth, of Georgetown, was devoted to the question "How to make our Churches an Increasing Power in the Land." It has already appeared in full in the *Canadian Independent*, and need not be reproduced here. The Rev. Charles Chapman, M.A., of Zion Church, Montreal, was chosen his successor for the year. The Rev. D. Macallum again did good service as Minute-Secretary, assisted by Mr. H. Pedley.

Papers were read by the Rev. Dr. Wilkes, on doing all things "Decently and in order ;" by the Rev. J. Wood, on "How best to promote denominational efficiency;" by the Rev. W. Manchee, on "Amusements;" by Dr. Richardson, of Toronto University, on "Science, falsely so called," and by the Rev. K. M. Fenwick, on "Special efforts to extend the Kingdom of Christ." Valuable addresses were also given at the Annual Public Meeting of the Union, by Rev. Messrs. Stevenson and Marling respectively, on "The Relation of the Church to Modern Skeptical Thought," and "Spiritual Power;" and by Mr. George Hague, on "The Reflex Spiritual Influence of Foreign Missions." These have nearly all been more or less fully given in the Magazine. "The Narrative of the State of Religion," and the reports given by brethren present, show the past year to have been one of much more than usual prosperity. The Home Secretary's Report indicated progress, and inspired hope for the future. The income of the Missionary Society was reported as steadily increasing. That of the College was also represented as "in a healthy state," and the Corporation, in consequence, upon the recommendation of a large select Committee, appointed to consider the matter, added to its staff of Professors. Mr. Archibald Duff, Jr., M.A., who takes the chair of Biblical Literature. The Provident Fund grows strong, and the Pastors' Retiring Fund gives promise of being in operation by another year.

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


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HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE CANADA CONGREGATIONAL MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

The first Congregational Church organized in Canada was at Quebec, during the latter quarter of the last century. I prepared an account of it for the Canadian Independent, which will be found in vol. viii. p. 21. The second was formed at Stanstead, on the borders of Vermont, by the late Rev. Thaddeus Osgoode. Facts concerning it are narrated Ibid vol. xiii. p. 443. Also, early in the present century, at least three Independent ministers came out from England under the auspices of the London Missionary Society, Messrs. Smart, afterwards of Brockville ; Purkis, once of Laprairie, L. C., afterwards of _____ U. C., and Bryning, of Mount Pleasant, U. C. These three brethren all went into the Presbyterian church, leaving no Congregational marks behind them. The Quebec church lived for many years under a succession of Independent ministers, the last of whom was the Rev. George Bourne, afterwards of New York. It became Presbyterian about the year 1830, and removing from its old place of worship in John street, now occupies Chalmers' church in that city. The Stanstead church still exists, though in a feeble condition and without a pastor. The first organized effort to supply Canada with Congregational ministers was made in conjunction with Presbyterians, (of the American type) and Baptists. I have before me the printed statement in the form of a circular. After some explanatory remarks, it proceeds : "Impressed with a deep sense of the destitute state of Canada, and the necessity of doing something to provide a remedy, a meeting was held in Montreal, on the 20th December, 1827, when it was resolved to form a society, for the double purpose of providing the means of educating pious young men for the ministry, and acting as a Home Missionary Society for Canada." name was, " Canada Education and Home Missionarv Society." There were twelve articles in its Constitution, having relation to both parts of its contemplated work, and the officers were, S. Hedge, Senr., and J. DeWitt, Vice-Presidents. Rev. J. S. Christmas, Ebenezer Muir, Benj. Workman, Henry Wilkes, L. M. Janes, H. Brodie, and Lucius Winchester, Directors; Wm. Freeland, Secretary ; J. Alger, Treasurer. About seven months after this I relinquished my commercial position and proceeded to Glasgow, Scotland, in order to pursue a course of study preparatory to entrance on the work of the Christian ministry. Being requested to act for the Society in Great Britain, I induced the Rev. J. Gibbs of Banff, who was about to migrate to New England, to look at Canada first. He did so, and settled at Stanstead. Several other ministers were persuaded to come out, notably, David Murdoch, who laboured some years at Bath, Bay of Quinté, and afterwards removed to the State of New York, where he laboured long, having died only recently, leaving, if I misexcellent teacher and he and I we part of our scher appeal, and we p recommendation Henderson, and Miller, Henry Fo Andrew Reed, W Crisp, Bristol; an London Missiona ber of \pounds 10's and Hebrew Bibles, 2 upwards of 200 Library.

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
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Rev. Richard Miles, recently returned from South Africa, read our appeal and visited us in London. After obtaining from me the information he required, he resolved to migrate in company with Mr. Smith, that he might also take part in our missionary work. He settled at Montreal, and was the founder of what is now Zion Church. The two families sailed from Greenock, in August, 1831, and while the one remained at Montreal, the other proceeded to Kingston, and ministered in the Union Church there, at the same time taking charge of two students, one of whom died ere he finished his curriculum, The other was for many years in the Baptist ministry in Canada, until his death. My visit to Canada in 1832 to promote the objects of our Society, revealed unforeseen difficulties in the way of prosecuting such a work as we had undertaken apart from denominational action. Meanwhile our society had introduced Congregational ministers into the Eastern Townships from the United States, who laboured at Danville, (Rev. A. J. Parker,) Granby, Waterloo, Russeltown, &c. The visit of Rev. Drs. Reed and Matheson from England, which was in 1834, resulted in 1836 in the formation of the Colonial Mission of the Congregational Union of England and Wales. A carefully drawn up narrative of these movements will be found in the Canadian Independent vol. viii, p. 22. From the year 1835 our missionary movements necessarily became denominational, inasmuch as we were linked with a Society in England, organized to carry forward the work of evangelization in Canada on Congregational principles. Accordingly, while the Colonial Missionary Society's work was superintended in the Western portion of the field by Rev. John Roaf, and in the Eastern portion by myself, as agents of the Society, there was, after a time, organized in each section, a local Home Missionary Society, whose special mission was to enter upon fields in rural districts, and thus to call forth in direct action upon their respective neighborhoods, the missionary zeal and enterprise of the Churches. Thus there were three societies at work, having the same general object: one in England, acting by its two agents, and one in each of the cities, Toronto and Montreal, acting by their committees and raising funds in the country. To be quite accurate it should be mentioned in this note, that the churches in Eastern Canada acted in connexion with the Canada Education and Home Missionary Society, until 1845, when a distinctly Congregational

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Society was formed. The Western churches formed their society in 1840. It is not needful to describe the inconveniences to which this gave rise, nor do I enlarge on the different positions in many respects occupied by the ministers who were connected with the society in England, from that of the brethren who were sent forth by the local societies. Individual and organized men learn lessons from experience if they are at all teachable. They also find that what is necessary and perhaps best at the beginning of things, cannot be wisely continued during their progress. As the number of self-supporting churches increased, and they became stronger, it was well that the chief responsibility of managing and sustaining should be transferred to them. This was always the design of the Colonial Missionary Society, and at length it took effect in the formation of the Canadian Congregational Missionary Society, in connection with the Colonial Missionary Society. The fusion of three Societies into one, was effected in 1853. Among other items in the first report presented in Montreal, June, 1854 are certain "Explanations."

"As misapprehensions may possibly exist among some of the friends of Congregational missions in Canada, as to the precise nature of the relations which this society sustains, the following explanatory statements are made:


" I. As to the connection of this Society with the Colonial Missionary Society, it is to be understood that it is rather a relation of co-ordinate bodies, than that of an auxiliary to a parent. As now reported, the amount expended by the Society has been £1367 9s. 8d., of which £757 5s. 2d. was contributed by the Colonial Missionary Society. This is a large portion, and lays claim for decided interference and veto. At the same time it is well known that their object is not to establish and maintain a series of dependent Missionary Stations, but rather to help the Colonial churches to fulfil their appropriate work of expansion to meet the wants of the country. Hence they are willing that we should originate every movement and carry into execution those plans which we may devise, provided we do not draw upon their funds without their consent. That all may work in harmony, it is agreed that the entire list of appropriations made by the Committee of this Society shall be sent to London immediately after the Annual Meeting of the Union for examination, and if need be revision, which will allow three months to elapse before any action on the appropriation will be required. "2. As to the connection of this Society with the Congregational Union of Canada, it is to be understood that although the committee are chosen by the Union, and its reports are laid before that body, yet association with it is not necessary to participation in its work and advantages. Churches and ministers may appropriately aid and be aided by the Society, supposing them Congregational churches and ministers, though for reasons satisfactory to them, they are not members of the Union. The design is to secure unimpeded action on the part of the Missionary Society in connection with the advantage of counsel, co-operation, and review supplied by the Annual Conference of the Pastors and Churches in Congregational Union assembled. "3. According to the arrangements under which the Society is acting, the Local District Committees are organizations of great importance, having in fact the chief responsibility in working out the objects of the Society

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
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This report includes the Indian Mission, then in charge of the Rev. Ludwick Kribs, and indicates that, although the payments to missionaries, as well as the accounts of the different Societies, were of diverse dates, such adjustment had been made as to place the treasuries West and East on an equal footing at the period of union. The lack of uniformity in date, however, rendered needful the statement that "the payments reported were in the majority of cases for nine months, while in others they are for twelve, and in two or three for fifteen months. It should also be noted that because of the connection of the Indian Mission, there is included in the receipts for the year nearly \$400 received from the United States in aid of it. This continued for several years until the Indian Mission was detached from this Society, at the request of the Colonial Missionary Society, inasmuch as its Constitution restricted its field to non-heathen peoples.

I place below, in a tabulated form, the figures which may be needful to complete this sketch, but may here note that among the churches mentioned in the first report as receiving aid are the names of some of our strongest and most prosperous ones, which have not only been for many years self-supporting, but have also contributed largely to all our denominational objects. The Indian Mission was detached from this Society after the third year of its existence and was thenceforward separately managed. At the Annual Meeting held at Brantford, Ont., June 1858, there was presented an overture from the Congregational Union of Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick : " That this Union, being convinced of the importance of bringing the churches into missionary connection with those of Canada, proposes that the missionary operations of these Provinces be united with those of the Canadian Congregational Missionary Society, delegates being appointed hence to the Congregational Union of that Province, and local Committees appointed here as there." There had been a visit to the Maritime Provinces the previous year, at the request of the Colonial Missionary Society, by Thomas M. Taylor, Esq., of this city, and myself, and a very careful examination of the position of the churches and Union was carried through. This led to the overture above mentioned. After consideration of the overture, a resolution was adopted to place the work in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick under the supervision of this Society in the manner proposed in the overture, provided that the whole expense thereof be borne by the local funds, and the grants of the Colonial Missionary Society. The first report from this, our fifth district, appears in June 1859. At the eighth annual meeting held at Kingston, in June 1861, an important letter was laid before it in relation to the work of this Society, dated, "Colonial Missionary Society, Blomfield, St., May 21, 1861." It is printed with the reply of the Union, in an appendix to the Minutes of the Union. The attention of the churches is called to the augmented drafts for funds on that Society, and the need of some change of plan. The remarks of a writer, " E"., in the *Canadian Independent* are cited as bearing

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out the views of the Society; and the propriety of a sliding scale in the amount of grants was indicated. The reply deprecated a sliding scale, disputed the views of "E" calling attention to the more accurate estimate of "K. M. F.," in the next number of the magazine and closed with certain suggestions for consideration, when Rev. F. H. Marling, and myself, appointed to visit the committee in London, should fulfil that appointment. Mention is made in the tenth Report, of the visits of the above deputation without expense to the Society, not together however, one having gone to England in 1861, and the Secretary-Treasurer in 1862. Pleasant relations are here noted, but also that while the *status quo* would be maintained for the present, modification must be looked for in the early future.

At the 12th Annual Meeting held at Toronto, June, 1865, the arrangement was carried into effect which closed the accounts in April instead of July ; a fact which affects the amount of expenditure that year as recorded in the tabulated statement.

At this meeting a revolution was brought about in the Society's mode of procedure, and in the nature of its dependence on the Colonial Missionary Society. We were favoured with the presence of the Secretary of that Society, the late Rev. J. L. Poore, also of the late Rev. George Smith, D.D. of Poplar, London. The Constitution of the Society was reconstructed, its name changed to that of the Congregational Missionary Society of British North America-it was detached from the Congregational Union, and made a society of subscribers of one dollar and upwards, and instead of, as heretofore, our bills on London being for a variable sum per annum according as the contributions of our churches came short of the expenditure upon the missionary work, they were to be for a fixed sum to be proportioned to our own liberality. The several papers, reports and discussions of this important meeting are too long for insertion here. They will be found in the Society's twelfth Report, and in the Canadian Independent, July, 1865, pp. 33-40. Messrs. Poore and Smith visited as many of the churches, as they could reach during their stay in the country, seeking to incite them to holy zeal and liberality in giving. The pages of the *Canadian Independent*, *July 1866* must be referred to for an account of a debate at the next Annual Meeting, on a motion having in view a return to the former plan of a local Society under Canadian management, leaving the Colonial Missionary Society to administer in the country by such agency as it saw fit. It is interesting only as correcting mistakes into which some had fallen, as to the sentiments of the Secretary and Committee in England. The motion was withdrawn, and the Society's grant of \pounds_{500} sterling, gratefully accepted. The substance of the discussion will be found also in the thirteenth Annual Report of the Society ; while the next report mentions "the recent decease in Australia, away from the partner of his life, and in the midst of his self-sacrificing colonial work, of the Rev. J. L. Poore, the Secretary of the Society. Gradually and peacefully did he fall asleep in Jesus, sustained throughout his illness and in dying, by the Master whom he loved and served." The fifteenth Annual Meeting held at Hamilton, June, 1868, was the occasion on which changes were made in the Constitution, and notably in the *personel* of the Home Secretaries. The name was again changed, and


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
Colonial Mission-Secretary of that eorge Smith, D.D. the Society became the "Canada Congregational Missionary Society." The Home Secretary from the commencement, the Rev. K. M. Fenwick, resigned his office, and the Rev. J. G. Manly was appointed in his stead. The following resolution was adopted by a standing vote :—Resolved, "That the cordial thanks of this Society are due, and are hereby given, to the Rev. K. M. Fenwick, for the long and faithful services rendered by him in the capacity of Home Secretary." The record further notes : "Dr. Wilkes explained that the interior administration of the Society's affairs had been mainly organized by Mr. Fenwick, and had been conducted by him with much skill and energy since the formation of the Society." The names of the Districts were changed to "Ontario Western," "Ontario Middle," "Ontario Eastern," "Quebec," "Nova Scotia and New Brunswick," having reference to the creation of the Dominion of Canada by the confederation of the several British North American Provinces.

At the meeting in Toronto, June, 1870, the proposal was negatived, that in the district reports the amount of grants made to the several mission churches be stated in loco, as also the amount raised by them, but a resolution was adopted, "That each district committee appoint a subcommittee of inquiry, who shall visit the churches aided by the Society, that have for some time received grants without diminution in their amount, and still ask for help, to see whether anything additional may be done for the more successful working of their finances." The following year the remark is made that "There cannot be complete independence, though there may be Congregationalism, on the part of a church which depends on a Missionary Society for pecuniary aid. That Society, by its grant, establishes a claim to inquire into the working of the institution, a right to require the labours of the pastor outside his own pastoral charge for the general interest, and a duty to tender its advice as to management in all things which may directly or indirectly affect the state of its funds. When self-supporting only, can a church be regarded as strictly independent; when not so, it ought to be to some extent under tutors and governors." June 6, 1872.—The decision of the Colonial Missionary Society was announced to reduce the Canadian grant at the rate of \pounds_50 per annum. Whereupon it was resolved, 1. That this Society respectfully acknowledges the receipt of the communication from the C. M. S., of date 2nd May, and takes note of its intimation of present and future diminution of its grant. 2. That the thanks of this Society are cordially renewed to the C. M. S., for long-continued liberal aid. 3. That in the present and immediately prospective circumstances of this Society, it sees no prospect of being able to undertake work in Manitoba and British Columbia, and that as a consequence, responsibility regarding Congregational work there must be left to the Colonial Missionary Society. It was also reported that, during the year, at the request of the Secretary of the C. M. S., I had obtained from all our fields of labour precise statistical information, by means of a circular containing nine questions; and that the results had been placed in a book under proper heads for future reference and as a permanent document; and that the book has been sent to the office in London. In June, 1873, the act of incorporation of the Society by the Legislature of Ontario was duly reported, and the Society was constituted under

(See Year Book No. 1, pages 8 and 9 of the report of this Society.) A committee was appointed to consider what steps should be taken to bring disused Congregational church property into the hands of this Society as now incorporated. The unusual feature in our reports occurred this year, of acknowledging two legacies, the first of \$100 by the late Robert Craig, Esq., of Lanaık, and the second by the late Thomas Fletcher, Esq., of Beverley, of \$1,500. The portion of the latter received (\$750) was ordered to be made a special reserve fund, and was not placed among the receipts of the year.

At the meeting, Toronto, June 1874, the Constitution was amended. and the by-laws, and the whole placed on record. (Year Book No. 2, pp. 104-5.) The important step was taken of detaching Rev. John Wood from pastoral work, and constituting him Home Secretary, Superintendent of the Missionary work of the Society, and Editor of the Canadian Independent. It was further resolved, after considering the following minute of last year, "That the original statement be reaffirmed, with the instruction that the district committees always allow it to have full weight in their deliberations on any given case." And further, "That the general committee be requested to prepare a course of reading and study for such cases as are alluded to in the above motion." The following is the minute agreed to, June 1873: "Whereas it is desirable to guard against the hasty introduction to pastorates of young men who are precluded from taking a regular collegiate course, Be it resolved, that in the opinion of this Society, such young men should not be ordained untill they have laboured three consecutive years in connection with this Society, and prosecuted a course of reading and study under the supervision of a district missionary committee, such course of study having been prescribed by the general committee." The Annual Meeting of the present year was encouraged by the marked beneficial effects of the vigorous movements of the new Superintendent, Rev. John Wood. His report will be found in this number of the Year Book, in its proper place. The Society has now accepted the proposal of the Colonial Missionary Society to make us a grant amounting to twenty per cent. of our own contributions. As therefore we enlarge our gifts, we secure proportionally a greater amount from our friends in England to enable us to carry forward our important work. The following table will show the number of names annually to whom payments have been made, not always, however, for a whole year, and sometimes including the vacation work of Theological students-the amount expended annually from the beginning of the Society's existence, and the amount each year raised among ourselves directly for our Missionary work, and that received from the Colonial Missionary Society.





A BRIEF VIEW OF THE OPERATIONS OF CONGREGATIONAL SOCIETIES.

The London Missionary Society.

This Society, founded in the year of our Lord 1795, has been from the beginning a non-denominational Society, its sole object being "to spread the knowledge of Christ among heathen and other unenlightened nations." Its fundamental principle is described in the third article of its Constitution as "not to send Presbyterianism, Independency, Episcopacy, or any other form of church order and Government," to the heathen, but "the glorious Gospel of the Blessed God." To this principle it has steadily adhered, although one after another of the British Churches has withdrawn from it to form its own separate Missionary Society. It is now, in fact, though not in name, the Congregational Foreign Mission of Great Britain.

Its receipts for last year were £115,909, stg., (about \$550,000). It has in its employ 155 Missionaries, besides 84 native ordained Missionaries and Pastors, 2 Female Missionaries, and 2 Missionary Pastors, together with nearly 3,000 native preachers. It has 8 principal Missions,



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denominated respectively: — The China. North India, South India, Travancore, Madagascar, South Africa, West Indies, and Polynesian Missions. Its success in the South Sea Islands, and more recently in Madagascar, has been truly marvellous.

AMERICAN BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Like the London Missionary Society, this is really a Congregational Mission. It was organized in 1810, and has just held its sixty-sixth Annual Meeting in Chicago, Ill. It has 19 Missions, with 72 stations, and 497 out-stations; 151 ordained Missionaries, 7 Medical Missionaries, 4 Male Assistant Missionaries, and 214 Female Missionaries; or a total of 376 sent out by the Society. It has also 1,005 native pastors, preachers, teachers, and helpers, making a total of 1,381. 222 Churches have been organized, with a membership of 10,604. The income for the year just closed was \$438,787, besides \$29,833 for work in "nominally Christian Lands."

THE AMERICAN HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

As its name imports, this Society finds its sphere of operations in the United Sates. It was organized May 12, 1826. It is non-sectarian in Constitution, but is now the recognized Domestic Missionary Society of the Congregational Churches of the American Republic. Income for 1874-5, \$313,619. Number of Ministers of the Gospel in the service of the Society, 969. These are distributed as follows :—In the New England States, 292; Middle States, 67; Southern States, 7; Western States and Territories, including 38 on the Pacific Coast, 586. The number of congregations and Missionary districts thus supplied with the preaching of the Gospel, was 2,223. The Report states that "after much negotiation with the Board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church, a joint declaration of principles and plans of action was adopted and published in September last," which the Committee believe to be "an important step toward increased harmony and efficiency in Missionary effort among the various branches of the one Household of Faith."

AMERICAN MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION.

This Association, formed Sept. 3, 1846, finds its sphere of operations among the Freedmen of the Southern States, the Indians, and the Chinese on the Pacific Coast. It was preceded by four recently established Missionary organizations, which were subsequently merged into it. They were the result of a growing dissatisfaction with the comparative silence of the older Missionary Societies in regard to Slavery, and were a protest against it. These were known respectively as the "Amistad Committee;" the "Union Missionary Society" which was formed "to discountenance Slavery, and especially by refusing to receive the known fruits of unrequited labour;" the "Committee for West India Missions," organized in 1837, as a self-supporting mission among the emancipated slaves in Jamaica; and the "Western Evangelical Missionary Society," formed in 1843, by the Western Reserve (Ohio) Association, with the primary object (

Combining all these aims, it has since Emancipation, devoted its main efforts to preparing the Freedmen for their duties as citizens and Christians in America and as missionaries in Africa. And as closely related to this, it seeks to benefit the caste-persecuted Chinese in America, and to co-operate with the Government in its humane and Christian policy towards the Indians. It has also missions among the liberated blacks in the West Indies; and a mission in Africa. It has 7 chartered Universities; 17 graded or Normal Schools; and 13 other schools. Teachers and Missionaries in its service :—Among the Freedmen, 250; among the Chinese, 17; among the Indians, 20; in foreign lands, 29; total, 316. Students—In Theology, 76; in College Course, 46; in Chartered Institutions, 1,905; in other schools, 9,839; total, 11,744. Indians under the care of the Association, 13,000. Its income for 1873-4 was \$344,085; expenditure, \$423,842.

AMERICAN CONGREGATIONAL UNION.

Unlike the Sister Unions of Ontario and Quebec, and of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, the American Congregational Union has for its leading object the promotion of the interests of the Churches of the Denomination, "by devising and recommending to the public, plans of co-operating in building meeting-houses and parsonages," towards which it renders aid by gift, or grant, or by loan, either with or without security. It also provides, or assists in providing, parochial or pastoral libraries, and collects, preserves, and publishes "authentic information concerning the history, condition, and continued progress of the Congregational Churches in all parts of the country, with their affiliated institutions," &c. It began its work in 1853, since which time it has received and expended on its various schemes about \$750,000. It has aided during that period in the erection of 873 houses of worship, in 34 States and Territories. The average amount paid on each of these, including loans, exceptional grants, and special appropriations, has been \$629.96. Its receipts for 1873-4 were \$70,741; expenditure, \$64,277.

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

CONGREGATIONAL PUBLISHING SOCIETY.

The forty-third Annual Report of this Society, presented May 27, 1875, at Boston, Mass., shows a total income for the year of \$95,006, or a total of sales of \$139,538. Its chief object is "to print, publish, procure, sell, and circulate such books, tracts, and periodicals, as are adapted to explain and advance the distinctive doctrines and precepts of the Gospel, illustrate a genuine Christian experience, and in enterprises of Christian activity, and support the Congregational faith and polity, as professed and defended by our Puritan ancestors in New England, and by the Orthodox Congregational Churches of the United States."

The National Council

Of the Congregational Churches of the United States, held its second session in New Haven, Conn., September 30th to October 4th, 1874, under the presidency of the Hon. Lafayette S. Foster, of Norwich, Conn. The



proceedings were opened by a very able sermon from the Rev. Dr. R. S. Storrs, of Brooklyn, N. Y. on the relations of Science and Religion. About three hundred Delegates were present, representing Churches and Associations in nearly every State and Territory in the Union.

THE ENGLISH CONGREGATIONAL MEMORIAL HALL.

The proposal to build a Congregational Hall and Library in London, which should become the Head Quarters of all our great Religious Societies and the depository of our denominational Literature, has been before the British Churches for over ten years past. But the carrying out of the project was long delayed by the difficulty of finding a freehold site of sufficient size, in a convenient and central position in the metropolis. At last, about two years ago, the attention of the Committee having the matter in charge having been called to a vacant space of ground in Farringdon street, which had formed part of the site of the Fleet Prison, and in the centre of the city, negotiations were opened with the proprietors which ended in the purchase of 9,000 feet of freehold land, with 83 feet fronting from the main road, aud 32 feet to old Fleet Lane, having a depth of about 100 feet, at a cost of \pounds , 28,000. No site could have been more appropriate for such an erection as that which was proposed to be placed upon it, for, to quote from the *Times*' account of the opening services—"The building stands upon ground which is consecrated to Nonconformity by sacred and venerable memories of the days of persecution and tyranny. It occupies a portion of what, till within quite our own days, was the "Fleet Prison." In the Fleet Prison, as we read in history, some of the earliest martyrs of Independency were immured and from its gates, two hundred years ago and more, several of them were led forth to suffer on the scaffold. For example, Whitgift's comptroller, in stating the nature of the indictment against Barrowe and Greenwood, narrates how they were brought before the Star Chamber in 1586, and " enlarged upon bond, but all in vain, for, after their liberty, they burst into further extremities, and were again committed to the Fleet, July 20, 1588, where they published their scandalous and seditious writings, for which they were proceeded against, at Justice Hall, near Newgate." From the Fleet, in 1590, Greenwood issued his answer to Giffard, signing himself, "Christ's poor afflicted prisoner in the Fleet at London, for the truth of the Gospel." Then he and Barrowe were tied to a cart and borne to Tyburn. To the Fleet Johnston was committed in 1593, and thence issued the memorial from the various Independent prisoners in the London gaols, stating their "miserable usage," "laden with as many irons as they could bear," "aged men and aged women, and young maidens" being confined for years among the vilest prisoners. Later on, in 1637, Prynne, Bastwick, and Bourton were committed by Laud to the Fleet, whence they were taken to the pillory, branded with hot irons, and their ears cut off; then sent back again to the fleet, and thence to their respective prisoners.



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

At aving the matter in Farringdon son, and in the roprietors which 83 feet fronting aving a depth of Few students of Church history will have forgotten how the crowd lined the streets and roads of London and its suburbs, "from the Fleet even till beyond Highgate," when Prynne was conveyed thence io Lancaster Castle. Such is the ground trodden by these men's feet and watered by their tears, upon which the Congregationalists of England have erected their "Memorial Hall."

The corner-stone was laid during the Annual meetings of the Congregational Union, on the 10th of May, 1873, by Mr. J. R. Mills, in the presence of the leading members of the Union, the late Ven. Rev. T. Binney offering up prayer on the occasion, and Dr. Halley delivering the address.

On Tuesday, January 19th, of the present year, (1875), the Hall was formally dedicated with most interesting and appropriate services. Mr. J. Remington Mills occupied the chair, and after the opening hymn had been announced by Rev. Dr. Allon, and the offering of the dedicatory prayer by Dr. Stoughton, addressed the assembly, reciting the difficulties which had surrounded the project, and congratulating them on their success. The Report of the Committee says:—

"When the Congregational Union of England and Wales resolved to commemorate the fidelity to conscience which was shown by the ejected ministers of 1662, it was scarcely to be expected that a sum of $\pounds_{250,000}$ -a quarter of a million of money—would be raised for the various objects of that commemoration. Yet that sum was contributed, and the Union then publicly expressed its thankfulness to God 'for such a noble proof of Christian sympathy' with the great principles of civil and religious freedom which the commemoration had called forth. "One of the special objects of the Bicentenary subscription was the erection of a Memorial Hall and Library, with offices for the use of the various societies connected with the denomination in London. This scheme was confided to the trustees of the Congregational Library, with additions to their number from the Bicentenary Committee; and in carrying it out, they were enabled, by the sale of the lease of the old library buildings, to give about \pounds 9,000 towards the support of the new undertaking. In their appeal for subscriptions, the committee, having set forth a plan and assumed its success, said, 'Here our Congregational Union meetings can be held; here our religious societies may assemble; here special religious services may be promoted, and all the interests of our common Christianity advanced.'" The edifice, says the *Times*, "towers grandly over the surrounding buildings to the height of about 160 feet. The style adopted by the architects (Messrs. Tarring and Son, of Basinghall street,) is the kind usually termed "decorated," from the richness of its ornamentation. The front of the building towards Farringdon-street is eighty-four feet in width, and its back abuts upon the arches of the London, Chatham, and Dover Railway. It consists of a lofty central gable, flanked by a lofty tower on the south angle, and by another smaller tower on the north. The principal entrance is under the south tower; while the entrance to the basement with external stairs is arranged under an arcade at the base of the smaller tower at the northern angle. The ground floor has three windows of two lights each, with pointed segmental heads; the two floors above are lit by

ranges of single and double light windows with pointed arches and with a three-sided "oriel" window, of a very elaborate pattern, in the centre, harmonising with both tiers. The fourth range of windows consists of lofty lights in the centre of the gable, giving ample light to the large hall, and of windows of corresponding height and treatment in the flanking towers. All the lights are "cusped," and their stone-heads, as well as the arches enclosing them, are adorned with very bold mouldings, tracery of the "decorated" period, and of geometrical pattern, being introduced into the windows of the upper range. The jambs are also moulded, and red granite shafts are freely employed, giving a sense of relief and lightness. The capitals, mouldings, and strings of this front are generally enriched with most effective carving.

The centre gable is surmounted at its apex by a lofty canopy, with a niche to contain a statue ; and some idea of the scale of the building may be gathered from a statement made to us that the top of this canopy is 150 feet from the ground below, though 10 or 20 feet lower than the summit of the principal or southern tower. This tower is gabled on each side, and has elegant pinnacles at each of its four angles. The roof of this tower is of slate, finished with a light cresting of iron. The whole of the work up to the plinth is faced with granite, and the remainder of the front with limestone from quarries in Devonshire, the dressed work being of Portland stone throughout. The whole of the basement consists of a range of lofty vaults on the ground floor; portions of the upper floors are arranged as offices, nearly thirty in number, to be used by the various societies in connection with the Congregational body. There is a large board-room on the first floor, on which is also the library—a handsome and spacious apartment, 57 feet by 46 feet, and 27 feet high. Its ceiling is formed into panels by moulded timbers supported by circular ribs, which spring from four massive iron columns. The ceiling and the columns supporting it will be finished and decorated in an artistic manner in polychrome, and the room will be fitted with large bookcases in harmony and keeping with the building of which they form a part. The hall, properly so-called, which is upon the second floor is 86 feet long, by 46 feet wide, and 42 feet in height, measured up to the highest point of the boarded ceiling. It is lighted principally by traceried windows at either end, and the walls are faced throughout with bath stone. Along each side runs a narrow gallery, and a wider gallery at the end towards Farringdon-street, the platform being placed at the opposite end. The roof is open half-way up; the timbers being boldly moulded, the spandrills filled in with cusping, and the boarded ceiling divided into panels by moulded ribs. The whole of the corridors, the library, the staircases, and the hall are -or. at all events, are claimed to be-of fireproof construction. The principal staircase, which is in the south-western angle of the building, presents several novel features, among which the most noticeable is the open arcade, around which the stairs are arranged. There is also a second staircase at the north-eastern angle. The corridors, staircases, &c., are spacious, and the building is well lighted throughout. It is heated all over by hot water, and special provision is made for the ventilation of the hall and the library. In the hall is already placed a handsome painted




The English *Independent* adds,—In the library is a memorial window, at present only partially completed. It will contain full length portraits of John Bunyan, John Milton, John Howe, and Richard Baxter ; and medallion portraits of the late Rev. Dr. George, Smith, of Poplar (whose widow, and father-in-law. Mr. S. Morley, M. P., are the donors of the memorial), Dr. Binney, Dr. Vaughan, and Dr. Pye Smith. There have since been placed there full length portraits of Mr. J. R. Mills, and Mr. Samuel Morley, M.P., and one of the Rev. Dr. Raleigh is soon to follow.

THE AMERICAN CONGREGATIONAL HOUSE.

With similar objects in view, American Congregationalists have erected a very handsome building, known as the "Congregational House," in Boston, on the corner of Beacon and Somerset streets, and dedicated it, with appropriate services, February 12th 1873. Addresses were delivered on the occasion by the Hon. E. S. Tobey, President of the American Congregational Association, the Rev. Dr. Wm. Ives Buddington, of Brooklyn, N.Y., the late Rev. Dr. Kirk, of Boston, Governor Washburn of Massachusetts, and other distinguished gentlemen. The building has a frontage of 103 feet on Beacon street, and 93 feet on Somerset street. "On entering the house from Beacon street, the first door on the right, at the head of the stairs, opens into the beautiful rooms of the Woman's Board; the second door leads to the Librarian's room, and directly in front is the entrance to the Library; turning to the left, passing three large parlors, you reach the room of the Treasurer of the A. B. C. F. M.; turning to the right you come to the large room, occupied by his clerks; thence to the business office of the "Congregationalist" on the left, and its mailing department on the right. The third floor furnishes rooms for the Secretaries of the Board, editor of "Herald," Prudential committee, museum, clerk and copyist of the board, City Missionary Society, American Congregational Union, American Missionary Association, and Massachusetts Home Missionary Society. The fourth floor has Pilgrim Hall, general committee and ministerial conference room,-which, together, have the capacity of seating six hundred persons,—the American Peace Society, editors of the "Congregationalist," and two large rooms which are temporarily occupied with a part of the Congregational Library. The fifth floor, fronting on Somerset street, is occupied by Thomas Todd, Esq., for composition and printing. The janitor lives in well-furnished rooms in the attic of what was the Gardner House. The Congregational Publishing Society occupies the store on the corner of Beacon and Somerset streets, and the two rooms upon the first floor fronting on Somerset street are the office of the "Missionary Herald," and the packing-room of the American Board. There has also recently been opened, in Boston, a building to be known as "Hitchcock Hall," which is to be the headquarters of the Con-

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gregational Library in that city. The room is described as an oval of about 43x60 feet, and is 40 feet high from the floor to the ceiling. This height is divided by four balconies into five divisions, each having ten alcoves. It has already 8,284 running feet of shelving, with a capacity for 75,000 volumes. When shelved to its full capacity, it can receive nearly 50,000 volumes more. The library of the Association, numbering 20,000 bound volumes and 65,000 pamphlets, will immediately be placed on the shelves ; also the missionary library of the American Board, which numbers about 7,000 volumes. Dr. Dexter, in his address, urged that every Congregational author should furnish one copy of every book or pamphlet which he publishes, to the library ; that every Congregational editor ought to give a full file of his paper ; and that every Congregationalist ought to send in all the books and manuscripts which he does not need, and which are worth preserving.





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
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A DECLARATION

OF THE

FAITH, CHURCH ORDER AND DISCIPLINE

OF THE

CONGREGATIONAL OR INDEPENDENT CHURCHES.

ADVERTISEMENT.

As there was reason to believe that the opinions of the Congregational Dissent ers had been greatly misunderstood and even misrepresented, and that a large body of their countrymen supposed them to be either Unitarians or Methodists, the attention of the brethren assembled at the general meeting of the CONGREGA-TIONAL UNION, held in London, May 11, 1832, was invited to the subject, and they were requested to deliberate on the best methods of disabusing the public mind. A DECLARATION of Faith and Church Order was suggested, and the draught of such a document was submitted for their consideration. On a business of such moment, it was determined, however, first to consult the Ministers and Churches of the respective County and District Associations, whether, in accordance with the example of their Nonconformist ancestors, it were desirable to publish a Declaration of the leading articles of their faith and practice; and whether, if deemed advisable, that Declaration should be made by such a statement as that which had been presented to them. The proposed Declaration was accordingly appended to the printed Report of the Meeting, and in that form submitted for the consideration of the County and District Associations, and was by them generally approved. On Friday, May 10th, 1833, the Declaration, as revised by the Committee appointed for that purpose, was presented to the Annual Assembly, and by that meeting was unanimously adopted "as the Declaration of the Congregational Body, with the distinct understanding, that it was not intended as a Test or Creed for Subscription," but simply as a summary of "what is commonly believed" by the Congregational Churches.

DECLARATION.

THE CONGREGATIONAL Churches in England and Wales, frequently called INDE⁻ PENDENT, hold the following Doctrines, as of Divine authority, and as the foun⁻ dation of Christian faith and practice.


They are also formed and governed according to the principles hereinafter stated.

PRELIMINARY NOTES.

1. It is not designed, in the following summary, to do more than to state the leading doctrines of faith and order maintained by Congregational Churches in general.

2. It is not proposed to offer any proofs, reasons, or arguments, in support of the doctrines herein stated, but simply to declare what the denomination believes to be taught by the pen of inspiration.

3. It is not intended to present a scholastic or critical confession of faith, but

merely such a statement as any intelligent member of the body might offer, as containing its leading principles.

4. It is not intended that the following statement should be put forth with any Authority, or as a standard to which assent should be required.

5. Disallowing the utility of Creeds and Articles of religion as a bond of union, and protesting against subscription to any human formularies, as a term of communion, Congregationalists are yet willing to declare, for general information, what is commonly believed among them; reserving to every one the most perfect liberty of conscience.

6. Upon some minor points of doctrine and practice, they, differing among themselves, allow to each other the right to form an unbiassed judgment of the word of God.

7. They wish it to be observed, that, notwithstanding their jealousy of subscription to Creeds and Articles, and their disapproval of the imposition of any human standard, whether of faith or discipline, they are far more agreed in their doctrines and practices than any church which enjoins subscription, and enforces a human standard of orthodoxy; and they believe that there is no minister and no church among them that would deny the substance of any one of the following doctrines of religion, though each might prefer to state his sentiments his own way.

PRINCIPLES OF RELIGION.

I. The Scriptures of the Old Testament, as received by the Jews, and the books of the New Testament, as received by the Primitive Christians from the Evangelists and Apostles, Congregational Churches believe to be divinely inspired, and of supreme authority. These writings, in the languages in which they were originally composed, are to be consulted, by the aids of sound criticism, as a final appeal in all controversies; but the common version they consider to be adequate to the ordinary purposes of Christian instruction and edification. II. They believe in One God, essentially wise, holy, just, and good; eternal, infinite, and immutable, in all natural and moral perfections; the Creator, Supporter, and Governor of all beings, and of all things. III. They believe that God is revealed in the Scriptures, as the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and that to each are attributable the same Divine properties and perfections. The doctrine of the Divine existence, as above stated, they cordially believe, without attempting fully to explain. IV. They believe that man was created after the Divine image, sinless, and in his kind perfect. V. They believe that the first man disobeyed the Divine command, fell from his state of innocence and purity, and involved all his posterity in the consequences of that fall. VI. They believe that therefore all mankind are born in sin, and that a fatal inclination to moral evil, utterly incurable by human means, is inherent in every descendant of Adam. VII. They believe that God having, before the foundation of the world, designed to redeem fallen man, made disclosures of his mercy, which were the grounds of faith and hope from the earliest ages. VIII. They believe that God revealed more fully to Abraham the covenant of his grace ; and, having promised that from his descendants should arise the Deliverer and Redeemer of mankind, set that patriarch and his posterity apart, as a race specially favoured and separated to his service; a peculiar church, formed and carefully preserved, under the Divine sanction and government, until the birth of the promised Messiah.

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IX. They believe, that, in the fulness of the time, the Son of God was manifested in the flesh, being born of the Virgin Mary, but conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit; and that our Lord Jesus Christ was both the Son of man, and believers to a stat through constant f

the Son of God; partaking fully and truly of human nature, though without sin, -equal with the Father, and "the express image of his person."

X. They believe that Jesus Christ, the Son of God, revealed, either personally in his own ministry, or by the Holy Spirit in the ministry of his apostles, the whole mind of God, for our salvation ; and that, by his obedience to the Divine law while he lived, and by his sufferings unto death, he meritoriously "obtained eternal redemption for us ;" having thereby vindicated and illustrated Divine justice, "magnified the law," and "brought in everlasting righteousness."

XI. They believe that, after his death and resurrection, he ascended up into heaven, where, as the Mediator, he "ever liveth" to rule over all, and to "make intercession for them that come unto God by him."

XII. They believe that the Holy Spirit is given in consequence of Christ's mediation, to quicken and renew the hearts of men; and that his influence is indispensably necessary to bring a sinner to true repentance to produce saving faith, to regenerate the heart, and to perfect our sanctification.

XIII. They believe that we are justified through faith in Christ. as "the Lord our righteousness;" and not "by the works of the Law."

XIV. They believe that all who will be saved were the objects of God's eternal and electing love, and were given by an act of Divine sovereignty to the Son of God; which in no way interferes with the system of means, nor with the grounds of human responsibility; being wholly unrevealed as to its objects, and not a rule of human duty.

XV. They believe that the Scriptures teach the final perseverance of all true believers to a state of eternal blessedness, which they are appointed to obtain through constant faith in Christ, and uniform obedience to his commands.

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i of God was maniived by the power of ie Son of man, and XVI. They believe that a holy life will be the necessary effect of a true faith, and that good works are the certain fruits of a vital union to Christ.

XVII. They believe that the sanctification of true Christians, or their growth in the graces of the Spirit, and meetness for heaven, is gradually carried on through the whole period during which it pleases God to continue them in the present life; and that, at death, their souls perfectly freed from all remains of evil, are immediately received into the presence of Christ.

XVIII. They believe in the perpetual obligation of Baptism and the Lord's Supper : the former to be administered to all converts to Christianity and their children, by the application of water to the subject, " in the name of the Father and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost ;" and the latter to be celebrated by Christian churches as a token of faith in the Saviour, and of brotherly love.

XIX. They believe that Christ will finally come to judge the whole human race, according to their works; that the bodies of the dead will be raised again; and that, as the Supreme Judge, he will divide the righteous from the wicked, will receive the righteous into "life everlasting," but send away the wicked into "everlasting punishment."

XX. They believe that Jesus Christ directed his followers to live together in Christian fellowship, and to maintain the communion of saints; and that, for this purpose, they are jointly to observe all Divine ordinances, and maintain that church order and discipline, which is either expressly enjoined by inspired institution, or sanctioned by the undoubted example of the apostles and of apostolic churches.

PRINCIPLES OF CHURCH ORDER AND DISCIPLINE.

1. The Congregational Churches hold it to be the will of Christ that true believers should voluntarily assemble together to observe religious ordinances, to promote mutual edification and holiness, to perpetuate and propagate the Gospel in the world, and to advance the glory and worship of God, through Jesus Christ; and that each society of believers, having these objects in view in its formation, is properly a Christian church.

II. They believe that the New Testament contains, either in the form of express statute, in the example and practice of apostles and apostolic churches, all the articles of faith necessary to be believed, and all the principles of order and discipline requisite for constituting and governing Christian societies; and that human traditions, fathers and councils, canons and creeds, possess no authority over the faith and practice of Christians.

III. They acknowledge Christ as the only Head of the Church, and the officers of each church under Him, as ordained to administer His laws impartially to all; and their only appeal, in all questions touching their religious faith and practice, is to the Sacred Scriptures.

IV. They believe that the New Testament authorizes every Christian church to elect its own officers, to manage all its own affairs, and to stand independent of, and irresponsible to, all authority, saving that only of the Supreme and Divine Head of the Church, the Lord Jesus Christ.

V. They believe that the only officers placed by the apostles over individual churches, are the bishops or pastors, and the deacons; the number of these being dependent upon the numbers of the church; and that to these, as the officers of the church, is committed respectively the administration of its spiritual and temporal concerns—subject, however, to the approbation of the church.

V1. They believe that no persons should be received as members of Christian churches, but such as make a credible profession of Christianity, are living according to its precepts, and attest a willingness to be subject to its discipline; and that none should be excluded from the fellowship of the church, but such as deny the faith of Christ, violate his laws or refuse to submit themselves to the discipline which the word of God enforces. VII. The power of admission into any Christian church, and rejection from it, they believe to be vested in the church itself, and to be exercised only through the medium of its own officers. VIII. They believe that Christian churches should statedly meet for the celebration of public worship, for the observance of the Lord's Supper, and for the sanctification of the first day of the week.

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IX. They believe that the power of a Christian church is purely spiritual, and should in no way be corrupted by union with temporal or civil power.


X. They believe that it is the duty of Christian churches to hold communion with each other, to entertain an enlarged affection for each other, as members of the same body, and to co-operate for the promotion of the Christian cause; but that no church, nor union of churches, has any right or power to interfere with the faith or discipline of any other church, further than to separate from such as, in faith or practice, depart from the Gospel of Christ.

XI. They believe that it is the privilege and duty of every church to call forth such of its members as may appear to be qualified by the Holy Spirit, to sustain the office of the ministry; and that Christian churches unitedly ought to consider the maintainance of the Christian ministry in an adequate degree of learning as one of its especial cares; that the cause of the Gospel may be both honourably sustained, and constantly promoted.

XII. They believe that church officers, whether bishops or deacons, should be chosen by the free voice of the church; but that their dedication to the duties of their office should take place with special prayer, and by solemn designation, to which most of the churches add the imposition of hands by those already in office.

XIII. They believe that the fellowship of every Christian church should be so liberal as to admit to communion in the Lord's Supper, all whose faith and godliness are, on the whole, undoubted, though conscientiously differing in points of minor importance; and that this outward sign of fraternity in Christ shoud be co-extensive with the fraternity itself, though without involving any compliances which conscience would deem to be sinful.

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

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
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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

Congregational Anion of Ontario and Quebec.

I. That the name of this Association be "THE CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF ONTARIO AND QUEBEC."

II. That it shall consist of Congregational or Independent Churches, and of Ministers of the same Church Order, who are either in the pastoral office or (being members of Congregational Churches) are engaged in evangelistic or educational service, approved and received at a general meeting.


III. That this Union is founded on a full recognition of the distinctive principle of Congregational Churches, namely the Scriptural right of every separate Church to maintain perfect independence in its government and administration, and, therefore, that the Union shall not assume legislative or administrative authority, or in any case become a court of appeal. promote evangelical religion in connection with the Congregational denomination. 2. To cultivate brotherly affection and co-operation in everything relating to the interests of the associated Churches. 3. To establish fraternal correspondence with similar bodies elsewhere. 4. To address an annual or occasional letter to the associated Churches, accompanied with such information as may be deemed necessary. 5. To obtain accurate statistical information relative to the Congregational Churches throughout the British American Provinces. 6. To hold consultation on questions of interest connected with the cause of Christ in general. V. To promote the accomplishment of these objects, and the general interests of the Union, an annual meeting of its members shall be held, each of the associated Churches being represented by two lay delegates; the meetings to be held at such time and place as may be appointed at each annual meeting.

VI. That the officers of the Union be a Chairman, Secretary-Treasurer, Statistical Secretary, Minute Secretary and Committee, all to be chosen annually from its members, who shall execute the instructions of the Union, and prepare a docket of business for the annual meeting.

VII. That alterations may be made in this constitution by any annual meeting, provided that notice of such alteration has been given at the meeting next preceding.

STANDING RULES.

1. Applications for admission to the Union, whether by churches or ministers, shall be made in writing; and after having been read to the Union, shall be referred to a Standing Committee on membership. Churches so applying shall present the written recommendation of three members of the Union. Ministers bearing regular letters of dismissal from a kindred Congregational organization, and those who furnish evidence of having completed a course of study in the Congregational College of B. N. A., and having been ordained to the ministry, may be received at once on these

grounds. Other ministers shall be required to bring proof of (1) their membership in a Congregational Church; (2) their ordination to the ministry; (3) if they have come from any other denomination, their good standing therein; and they shall satisfy the Membership Committee in relation to their literary acquirements, and their doctrinal and ecclesiastical views.

2. The Union shall meet annually on the Wednesday after the first Sabbath in June, at 7.30, p.m., when the retiring Chairman's address will be delivered.

3. The Union shall then be organized under the presidency of the retiring Chairman. or, failing him, the pastor in the place of meeting, by the election of Minute Secretaries and Reporters, the calling of the Roll, and the appointment of Standing Committees on Business, Membership, Nominations, and Finance, on nomination by the Committee of the Union.

4. On Thursday morning, after the devotional exercises, the new Chairman shall be elected, after nomination by the Committee of the Union, or by any member of the Union.

5. After the election of a new Chairman, the Committee of the Union shall present their annual report.

6. The meetings shall be daily opened and closed with prayer; the morning devotional exercises to extend an hour.

7. No motion shall be discussed unless seconded; no member shall speak twice to the same motion without permission from the chair; and every motion shall be presented in writing by the mover, if required by the chair.

8. The roll shall be called, and the minutes of the preceding day read at the opening of each day's session, and the minutes of the last day at the close of the session.

9. The Church in whose locality the annual meeting shall be held shall be requested to celebrate the Lord's Supper in connection with such meeting.

10. On the Monday evening during the sittings of the Union, a public meeting of the Union shall be held.

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
11. Application shall be made by the Statistical Secretary, one month at least before the annual meeting, for statistics of the several Churches, and a brief narrative of the state of religion among them, that he may prepare a condensed narrative of the whole for the annual meeting, and for publication, if so ordered.

12. A collection for the funds of the Union shall be made annually in each Church, on or near the Lord's day prior to the meeting. From this source, in addition to the other expenses of the Union, the travelling fares, by the cheapest route, of the ministerial members of the Union, and of one delegate from each Church contributing for the year, shall be paid in full, if possible, and of both delegates as soon as the funds suffice; on the understanding that such payment shall not be made until after the final adjournment, except with the leave of the Union.

13. The delegates from the Union to corresponding bodies, who may fail to fulfil their appointments by personal attendance, shall address these bodies by letter, communicating in substance such information and sentiments as they would furnish if present at their annual convocations. LIST OF CONGR

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SUMMARY OF STATISTICS.

SUMMARY OF STATISTICS, 1874.

Sixty-four returns have been made. It is difficult to obtain returns from churches without pastors; though in every case blanks were repeatedly sent by the Secretary. An unusually large amount has been laid out in building and improving places of worship. The admissions to Membership on Profession, though larger than in any previous Report (531), do not include the ingatherings of the last five months, which have been so abundant. Some apparent discrepancies in the figures-such as the totals of "Membership," and the totals of "money raised," are explained by the fact, that in some cases the "totals" only are given in the returns from the churches. In all cases I have verified the additions-sometimes necessarily correcting them; but in two or three instances where the combined number of male and female members did not agree with the "tota!" as given, I have put them down as I found them-supposing the "total" to be correct, and the other an oversight I could not remedy. I have had much trouble with dates. They are in some cases variously reported from year to year. It is hoped our brethren will be careful and correct in these matters; and that they will fill in all figures, instead of making the convenient, but unwelcome note, "see former report." The principal figures are appended, compared with last year.

ABSTRACT OF THE

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

OF THE

CONGREGATIONAL UNION OF NOVA SCOTIA AND NEW BRUNSWICK,

HELD IN BROOKLYN, N. S., SEPTEMBER IOTH-I3TH, 1875.

The Congregational Union of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick commenced its annual session in Brooklyn, N. S., on Friday 10th Sept. The Rev. Charles Duff, the pastor of this church, having removed to Ontario, Mr. Joseph Barker, recently of Bangor Theological Seminary, was in charge as stated supply. After preliminary devotional exercises, the Union organized by the Chairman, the Rev. A. McGregor taking the chair, and ordering the roll call. The following is the roll of the Session.

PERSONAL MEMBERS PRESENT. — Rev. Messrs. S. Sykes, Jacob Whitman, Alex. McGregor, James Shipperley, and Duncan McGregor. Subsequently added.—Rev. William Peacock.

DELEGATES.—Brooklyn and Beachmeadows, Messrs. Henry Smith and Alexander Smith; Chebogue, Wilson Healy; Cornwallis, Jacob W. Cox; Liverpool, W. Anderson and N. McLeod; Maitland and Noel, R. Falconer and J. M. O'Brien; Margaree, William Peacock; Milton, W. H. Freeman and Hon. F. Tupper; Pleasant River, E. H. Burnaby and H. A. Freeman: Sheffield, N. Burpee and Joseph Barker; St. John, H. P. Kerr, and James Woodrow; Yarmouth, W. P. Sterrit and F. Dennis.

HONORARY MEMBERS.—Rev. H. M. Parsons, Delegate from the National Council of Congregational Churches of the United States; Rev. A. J. McLeod, Delegate from the Maine Conference of Congregational Churches; Rev. John Wood, Delegate from the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec; Mr. J. B. Hawes, Maitland; James D. Horton, G. McLeod, Edward McLeod, and Thomas Gardiner, of Brooklyn; and C. H. Whitman, of Milton.

The retiring Chairman, Rev. Alex. McGregor, delivered his address. The subjects referred to had reference mainly to the discouragements arising from the removal of ministers at a later period than that covered by the reports; the encouragements arising from the blessings bestowed upon the churches during the year covered by the reports, in the increase of members; and pointing out the methods to be pursued for future work and success.

The Rev. H. M. Parsons, of Boston, delegate from the National Council of Congregational Churches of the United States, made an address, in which he presented the salutations of the body from which he was a delegate. Other denominations had been combining their forces ; and the Congregational denomination of the United States had felt the need of more spiritual unity among those bearing the Congregational name. The National Council was not indifferent to the progress of the Congregational churches in these Provinces ; and would extend to them their heartfelt sympathy and co-operation. Mr. Parsons closed with a stirring address.

Rev. A. J. McLeod delegate from the Maine Conference of Congregational churches, presented the salutations of the 241 churches with which he was connected.

Mr. James Woodrow followed with an address on faithfulness to Congregational principles, and the maintenance of our position in the face of all obstacles; his closing remarks having reference to Christian work.

Various reports were presented, and routine business transacted.

The election of Officers and Union Committee resulted as follows: —Rev. Duncan McGregor, Chairman; Mr. Joseph Barker, Secretary; Mr. James Woodrow, Treasurer and Statistical Secretary; Rev. Alex. Mc-Gregor, Missionary Secretary; Rev. Simeon Sykes, Rev. James Shipperley; Hon. Freeman Tupper, and Messrs. Freeman Dennis, H. P. Bridges, and William Anderson. This Committee is also by the Act of Incorporation, the Committee for Missionary work.

The report of the Treasurer was presented, and after report of Finance Committee was received.

Voted, That this Union recommends to the cordial support of our Churches the *Canadian Independent* and the *Congregational Year Book*.

Voted, That this Union recommends to each of the Churches that a collection for the Congregational Provident Fund be taken up on the first Sabbath in December.

Voted, That the Secretary be authorized to write a fraternal letter to the pastor of the Congregational Church in St. John's, Newfoundland.

Rev. A. McGregor reported in reference to his visit to the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec; also with reference to his consultation with the Committee of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society, in regard to Missionary operations in the Lower Provinces.

Mr. Charles H. Whitman read a paper on Sabbath Schools and Sabbath School work.

Rev. Jacob Whitman made a statement in reference to the resuscitation of the cause in Manchester, N.S.

On Saturday afternoon, Rev. H. M. Parsons conducted a Bible service. Subject :— "The Good Shepherd." On Monday afternoon Mr. Parsons held another Bible service. Subject :— "Eternal Punishment."

A resolution was adopted urging upon the churches greater activity in the cause of Total Abstinence.

A resolution was adopted expressing interest in the progress and well-being of the Congregational College in Montreal; commending the institution to the generous support of the churches; also recommending the second Sabbath in November as a day of special prayer for the College.

The Rev. Alex. McGregor, in pursuance of a recommendation in his retiring address, introduced a plan for the establishment of a weekly newspaper as the organ of the body, proposing the formation of a Joint Stock Company, with shares of \$50 each. Twenty-two shares were taken up; and it was understood that the practical aspect of the enterprise would be well considered before anything was undertaken.

On Saturday evening the meeting partook largely of a devotional character, the chair being occupied by Freeman Dennis, Esq.

Rev. John Wood, of Toronto, Superintendent of Missions of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society, addressed the meeting. Addresses were also made by Rev. S. Sykes, Rev. A. J. McLeod, Rev. H. M. Parsons, and others.

Mr. J. Woodrow presented the statistical report, showing that the actual increase of membership in the two Provinces over the number reported last year was 104, or 9 per cent. Number of members in connection with the Churches connected with the Union, 1,184; add Milltown, 122. Total in the two Provinces, 1,306, an increase of 60 per cent in 14 years.

The Sabbath day opened with a well attended Prayer Meeting at 10 o'clock ; followed by the Annual Sermon by the Rev. Henry M. Parsons, from Matt. xxviii. 18, 19, 20, and which was delivered to a crowded audience.

In the afternoon, the Rev. William Peacock, of Lanark, Ont., was ordained to the work of the ministry, and as pastor of the church in Margaree, N.S. Mr. Peacock is a graduate of Bangor Theological Seminary, and having a call from the church in Margaree, which call he had accepted, and the church being so far away from other churches, an exceptional case was made of the ordination at the Union, in place of with the church calling the pastor.

After the ordination, the communion of the Lord's Supper was administered to the members of the Congregational Churches of Brooklyn and Beachmeadows, Liverpool, and Milton, the ministers and delegates in attendance on the Unlon, and other Christian friends.

At 7.30 p.m., the Rev. John Wood, of Toronto, preached from Malachi iv. 5, 6, after which there was a brief and interesting Praise Meeting.

On recommendation of the Membership Committee, the name of the Rev. S. G. Dodd was dropped from the roll of personal members, and the name of the Rev. William Peacock added.

Voted, That further action on the paper on Congregationalism presented by Mr. Woodrow at the meeting at Sheffield, be deferred until the result is known of the action of the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec on the proposed manual

The Rev. Alex. McGregor was appointed delegate to the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec ; and the Rev. D. McGregor to the Maine Conference of Congregational Churches.

The Rev. James Shipperley was appointed to preach the Annual sermon next year.

Mr. James Woodrow was requested to prepare a paper for next Annual Meeting on some seasonable topic.

The Rev. Simeon Sykes was appointed to write a paper on "The Temptations to Christians peculiar to the Times."

Rev. John Wood, of Toronto presented the salutations of the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec. The following resolution was unanimously adopted, after an interesting and animated discussion :—

"That this Union hereby records its thankful acknowledgment of God's mercy in sending down copious showers of blessing, all over the Christian world during the past year, and honoring the efforts of laymen and evangelists, especially those honored servants of God, Messrs. Moody and Sankey."

The closing meeting was held Monday evening, 13th September, partaking largely of a Missionary character.

The Rev. Duncan McGregor read an interesting paper on "Indifferentism."

The Rev. James Shipperley gave an account of his work at Pleasant River, N.S.

Mr. Freeman Dennis followed, taking for his subject: "Storing for the cause of God."

Rev. H. M. Parsons followed on the same subject, and in a stirring address advocated the giving of at least one-tenth of the income—not giving to the church or the minister, but to the Lord—using the church as the channel for the gifts—and of giving as an act of worship during the service on the first day of the week.

Addresses were made by Rev. J. Wood, Rev. A. J. McLeod, and others, and a collection was taken up for missions.

Resolutions of thanks, to the friends in Brooklyn for hospitality ; to proprietors of Steam-boat and Railway lines ; and to the various gentlemen who had prepared papers, were adopted.

The meetings of the Union were enlivened by a prayer meeting every morning; and by devotional exercises all through the business sessions.

It was resolved, on motion, that the Union Committee have power to name the place where the meeting of the Union shall be held in 1876; and further, that the time for such meeting shall be the Thursday following the first Sunday in September.

Before the closing of the Union meetings, an invitation was sent to the members and delegates to attend a social gathering in the Congregational Church in Liverpool, on Tuesday evening, 14th September, which was accepted.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE

82

CONSTITUTION.

As amended by the Annual Meeting of Subscribers, at Toronto, Ont., June, 1374.

ART. I.—That the Society be called "The Canada Congregational Missionary Society in connection with the Colonial Missionary Society."

ART. II.—That its object shall be to aid feeble Congregational Churches in sustaining their Ministers; to spread the Gospel, by means of Missionaries, among all classes of inhabitants; and to promote other general missionary objects of the Congregational body.

ART. III.—That all persons subscribing five shillings per annum, shall become Members of this Society; and any person subscribing at one time Twenty Dollars or upwards, shall be an Honorary or Life Member of this Society.

ART. IV.—That the Missionary field shall be divided into such and so many Districts as the Society may from time to time determine; and that for each of these there shall be appointed by the Society from among its members, after nomination, at each Annual Meeting, a District Committee of not more than ten members, with a Secretary-Treasurer; such Committee to consist, as far as practicable, of pastors and members of self-sustaining Churches, and of ministers and laymen in equal numbers. ART. V.—That from each of the several District Committees, there shall be chosen annually by the Society, after nomination, at least three members, such representatives to form together the General Committee; and that there shall also be appointed by the Society annually, after nomination, a General Secretary-Treasurer, who shall receive and distribute the missionary funds, and conduct the correspondence with the Colonial Missionary Society; and a Home-Secretary, who shall correspond with the Churches and the several District Committees.

ART. VI.—That the Annual Meeting of this Society shall be held at the same time and place as that of the Congregational Union of Canada, and during such Annual Session the General Committee shall adjust all the appropriations for the coming year so far as possible.

ART. VII.—That each District Committee, within its own bounds, shall receive and report to the General Committee upon the Annual applications for aid; shall have power to make grants, in special cases, arising between the meetings of the General Committee, to such amounts and on such principles as the latter body may determine; shall attend to the collection of missionary contributions; shall explore unoccupied fields; shall superintend the labors of evangelists; and shall have a general supervision over the missionary work, visiting each missionary field, by deputation, at least once in every year. And that all its proceedings, as they are taken, shall be reported to the officers of the General Committee.

ART. VIII.—That all Churches receiving aid from this Society to sustain their minister, shall be required, as the condition of its continuance, faithfully to fulfil their own engagement towards his support.

ART. IX.—A detailed statement of Missionary affairs shall be made annually to the Colonial Missionary Society.

ART. X.—That this Constitution and the By-Laws may be altered by any Annual Meeting of the Society, one day's notice having been first given to the Society, in writing, of any proposal to that effect.

BY-LAWS.

I. All communications on the subject of grants shall be made by or to the financial representatives of the church or station seeking aid.

2. Applications for aid, in new cases, shall be made one month at least before the Annual Meeting.

3. Every Missionary of this Society shall be in full communion with a Congregarional Church.

4. All the Missionaries shall report once in six monthr to the District-Secretaries respectively, and make a full statistical return annually, according to the prepared forms,

5. In the event of any District-Secretary vacating his office during the year, intervening between the Annual Meetings, the name standing first on the list shall be Convener, and the District Committee is empowered to appoint a successor.

THE TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Society was held, pursuant to announcement, in the Congregational Church, Hamilton, on Thursday, the 10th of June, 1875, at 2.30, P.M. James Wilkes, Esq., of Brantford, was called to the chair, and the Rev. R. Robinson, of Wiarton, acted as Secretary. The Rev. J. A. R. Dickson led in prayer, when, after a few words from the chair, the Rev. Dr. Wilkes read the Annual Report, and a financial statement comparing the income and expenditure of the several districts with those of the previous year. The Rev. John Wood, Home-Secretary, also read a report of his labours for the nine months since his entrance upon his duties as General Superintendent of Missions. On motion of Dr. Wilkes, seconded by Rev. J. Howell, both reports were adopted, and ordered to be printed under direction of the Committee. Dr. Wilkes also nominated, on behalf of the retiring Committee, the Officers and Committee for the ensuing year. The nomination was confirmed. (See page 3.) A discussion then ensued on the best method of conducting and extending our missionary operations, in which several brethren took part. The Rev. Mr. Salmon moved, seconded by Rev. Mr. Unsworth, that the salary of the Home-Secretary be increased by the addition of \$200 a year. The motion was referred to the General Committee, which subsequently reported recommending the increase, and it was accordingly ordered to be made.

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

(a) That the Congregational churches have from the beginning favored the exercise of such "gifts" by the brotherhood at large.

(b) That we thankfully recognize the special blessing which God is bestowing on labours of this kind in our own time.

(c) That the circumstances of our work in Canada are such as to require the services of unordained preachers in opening and keeping up our mission stations.

(d) That such work should always be carried on under the direction of the churches to which the preachers belong, and where needful, in conjunction with the District Committees.

(e) That these resolutions be therefore commended to the practical attention of the churches, and Missionary Committees throughout our fields, from whom this Society requests reports as to any action taken at


(3) That the Home Secretary and the local Secretaries of Ontario be authorized to apply for an Act, empowering them to obtain possession of and sell, where desirable, disused church properties, in accordance with the provisions of the latest edition of the Blank Trust Deed.

(4) That the Society do accept the suggestion of the officers of the Colonial Missionary Society, to make the amount of the future grants to this Society one-fifth of the amount we raise.

The several District Committees and Secretaries were then appointed, the minutes of the Session were read and confirmed, and the Society adjourned (after singing the Doxology, and prayer by the Rev. J. A. R. Dickson,) to meet in Montreal, in June, 1876.

REPORT.

In presenting this twenty-second Annual Report of the Canada Congregational Missionary Society, which is, in fact, the thirty-ninth report of the Home Missionary operations of the denomination to which we belong, the Committee cannot but feel that the past year has been one of the most important and encouraging of its history. Not only has much precious fruit been gathered among the missionary churches, and those which have



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led to the practical es throughout our ny action taken at been planted and fostered by the Society, but a spirit of hopefulness has been manifested by the missionary pastors, largely, it is believed, the effect of the new and more aggressive policy entered upon at the last Annual meeting, that augurs well for the future.

Of late years the impression has been gaining ground in many quarters, that Congregationalism has done its work in Canada, and that like the feebler branches of Methodism, it is ultimately to be absorbed by the larger and more popular ecclesiastical organizations. Our struggle against wind and tide was beginning to be considered fruitless, if not, indeed, objectless. The policy of "consolidation," as it has been called, like an iron band girdling a young and vigorous tree, was threatening the very life of the denomination, and causing a feeling of uneasiness and uncertainty as to the continuance of our work in any given locality, which no spirit, however brave and self-sacrificing, could wholly surmount.

Such a state of things could not be otherwise than most paralyzing in its influence. Growth is an essential condition of life, and to stand still, therefore, was to lose ground at once relatively to other denominations who were outstripping us in the race, and absolutely as the result of such a do-nothing policy. It is easy to see that one great incentive to effort in such a case, is gone. If the ship is inevitably sinking most men will prefer to leave her before she founders entirely.

The policy of extension, however, was adopted at the last Annual Meeting, and is already producing beneficial results, and your Committee have pleasure in reporting and believing that substantial progress has been made, both in consolidating and extending our operations, during the year. The appointment of Mr. Wood to the joint position of Superintendent of Missions and editor of the Canadian Independent, was felt by all who were present at our meeting in Toronto, to be a bold and most important step, but it is believed to have been, uuder the guidance of Divine Providence, a step in the right direction. Mr. Wood's report for the nine months since his entering upon his office, will be laid before you, and will speak for itself. But the Committee feel that the organization of churches at St. Catharines and Elora, of a new congregation at Wiarton, and the prospective formation of a new church at Galt; the closer oversight given to vacant and missionary churches, heretofore impossible, and the assistance rendered by him in special revival services at Manilla. Warwick, Oro, and elsewhere, as well as the advantages arising from his general attention to the wants of the churches and their pastors, by correspondence, fully justifies the action of the Society in the appointment of such an officer. And they would earnestly ask, on his behalf, the prayers of all his brethren in the ministry and out of it, that he may wisely and usefully fill the position, to which by their unanimous choice, they have called him. It is a cause of devout thanksgiving and joy to the Committee to report that the past year has been one of great spiritual blessing to many of the churches of the denomination. Particulars of several extensive religious awakenings will be found in the extracts from the reports of the Missionary Pastors, and in the Narrative of the Churches for 1874-5. So great a blessing ought to be felt to be infinitely more than a reward for all our poor labors and self-denial for the Lord's sake, and ought also to stimulate us all to more earnest and loving consecration to the Lord's

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

It is gratifying also to have to report that notwithstanding the annual decrease of the grant from the Colonial Missionary Society, by $\pounds 50$ sterling, or \$250, the income of the Society is gradually increasing, being this year \$9,046, as against \$8,018 last year, and 7,026 in 1872-3. This includes, of course, a second instalment of the legacy of the late Mr. Thos. Fletcher, of \$600, and \$1,695.55 from the Colonial Society. But the receipts from Canadian sources have increased from \$4,714 in 1873, to \$5,614, or exactly \$900.

Every year, too, some of our churches reach the point of self-support. This year Oro, Manilla, and perhaps one or two more are to be added to the list, while several others apply for diminished amounts, which are in fact repaid almost entirely by their contributions to the Society that assists them. Several of our new movements, however, will involve a heavy expenditure for a time which the Committee have confidence will be cheerfully borne in view of the substantial progress that is being made. Yet they cannot help reflecting how much more might be accomplished if every subscriber of a dollar would give two, and every donor of five dollars would increase his gift to ten !

REPORT OF THE HOME SECRETARY,

My formal entrance upon the work to which I rejoice to believe that the providence of God, no less than the voice of my brethren, called me, at our last annual meeting, dated from the first of September last. I found it impossible, before that date, to relinquish my charge in Brantford, or remove my family to Toronto. It was still a month later before I could obtain possession of the house I had rented, and, of course, far on in October before we had got things around in such a shape that we could think of our new abode as "home." My responsibility for the *Canadian Independent*, however, com-



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ast year, including e of the Soclety, pel of Jesus Christ that His Word to their labours rvest of precious menced immediately upon the publication of the August number, and for the first two months I did my work in great discomfort. It was partly in consequence of these difficulties that the Year Book was so late in being issued, though it was still further delayed by the absence of Dr. Wilkes in England, and the impossibility of completing the missionary report until his return; while that, again, further retarded its publication in consequence of the printers being so pressed with parliamentary work. These explanations are needful, not so much for my own justification, as for the satisfaction of all who subscribed for the Year Book. We hope to be able to issue it in good season this year. There were also several mistakes in regard to the method of its transmission, which will be avoided in future.

The following is a brief outline of my missionary work :----

July 16th I went to Newmarket to endeavour to arrange some of the chronic difficulties that have hindered our work in that place, and report to the District Committee as to the advisableness of continuing the grant. I regret that my visit was apparently unsuccessful, and the grant has ceased.

The next day I went to Alton on a similar mission. Mr. Gray, who had resigned his charge, and was about leaving the field, was asked by the church to reconsider the matter, but, after weighing the question for several weeks, determined to abide by his decision, and left the place. Alton was thus thrown on my hands for supply during the winter. Four Sabbaths were spent there, besides several given to neighbouring brethren, who went to Alton at my request. That station has since been supplied with a pastor, in the person of the Rev. H. J. Colwell, late of Randolph, Vt., who, at my suggestion, visited them in the month of January, and upon their invitation, began his labors

September 6th, I preached in Stratford, Mr. Heu de Bourck being absent in the United States.

September 13, One service in Brantford.

September 27th was spent at Alton.

October 4th at Georgetown, the pastor being absent from home.

October 11th, I went to St. Catharines, where we held our first service in the Town Hall. After the morning service I held a conference with the people, with whom I had been previously corresponding, and at their urgent request, promised them supply every Sabbath for two months, with a view to organizing a Congregational Church.


October 18, I supplied the Northern Church, Toronto, while Mr. Dickson went to St. Catharines.

October 30th, went to Fergus with Mr. Manchee, and held a conference in Speedside Church, with delegates of the five congregations of Fergus, Garafraxa, Douglas, North Garafraxa, Speedside, and also some friends from Elora, with a view to a new distribution of that field. The result has already been reported in the *Canadian Independent*, viz., the organization of a church at Elora, which has been associated with Fergus, and the constituting of Garafraxa and Douglas as one missionary field. Speedside being able to support its own pastor, was not associated with any other congregation, and is shortly to welcome back its former pastor, Mr. C. Duff. Mr. Barker went that Sabbath (November 1st) to St. Catharines, and I took his work—three sermons, three separate communion services, and 32 miles travel.

November 8th, Alton and North Erin.

November 10th. Spent three days at Manilla in assisting the Rev. D. McGregor in the special services he had recently commenced. The results have been reported from time to time in the "News of The Churches," in the columns of the *Canadian Independent*.

November 15th was spent at Galt, by request, with the Methodist New Connexion Church, its pastor supplying St. Catharines. Was joined, on



Monday, by Mr. Allworth, of Paris, the Secretary of the Western District Committee, and held a conference with the people, who, having resolved on not entering the Union, passed a resolution unanimously to become a Congregational Church. Mr. Smyth, the pastor, is still in charge, however, and further action is, therefore, for the present deferred.

November 22nd, preached the missionary sermons at Hamilton.

November 24th, went to Manilla again.

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November 25th, Georgetown missionary meeting.

November 26th, attended the ordination of Mr. J. Davis, South Caledon.

December 6th, went again to St. Catharines. It was agreed, at the request of the people, to organize a church there on the 22nd inst., which was accordingly done. Supply was found for St. Catharines every Sabbath thereafter, (with the exception of one day, when the person who was to supply failed to go) until Mr. Black entered on his work, May 2nd. In this I was kindly assisted by Mr. Hague, of Toronto, and the neighbouring pastors. The little church, I am happy to report, is prospering, the congregation is increasing, and Mr. Black is to be ordained over them next week.

December 8th, 10th, two evenings at Manilla.

December 13th was spent at Rugby, Oro and Vespra, preaching the missionary sermons.

December 15th at Newmarket, attending the missionary meeting with Mr. Silcox.

December 20th, preached at London for same object.

December 22nd at St. Catharines, at organization of church.

This was shortly after the commencement of the effort that resulted in such a large gathering of souls to Christ. Both here and at Manilla and Stouffville, Mr. R. McKay rendered very valuable assistance, and his work was very much blessed of God.

January 24th, St. Catharines again.

January 29th, left for Lanark; preached at Lanark Village, Middleville and Hopetown on Sabbath, and held missionary meetings at all the stations of the Brothers Brown during the week following, as well as a conference with Lanark Village Church, as requested by the General Missionary Committee.

Feburary 4th-8th was spent at Ottawa, preaching on the Sabbath for Mr. Sanderson. The Ottawa church is progressing well, and hopes very shortly to be independent of the Society.

February 8th, went to Montreal.

February 17th, to Stouffville, to the opening of the new church, reported in the *Canadian Independent* shortly after.

February 21st, Galt, Rev. D. Smyth being sick. Here also Mr. Hague and others gave assistance for several Sabbaths.

February 28th, Alton again. At my suggestion the church, which had just invited Mr. Colwell, agreed to adopt the "weekly offering."

March 7th, St. Catharines.

March 10th, 11th, assisting Mr. Smith at Pine Grove, at special services. Sixteen were here brought in.

March 14th, Manilla—to give Mr. McGregor a rest, as he was very unwell from anxiety and over exertion.

March 21st, supplied Georgetown, Mr. Unsworth being ill.



March 28th, visited Southwold with a view to assisting them, and ascertaining the prospect at St. Thomas.

April 4th, Whitby—went to preach and confer with the people there in regard to the prospect for 1875-6.

April 6th, went to spend the week at Edgar, assisting Mr. Silcox in special services, of which a report has appeared in the *Canadian Independent*. Returned Saturday, and immediately left for Bolton, where I spent the 11th preaching for Mr. Wheeler, still too ill to preach. Returned on Monday, and left again early the next morning, for Edgar, where I spent the next four nights. Here Mr. Salmon rendered excellent service, assisting Mr. Silcox for 10 days. The results of this revival have already been partially reported. Last Sabbath 92 persons were received into the church. Oro is henceforth, self-sustaining. Returned from Oro Saturday, and left immediately for St. Catharines, where I spent the 18th preaching for the church there.

April 25th, went to Stouffville, and after preaching, held a conference with the church about diminishing the grant. The amount asked for this year is less.

April 26th, went to opening of Wycliffe Y. M. C. A. Hall, Brantford.

April 29th, being telegraphed for, went again to Brantford to the funeral of Mrs. S. C. Goold.

May 2nd, at home. Preached in the morning in Zion Church.

May 4th, went to Manilla with Messrs. Jackson and Reikie to attend a council there to arrange some difficulties between two of the deacons and the pastor.

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May 9th, preached at Manilla, and read the deliverance of the council to the church.

May 30th, preached both times for Mr. Dickson of the Northern Church, Toronto, he being ill.

June 6th, preached again in the morning for Mr. Dickson.


The above is a brief outline of my missionary work for the nine months from September last, during which I have travelled 7275 miles, have been absent from home 29 Sabbaths, and 90 week days, or 119 days altogether, (4 months). My work has been very laborious, so much absence from home involving, of course, a very great pressure of duties when at home, in the editing of the *Canadian Independent* and the Year Book, and in the correspondence with the churches, their pastors, and the District Secretaries. But I am thankful to report that I have never met with the slightest accident in my travels, never was in better health, and never was happier in my work, being convinced that the Lord had just this work for me to do.

ONTARIO WESTERN DISTRICT.

In the Western District we have to record some changes, and these not all of a discouraging nature.

Amherstburg has not been occupied since Rev. J. M. Smith's removal. Rev. W. H. Claris is still gradually, and we trust permanently establishing a cause in Sarnia and doing a good work for the Redeemer. He reports increase in the church and congregation. What for a time was discouragingly weak, is now promising to be, with patience, a self-sustaining cause.

Warwick with its four or five preaching stations is now no longer receiving Missionary aid, but is receiving large blessings from the Lord under the pastorate of Rev. Robt. Hay.



Stratford church under the pastorate of our indefatigable brother Heu de Bourck is progressing still. They labor under a heavy debt on their church building. He writes : "Three years ago the church consisted of 14 members ; since then the number has increased to 62. Our losses by death, removal, and discipline have been 15, so that our members now are 47. 15 of these have been admitted since last report."

Listowel, under the pastorate of Rev. E. Rose, is making encouraging progress. He writes: "The last year has been marked with more progress in spiritual interest, in addition to membership—mostly by profession, steadily growing congregations, with increased interest in the public services, than in any preceding year of the church's history.

The large field so long occupied by Rev. Mr. Snider was vacated last fall, he having gone to Michigan and settled there, since which the churches have been only partially supplied, and are, we believe, at this time still vacant.

The death of the Rev. Mr. McKinnon has caused a lack of report from that field at the date of writing this. No communication has been received by the secretary from *Kincardine*.

Rev. E. Barker has left *Garafraxa* church and taken up *Elora*, where he has made a hopeful beginning of a new cause, and has now between 20 and 30 members. When Garafraxa and Douglas get a pastor between them, which they desire to do, it will we believe be a very happy arrangement; since these two churches, and Fergus with Elora seem to be more naturally allied by position, and are thus more easily brought under two pastors, than in any other way. St. Catharines, where for many years Congregationalists in principle have been without a pastor, is now opening to us, with a population of some 10,000. Rev. Mr. Black has entered upon this important field, and has commenced with a church of 18 members, to work for Jesus under very encouraging aspects. This town is not crowded with churches. There is ample room for a Congregational labourer. Mr. Black writes : "We are very much encouraged. The outlook in almost every direction is promising. It only remains for the Missionary Society to help us with a liberal hand for a year or two to ensure the desired success." Other fields promise to open to us in this district. What is now needed is for the churches of our body to awake up to the importance of the work before us, and every church to show by liberal contributions, that if the committee will go forward the churches one and all will stand by them in leavening this region with our New Testament principles, and God even our God shall bless us.

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

ONTARIO MIDDLE DISTRICT.

The Lord in mercy has been pleased during the year to visit this district. Showers of blessings have descended upon it. Many have been saved and brought into fellowship with His people. Pastors and people who have toiled together in hope, often discouraged, have had their hearts



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up *Elora*, where is now between i pastor between happy arrangeem to be more ught under two filled with joy at the manifestation of His power. The membership of some of the churches has been doubled; while nearly all have been revived and increased.

One new church edifice worth \$6,000 has been erected and paid for. Two have declared themselves independent. Another has decided on building a new church and parsonage this summer. One old station has been resuscitated, with promise, the friends proposing to build a new church forthwith. Yet, with all this joy and hope, sorrow and trial have been mingled with some of the brethrens' experiences, but the Lord has sustained and been the strength of their hearts. The following extracts from the reports of the brethren will give a fuller idea of the work of the churches :

Alton and North Erin.—At the beginning of this year, Rev. M. S. Gray resigned his charge of these stations, which after being supplied through the diligence of our General Secretary for some months, invited the Rev. H. Colwell, who accepted the pastorate in March last. Since his settlement the people have determined upon erecting both a new church and parsonage while God has given them tokens of His love and mercy in the building up of His spiritual house with the saved.

Markham and Unionville.—The pastor, Rev. R. Bulman, is labouring in hope, with a measure of success attending his efforts. He writes under date of February : "Since I last wrote you my field of labour has not yielded anything very remarkable to record. The work has been gradually consolidating in service, influence, and numbers, and the prospect is hopeful with regard to the future. "The limited population in the district, and that divided into five distinct parts in its church-going portion, necessarily affects the number of our congregation, and consequently the material to work upon is not so large as we could desire. "The Sabbath School is prosperous, and in a more efficient state than it was some time ago. There is evidently a good work going on in my Bible class, and I hope and pray that many of the members of it may soon find the Saviour, and be added to the fellowship of the church. Our prayer meetings, though not largely attended, are seasons of refreshing and edification. We have perfect harmony among ourselves, and in our work of faith and labour of love we earnestly desire to extend the kingdom of Christ in the world. Like some other country churches within an easy distance of the city of Toronto, our church members are constantly moving to take situations, or enter into business in some way, as we have only a very limited number of employers of labour in the neighbourhood, and business is restricted to a few. But although this has a discouraging effect upon us, yet the churches in the city are increased thereby. Our loss is their gain, and this is much better than losing members altogether when they remove to places where we have no churches. "In October last our old deacon, Mr. Philip Eckardt, venerable in years and mature in piety, was taken home to heaven, to rest from his labours, and we rejoice to see his children walking in the same good old path ' the father trod.'"



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Manilla.—Rev. D. McGregor, pastor of this church, after a number



of years of toil and discouragement, with occasional visits of mercy, has during the year enjoyed a most remarkable work of grace in every part of his field. One to two hundred souls professed to find peace with God in believing.

Meetings were held night after night for months, when both young and old were found pressing into the kingdom. Our brother was assisted by a number of brethren, and especially by Mr. Mackay, the evangelist, of Kingston, who was much blessed in his work there. Mr. Mackay writes under date of Dec. last : "I have seen much of God's work in Scotland during the past ten years. It has been my privilege to take part in the mighty movement going on now in Scotland, as also to see the work in Edinburgh under those honoured servants of God, Messrs. Moody and Sankey; but I can safely say I have not seen a deeper impression any where than was witnessed here this evening (the 26th of November). At the close of the meeting I requested the anxious to come into the vestry, and was immediately followed by many; the room was crowded by weeping troubled souls. It could not hold the third part of those desirous to be spoken to, but they were dealt with in the church. I spoke and prayed with them. That evening from fifteen to twenty professed to find rest in Chrisi, and at my request they rose and sang; "Happy day, happy day, etc.," after which I requested them to leave, so as to make room for others. The vestry was again filled, and many more there and in the church "passed from death to life." At the close of the meeting I requested all those who could sing "Happy day, happy day, etc.," as in the sight of God, to stand up and do so, when fully 150 responded. "Sabbath, Dec. 6, will be long remembered in Manilla. It was perhaps the greatest day in the history of the Congregationalists here. The church was crowded; it was a blessed sight; the young converts were seated in front of the pulpit, and occupied about the half of the centre of the church. At the baptismal service, Mr. Day offered up prayer, and Mr. McGregor gave a very suitable address, after which fifteen converts came forward and knelt before the railing, and were baptized. It was truly a day of special favour from on high." The pastor writes under date of January : "It is supposed that about 200 souls were benefited, 97 made application for membership, 95 were admitted to the fellowship of the church, and we believe some of those blessed will be unknown to us until the great day. We cannot thank God sufficiently for His marvellous work here. After a long season of waiting and weeping, the seed was made to spring up and bear a hundredfold. The power is His and He shall have the glory."

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
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The work continued to progress, and more have been added to the church since, but a dark cloud has since arisen, which for the time is endangering the good done. May the Lord remove it.

He writes under date of January :—"The attendance at both stations is as good as could be reasonably expected. In Owen Sound, I have noticed considerable improvement lately, and last church meeting four young people were proposed for church membership, and I earnestly hope there are others who

will soon come into the church. The Sabbath school has also improved, in regard to numbers, lately. The locality of the church militates against us in stormy weather; but, upon the whole, I am much encouraged in my work."

Oro, Rugby and Vespra.—Rev. E. D. Silcox, pastor. — During the year, God has visited this mission field with a most glorious work of grace. Many have been converted and received into church fellowship. Our brother is encouraged both with the people's kindness to him, and the work of mercy in their midst. He writes under date of March :—." We have declared our independence, to take effect July 1st, 1875. In taking this step, the churches desire to thank the Canada Congregational Missionary Society for their long-continued assistance, and they also cherish the hope that, in time, they will be able to return, with interest, the money received from the said Society.

"Since I last wrote you, there have been a number of additions to the membership; there are still quite a number who, I have good reasons for believing, are Christians, and will, I trust, soon unite with us. Several have already made application for membership. There is a good work going on, especially among the young.

"The Bible class in connection with Oro church has proved a great blessing to many. Several attribute their conversion to the instruction received in the Bible class. There is also an improvement in the spiritual life of the churches. More zeal is being manifested for Christ's cause and Kingdom. But, how we long for such a revival as has visited Manilla ! We have very much to encourage us in our work. I hope the time is not far distant when there will be a division in this field, as it is too large for any one man. I drive thirty miles and preach three times every Sunday. There is no end to visiting." Our brother had not long to wait before the Lord sent them a great blessing, even as Manilla's. The General Secretary was invited by the pastor to go and assist him in some special services he had commenced the previous week. He responded. Bro. Wood writes, under date of April: "The first evening that an after meeting was held for enquirers, five remained for conversation; the next, twenty-five; the third, about sixty; and the fourth, about ninety-the whole congregation, in fact, being deeply moved. During the first three weeks, it is believed there were seventy hopeful conversions. 'Bethesda' Church became truly a house of mercy; and, as in Samaria of old, there was great joy there, as well as in the presence of the angels of God, over many repenting sinners." The latest report from the pastor is, that the enquirers now number 140, of whom probably ninety have been led to decision, and the work still progresses. To the Lord be all the praise. Stouffville.-Rev. B. W. Day, pastor,-during the year has been much encouraged in his work. The Lord has done great things for both pastor and people, both in temporal and spiritual blessings. He writes, under date of January : "We have been so far prosperous in the erection of our new building, and hope in the course of a very few weeks to open it for divine service. The people have been of one heart and soul in this matter, working with their hands and giving liberally of their means for its erection. Old and young have all taken part, and are now rejoicing together


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in the measure of success vouchsafed by the Lord. At the same time the feeling is growing in the minds of our earnest spiritual workers, that we must not be content with mere bricks and mortar, no matter how tastefully they may be arranged, but must labour for the building in of spiritual stones into Christ's Spiritual House. Many are praying for a gracious outpouring of the Holy Spirit in connection with the opening of our new and beautiful sanctuary, and are beginning to expect that in answer to prayer this blessing will be bestowed."

He writes, under date of May: "Since the date of my last report the Lord has indeed vouchsafed to us a gracious manifestation of his pleasure. We began special services about the middle of January, and continued them on until after the opening of the new church, which took place on the 17th of February. Most of the time we had the assistance of Mr. Mackay, the Evangelist, whose labours were much blessed to the salvation of souls.

"As the result of these services and in connection with our regular work, thirty persons have been added to the church, and amongst these, several of our Sabbath School scholars. In fact, the work seemed to begin in the Sabbath School, as it was at the close of one of its sessions, on the Sunday afternoon, that we received the first indications that the Spirit was at work.

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them rejoicing in the forgiveness of sins, and others weeping because they could not realize that they were safe in the arms of Jesus. From that time onward the number continued to increase, until thirty persons were led to come out boldly on the Lord's side and unite themselves with the church. The opening services in connection with the new church were also very successful.

"The whole cost was about \$6000, including land, sheds, and other things. All this has been provided for, and so it may be said to be free from debt. We are almost astonished at our success, and can only say: 'It is the Lord's doing, and is marvellous in our eyes.' This we are enabled to testify, that very special prayer had been offered up to the Lord for His guidance and help. He was graciously pleased to answer these prayers and bless us not only temporally but spiritually."

Whitby.—Rev. S. T. Gibbs, pastor.—This field has experienced great loss, both in removals and by the death of some of its best friends, which has weakened the cause and much discouraged our brother, but he is hoping God will overrule it for His glory. They have adopted the "weekly offering system," which is working well, giving hope of a better state of things among them financially. Our brother desires his future course to be guided by God for His praise and glory.

South Caledon.—Rev. J. Davies, pastor.—Our brother has laboured during the year with much encouragement; but the Lord has been pleased to take away, by death, his beloved partner, at a time when everything indicated success and usefulness in the Lord's work. His great loss is a heavy blow to him, and he asks the prayers of the faithful that it may be sanctified to the good of many. He writes, under date of April: "Two persons during the year have been added to our membership. Some of the members are being influenced with holy zeal to do more tor the cause of Christ.

Wiarton.—This station is an old one resuscitated. It was part of what was called the Colpoy's Mission. Our Bro. Robinson, late of the Indian Mission, has accepted an invitation to labour in the field. He writes, under date of December, 1874: "Wiarton is a new town laid out at the extreme end of Colpoy's Bay. It is very ambitious, and has by charter the main-line or branch terminus of Stratford and Lake Huron Railroad, and expects the former. Corner lots are at fancy prices, and settlers are fast coming in and building. We have some fifteen families or more of Congregationalists in our neighbourhood, and I had in the school-room a congregation of some seventy persons, and in the neighbourhood a congregation of some fifty persons when I preached, most of whom might be reckoned on as our own."

He writes, under date of May: "It is now the time I should give some report of my work in this place during the past four months. With the exception of but one day, on which the road was impassable to Colpoy's, I have preached three times every Sabbath, and that to congregations varying, according to the weather of a most tempestuous winter, from ten persons to eighty, and generally in all to about one hundred people each Sabbath. I believe that we can organize our church here with some fourteen persons, who are professors of religion and Congregationalists from principle; but it has been deemed prudent to defer organization until we get into our own building, as we are at present worshipping in the Wesleyan chapel. "Several of my people, who were my Bible class scholars in Owen Sound, are settled here, and I am in hopes that some of them have given their hearts to the Lord and will unite with the church. They attend my Bible class here, which includes eight or ten adults. It is held every week. "The friends have bought a lot and have agreed on the plan of a new frame church, 28 x 40 feet, with tower and spire on the corner, and we have let out the contract to a respectable firm here, who engage to complete the whole by 1st July, and who are to be paid in full in one year from that date. We hope to be able to fulfil our part of this, but scarcely hope to get into the building before the middle of July. "I am encouraged here in my work by assurance from many persons that it is much needed here. There are about 500 people in the village, four mills are in operation, and a number of stores. Our steamboat runs thrice weekly hence to Owen Sound. Application has been made for a daily mail; we have a telegraph line. I do not think as large a grant will be asked or needed another year."

ONTARIO EASTERN DISTRICT.

Ottawa.-Rev. J. G. Sanderson, pastor, writes-" Financially, we are, on the whole, in an improved position. The debt on the church, amounting to \$1800, has been provided for, so that it can be paid as it becomes due. The building has been improved by the re-painting of the wood-work, and the colouring of the inside walls, and by other decorations; the stoves and pipes have been removed, and the place is now heated by hot-air furnaces from the basement.

"Spiritually, we have made but little progress. I have received much kindness from the people, and many expressions of attachment ; but I seek not gifts, but souls. Hoping, praying, and working for better this year."

Lanark.—Rev. John Brown writes—" During the last half year, our work has gone on in much the same way as formerly; we have still to deplore a great want of spirituality in the church, and indeed in the whole place. There is, however, a notable improvement of late in this respect, in the case of some of our people; the prayer-meetings are fuller, and the tone and spirit better than formerly.

"Our church property has been improved by the enlargement of the little barn, and the erection of a close fence. Our Sabbath school is much improved of late."

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Middleville.—Rev. R. Brown, pastor, reports—"Our congregations at each of the four stations have been as good as formerly, except a slight falling off at Rosetta. The attention to the word has been as good, but it has not led to a declaration for Christ on the part of many. In regard to Sabbath schools, we are encouraged. Our weekly prayer-meeting usually winter-kills, but during the summer months more than usual interest was manifest in the service. We are all at peace among ourselves. On the whole, I am hopeful, and happy in my work."


Vankleek Hill and Hawkesbury.---These churches without pastors, under great discouragement, still keep up manfully, and part of the time have been supplied by Messrs. Silcox and Pedley (students).

Athol and Martintown.—Rev. D. Macallum writes—" There are no changes to report in our arrangements. Attendances at all our stations are good. During the snmmer months, I went monthly to the front of Roxboro'; the attendance was encouraging, but the church was out of repair."

Brockville.—Since last report, this church has met with sad reverses. In January, Bro. Ireland writes—"No less than thirty of our friends, who were then (at the time of last report) with us as members or adherents, are no longer present. Some have left the town, and others, who are Episcopal Methodists, have withdrawn to join the new Methodist Episcopal church which has just been completed. Since then, the removal of Deacon Hall and family to Toronto, who were invaluable to this weak church, has in one blow deprived them of deacon, organist and caretaker of the chapel (Mr. Hall served us for years, gratuitously acting as sexton), and given the final blow to the present prospects of the church."

Mr. Ireland felt it to be his duty to tender his resignation, which has been accepted.

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Belleville.—In last report, mention was made of Rev. W. Wooding's intention to return to England. On his departure, Rev. T. M. Reikie became pastor, but remained there only five months; since then the pulpit has been supplied by the kindness of a student of the M. E. College.

Cobourg. — In December, Bro. Griffith, pastor, writes—"I record with gratitude our taking possession of our new building. Since our entrance, there has been a marked improvement in our congregation and the Sabbath school. It must be said, however, that our numbers vary very much. The conviction is fixed with me now, that the church in this place can be built up only by hard labour, by persevering, undaunted effort. I am certain there is no other way." In April report he writes— "This period has been to me more trying than others of the same length since I have come to Cobourg, not because of any unusual occurrences. The attention to the preaching on the Lord's day has been all that could be desired. Our prayer-meetings, taking into consideration the size of the church, have been large; nor have they been without evident blessing.

"The Sabbath school has been entirely re-organized; it is now better in every way than it has been for some time."

Coldsprings.—Rev. James Howell, pastor, reports—"That our congregations at Coldsprings have kept up tolerably well, and we hope some

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good has been effected. Four individuals have been admitted into the fellowship of the church on profession, and three from other churches. Our Sunday school, as it is now winter time, is not so well attended, nor so efficient as it has been. Our young brethren, the Pedleys, having left us to prepare for higher work, we have been deprived of two most efficient teachers.

"I have established a Bible-class for young people, on Wednesday evenings at the Parsonage, which has been comparatively well attended, and I hope to find that it has been made a blessing to many.

"The memorial stone of our new church was laid on the 21st of April. The anticipated cost of the building (brick, 50 x 30 feet) is about \$1800, towards which some \$1490 has been promised by the people, payable in three years."


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QUEBEC DISTRICT.

The usual routine of Sabbath and week-day services has been continued in this Missionary District, without mnch variation, during the past year. Upon the whole, the Missionaries seem to have been not a little encouraged by the indications of the Lord's presence and power among the people. We record a few extracts from their reports :—

We give, first, part of Bro. Sherrill's report of

Eaton—" During the past year, I have been the 'acting pastor' of this church, notwithstanding my resignation in November, 1873. Since that time there has never been a slack hand, or a thought of retreat, on the part of any one upon whom we relied for help in sustaining the Lord's



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work through this church. Deaths and removals have caused great mourning and some anxiety about the future, but knowing these events are ordered in wisdom and love, we receive in them lessons of instruction from our Heavenly Father, and hear Him saying, 'Commit thy way unto the Lord, trust also in Him, and He shall bring it to pass.'

"Courage and hope have prevailed. Pledges for the support of the Gospel have been cheerfully met. The finance committee have felt that necessity was laid upon them, and they have done their work efficiently.

"Mr. W. H. Warriner, from the Congregational College, Montreal, laboured here during last summer's vacation of five months. His preaching on the Sabbath and work during the week met with great acceptance. I visited with him from house to house. He also had special evening (week-day) services, and we believe souls were converted.

"After Mr. Warriner left, Kev. John Lawrence preached for us two months. His work among us was well done. With the exception of four Sabbaths Mr. Warriner spent with us, I have during the winter preached and done ordinary pastoral duties.

"The work at Learned Plain has been interrupted, owing to the severe weather and almost impassable roads.

"During the year, eight have been added to our church, all members of the Sabbath schools here and at Learned Plain.

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"Two members have been removed by death. Our church is emphatically a Mission church. Every year members have gone out from us who are, we believe, doing good work for Christ, both in Canada and in the States."

Being Bro. S.'s nearest ministerial neighbour, I can corroborate his statement, that the Eaton church is emphatically "a mission church," its depletion contributing to the increase of larger and stronger churches in towns and cities. We are truly glad to find that he has been able to do so much pastoral work.


Fitch Bay.—Of this field, the missionary Bro., L. P. Adams, in January, 1875, writes :—"I keep up all my preaching places as usual, and have commenced again at Smith's Mills, with a large congregation and some encouraging prospects. Since my last report, we have received into church fellowship six members, two heads of a family and four youths. Praise God, he owns our poor service yet."

In his report for April, after referring to the extreme hardness of the times financially, he writes :---

"Things move about as formerly. Three have united with the church by profession this winter, and two have been dismissed by letter to join one of the Congregational churches in Lawrence, Mass." Thus proving the missionary character of this church also.

Waterville.-Of this station, Mr. Purkis reports, in January, nat nothing of unusual interest had occurred during the past half year; he had endeavoured to keep the truth, as it is in Jesus, before the minds of the people. The attendance at the centre of the field has been good, also at the Levers neighbourhood; at North Hatley and Capeltown, rather below the average, which, in the circumstances, it is not difficult to account for. One new member was received the Sabbath before he wrote, and more were in prospect. He had engaged in Union prayer-meetings with

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two ministers of other denominations, in the beginning of January, the attendance at which was considerably affected by rough roads.

At Capeltown, the attendance is much diminished by efforts to draw the people in other directions, and many of the men are detained by a great deal of work being done on the Sabbath, especially in the evenings, when Mr. Purkis preaches. Those who do hear, however, are liberal in their weekly contributions for the support of the Gospel.

During the year, he had preached 163 sermons, besides holding prayer-meetings on Wednesday evenings; and a prayer-meeting is held on Sabbath evenings, in the Parsonage, in his absence.

At last church meeting, six new members were added to their number, four by profession—young people—and two by letter from Scotland.

In the midst of discouragement, he adds—"I do not, however, despair, for in every thing that is worth working for we must make up our minds to work and wait. I have seen many ups and downs, and therefore am not discouraged if the sun does not always shine, knowing that we shall ultimately reap if we faint not."

Our Committee is also happy to have been able to employ Mission labour during the summer months, in aid of our Brother McIntosh, in his arge field, and he himself is in very poor health.

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
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NOVA SCOTIA AND NEW BRUNSWICK DISTRICT.

Last year, it was our privilege to report a gracious outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon all our Missionary churches, both in Queen's and Yarmouth counties, N. S., resulting in a quickening of the zeal of old professors, and many new converts being gathered into the fold. Since then, gratifying reports have reached us, as to the stability of those added to the churches, while from othnr quarters the news comes of a pleasing work of grace. During the past year, no new settlements have been effected, and no changes have been made in the pastorate. Still, we are convinced that the subjoined reports from the pastors will prove that the Lord is employing them to do a good work for Him.

Keswick Ridge, N. B.—The pastor of this church, Rev. S. Sykes, is much encouraged, although feeling deeply the need of more help on his already too-extended field. Under date 26th of March, he writes :—

"I know that it will do your soul good to get the report from this church for the past year. The Lord has been blessing His own truth, both to the edification of His people and to the salvation of precious souls. Since our last Union meetings at Sheffield, in the month of September, twenty have been received into the fellowship of the church, all on profession of their faith in Jesus. One-half are from the young of our congregation and Sabbath school, the other half from the middle-aged and aged of our hearers. Two, who have been constrained by divine grace and love, to unite with us in church fellowship, one male and one female, are from the ranks of the aged ; they are both over seventy years of age.



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Besides those who have given themselves 'first to the Lord and then to His people,' there are a number more, who we have reason to believe are not far from the Kingdom ; and others who are in it, but who have not yet united with the ranks of Christ's followers by open profession. We hope and pray that we may, ere long, see them all 'witness a good confession before many witnesses.'

"There is a fine field in this section of country for evangelistic labour. I cannot do all I wish to do and have opportunity to do. Last September, three young men, members of the church, with my concurrence commenced a Young People's prayer-meeting. It is held in three different districts or school sections, in the different school houses. It is conducted by these three young men in turn. I frequently attend the meetings and help them, but they conduct them. The prayer-meetings have been blessed as a means of great good.

"The amount of our Missionary subscriptions this year is in advance of last year. Our manse is about out of debt. If times do not get too hard, we contemplate in the autumn making a commencement towards the erection of a new church edifice, which we need very much."

Chebogue, N. S.—This church is yet without a settled pastor. Mr. J. B. Hawes, a young man from the United States, not yet ordained, has supplied the church since March, 1874, and expects to remain until the autumn of this year, after which, it is to be hoped, a settled pastor will be secured. Meantime, Mr. Hawes has been enabled to do a good work. Last year, a revival was reported in connection with his labours, and those of Deacon Dennis, of Yarmouth, and of late he has been indefatigable in collecting money to enable the church to build a Parsonage. Under date, March 14th, he writes :---"Of late there has been no increase of membership, but a good degree of interest in spiritual things has been manifested. The attendance at the public services has rather been on the increase than otherwise, the congregation on several occasions numbering two hundred,---the average being one hundred and ten or one hundred and fifteen. A new interest was given to the Sabbath school, and the number of attendants increased, by changing the hours of meeting from 9 a.m. to 11.30 a.m. The opening, also, of a Teachers' meeting, last September, has given a new interest, and, we trust, increased facilities for instruction in the school. In addition to the regular weekly prayer-meeting, during the autumn and early winter months, on Friday evening of each week, which was well attended, and a good degree of interest manifested. We believe many of the young men will ever look back upon these meetings as an oasis in their lives. We hope that some were there led to give their hearts to the Saviour. Last September, the Society commenced to build a new Parsonage, which will cost when completed about \$2,200. About \$1,300 has already been subscribed; of this amount, about \$600 has been given by friends in Yarmouth, Liverpool, G. B., and the United States. Strenuous efforts will be made by the people here to complete their Parsonage the coming summer." Pleasant River, N. S - Here, and at the adjoining out-stations of Ohio, Baker's Settlement and New Elm, our brother, Rev. J. Shipperley, continues his indefatigable labours, and with most encouraging results, as will be seen from the subjoined report of a late date :---

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" This Mission church, with its distinctive denominational principles, lives, holds its own, and grows. Although we cannot report this year, as we did last, such large additions to membership, yet we have not to regret a too hasty reception of members to our communion at the time of refreshing a year ago. These converts, the majority of whom are young persons, are, I trust, growing in grace and influence, and will in time become a source of greater spiritual and temporal support to the church. We have, in this part of Nova Scotia, to battle against an ever increasing financial depression, notwithstanding which, I trust our friends may be able to keep up their subscriptions to about the present amount next year. We have also to contend with other denominations, who are ever on the alert to build on our foundations, and find out where a new settlement has been educated up to a given point, and then come in and endeavour to divert what would have been our support into other channels, though our missionaries have laboured for years on the same ground without any contribution whatever from the settlers. This state of things has a strong tendency to prevent some of our mission churches from becoming selfsustaining as soon as they otherwise would. Last year, I reported an addition to the membership of 18; but after that report was sent in, about 23 more were admitted on profession, and we have now three others whom we expect shortly to receive into fellowship. 
Since the above was written, we learn that there has been a pleasing work at Pleasant River, and nine have joined the church at that place and two at Ohio.

Brooklyn and Beachmeadows.—While preparing this report, we are much concerned to learn that Rev. C. Duff, the pastor of this church, and our fellow-labourer, has resigned his charge, and has accepted a call to the pastorate of the church at Eramosa, Ontario. His last report is given below. On March 21st, he writes :—

"In my last report, I referred to a gratifying work of grace, in common with other places in this county. During the past year, we have suffered something by the reaction usually following such seasons; but there is abundant evidence that all the seed did not fall upon stony ground. Spiritual depression, however, is not agreeable, and a better understanding of the nature of true revival and Christian progress, will doubtless relieve the church of much of the baneful reactionary influence.

"Financial matters in the church have suffered somewhat from the sad prostration of all branches of industry followed by our people.

"The lot referred to in my last report, offered by Mr. John Bagley, Sr., for a church site and burying-ground, at Lower Beachmeadows, remains as last year. Mr. Bagley had, last summer, the misfortune to lose his house by fire, and a great deal of what it contained. This made it impossible to make any advance with the project of a new church, as it absorbed not only all his own time and energies in the erection of another dwelling-house, but also some aid from his neighbours and friends. This part of the field needs careful attention, however, and the Missionary-Secretary should be deputed to visit it as soon as it is convenient for him to do so. With this report, I must bid farewell to this field of labour.



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having accepted a call to Eramosa, my former field of labour, in Ontario. To me it has been the occasion of many joys and many sorrows; and God is my witness how I have longed for them, and do still, in the tender heart of Jesus Christ. The Great Shepherd of Israel, who knows his sheep, and is known of them, lead, watch and keep them unto the great day."

Milton, N. S.—"This station still feels the benefit of the infusion of fresh material, as a consequence of the revival of the last year. The congregations have been good and attentive, and the week-day services have been well attended. It is inspiring to hear the voices of new members in our prayer-meetings. No department of church work seems to be more prosperous than the Sabbath school. That institution, under the able superintendence of Mr. Whitman, is very efficient, and the number of teachers and scholars in attendance is larger than at any previous time.


"The pastor's Bible-class, held once a-week during the autumn and winter months, have had a most encouraging attendance.

"By a series of socials, held during the winter, a considerable sum has been raised by the ladies of the congregation, which is to be appropriated towards improving the surroundings of the church property. A new lecture-room is very much needed, and we fervently hope that efforts will soon be made to erect one. Despite the very hard times, the contributions of the church for Home and Foreign Missions have been nearly equal to former years." Halifax, N. S.—In January, 1874, the church meeting in Salem chapel secured the services of Rev. T. Milner, formerly of St. John, Nfld. For the first year of Mr. Milner's labours they received a grant from our Society in aid of his support, as also some small help from the Colonial Society. It is gratifying to see that already they are sustaining their pastor without aid from either Missionary Society. Mr. Milner's subjoined report is very short, but most suggestive and encouraging. Under date, May 21st, he writes :---"At the commencement of the year 1874, I found a congregation worshipping in Salem church, which numbered, say, 20 or 25; half of them were members, and half of the members were hopeful, while the rest were in the 'slough of despond.' The church was a moral chaos, without organization and with such opposing elements, there was no prospect of regaining anything approaching harmony. I am glad to say that the year 1875 found the little one had become a hundred, that is, as far as the congregation is concerned, and our membership was doubled. My people had a mind to work in harmony for the Great Master, and with one mind they determined to depend only upon the Great Head of the Church for future support." Margaree, Cape Breton.-Mr. Malcolm, student, laboured here last summer, amid some interruption from sickness, which necessitated his retiring from the field early in August. He speaks of the people as a good deal discouraged, having suffered much from that "hope deferred which maketh the heart sick." Still, our brother's short ministrations

Maitland and Noel, N. S.—Rev. J. R. Kean feels discouraged with the general aspect of affairs in this field, and much fears that he may have to retire from it, from sheer inability to overtake the work necessary to be done on so wide an extent of country. Under date, May 29th, he writes :—

"I may say that I fulfilled all my appointments on this scattered field, up to the 1st of March, through all the storms of the past winter, on a field extending 30 miles along the shores of the Bay of Fundy. At that period I went to spend a few Sabbaths on my old field, Canning, after I received the second letter of invitation, believing that in doing so, I was still engaged in the best sense in doing Missionary work. On account of the severity of the winter, I could not return to Maitland until May. A church meeting was called, but was so thinly attended, that those present did not feel warranted in the circumstances in making a fresh application to your Society for help. I may say that I have received very many proofs of kindness and warm attachment from the members generally, and from members of other churches; but with a financial deficit of nearly \$400, I feel that I would not be warranted in continuing longer to subject myself to the fatigue which such a field imposes."

I. COURSE OF STUDY.

According to the Regulations of the College, the Full Course of Study extends over five Sessions, and is divided into a Literary Course of two Sessions, and a Theological Course of three Sessions. Candidates for admission to the Full Course must be prepared to pass the Matriculation Examination of the McGill University, in the following subjects :—

Classics, Mathematics and English.

- In Classics.—Latin Grammar, Greek Grammar, and one easy Latin and one easy Greek author. The authors recommended are :—Cæsar; Sallust; Virgil (Æneid B. I.); Xenophon (Anabasis B. I.); Homer (Iliad B. I.).
- In Mathematics.—Arithmetic; Algebra, to Simple Equations, inclusive; Euclid's Elements, Books I. II. and III.

In English.-Writing from dictation.

For the literary and scientific subjects of the Full Course, the students attend the classes of the Faculty of Arts in McGill College, according to the terms of affiliation with the University, in which Faculty the Full Course extends over four years, and leads to the degree of B.A. But in the Third and Fourth Years, Theological students are allowed exemption from attendance on certain classes, should they desire it. Thus the studies of the Third and Fourth Years of the Full Course are prosecuted simultaneously in the Faculty of Theology and in the Faculty of Arts. The work of the Fifth Year is confined to the Faculty of Theology. This NORTH AM
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The following is the course of study in the University which students in Theology must pass through in order to obtain the degree of B.A. :—

- First Year.—Classics; French or German or Hebrew; English Literature; Pure Mathematics; History; Elementary Chemistry.
- Second Year.-Classics; French or German or Hebrew; English Literature; Pure Mathematics; Botany.
- Third Year.—Classics; English Literature; Mental and Moral Philosophy; Mixed Mathematics; Zoology.
- Fourth Year.—Classics; Mental and Moral Philosophy; Mixed Mathematics; Mineralogy and Geology.

The Theological Course proper begins with the Third Year of the Full Course and extends over three full Sessions. It embraces the following subjects :—(1) Systematic Theology; (2) Historical Theology; (3) Pastoral Theology; (4) Homiletics; (5) Greek Testament Exegesis; (6) Church History; (7) Evidences and Biblical Literature.

In both Departments, the Session begins at the middle of September; and examinations are held at Christmas and at the end of the Session in the several subjects of the year. Students must pass these examinations as a condition of maintaining their proper status. Candidates who are admitted to the Theological course proper ("Shorter"), in accordance with Sec. 3, Chap. IV. of the Regulations, are required to attend such classes in McGill College as the Faculty of Theology may deem expedient, and also to pass the examinations of such classes. 6. Spec
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II. BY-LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

CHAPTER I.

OF THE CORPORATION.

I. This Corporation is called "THE CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA."

2. Its object is to educate Ministers for the Congregational Churches of Canada and the other Provinces of British North America.

3. All who contribute one dollar annually to the funds of the College are members of the Corporation, and entitled to a voice in the management of its affairs.

4. A Regular Meeting of the Corporation is held annually, for the reception of the Report of the Retiring Directors, the election of a new Board, and the transaction of other necessary business.

5. The Annual Meeting is held at the same time and place as that of the Congregational Union of Canada.

6. Special Meetings of the Corporation may be held for the transaction of special business, on a requisition to that effect to the Chairman of the Board of Directors, signed by, at least, twenty members of the Corporation. Provided always, that no such Special Meeting be held without two months' public notice thereof, signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Directors.

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CHAPTER II.

OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

1. The Board of Directors is elected from members of the Corporation, and consists of a Chairman, Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and not less than fifteen nor more than twenty other members, who hold office for one year, but are eligible for re-election.

2. Five members of the Board form a quorum.

3. The functions and duties of the Board are :—The oversight and management of the affairs of the College during their year of office; and on the expiration of the time, to present a report of their proceedings, as well as of the general condition of the College, to the Corporation at its Annual Regular Meeting, or at such other times as the Corporation may require.

4. The proceedings of the Board of Directors are subject to the sanction of the Corporation, and are regulated by By-Laws, which may be enacted, amended, or repealed at any Annual Meeting.

5. Vacancies in the Board, whether occurring by death or resignation, may be filled by the Board, as soon after their occurrence as it may see fit. Provided always, that no such appointments be made without a vote of, at least, a majority of the members of the Board.

CHAPTER III.

OF THE PROFESSORS.

I. The Professors receive their appointment from the Corporation; or in exceptional cases, from the Board of Directors, subject to the approval of the Corporation.



BY-LAWS AND REGULATIONS OF THE

2. Their duties and their salaries are determined by such regulations as the Corpo. ration may from time to time ordain in that behalf.

3. The Professors constitute a Fuculty of Theology, and, as such, are entrusted with the educational department of the College, subject to the sanction and control of the Board of Directors.

4. In cases of Discipline, the Faculty may admonish or reprimand a Student, or prohibit his attendance on the classes, preliminary to reporting him to the Board to be further dealt with.

5. The Faculty are required to make regular reports of their proceedings to the Board.

CHAPTER IV.

OF CANDIDATES FOR ADMISSION.

I. Every Candidate for admission into the College must present to the Directors the testimony of the Church of which he is a member, respecting his piety and apparent suitableness to the work of the Ministry, together with a written statement of the grounds of his own conviction that he is called of God to that work, and of his views of Christian doctrine and Church government.

2. Candidates for admission to the Full Course must be prepared to pass the Matriculation Examination in the McGill University.

3. Candidates who are graduates of any University, or who can satisfy the Board that they are otherwise possessed of sufficient acquirements, may be at once admitted to the Theological Course. Also, as exceptional cases, such candidates may be admitted to that course as it may be expedient, in the judgment of the Directors, to train as preachers, without the ordinary literary culture. 8. 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4. Approved Candidates are received on a probation of four months, at the close of which, if the result of their probation be satisfactory, they are admitted to the Full Course.

CHAPTER V.

OF THE STUDENTS.

I. Students are, during their Literary Course, under the general supervision of the Faculty of Theology, and take such subjects in the Theological Department as the Board may direct.

2. The Students, both in the Literary and the Theological Department, are required to attend exclusively to the studies approved by the Board.

3. Every Student, on his admission into the College, is required to sign a declaration of obedience and consent to the By-Laws and Regulations of the College.


4. Students are allowed to live with such families only as are approved by the
Board of Directors. Changes of abode must be promptly notified to the Secretary of the College.

5. Attendance upon the classes in the College and the use of the Library is allowed without charge to the Students. Aid may also be granted to them from its funds, to meet the expense of Board ;—the amount of such aid to be fixed at the beginning of each Session.

6. As a part of their preparation for their future work, the Students, under the sanction of the Directors, preach the Gospel, as they have the opportunity.

7. Every Student, when admitted into the College on the expiration of the term of his probation, is required to procure a formal dismissal from the Church to which he formerly belonged, and, without delay, to obtain admission into a Congregational Church in the place in which the College may be. Such dismissal and admission must be reported by him to the Board. Furthermore, he is expected to be as regular as possible in his attendance upon the services, ordinances and church-meetings of the Church to which he belongs during his College course.

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CONGREGATIONAL COLLEGE OF B. N. A.

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8. Students are not allowed, during their College course, to enter into the marriage relationship, without the knowledge and consent of the Board of Directors.

9. Students who leave the College without obtaining the official sanction and discharge of the Board, are required to refund to the College the amount expended by it for their education.

10. Churches who desire the services of Students with the view of permanent settlement in the Pastorate, or otherwise, are requested to communicate with the Board, through the Secretary.

CHAPTER VI.

OF THE COURSE OF STUDY AND EXAMINATIONS.

I. The Full Course of study extends over five Sessions, and is divided into a Literary Course of two Sessions, and a Theological Course of three Sessions.

2. In the Theological Department, the course of study includes the Original Languages of the Scriptures, Biblical Literature, Systematic and Pastoral Theology, Church History, Homiletics, and Exegesis of the Greek Testament, with such other accessory subjects as the Board of Directors may from time to time appoint.

3. In the Theological Course, the Students are examined at the close of each Session, in all the subjects of the year. The examinations are conducted by Examiners (among whom the Theological Professors are included) chosen by the Board of Directors, and by means of printed questions and written answers to the same. Those who pass are arranged according to their proficiency, as 1st Class, 2nd Class, and 3rd Class. If a Student fail to pass in any subject, he is required to undergo a Supplemental Examination in the same. The results of these Sessional Examinations are recorded by the Board, and reported to the Corporation at the Annual Meeting.

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4. The Session in the Theological Department begins on the second Wednesday in September, and ends on the second Wednesday in April.

5. The Professors are at liberty to hold, during the Session, such Class Examinations as they may deem necessary, either in the manner aforesaid or orally.


6. In the Literary Course, Students are required to pass such examinations as may be appointed by the Faculty of Arts of the McGill University. The Board of Directors are required to obtain from the said Faculty of Arts a Report of the Examinations of the Students in the several subjects thereof, and also of their attendance and conduct during the Session in the University, and to present the same at the Annual Meeting of the Corporation.

CHAPTER VII.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

I. In reference to matters not provided for in the foregoing By-Laws, the Directors may act according to their discretion, subject always to the approval of the Corporation at any Regular Meeting.

2. Alterations may be made in the By-Laws and Regulations, or new ones added, by any Annual Regular Meeting of the Corporation, provided that notice of such alterations or addition has been given at the meeting next preceding.



(9) The above minutes were read and confirmed, and the meeting, after prayer, adjourned *sine die*.

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

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V. REPORT FOR SESSION 1874–75.

The thirty-sixth Session of the College was opened on the evening of Wednesday, Sept. 23rd, 1874, with the usual public service in Zion Church. The Rev. J. F. Stevenson, LL.B., delivered the inaugural address on "Education for the Christian Ministry;" and Messrs. Chapman, Fenwick, Fraser, and the Secretary took part in the proceedings. The closing service was held on April 14th, at which the Rev. F. H. Marling, by invitation of your Board, delivered the address, his topic being "The Cure of Souls."

The work of the Session in the Literary Department began with the Entrance Examinations on Sept. 15; and that in the Theological Department immediately after. In the last Report, reference was made to the visit of the Principal to England. Whilst there, he received an invitation from the Committee of the Congregational Union of England and Wales to preach the Annual Sermon before that body at its autumnal meeting; and deeming that his presence at the meeting might be made of service to the College, he accepted it. Your Board cordially granted the necessary leave of absence; and, in order that the students in the Theological Department might in the meantime be as fully employed as possible, arrangements were made with Messrs. Fenwick and Chapman to deliver each a portion of his Special Course at the beginning of the Session. At the end of October, the Principal returned, and at once resumed his duties, from which time the work of the Session went on in its regular course. The health of the students has been uniformly good; a blessing which has to be ascribed, in part at least, to the fact of their occupying more comfortable and healthy places of abode, which the praiseworthy efforts of Mr. Chapman procured for them in the families of members of Zion Church and Congregation. Applications for admission have been received from four candidates; three from Ontario, and one from Quebec. Of these, two were able to pass the Matriculation and Sessional Examinations; and they have, therefore, the status of under-graduates of the University; the position of the others remains to be decided. All have been admitted as students of the College. The Sessional Roll stood as follows :---



Mr. Black has completed his course; Messrs. Warriner, C. S. Pedley, and McGregor have passed creditably the Intermediate Examination in the University; and two candidates for entrance next Session have been received on probation. Your Board regard it as a gratifying fact, that the number of students in attendance should thus be above the average, and that so many of them are entered for the Full Course of study.

The following are the Reports presented of the work in the several classes of the Department of Theology. The results of the Examinations are given in Appendix.

Dr. Wilkes Reports :---

"It is gratifying to have to report a favourable and successful thirty. sixth Session. Our Roll has consisted of twelve names, and these, with slight exceptions, have been regular and punctual in their attendance. The exceptions were the temporary illness of one, and the coming forward somewhat late of two others. The students have all attended our weekly devotional exercises with exemplary regularity, and have manifested throughout no little spiritual fervour. The classes in the Theological Department have had seven of the students on their lists; these have passed the usual written examinations on the several subjects, the results of which are appended. I have again to bear testimony to their uniform diligence, courtesy, and propriety of conduct. They have for the most part supplied the pulpit of the Eastern Congregational Church during the Session, under my direction, and also the Mission Chapel, at Hochelega, of the American Presbyterian Church. The attention of the class in Systematic Theology has been engaged by forty-one lectures, embracing the last section of a three years' course, and relating to the benefits to man resulting from our Lord's redemptive work, with the final issues thereof; also to the Church, its worship and ordinances. Eighteen lectures in Church History have brought before them some outlines on that subject from the Seculum Obscurum 10th century to the middle of the 16th, including the Reformation in Germany and in German-Switzerland. Some notes on Hebrew literature and on the Pentateuch, in view of modern objections to its Mosaic authorship, occupied eleven lectures; while the History of the Canon, particularly of the Old Testament was attended to in four. Ten in Homiletics completed the third year's course. The students had weekly exercises in plans of sermons, the delivery of homilies, and the construction and delivery of sermons. These exercises were attended, also, more or less, by the students not in the Theological Department."

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(2) Dr. Cornish reports :---

"We have read in class during the Session, Chapters XII. to XVL, inclusive, of the Gospel by St. Mark. The students have been regular in their attendance, and their conduct has been to my satisfaction.

At the close of the Session, an Examination was held in the abovenamed subject."

(3) Mr. Chapman reports :----

"During the past Session I have conducted three classes—one on the book of Isaiah, one on Butler's Analogy, and one on the Evidences of Christianity, embracing together forty-two lectures and discussions. The course on Butler and the Evidences was the completion of a series on the modern controversies in relation to Science and Theology; extending

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over three Sessions. My object has been to dispose, first, of all preliminary objections to a supernatural Revelation, as such, so as to allow the evidence derivable from history to have its full force. The students have been made familiar with old and new forms of thought in relation to the truth of Christianity, and trained in the methods by which error is to be detected and destroyed.

I desire to bear my testimony to the zeal, and, in some instances, enthusiasm, with which the students have conducted their studies. In the examination on the Evidences, I was favoured with the assistance of the Rev. J. F. Stevenson, LL.B., who bears emphatic testimony to the general excellence of the papers, and the special merit of some of them. It is interesting to know that the marks independently assigned by Mr. Stevenson were almost identified with those assigned by myself. "

(4) Mr. Fenwick reports :---


"My course of lectures on Historical Theology, delivered to the students at the commencement of the Session, has brought down the subject assigned me to the Council of Nice. Previously, the formulation of dogma from the writings of the ante-Nicene fathers, taken directly from their own writings, had been furnished; so that the way was open for an intelligent historical development of their theological opinions. This has been done in the present course ; in addition to which, the Nicene Council, in its dogmatic aspect the most significant, and the most important of all the Church Councils, has been carefully examined ; and the Trinitarian controversy, which culminated in the Nicene Creed, has been historically traced, and its issue as embodied in that remarkable symbol has been critically studied. Besides delivering the lectures, I was able to have two reviews, both of which were highly satisfactory. The attention of the students to their work; and the progress which they evidently made, were very encouraging; nor can I, in justice, omit to mention the spiritual tone which marked all their intercourse." The Rev. F. H. Marling and the Rev. J. F. Stevenson, LL.B., at the request of your Board, acted as joint-examiners in the Sessional Examinations, for which valuable service the thanks of the corporation are due to these gentlemen. For the standing of the students in the several classes of McGill College, reference must be made to the published lists of the Calendar of the University, which may be obtained on application to the Registrar. These returns are duly reported to your Board, in accordance with the terms of affiliation. A report of the Endowment Fund will be found in the Appendix to this report. The Treasurer, Dr. Wilkes, reports the amount of cash received up to date, and invested, or on deposit, as \$7,526.45, together with four bts of land at Longue Point, valued at \$243.88. Reference was made in the last Report to the generous offer of the Treasurer to endeavour to collect for the fund, as opportunity might present itself when in England. Your Board have much pleasure in reporting that the sum of \$2359.20 has thereby been realised; in reference to which, it is recommended that the best thanks of this Corporation be tendered to the Principal for this essential service rendered by him to the College, and also to the donors in England and Scotland for their timely liberality. The sum of \$600 has been received from the executors of the late Mr. Thos. Fletcher, of

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Beverly, Ont., on account of the moiety remaining unpaid of his bequest of \$1,500, thus leaving \$150 still to be paid. The amount now reported has been added to the Endowment Fund.

The examinations for the several Prizes offered for competition at the beginning of the Session were duly held; and on the reports and recommendations of the examiners appointed by the Corporation, the following award was made :----

(1) A prize of \$50, offered by George Hague, Esq., of Toronto, for an examination in Greek Testament Exegesis and Oral Exposition, the subject being the Epistle to the Philippians, in the original.

(2) A second prize of \$25, by the same donor, to the candidate standing next to the successful competitor in the above-mentioned examination. \$50 to Wm. H. Warriner, 2nd Year, Full Course; \$25 to Jas. R. Black, B.A., 5th Year, Full Course.

(3) A prize of \$25, offered by R. W. Cowan, Esq., of Montreal, for the best essay on The Fact, Source, Nature, and Cure of Human Depravity. \$25 to Jas. R. Black, B.A.

(4) A prize of \$25, by the same donor, for the best essay on The supposed antagonism of Science and Theology. \$25 to Andrew O. Cossar, and Year, Theological Course.

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
(5) A prize of \$20, offered by Thos. Robertson, Esq., of Montreal, for The best account of Chrysostom, the three Capadocians, and Augustine. \$20 to Chas. S. Pedley, 2nd Year, Full Course.

Your Board have to report the donation of \$50 by the late Mr. Geo. Robertson, Sen., of Kingston, to be offered, under certain specified conditions, for competition in the subject of Mr. Fenwick's Course. Should no competitor be entitled to the award, either in whole or in part, of the sum given, it must be used for the purchase of books in the Department of Historical Theology in the College Library. Before your Board could thank the donor, he had passed to his reward; but they think it no more than due to the memory of one so conspicuons for his goodness and generosity to our Churches and Institutions, as Mr. Robertson was, that the resolution they sent to his widow should have a place in this Report, and they accordingly insert it :--- "That the best thanks of the Board be tendered to Mrs. Robertson, the widow of the donor, for the generous and considerate gift of her deceased husband; and that she be assured of the sincere sympathy which the Board feels with her in the bereavement she has so recently been called upon to suffer, and also of their high appreciation of the personal and public worth, and large-hearted munificence which were so long and so consistently displayed by him who has been taken from his family and the church to receive his reward."

The thanks of the Corporation are due to Mrs. Thos. Avery, of Birmingham, for the gift to the Library of, 1st, the complete works of the Rev. Jno. Angell James, 15 vols.; and 2nd, The Faiths of the World, 8 vols.

The Treasurer's statement herewith presented reveals the unwelcome fact that, had there not been in his hands at the beginning of the year a balance of \$431, there would have been a deficit at the end of the year It is matter for regret, that many churches, which can afford to contribute, neglect, from one cause or another, to help to sustain an Institution which exists for the common good of all.

At the Annual Meeting for 1874, a resolution was adopted requesting the newly-elected Board "To consider the propriety of augmenting the number of lecturers." This resolution was duly reported to the Board, and placed on record for future consideration. It is the opinion of your Board, that the time has arrived for an effort to be made to augment and strengthen the staff of permanent Professors, in order to the completest possible arrangements in the College curriculum for the prosecution of a full course of study in the various branches of Biblical Literature. Notwithstanding all that the College is enabled to do in this department, much remains to be done that is very desirable, and which cannot be attempted unless some one capable person be found to give his undivided time to the treatment of subjects of this class. The attention of your Board has been called to the fact that Providence has apparently put such a person within our reach in Mr. Arch. Duff, Jun., M.A., a child of one of our Canadian churches, and a graduate with honours of McGill University, and who has, since the completion of his literary course, availed himself of the best advantages of the Andover Theological Seminary, and has attended Universities in Germany, making Biblical subjects his special study. Mr. Duff has, further, the reputation of being a good teacher, and he is desirous of labouring among and for the churches of his native land. This matter is thus laid before you for your instructions thereupon; and without entering into details which can be better dealt with elsewhere than in this Report, your Board suggests that it be referred either to a select committee of Corporation, or to their successors in office, with instructions to report thereupon to this present annual meeting.

#### REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1874-5.

The Directors, in presenting the Fourteenth Annual Report of the Society, desire to record their gratitude to the Father of all mercies for the measure of success accorded to the work itself, and for the general favour with which the appeals of the Society have been received.

In the *personnel* of the Mission, two important changes are to be noted. At the last Annual Meeting the present Secretary was elected to fill the place of Rev. S, N. Jackson. M.D., who had resigned. And at the end of the calendar year, Rev. R. Robinson, General Missionary Agent, resigned his labors in connection with the Society, on account of rheumatic affections, which made walking, and especially camping out, painful and dangerous duties. Mr. Robinson has since settled down as pastor of Wiarton, County Bruce, whither the best wishes of the Directors follow him. month i in Toro ing succ Quebec.


#### NEW GENERAL AGENT,

In January the Directors made an engagement with Mr. John L. Lister. by which that gentleman transfers his whole time to the work of the Society, beginning with May, 1875. Mr. Lister is in the vigorous prime of life, with much missionary zeal, inured to fatigue, with an unusual aptitude for acquiring languages, and with a very excellent Christian reputation. He follows, for the present, the course of duties undertaken for the last two years by Mr. Robinson; superintending on the field the mission work of the Society, during the season of navigation, and visiting and interesting the churches in the mission during the winter. Mr. Lister, with a praiseworthy ambition, is determined to qualify himself to preach and teach in Ojibway, and has been for some months diligently engaged in the study of that language. His surprising and self-attained proficiency in a great number of languages already acquired, gives the hope that his expectation of preaching next year without an interpreter will be realized. When thoroughly acquainted with the field, and when qualified by a competent knowledge of the language, we hope to locate Mr. Lister permanently at a central mission station. None have felt or regretted more the want of such a central point in our mission work than the Directors themselves; and we trust this may now soon be accomplished. With the mission boat at command in the summer, our Chief Missionary might visit and superintend the missions to the Indians from the interior, who come down to the great lakes for trade; and in winter might have a few young men in training for the mission work.

#### VISITING THE CHURCHES AND COLLECTING.

The services of the Rev. R. Robinson terminating with 31st December, when only a small number of churches and places had been visited, the Board felt constrained to revert for the time to the orginal plan of employing Collecting Agents who were well known to the churches. They could not ask Mr. Lister, at the first outset, to undertake this duty, being as yet unknown by face to the churches. The Secretary was therefore induced to spend a month collecting in the central portions of Ontario; Rev. James Howell a

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month in the eastern parts of the Province, and Rev. William Clarke collected in Toronto and Western Ontario. Miss Baylis, with gratifying and encouraging success, pleaded the cause of the mission in the cities of Montreal and Quebec.

#### NO SURPLUS.

A benevolent society, which does not expend all its income, shows either a work circumscribed and incapable of extension, or an indolent prosecution of its plans. We feel safe in saying that so disheartening a thing as an unexpended surplus on hand, will never happen to us. Yet a word of explanation respecting the Financial Statement may be necessary. Our funds all come in during the winter. Our accounts are made up for the Annual Meeting in June; at which time there must be enough on hand to carry on all the operations of the summer. This amount appears as "Balance on hand," but is very far from being a surplus. In fact, in the autumn of last year, the amount in the hands of the Treasurer was very considerably overdrawn. One reason of this was, that an annual grant of \$200, American currency, from the Society for Propagating the Gospel, Boston, was terminated. Through the influence of Rev. Dr. Wilkes, the Boston Society was induced to transfer an annual grant, formerly made to the mission at Colpoy's Bay, to this Society at its formation, and on its taking that mission under its care; and this grant was continued thirteen years. At the last Annual Meeting of that Society, their work among the Indians East of the Mississippi, and among the freedmen of the South, was considered so great and pressing, that, in hopes the Canadian brethren could now sustain their own mission, the grant was dropped. The Rev. Dr. Lathrop, Secretary, in an official note, says, "In both these directions we have increased our appropriations for some years past, with such manifest and gratifying results, that we feel constrained to put more laborers into this field. We feel an undiminished interest in the Canada Indian Mission Society, but in view of the great needs," &c., and "trusts that the growing wealth and prosperity of the Dominion of Canada will meet all the needs of our treasury and our efforts." This decision, the wisdom and necessity of which we were not in a position to question, made at once a reduction of nearly \$200 in the income of the Society; an amount which it is absolutely necessary to make up, in order that the work may be sustained, even at its present position.

#### EXPLORATIONS.

The Rev. R. Robinson, in the mission boat "Aurora," (28 feet keel, half decked) made several hundred miles of lake navigation last summer; and besides locating native teachers at Serpent River and Sheshegwahning, held communication with two pagan bands, hitherto without missionaries, with a view of opening the way to our establishing missions among them. He says in his journal, "Spent most of next day (30th Juue, 1874) on an island with some 12 camps of "White Fish Lake" Indians, speaking to them from tent to tent, but could not get a meeting till their chief could be present. * * * When on mainland I had a talk with the pagan chief of the "Birch Lake" Indians and six of his men at their camps. In reply to my statement of the gospel, the chief, a very intelligent looking man, said, "We very seldom hear about such things. Maybe if we heard more frequently and fully, we would embrace your religion. We will be glad to see you in August, and say more about the matter then."

With respect to these last, Mr. Robinson and the Secretary endeavoured in August to reach them at their settlement, forty miles up the Spanish River, by canoe. After proceeding some fifteen miles up the river, they found six lodges of these Indians on an island, and learned from the only "brave" at, the time present, that the rest of the band were scattered here and there

fishing and trading, and that it was useless to proceed farther. The Indian was instructed to present to his brother, one of the chiefs, and to the other Indians in council, the following proposition :—"That if the Band would settle down in a village at Birch Lake, in the manner of the more civilized Indians, a *Teacher* should be sent them." He said "they would hold a council over it, and let us know." Mr. Lister will learn their decision this year.

Mr. Robinson's journal continues :—" Camped last night on Island, beside White Fish Lake Indians. Rain in the night. Cold, and *rheumatism* pretty bad; yet no *flics*, and some sleep. About thirty Indians gathered, and I preached to them. These are all pagans, but they listened attentively, and said they would think much about what they had heard. Keeshick interpreted for me. He and Walker addressed them, and the latter prayed."

At Sagamook, Serpent River, Sheshegwahning, and Blind River, the same efforts were continued. A similar attempt at Bachawahning Bay, in the eastern waters of Lake Superior, was not successful, as the Indians had all scattered, fishing and picking blue-berries, and Mr. Robinson felt the imprudence of proceeding further along that rock-bound coast in a bark canoe.

#### SHESHEGWAHNING,

This is an Indian Village on Manitoulin Island, described more particularly in our last Report. We quote from Mr. Robinson's journal. "July 4th, 1874, started for Sheshegwahning at 3 p.m. Tried to stay at Cape Robert, but, for want of shelter, had to keep on until midnight, when we reached Sheshegwahning. Sabbath, July 5th. Beautiful morning. Chief John, and several others, came out to our anchorage, and we appointed 12 o'clock for worship. Preached to about forty Indians, from Acts, 'And the times of this ignorance,' etc. (Next day) "Held Council, thirty present, chiefs and men. Want a Teacher, but evidently distinguished education from religion, and don't want the latter. Council held for two hours, during which I preached the gospel, not without solemn warning as to their accountability for treatment of it." Mr. Robinson had made an arrangement with George Richards, an accomplished and educated Indian, by which the two were to go to Sheshegwahning in September, and spend a month there, in the hope that Richards might then, with the prospect of acceptance and success, be left alone. Richards, however, took sick, and it was only on the 19th October that a new arrangement was made, by which he proceeded alone with his family, to teach at Sheshegwahning till spring. He engaged to maintain worship among the people, as far as permitted, as well as train the children. At the end of three months his first report speaks very modestly of his success as an evangelist, but says the children have come regularly to school, and made fair progress. His engagement is continued.


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#### SPANISH RIVER.

Last week Miss Baylis sailed from Collingwood on the "Cumberland steamer to begin her fifth summer's labor at Spanish River. Her school was small last year, on account of fewer hands being employed in lumbering, and, therefore, fewer Indian children at the station. The same discouraging fact will be found this year, and yet it is so important to keep up the work, and so far does her quiet influence and labors extend, that the directors, in the best interests of the Society, could not think of letting this station drop, even for a time. Mr. Robinson's journal says, under date of July 2nd, 1874, "Miss Baylis has some nineteen scholars, and she is evidently laboring with all her heart for the improvement of the whole community. May the good Lord bless her work, and encourage her soul. Visited several camps of Indians. One old pagan said he was afraid to change his religion, lest the Great Spirit should

A Roman Catholic old Indinn woman wished to hear more of Jesus, but had changed her religion once, and was afraid to change it too many times. We told her that Jesus only wanted one change—that of the heart."

From Miss Baylis' journal, we give her jottings for ten days, as a specimen of her work for the season. "June 22nd, yesterday, Sabbath. Had morning meeting, sixteen being present, with interpreter. Sabbath School, twenty-seven present. Evening Readings, twenty, (all white people.) To-day I feel tired after yesterday's teachings. The weather is very warm. The mosquitoes and flies trouble us very much. To-day I had fifteen children in school; but had to go and gather them in. June 23rd. School, 17 children. In the afternoon I went to the tents, and read to the people. The white people are very careless about their souls. Liquor is taken to a great extent. June 25th. The children came very late and irregularly to school to-day. I reproved them for it. Two of the older girls ran out of the room, and home. I thought I had offended them, and they would not come again. To my astonishment they came in the afternoon, with their hands full of strawberries for me. I was pleased with the peace-offering, and gave them some beads. I was feeling quite discouraged-I have so many trials with them. June 25th. This evening I commenced a "Singing practice;" seven present. June 29th. Yesterday morning, Sabbath, a squaw came. I read to her. Sunday School, twenty-five children; nearly all Indians. Evening meeting, twenty. They were very attentive. I read about the Saviour's death. Urged them to accept salvation now. I hope the seed will find a lodgement in some heart! Liquor is being taken just now to a great extent. I told them that if they did not give up taking it, it would send them to destruction at last. June 30th. This evening I had a temperance meeting, six present, three joined the pledge. Some of the men have been turned from work on account of drunkenness." Under date of July 7th, she says, "Some pagan Indians and squaws from Sagamook visited me. I told them about God, Heaven and Hell. Some listened, others laughed, and went out of the room. * * * After they left, two christian Indians came; one of the men asked me for an Indian Testament, which I gave him. July 8th. After School to-day a number of squaws came to see me. They were all pagans. Afterwards I went to their camp with an interpreter, and told them about the Saviour. July 9th. Commenced a Mothers' Prayer Meeting with the women, four in attendance. Last evening I held the temperance meeting again, eleven came; six white men took the pledge, one Indian. I gave them badges." Her largest attendance at School was twenty-three. On one occasion she had "Bible Readings" at an Indian's shanty, and so many came, that some stood without. Some of the pagan women mocked. On 29th August, Miss Baylis gave the children their annual treat in the Mission House. A travelling Photographer "took" them all, with the Teacher, in a group. In the afternoon they had tea in the School Room, and received their gifts and prizes. The kind ladies who have, year by year, furnished Miss Baylis with a variety of garments for these little ones, will be interested in the following : "June 19th. Fitted out four little girls with clothing for School. They have just been to see me with their old clothes on. They take the new ones off when they go home, to keep them clean for School. Some of them were very filthy. destitute, and nearly naked; they were all pagans. The clothes which the ladies made have been very useful to the mission."



#### SERPENT RIVER.

So called from two gigantic " serpents " about 100 feet long on the rocks, made by scraping of the moss and lichens—an ancient land-mark near the

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mouth of the river. A small Indian Village, inhabited by pagan Indians. Peter Kesshick, Native Teacher, was trasferred, as contemplated in last report, at the middle of the year, from Sidney Bay to Serpent River. The ne. gotiations for settling a Teacher had been long pending, and the scheme was, for a time, strongly opposed by the Indians themselves. Mr. Robinson reports, 15th July, 1874, from Blind River, "Serpent Indians here. Visited eight camps Serpent Indians. Saw both the chiefs with their men in council, and persuaded them to receive Keeshick, (who was present), and preached the gospel to them. They are evidently suspicious or fearful, and not at all reliable." On 23rd July Keeshick, with Mr. Robinson's tent, and a sufficient stock of provisions, started for Serpent River; where the Missionary Superintendent and the Secretary found him early in August, gradually winning his way among the people, and spent a Sabbath with him-preaching twice to the Indians, besides (on the Saturday) having a " council," at which the elements of the Christian religion, as well as "business," were thoughtfully gone over. The men were very respectful. An Indian house was obtained for the Teacher. and Mr. Robinson resumed possession of his tent. At the end of the season Keeshick reported that the band had treated him kindly. His scholars had given him great satisfaction. He had given his boys all Christian names, ames, Peter, &c., which he assured the deputation they would retain during life, and of which the little fellows seemed very proud. Were they not now on the high road to civilization when they were reading the white man's books, and had, like him, two names? Keeshick is again engaged for Serpent River. All these stations will receive the assiduous care and superintendence of Mr. Lister during the season of open water.


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#### FRENCH BAY, SAUGEEN.

This Indian Church is of the first importance in our missionary operations. It is now many years since it was organized, and its history has been that of a true church of Jesus Christ. A number of men and women, strong in their simple faith in Christ, have gone from its membership to that of the church above, and others still in the church, would, in sincere and reputable Christian walk and conversation, compare favorably with any Christians elsewhere. Mr. William Walker (otherwise called Barrell) still remains in charge of the church as preacher. After having made proof of his ministry at Saugeen and elsewhere for a number of years, he might now, the Directors think, look forward to his being set apart by ordination, to the full work of a Christian pastor. Two of the female members have died during the year. The church has a present membership of thirty. Mr. Walker reports two young people as candidates for church membership. Sabbath School, twenty in attendance. The chapel is free from debt. The little reed organ (for they are very musical) bears still a troublesome debt of \$27. Mr. Walker says in his last report, (April, 1875,) "I have prayer meeting every Thursday. I have preaching at Saugeen every other Sunday. Preaching twice at French Bay every Sunday. French Bay is quite a large settlement. Almost all attend my meetings. We have no pastor; I am acting here as preacher. I had revival meetings here last month. Very good meetings. I often visit my friends, and pray with them. We have had some very refreshing seasons." The children at French Bay are instructed in secular branches at a School supported by the Indian Department.

French Bay settlement is six or seven miles north of Saugeen Indian Village---on the same "Reserve." Mr. Walker, by the aid of a trifling grant from the Society, repaired a house at French Bay, and removed his family thither from *Saugeen* in the autumn. He is thus nearer the chapel, and nearer the greater number of his members. This church has been visited, (in each case including Sabbath services among them) since the date of the last report, several times by Mr. Robinson, once by the Secretary, and once by



Mr. Lister. Mr. Walker accompanied Mr. Robinson last summer, for some weeks, in the "Aurora," during his missionary exploration in the north. He will do the same with Mr. Lister this summer. Fortunately Mr Walker has a band of praying men and women, and some experienced preaching *Deacons*, in whose hands he can safely leave the affairs of the church for a time.

With this brief outlook at the work and its prospects, the mission is left with God, for whose glory it is done—with the friends everywhere, who have sympathized with us and have aided us, and with the churches, whose own spirituality is promoted by having such a work to do.

MINUTES OF THE EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING,

HELD IN THE CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH, HAMILTON.

JUNE 11th, 1875.

The Provident Fund Society met in the Congregational Church, Hamilton, June 11th, 1875, at 2.30 p.m.

Mr. Wm. Edgar, of Hamilton, was called to the chair, and Mr. S. J. Lyman, of Montreal, appointed Secretary. After prayer the roll was called and the following members answered to their names :—

Revs. Messrs. W. H. Allworth, R. Brown, W. Clarke, Geo. Cormish, C. Chapman, J. Howell, J. I. Hindley, S. N. Jackson, F. H. Marling, D. Macallum, J. McKillican, A. McGregor, J. G. Sanderson, J. Salmon, W. W. Smith, J. Unsworth, J. Wood, Dr. Wilkes, J. A. R. Dickson, W. Manchee, E. D. Silcox, W. H. A. Claris. Delegates representing churches -J. Crow, Guelph; J. Fraser, Bond street, Toronto; Geo. Pim, Zion Church, Toronto. The Reports of the Society were presented by Mr. T. Robertson, of Montreal, in the absence of the Secretary of the Board. The Rev. H. J. Colwell enquired whether under Article No. 4, sec. 1, he could transfer his name, with funds to his credit in the Widows' and Orphans' Fund branch, to the Retiring Fund branch. The question was referred to the Secretary of the Board. Rev. Wm. Clarke addressed the Society on the state of the endowment for the Retiring Ministers' Fund branch. It was proposed that five thousand dollars should be raised. Of this, Ontario would raise \$3,000, and Quebec \$2,000. He was happy to be able to report that \$3,400 had been promised in Ontario, of which \$1,234.66 had been paid in. It was moved by the Rev. S. N. Jackson, seconded by the Rev. R. Brown, and Resolved, that the report be amended by inserting the names of churches and individuals entitled to representation at the annual meeting; and that the following gentlemen constitute the Board of Directors for the ensuing year :---Messrs. J. C. Barton, C. R. Black, C. Alexander, J. R. Dougall, J. S. McLachlan, R. Dunn, R. C. Jamieson, W. R. Ross, T. Robertson, and J. Baylis.


In reference to notice of motion of last year, it was moved by R. Brown, seconded by Rev. J. Wood, and

five years' annual subscriptions he shall have the privilege of withdrawing from the Society, and receiving as surrender value of his claim on its funds, two-fifths of the amount of the premiums paid in by him."

The following ministers applied for membership in the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Branch, and, having been balloted for, were unanimously elected,—The Rev. John Fredk. Stevenson, LL.B., Montreal; Rev. E. C. W. McColl, M.A., Brantford; Rev. Robt. Hay, Forest. The Rev. S. N. Jackson moved, seconded by Rev. R. Brown, that the Secretary be instructed to send notices to members of amounts and subscriptions due.— Carried.

The meeting then adjourned to meet in Montreal in 1876.

Following your instructions, your Board secured the services of the Rev. Wm. Clarke to collect specially among the churches for the Retiring Ministers' Fund branch. The result of his labors are shown in the accompanying financial statement. From it, it will be seen that there is now a fair prospect of this fund becoming operative by next year. The capital of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund Branch shows a satisfactory increase.

During the year Rev. W. F. Clarke, and Rev. J. M.
