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CONSTITUTION.

(Adopted 1879.)

I.—This Convention shall be known as the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces.

II.—The objects of the Convention shall be to maintain the educational and missionary operations of the body, and to advance the general interests of the denomination.

III.—The membership of the Convention shall be composed as follows:—
lst. Each of the Baptist Associations in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick,
and Prince Edward Island shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the
Convention five of its own members as delegates to represent it therein.

2nd. Each Church connected with any of the above-named Associations, and contributing annually toward the objects of the Convention, shall be entitled to send one of its members to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and an additional delegate for every twenty dollars contributed to those objects during the ,ear; but no Church shall be entitled to send more than five delegates.

3rd. Every ordained Baptist Minister connected with one of the Churches above mentioned, either in the relation of pastor or member, shall be a member of the Convention.

4th. Any member of one of these Churches who shall have contributed towards the objects of the Convention fifty dollars at one time, previous to the 27th of August, 1879,—or one hundred dollars at one time, after that date, shall be a life-member of the Convention.

5th. The President and Faculty of Acadia College, being members of any of the Churches above mentioned, shall be ex officio members of the Convention.

IV.—The Officers of the Convention shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and an Assistant Secretary; all of whom shall be elected annually from among the members, except the Secretary, who shall be elected triennially.

V.—The Convention shall meet annually, at such place as shall be agreed on by the body, and shall commence its session on the first Saturday after the 18th of August, at 10 o'clock, A. M.

A special meeting of the Convention may be called at any time by the President, on a requisition signed by the Officers of the Convention and the Secretaries of the three Boards, viz.: of Governors of Acadia College, of Foreign Missions, and of Home Missions, in the Convention.

VI.—There shall be a Board of Home Missions and a Board of Foreign Missions appointed by the Convention, each consisting of fifteen members of the body, five of whom shall retire each year in the order of their appointment, but shall be eligible for re-appointment. Five members shall form a quorum of each Board.

VII.—The Convention shall, once in three years, appoint six new members of the Board of Governors of Acadia College in place of six who will then go out of office, in rotation, in accordance with the resolution passed by the Convention in September, 1850, and with the Act of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, 14 Vic., cap. 37.

VIII.—The Convention shall also appoint a Ministerial Education Board, and a Board for the management of a Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund, each of which Boards shall consist of nine members of the Convention, three of whom shall retire annually, in the order of their appointment, but shall be eligible for re-appointment. Three members shall form a quorum of each Board.

IX.—Vacancies occurring in the Secretaryship, or in any of the foregoing Boards may be filled by the Convention at any session.

X.—This Constitution shall not be altered or amended except by vote of two-thirds of the members present at any meeting; written notice of the proposed alteration or amendment having been given at the last preceding annual meeting.

RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. Every sitting shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. Persons invited to a seat may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on none.;
- 3. No person shall speak oftener than twice on any motion, unless by permission of the body.
- 4. Motions made and lost shall not be recorded in the Minutes, except so ordered at the time.
- 5. The government of the body, and the regulations of its proceedings, shall be strictly in accordance with parliamentary usage, so called.
- 6. Immediately after the opening of the Convention these rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair.

Creed, the following resolution, moved by Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D. D., and seconded by Rev. E. M. Saunders, was passed:

Resolved, That a Committee of five be appointed to consider this, the fourth clause of the Foreign Mission Report, and recommend a course of action in treatment of it at the beginning of this evening's session.

Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D. D., Rev. E. A. Crawley, D. D., B. H. Eaton, Rev. D. G. McDonald, and Rev. A. Chipman were appointed as that Committee.

Session closed after prayer by Rev. I. J. Skinner, of Alma, N. B.

THIRD SESSION.

SATURDAY EVENING.

Opened at 7.40 P.M. Prayer by Rev. J. F. Avery, of Halifax, N.S. Minutes of last session read and confirmed.

Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D. D., submitted the Report of the Committee appointed to consider t'e fourth clause of the Foreign Mission Report, and to recommend a course of action to the Convention. The Report and the subject under consideration were discussed at length by C. E. Knapp, Rev. G. E. Good, A. Longley, Rev. W. F. Armstrong, Rev. G. E. Day, Rev. I. E. Bill, D.D., John March, Rev. G. N. Ballentine.

On motion of Bro. A. W. Masters, the further consideration of the Report was postponed for one hour to resume the order of business for this evening's session,

The hymn beginning-

"Jesus shall reign where'er the sun,"

was sung, and addresses on Foreign Missions were given by Rev. John McLaurin, of Cocanada, India; Bro. J. R. Hutchinson, (Lic.), Missionary elect to Chicacole; Rev. W. F. Armstrong, returned Missionary; and Rev. Wm. George, of Zeegong, Burmah.

A collection was taken, and the Convention resumed business.

Resolved, That members of the Woman's Missionary Aid Societies present be invited to remain during the session.

On motion of Rev. E. Hickson,

Resolved, That the public be invited to remain and listen to the discussion of the questions that are to engage our attention.

The Report of the Committee on the fourth clause of the Foreign Mission Report was then discussed by Rev. J. B. McQuillin, Rev. Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D. D., Henry Lovett, and others.

Moved by Rev. E. M. Keirstead, seconded by Rev. A. Cohoon, and Resolved, That Rev. W. F. Armstrong be requested to submit in writing a statement of the reasons which have led him to resign his connection with this Convention as its Missionary.

In compliance with the request of the President, Rev. W. F. Armstrong came forward and read from MS. until 11.58 P. M., when, on motion of Rev. Geo. O. Gates, the further consideration of this matter was postponed till Monday morning at 9.30 o'clock. Adjourned after prayer by Rev. Wm. George.

LORD'S DAY, Aug. 21st, 1881.

A very large congregation had assembled at 3 P. M., when the service began. After introductory exercises, conducted by Rev. G. O. Gates, A. M., Rev. J. C. Morse, and Rev. D. G. McDonald, the Convention Sermon was preached by Rev. J. E. Hopper, A. M., of St. John, N. B. Text—Eph. ii. 20–22. Theme—The Foundation, Character, and Design of the Church.

Prayer was offered by Rev. D. G. McDonald, and Rev. Dr. Bill effectively addressed the meeting, giving reminiscences of a Baptist Association held in Yarmouth in 1829.

After singing, the benediction was pronounced by Rev. T. A. Higgins, A. M.

FOURTH SESSION.

MONDAY MORNING, August 22nd.

The Convention was called to order at 9.30 A. M., by A. Simpson, Esq., Vice-President, and prayer was offered by Rev. J. C. Bleakney, of Berwick, N. S.

The Minutes of last session, and of the service on Lord's Day, were read and approved.

Dr. Rand, President, then took the chair.

The following resolution was moved by A. Longley, and seconded by C. E. Knapp:

Resolved, That unless Bro. Armstrong is now prepared to submit his charges against the Board in writing, that he shall at once give place to the Foreign Mission Board, that they may put their side of the case before the Convention, and in that event the Board have one hour allotted them for that purpose; in the event of Bro. Armstrong proceeding with his charges in written form, that half-an-hour only be allowed him to do so.

Discussed by Dr. Sawyer, Rev. J. B. McQuillin, and passed.

Rev. W. F. Armstrong then took the platform, and read from manuscript a statement of his charges against the Board. The half-hour granted by resolution of the Convention having expired, it was moved by Rev. G. O. Gates, seconded by Rev. Dr. Welton, and

Resolved, That another half-hour be granted Bro. Armstrong in which to continue his statement.

Mr. Armstrong having read the second half-hour, and taken his seat, it was, on motion,

Resolved, That the Foreign Mission Board be requested to reply to the statements of Bro. Armstrong read by him.

Rev. W. P. Everett, Secretary of the Foreign Missionary Board,

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Closed the floor. Prayer

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then took the platform in compliance with this resolution of Convention, and addressed the body.

The hour for adjournment having come, it was Resolved, That the Convention adjourn till 1.30 o'clock.

Prayer by Rev. I. J. Skinner, of Alma, N. B.

FIFTH SESSION.

MONDAY AFTERNOON.

The Convention was called to order by Dr. Rand at 1.30 P. M. Prayer by Rev. T. A. Higgins, of Annapolis, N. S.

Minutes of morning session read and approved.

Rev. W. P. Everett resumed his reply to Mr. Armstrong's statements for some time, and then gave place to Bro. John March, who addressed the Convention, and read the statement of the Foreign Missionary Board on this subject.

Rev. W. F. Armstrong then replied to the brethren who had spoken in behalf of the Board.

The time was extended half-an-hour, and discussion was continued by several brethren.

Closed at 6 o'clock, with Rev. W. F. Armstrong in possession of the floor.

Prayer by Rev. Isa. Wallace.

SIXTH SESSION.

MONDAY EVENING.

Session opened at 7.30 P.M. Prayer by Rev. J. T. Eaton, of Paradise, N. S.

Minutes of this afternoon session approved.

Rev. W. F. Armstrong resumed his answer to the Foreign Missionary Board. At the close of his address Rev. W. H. Warren, A. M., moved the following resolution, of which he had given notice in the afternoon session, viz.:

Resolved, That having heard the grave charges preferred by Rev. W. F. Armstrong, returned Missionary, regarding the spirit and policy of our Foreign Missionary Board, and the evidence connected with these charges, and having heard in reply the explanations and detailed statements of our Board respecting these charges, this Convention, whilst sincerely sympathizing with the Missionary and his family in any financial or other difficulties through which they may have passed, owing to circumstances which, however unfortunate, did not evidently arise on account of any carelessness on the part of our Board, are satisfied that the charges made by Rev. W. F. Armstrong against our Foreign Mission Board are not sustained, and that our Board have shown themselves to be entitled to the unabated confidence and gratitude of this Convention.

This resolution was seconded by Rev. G. E. Good, A. M., and spoken to by Rev. W. H. Warren, Rev. G. E. Good, Rev. J. Rowe, C. E. Knapp, Rev. C. Goodspeed, E. W. Ellott, Rev. D. Freeman, Rev. John Gammon, C. B. Whidden, Rev. A. Estabrooks, Wm.

Faulkner, Henry Lovett, Rev. Dr. Crawley, H. C. Creed, A. Longley, J. S. Trites, Dr. Day, and passed.

Rev. Dr. Day then moved the following:

Resolved, That this Convention deeply sympathizes with Brother and Sister Armstrong in their cares and toils, and sincerely hopes that the time may speedily arrive when such an agreement shall be made by the Foreign Mission Board and Brother Armstrong as will lead to the return of Brother and Sister Armstrong to the mission station at Chicacole.

This was seconded by Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D., supported by Rev. J. E. Hopper, A. M., and passed unanimously.

On motion, adjourned at 12.15 A. M., of Tuesday, Aug. 23rd. Prayer by Rev. W. H. Richan.

SEVENTH SESSION,

TUESDAY MORNING, August 23rd.

The President took the chair at 9.30 A. M. Prayer by Rev. John Gammon, of Havelock, N. B.

Minutes of last session confirmed.

The Foreign Mission Report was then taken up, and the several clauses, on which Convention had not passed, adopted. The Report as a whole, and the Treasurer's Report were adopted. (See Index.)

By request of Convention Rev. A. Cohoon, A. M., Secretary of the Home Missionary Board, then read the Annual Report of that Board. It was adopted after discussion by Rev. J. W. Manning, Rev. A. H. Lavers, Rev. J. E. Hopper, J. W. Barss, Rev. Dr. Bill, Rev. I. J. Skinner, and others. (See Index.)

The Report of the Treasurer of the Home Mission Board was then adopted. (See Index.)

Subscriptions towards paying the indebtedness of the Home Mission Board were given to the amount of \$853.25.

On motion of Rev. A. W. Barss, the thanks of Convention were given to the brethren comprising the Home Mission Board for their services during the past year.

Rev. J. H. Hughes being absent, Rev. Dr. Bill was appointed to take his place on Committee on Ordination.

Adjourned after prayer by Rev. I. J. Skinner.

EIGHTH SESSION.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

Convention opened at usual time, the President in the Chair. Prayer was offered by Rev. A. W. Barss.

Minutes read and approved.

Rev. W. H. Warren then moved the following:

Resolved, That a suitable reply be forwarded by our Secretary to Rev. J. M. Cramp, D.D., thanking him for his kind letter and valuable suggestions, and expressing the affectionate esteem in which he continues to be held by the members of this Convention.

The motion was seconded, and unanimously passed.

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Wolfville.

Rev. J. W. Manning read the Report of the Board of Management of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund. Rev. E. M. Saunders, Treasurer of the Board, read his Report. These Reports were discussed by J. W. Barss, Dr. Day, Rev. S. W. DeBlois, D. D., A. W. Masters, S. Selden, and laid on the table.

The Report of the Finance Committee of the Convention was read, by Dr. Day for Nova Scotia; by John March for New Brunswick; and by Rev. D. G. McDonald, for Prince Edward

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On motion, the report of the Committee was adopted. (See Index.)

Moved by Rev. T. A. Higgins, seconded by Rev. W. H. Warren, and unanimously

Resolved, That as a slight expression of the appreciation of his efficient and arduous labors in connection with the finances of our denomination during the past and previous years, \$100 be paid to Rev. Dr. Day from the Emergency Fund of the money in hand from the Convention Scheme.

Dr. Day made a suitable acknowledgment.

Moved by J. S. Trites and unanimously

Resolved, That in recognition of his valuable services in connection with the finances of our denomination during the past year the sum of \$100 be paid Bro. John March.

Bro. March thanked the Convention and made a donation of the amount to the funds of the Convention.

On motion, of Rev. J. B. Woodland it was unanimously

Resolved, That the sum of \$35 be paid Rev. D. G. McDonald in recognition of his valued services in connection with our denominational finances during the past year.

Bro. McDonald expressed his appreciation of this action of the Convention, and presented the sum to the Convention funds.

On motion, the Convention then went into consideration of the finances of the Convention. Addresses were made by Judge Johnston, Rev. D. Freeman, and Rev. J. E. Hopper.

The following was moved by Rev. J. A. Durkee, seconded by R. M. King:

Resolved, That a Committee of seven be appointed to report to the Convention on denominational finance, with especial reference to the appointment, and duties of a General Financial Agent.

Spoken to by Rev. J. A. Durkee, R. M. King, C. B. Whidden, Rev. J. Rowe, D. R. Eaton, E. H. Jones, Wm. Faulkner, and

The following brethren were then appointed as this Committee, viz.: D. R. Eaton, J. H. Harding, Dr. Day, Rev. D. G. McDonald, Rev. W. P. Everett, Rev. J. W. Manning, C. F. Clinch.

Adjourned after prayer by Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D. D., of Wolfville.

NINTH SESSION.

TUESDAY EVENING.

President called the Convention to order at 7.30. Prayer by Rev. J. W. Weeks, of Chester, N. S.

Minutes of last session confirmed.

The Secretary read a Circular from the Dominion Temperance Alliance addressed to the Convention, whereupon Bro. A. Longley moved the following:

Referring to the Circular from the Dominion Alliance, just submitted to this Convention, asking for some expression of opinion in reference to the Canada Temperance Act, and attempts lately made in Parliament to mar or destroy the said Act;

Resolved, That this Convention will petition the next Parliament to keep said law intact, and, if practicable, improve it.

This was seconded by Henry Lovett, Esq., and unanimously and heartily passed.

Rev. E. M. Saunders, A. M., presented the following preamble and resolution, which were seconded by Judge Johnston, supported by Rev. E. A. Crawley, D. D., and unanimously passed:

Whereas, A work on the history of the Baptist denomination in the Maritime Provinces, by the Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D., referred to in a resolution passed by the Convention last year, has been issued from the press, and is now before the public;

Therefore resolved, That this Convention place on record its conviction that this work, replete with valuable information concerning our denominational operations, and prepared by a brother who has been intimately acquainted with the events and the persons of whom he writes for a period of more than fifty years, must prove exceedingly valuable to our ministers and churches; and that we repeat the recommendation of last year, that the members of the churches should aid in the circulation of the work.

On motion of Bro. R. M. King, the thanks of the Convention were then tendered by a rising vote to the friends at Yarmouth for their great kindness and hospitality to the delegates of this Convention during the present session.

President, Rev. A. W. Sawyer, D. D., then read the Report of the Board of Governors of Acadia College, Horton Academy, and Acadia Seminary, and the Report of the Treasurer of Acadia College. Prof. J. F. Tufts read the Report of the Curator of Horton Academy and Acadia Seminary.

These Reports were spoken to by Rev. C. Goodspeed, A. M., Rev. Prof. D. M. Welton, Ph. D., Rev. S. W. DeBlois, D. D., J. W. Barss, and Rev. E. M. Saunders, A. M. The several clauses of these Reports, and the Reports entire, were passed by the Convention. (See Index.)

On motion,

Resolved, That the only consolidation we desire in reference to Acadia College is a consolidated Endowment Fund.

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The Bapt Yarmouth, and restora Secretary B stances of in Rev. W. H. Warren read the further Report of the Committee on Nomination, as follows:

Resolved, That the various Committees of the Convention have power to fill any vacancies that may occur during the year.

Moved by Rev. I. E. Bill, D.D., seconded by Rev. A. H. Lavers,

Resolved, That the following telegram be transmitted to Washington by the President of the Convention:

To Secretary Blaine, Washington, U. S.:

The Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, now in session at Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, offer united prayer to Almighty God for the life and restoration to health of President Garfield. and beg to present to Secretary Blaine their expression of profound regret in view of the circumstances of imminent danger which now threaten the President's life.

Rev. J. W. Manning read the Report of the Committee on employing a Financial Agent, as follows:

Resolved, That we recommend to the Convention that the Finance Committee procure an Agent for the ensuing year, to secure the successful working of the Convention plan of raising funds for our respective Boards, and inasmuch as Acadia College is in special need of financial assistance, the said Agent be instructed to make special efforts on behalf of that Institution, and furthermore as the Board of Governors propose to pay one-half of an Agent's salary, that said Agent be under the control and direction of said Board in making the special effort for the College.

The Report was adopted.

Rev. J. B. Woodland read the Report of the Committee on publishing Minutes of Associations and Year Book. The Report was recommitted, to be submitted again as soon as practicable, Rev. A. Cohoon being appointed Chairman of the Committee in place of Rev. J. B. Woodland.

The Report of the Committee on Ordination was read by Rev. Geo. Armstrong, D. D., and adopted. (See Index.)

Bro. J. R. Hutchinson, Missionary elect, came to the platform, and, at the President's request, Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D., extended to him the right hand of fellowship, and the sympathies of the denomination, the Convention standing during the Address.

Rev. W. H. Warren finished reading the Report on the State of Religion in the Denomination. After amendment, the Report was adopted. (See Index.)

The Report of the Board of Management of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund was taken from the table, amended, and adopted. (See Index.)

Resolved, That a Committee of five be appointed to prepare a form for statistics of the churches, and to submit that form to the several Associations next year for their adoption, and that Rev. Geo. O. Gates, Rev. J. B. Woodland, H. C. Creed, Rev. J. A. Durkee, and Rev. E. M. Keirstead be that Committee.

The Report of the Treasurer of Convention was adopted, and the Secretary's bill of \$18.71 for expenses of his office ordered to be paid.

Resolved, That the Secretaries of the Convention and Rev. J. W. Manning be the Committee on publishing the Year Book of 1881; that 3,000 copies be printed, and 100 copies be reserved for use of Conventionat next session; that the cost of publication be equally divided between the Home Mission Board, Foreign Mission Board, and the Board of Governors of Acadia College, and that these Boards be ordered to pay the drafts of the Publication Committee according to the above division.

On motion, the Committee on Dr. Cramp's History was reappointed, to stand as follows: Rev. George Armstrong, D. D., Rev. S. W. DeBlois, D. D., Rev. E. M. Keirstead, Rev. S. B. Kempton, Rev. E. M. Saunders.

On motion of Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D., seconded by Rev. President Sawyer, D. D., the thanks of the Convention were tendered to Dr. Rand for discharge Conven

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Rand for the dignity, ability, and impartiality with which he has discharged the duties of President at this trying session of the Convention.

Thanks of Convention were also voted to the Secretaries for their services.

Minutes of this session read and approved, and, on motion, the Convention adjourned at 11.40 P. M., to meet with the Leinster Street Church, St. John, N. B., at 10 o'clock, A. M.. on the Saturday after the 18th of August, 1882.

College, and seven in special studies, making a total of sixty-three. The indications are that the Matriculating class for the coming year will be larger than that of last year, and the prospect so far as attendance is concerned, is encouraging. The reports from the officers in charge show that the studies of the year have been pursued with the usual success. The students, as a body, are reported to have engaged in their proper work with commendable industry and zeal. It was decided at the opening of the year to admit ladies to the privileges of the classes in the College. One young lady has maintained first-class standing in all the studies of the Freshman Class of last year, and two otners maintained similar standing in the same Class, in the Mathematical Department. It is expected that several young ladies will join College Classes next year. Thus the privileges of the College will henceforth be open to the sons and daughters of the land, and on the same conditions. Still it is not probable that a large number of young ladies will make use of these privileges, as the shorter course of the Seminary will be found to be better adapted to the demands for the education of young women. The Board believe that the English Department of the College is now in a condition of great efficiency. The accession of Dr. Schurman to the staff of instruction has been a great gain, which we hope may be long continued. The vacancy caused by the retirement of Professor Kennedy from the Scientific Department has not yet been filled. The Board, understanding that Dr. Blaikie. of Edinburgh, whose testimonials were of the highest character. would accept the position if it was offered to him, appointed him to the place last June, but before this communication reached him he had accepted an appointment at Bristol, England. But the Board intend to make suitable provision for instruction in this Department at the earliest practicable moment.

HORTON ACADEMY.

Fifty-nine have been enrolled in this Department in the last year, twenty-six of whom were in the Senior Division. In this School attention is chiefly directed to the preparation of young men for College. The Board believe the work done is creditable to both teachers and pupils; though it would probably be better if the students would spend a longer time in the Academical Department. The Board have to announce the retirement of Professor Tufts from the Principalship of the Academy. This has been permitted solely in consequence of Professor Tufts' earnest solicitations to be relieved from some of his more pressing responsibilities, as he felt that his health was failing under the stress of labor to which he has been subject for some years. The Board cannot let the occasion pass without placing on record an expression of the great value of Professor Tufts' services as head of the Academy for the past eight years, and their testimony to his cheerful and unwearied efforts to promote the success of our Institutions at Wolfville. They have pleasure in adding that he will continue in charge of the Department of History in the College, and will give instruction to such Classes in the Academy and Seminary as the Executive Committee may assign to him. Mr. A. W. Armstroug, A. B., who was connected with the Academy last year as teacher of Greek and English, has been appointed Principal. The Board believe that the arrangements for this Department for the coming year will prove to be deserving of the patronage of the public.

ACADIA EMINARY.

The number enrolled in the Seminary the past year was fifty-one. Two graduated from this Department in June last, and several others are contemplating the completion of the couse of study. The Principal reports that "in individual attainments, regularity of attendance, and in the character of the work done there has been marked improvement" during the year. Your Board are of the opinion that the superior accommodations, and the carefully arranged courses of study in this Department are deserving of a much larger patronage than they have yet received.

THE THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

The Professors connected with the Theological Department report that five students have been connected with the classes in New Testament Greek, nine in Hebrew, six in Theology, and twenty in Homiletics. Dr. Crawley has continued to give instruction in New Testament Greek, and Dr. Welton in Hebrew and Theology. These Professors have performed much hard labor in connection with this Department, and are worthy of the sympathy of the denomination. Two young men, Messrs. Malcom P. King and Christopher Haverstock, having completed the three years' course of study, received testimonials of the same last June. The courses of study have been more perfectly adapted to the conditions of the Department, and the prospect is that a larger number of students will connect themselves with its Classes. The demand for Theological Education at Acadia is too strong to be disregarded, and it is the purpose of your Board to make the Department as efficient as possible in the circumstances.

LEGISLATIVE ACT TO COMPLETE TITLE.

It appears that the formality of the transfer of property by the Nova Scotia Baptist Education Society to the Governors of Acadia College was not quite complete. The Board intend to apply to the Legislature at its next session for the passage of a suitable Act by which their title to the real estate received from the Education Society will be placed beyond question.

ACADEMY GRANT.

The Convention are aware that, in agreeement with an Act passed five years ago, the College Grant ceased last winter. The Board have decided that this is the proper time to seek a renewal of the Grant to Horton Academy, so that it may be placed on the same basis as the Special Academies of Nova Scotia. Correspondence in relation to this subject has been opened with the Government of Nova Scotia, and the results will be reported at a future time.

FINANCES

For the first time in several years the Board have to report a deficiency in the Academical Departments. The causes of this condition will be carefully sought out, and the hope may be cherished that these Departments will be self-sustaining. It should be distinctly understood that financial success here depends on a full attendance of students, and that with a full attendance the Institutions are accomplishing the very purpose for which they exist.

The Board have been considerably pressed during the past year by the financial condition of the College. This will be set before the

Convention by the Treasurer's Report. For two or three years previous to the last the annual income did not equal the expenses. Notwithstanding the fact that the Convention has given a larger revenue to the College than in previous years, this deficiency has been largely increased during the past year by the failure of one source of income. The Board made a careful survey of the state of their finances last November, and decided that they could not continue to be held by the legal and moral responsibilities which lay upon them, unless some special efforts could be made to enlarge the income of the College. They wished that the interests for which they were responsible should be promoted in harmony with the general plans of the Convention, and therefore they have patiently waited till this time to see what might be the more mature development of those plans, hoping that a stage would be reached when they might satisfy the claims of the obligations which rest upon them by co-operation with the representatives of the other Boards of the Convention. The College Board are pleased to see indications that the time is near when the general scheme for the benevolence of the denomination shall be vitalized by one directing and stimulating mind, and they believe that the Convention will not permit the present occasion to pass without adopting some plan by which the desired co-operation can be effected, and our educational institutions placed on a firmer basis, and thus made more useful to the people by whom they are supported.

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Report of the Foreign Missionary Board.

The close of another fiscal year of the Convention imposes on us the presentation of the Annual Report of the official acts of the

MEETINGS.

The usual routine business has been carried on as in previous years, and been shaped and directed by ihe Board in their monthly and adjourned meetings. We have he'd 21 such meetings during the past year, being a number somewhat in excess of former years. Our meetings have been held in the office of one of our mercantile firms, who have favored us as at former periods with gratuitous accom-

FINANCIAL.

The total receipts of our Treasury for contributions during the year have been \$4705.17. The contributions of the churches and W. M. A. Societies of New Brunswick have been \$1734.25, being \$977.54 in excess for the amount received last year; and from P. E. Island there has been contributed \$333.78, an advance over last year

The receipts from Nova Scotia have been: Contributions, \$2637.14; legacies, \$270; total \$2907.14; being a decrease on the preceding year of contributions \$605.80, and of legacies \$343.86.

We have been able to meet all demands upon our Treasury, and still leave a balance with which to meet the extra expense to be incurred in providing an outfit and the passages across the oceans for a new missionary family which we expect to send to India shortly.

We had at the beginning of the year confidently hoped that the Convention Plan of providing funds for the benevolent objects of our denomination would, during the present year, be so fully endorsed and generally adopted by the churches as to largely increase our income. But in this matter we admit a feeling of disappointment, but do not attempt to attach the blame of comparative failure to

In December last our Board were approached through a delegate bearing a proposition from the Board of Governors of Acadia College, desiring to enter into an arrangement whereby a Financial Agent might be placed in the field to visit the churches with a view to securing a further endowment for Acadia College, and at the same time to solicit the practical support of the Convention Scheme by the churches, the College proposing to pay a liberal portion of the

Our Board did not feel free to lend themselves in any way to interfere with the work of the Committee to whom the Convention had entrusted the financial operations necessary to secure funds for the various benevolent objects sustained by the denomination.

We feared that the Finance Committee might possibly be embarrassed by the attempt of any Board making a special appeal to the denomination for extra subscriptions. We, therefore, passed the following resolution as a reply to the proposition of the Governors of

Resolved, That the Foreign Mission Board is perpared to support any arrangement upon which the Finance Committee of the Convention may decide for the appointment of a Financial Agent to secure the support of the so-called Convention Scheme, either in connection with the appointment of a special agency in the interests of Acadia College, or otherwise.

We have never heard of any practical outcome of this proposition to place a Financial Agent in the field, and it may be that the services of such an official were requisite to enable the Finance Committee of the Convention to achieve the object aimed at by the Scheme.

Certain it is that our department of the work of the denomination, as well as all the other departments, requires an increase of income to enable us to maintain efficiently even our present missionary corps, leaving out the question of an extension of our operations to such a degree as might reasonably be expected of us, and which our present facilities would enable us to undertake at a comparatively small increase of expenditure.

Our disbursements during the past year have been equal to the demands of our missionaries on the field.

OUR MISSION STATIONS.

We have but little more to record of the events occurring on the respective fields than has been presented to the denomination through the missionaries' letters published during the year in the Messenger and Visitor.

We have been expecting formal reports from the respective stations, and they are probably on their way, and we may be allowed to append them, if deemed necessary to our Report when it is published in the next Year Book.

We would, however, here make a few notes of a general character which may be of interest to the churches. We have in our mission three principal stations, wiz.:—

I. Bimlipatam. Rev. R. Sanford and wife, missionaries; native helpers, 3.

Here we have a fine mission compound which cost us over Rs. 10,000, and, including the land, much of which was a donation, Bro. Sanford says is worth at the market rate Rs. 15,000. The Mission House, capable of accommodating two families, is built of brick and stone. and occupies a beautiful situation.

The church connected with this station was reported in January last as numbering 31. Two baptisms have since been reported. Bro. Sanford is now giving his time to direct mission labor in his own town, and in the outlying densely populated district, and is meeting with a good degree of encouragement. His wite is engaged also in school work.

2. Bobbilly. Rev. G. Churchill and wife; I native preacher just engaged.

Here we have also a good compound, whose buildings are just about completed, and also a building used for school and a preaching station in the town. This compound and other property has cost over Rs. 6,000. Bro. C. has recently had the privilege of baptizing one at his station, and henceforth he will be enabled to give himself wholly to direct mission work. Mrs. Churchill carries on a promising school.

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3. Chicacole. This station is at present occupied by Miss Hammond, who has been carrying forward, as far as possible, the work which was entrusted to her charge when Bro. Armstrong vacated the station. There have been three or four baptisms at this station during the year. The property there cost upwards of Rs. 5,000, and was purchased very cheaply by Bro. Armstrong.

Thus it may be seen that our Mission possesses more than Rs. 20,000 worth of property in India, and our missionaries are now so situated that they can conveniently work for the conversion of souls, and the strengthening and instruction of the converts.

REINFORCEMENTS.

Immediately upon the organization of our Board, 7th Sept., we commenced our endeavors to secure a speedy reinforcement of our Mission, and were then encouraged to hope that the services of one of our esteemed young pastors would be secured as a co-laborer with Bro. Armstrong at Chicacole. But after waiting a considerable time for a decided reply from the brother we called, we were disappointed by his declining to respond to our appeal.

In the meantime, at a very largely attended meeting, held Sept. 21st, the Board voted a generous allowance for the support of our returned missionary, Bro. Armstrong, during his stay in this country, and at the same meeting, in view of the pressing necessities of the Chicacole station, and of the undue strain on Miss Hammond's health and strength, they deemed it their duty to intimate to Bro. Armstrong that it was their opinion that he should endeavour to return to his field of labor in the East at as early a period as circumstances would permit.

Notice of this action of the Board was duly conveyed to Bro. Armstrong, but though we waited patiently for several weeks for his presence at Board meetings, or for some written expression from him, he gave no response, either of satisfaction or dissatisfaction, with our proposals. At last, in answer to an invitation to attend a Board meeting in November, he intimated to us that if we would appoint a meeting on Nov. 16th, he would be prepared to attend.

We acceded to his proposal, and he met us at that date. After having presented his financial account to us for adjustment, and in answer to interrogatories having given us some account of the situation of the Chicacole station, and his view of its pressing need of full reinforcement, he then declared his desire and intention to resign his connection with our Board. He was requested to submit the resignation in writing, that it might be acted upon in due form.

We then adjourned our meeting until the next day to afford our brother time to complete his accounts, to convey to the Board the real estate in India held in Mr. Armstrong's name, and to place his resignation in writing, if he still persisted in his intention of leaving our Mission.

On the next day he submitted his resignation, which was couched in the following language:

To the Baptist Foreign Mission Board of N. S., N. B., and P. E. I.: Dear Brethren.—

I am not willing to return to India to labor or attempt to labor under the policy and spirit manifested towards us by you; I therefore beg to lay my resignation on your table.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 17th, 1880. W. F. Armstrong.

Bro. A. was requested to state what causes, if any, had arisen for now pressing his resignation which had not already been, as we supposed, adjudicated on by the last preceding Board, in conjunction with the large Committee appointed by the Convention at its last session at Hillsboro' to confer with the Board in reference to alleged differences between Mr. A. and the Board.

Bro. A. responded that no difficulties had arisen other than those he had presented before the Board and the Convention Committee of Conference at Hillsboro'.

The Board, therefore, felt that no good purpose could be served by re-opening a discussion of matters which had already received full attention at the hands of the Board and the Convention, and as he now made his resignation peremptory, there was no alternative for the Board but to accept it. Thus our missionary severed his relation to us and to the field whose necessities, he assured us, could not be met with less than the presence and labor of two missionary families

Of the wisdom or unwisdom of our brother's course we have no desire to express an opinion publicly. We suppose that Mr. Armstrong has done what, in his judgment, he deemed to be his duty. To his Master and ours he is responsible.

In consequence of Mr. Armstrong declining to return to Chicacole, the necessity of providing an immediate reinforcement became the more urgent, but we knew of none that we could obtain who was fully eligible to the position. At the first meeting of the Board in September last we had received an application from Mr. John R. Hutchinson for an appointment to the Foreign field, and though we received from several of our pastors, in whose judgment we confide, many strong testimonials commendatory of Bro. H.'s talents and Christian character, yet we deemed it not advisable to give him an appointment until he had received a more extended education.

We then opened correspondence with two esteemed graduates of Acadia College, pursuing their studies in Newton Theological Seminary, but both of them declined to consider the acceptance of an appointment until the completion of their theological course, over two years thence.

We seemed, therefore, shut up to embracing the only course which Providence seemed to open before us, namely, the appointment of Bro. Hutchinson, who, though not so highly qualified as either he or we desired, yet being a diligent and most promising student, and having had considerable experience in school-teaching, we felt that he might meet, to a considerable extent at least, the present demands of the Chicacole station. Therefore, in May last we elected him as our missionary, and expect that very soon after the session of the Convention he will embark for his field in India.

But since all our missionaries on the field strongly appeal for an immediate reinforcement of two men instead of one, we would respectfully invite the Convention to consider this appeal, and take such action as will justify and sustain the Foreign Mission Board in sending out another family as soon as possible, and one or two more young lady missionaries.

We regret to announce that the present resources at our command do not seem sufficiently ample to justify such an enlargement of our work as the present necessities of our mission fields legitimately demand. But it is the opinion, not only of our missionaries on the field, bu mission and will

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field, but of our Board also, that to long defer in sending another missionary beside Bro. Hutchinson will prove to be a false economy, and will almost certainly subject the Mission as a whole to great loss.

OBITUARY.

We consider it our duty and mournful privilege to record the loss which our Foreign Mission has sustained during the year by the death of one who, for more than half a century, had been the constant and deeply devoted friend and advocate of the Foreign Mission cause, namely, Rev. Charles Tupper, D. D., who died in January last. He was for many years the Secretary of the F. M. Board, and carried on the correspondence with the American Baptist Missionary Union during the several years we used that organization as the channel through which we conveyed our contributions for the support of laborers in Burmah.

By his voice and pen alike, by judicious counsel, as well as with frequent and generous contributions of money our dear brother during a long life nobly sustained the Foreign Mission work.

TELUGU SCRIPTURES.

Within a few days past the American Baptist Missionary Union has informed us that the translation of the Scriptures into the Telugu language, which has been prosecuted by Rev. Dr. L. Jewett for over twenty years past, has at last been completed, and the Union kindly offers to supply our Mission with all requisite copies at cost, and the mere expense of transportation.

W. M. A. SOCIETIES.

These auxiliary organizations have brought us under fresh obligations to them during the past year by their generous remittances to our treasury, and by the appropriations they have cheerfully granted for school work and other departments of missionary labor, and also a seasonable grant of \$500 towards the expense incurred in the return of Mrs. Armstrong and family to this country

The Reports of the Central Boards of W. M. A. Societies of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are subjoined to our Report as usual.

ESTIMATES.

The salaries of our missionaries having been increased by the action of the Convention at its last session, and our missionaries being now relieved of their tedious and onerous work of building, are desirous of pushing the work of evangelization by the employment of more native helpers, and by making extensive preaching tours, all of which will require the outlay of large sums of money at each station, the Board feel that the expenditures of the ensuing year cannot be met with a sum less than \$6,000.

It will require wisely laid and successfully executed plans to provide this amount, but we believe it can and will be done if the members of our churches will kindly remember with their benefactions and prayers their brethren and sisters who, having left the oved homes of their native land, and torn themselves away from civilization and refinement to enter death-fraught climes, are there now dwelling and toiling amidst scenes repugnant to their tastes and habits, and revolting to their moral sensibilities.

If, instead of justifying the meagre support of Foreign Missions by the plea of that sordid maxim of a worldly policy, "Charity begins at home," our churches would adopt that divinely-inspired

maxim, as superior to the other as love is to selfshness, "Charity seeketh not her own," then would our treasury be amply supplied.

God grant that the day may soon he ushered in when all Christians may cease to reckon what they give to Missions as so much loss of worldly property, and, on the contrary, believe in their hearts that such contributions are funds wisely and securely invested to

"Dig channels for the streams of love, And let them broadly run"

through the desolate Saharas of heathenism, until the wildernesses shall blossom as the rose, and become the fruitful gardens of our Lord.

The Annual Report from the Central Board of W. M. A. Societies of Nova Scotia to the Convention assembled at Yarmouth, N. S., 1881.

The record of the past year is easily given, for nothing has occurred in our Mission history of a momentous character.

We desire gratefully to acknowledge the preserving care of our Heavenly Father in protecting our beloved missionary, Miss Hammond, from the dread disease of small-pox, which at one time prevailed in the Mission compound, as well as in the town of Chicacole. Miss Hammond still takes charge of the schools and Mission affairs in this station. Her situation there is a trying one in many respects. With great responsibilities resting upon her, she has little society, and must pass many lonely hours, yet her days are busy ones, well filled up with work. We trust her health may prove equal to the strain, and are pleased to know that she will soon be reinforced by the appointment of Mr. and Mrs. Hutchinson to this station. May the blessing of God attend on the movement.

The Central Board of Nova Scotia have sent in to the treasury the sum of \$976.28 since last Convention. They also last winter donated the sum of \$200 to our former missionary, Mrs. Armstrong, for her personal use, and in consideration of past services and labours for the cause of Missions. The Societies in Halifax have agreed to assume the support of Harriamah, the Oriya woman who resides with Miss Hammond; this will be \$25 yearly. We have forty-seven Societies in Nova Scotia; four new ones have been organized this year,—at Margaree, C. B., Lake George, Yarmouth Co., Lockeport, and Antigonish. Four Life Members have been appointed.

The Eleventh Annual Report of the W. M. A. Societies of New Brunswick, to the Convention assembled at Yarmouth, August 20th, 1881.

Our Report must of necessity be brief. We are glad we can say we are not in the retrograde movement but quite the contrary.

Our sisters show by their increased contributions that they love the cause of Missions, and are determined to prove faithful to the trust God has given into their hands.

Our Missionary, Miss Carrie A. Hammond, has had charge of the Chicacole station alone for over a year. Her perseverance and the good judgment she has manifested in uprooting caste prejudices which had existed in the little church, and in the work of bringing the schools wholly under christian influences, prove her to be "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed."

Her regular correspondence with the Central Board is a source of great satisfaction, each communication comes freighted with intelligence of the most interesting nature.

She frequently refers to the kindly manner in which the Foreign Mission Board attends to her every want as far as the finances are concerned, and she attributes, in a large measure, the success which has attended her efforts to the prayerful interest shown in her work, and the thoughtful provision made for her wants by the brethren

The box just received by her, sent by the Fredericton Society, and in which were contributions from various parts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, has greatly cheered her heart. She says when she handles the articles therein contained, it makes the distance between us seem much shorter, and sends back her warmest expressions of

Mrs. Churchill and Mrs. Sanford were also recipients of donations by the box above referred to, and they are encouraged, and have their hearts gladdened by receiving these tokens of love from their friends at home.

Mrs. Churchill's school, taught in the Zayat, purchased by our Aid Societies in the town of Bobbily, is in a flourishing condition. This school is also wholly under Christian influences.

In a letter dated June 28th, she speaks of the first baptism in Bobbily, which took place just a short time before that date. The person baptized had been in their family for about three years. Mrs. Churchill says she has never seen a happier person. After she had made up her mind to follow the Lord in this ordinance, she was talking of Jesus and His love to every one she met. And so the seed

sown is beginning to take root. May the Lord grant an abundant harvest.

Mis. Sanford's school, also taught in a schoolhouse built by our Aid Societies, is in a very healthy condition, taught on the same principle as the others already referred to, and is proving a great blessing to those people. The work is very heavy at all those stations, and helpers are much needed. Three young ladies should go out at once from our own Provinces to their aid. We have heard from time to time that some have their minds turned in that direction, but they are not forthcoming. May the dear Lord stir up their hearts, and call them, and give them no rest, until they have decided to do His work in helping those faithful sisters.

The *Mission Link* comes to us as a welcome visitor, and we would urge upon our Societies to place a copy of it in the hands of every member, and to procure such other missionary reading as will be helpful in their meetings.

We have, in concurrence with the Central Boards of Nova Scotia and P. E. Island, granted the following sums from the General Fund of W. M. A. Societic 3:—\$100 for Miss Hammond, \$100 for Mrs. Churchill, and \$100 for Mrs. Sanford for school purposes; \$500 toward paying Mrs. Armstrong's expenses home; and \$500 for Miss Hammond's salary; making in all \$1,300. We have 45 Societies, and they have contributed \$700 since last Convention.

Report of the Central Board of W. M. A. Societies of P. E. Island to the Convention.

Through the kind Providence of our Heavenly Father we are again permitted to make our Annual Report.

The record of the past year is somewhat discouraging when we consider that of the nine Societies on the Secretary's books from only six have we heard, yet we feel hopeful in the thought that from those who have reported themselves a good degree of interest is manifested, and the amount contributed is more than last year. We would respectfully suggest that it would seem desirable not to reckon the women's missionary money with Convention funds, as there is apt to be misunderstandings in reckoning things together that have no legitimate connection.

The discouragements of the past year in Foreign Mission work have had a very depressing effect on all our efforts in this direction. We humbly trust that the God of Missions will overrule all the mistakes and misunderstandings of His people to His own honour and glory. While we must ever bow to a will higher than ours, we cannot but feel that the loss to our mission at Chicacole of our dear brother and sister Armstrong would be an incalculable one.

We deeply sympathize with our missionary sisters on the Foreign field, especially with our dear sister Hammond in her isolation and loneliness, who, with heroic devotion, has stood to her post, though surroun she mus thus sin Mission. she may been thu

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surrounded by deadly disease and trials of many kinds. Assuredly she must have been upheld by an arm Divine, else she never could, thus single-handed and alone, have carried on the interests of that she may be somewhat relieved from the great responsibility that has been thrust upon her.

While with thankfulness to God we behold the opening fields for women's work, we regret that others divinely gifted and guided do not feel it their privilege to enter those open doors, that they may lead to light and life those benighted, down-trodden daughters of heathenism. Surely no more Christlike work presents itself to the mind or heart of any; and whether we labor on Foreign fields or in self-denying, earnest work at home for the same glorious cause, let us ever remember that the work is the Master's, and that no outward discouragement or trial should make us less active and earnest in carrying out His last commission.

Report of Executive Board.

Your Board herewith present their Third Annual Report of the appropriations of the year, and also the results which this outlay has aided in accomplishing, so far as it is possible to iudicate them. It must be borne in mind that many of these results are too farreaching, and, at the same time, too intangible, to admit of exact measurement and description, save by the Infinite Mind.

Pecuniary aid, amounting to \$3943.87, has been granted to 44 fields, including in all 84 churches.

This amount has been divided as follows: \$2272.49 to 24 fields in Nova Scotia; \$1329.72 to 17 fields in New Brunswick; and \$341.66 to

On these fields 48 brethren have laboured for the whole or part of the year. They have reported 200 stations occupied, 1360 weeks labour, 3876 sermons, 2591 other meetings, 9446 religious visits, 9466 pages of tracts distributed, 249 baptized, 75 received by letter, and two churches organized.

It is not necessary to speak at length of all these fields, but a few words concerning some of them will not unduly tax time or type.

The first in order is Alberton and Point Wolfe, &c., P. E. I. Since

The first in order is Alberton and Point Wolfe, &c., P. E. I. Since September last Rev. E. N. Archibald has laboured on this field half his time. Through his faithful labours difficulties have been removed, divisions healed, the new house at O'Leary completed, a number added to the church, and the cause greatly strengthened. He is now being assisted by his brother, I. C. Archibald, who was recently appointed a mission of twelve weeks.

Buctouche and St. Mary's, Kent Co., N. B., has continued to prosper under the ministry of Rev. E. H. Howe. The little church at Cocaigne, almost extinct when Bro. Howe went to the field, is now beginning to look up again.

Campbellton, Restigouche Co., N. B.—Bro. Haverstock continued to labour, chiefly in the upper part of the field. until his return to College in September. A grant of \$150.00 was then promised, and efforts made to settle a man. Failing in this Rev. T. M. Munro, then living at Newcastle, visited them several times during the winter. Bro. Edgar Hatfield is now on the ground. It is hoped that a church will soon be organized at Campbellton.

Canterbury, N. B.—This field, including Canterbury, Lower Woodstock, Dumfries, and Howard Settlement churches, was recommended to us by the York Co. Quarterly Meeting. Bro. J. L. Shaw commenced labouring among them in January last. He found the cause very low on account of divisions and want of pastoral care. He has been trying to strengthen the things that remain, and is hoping for a brighter day.

Dartmouth, N. S., under the leadership of Rev. E. J. Grant, continues to make progress in the right direction.

Fairville, St. John Co., N. B., though without any ministerial labour except for a few weeks at the beginning of the year, has made marked progress. Encouraged by the interest taken in the field by the Board, the brethren determined to arise and build. Under the wise leadership of Bro. Baker and others, the work has been pushed forward so rapidly that the outside of their beatiful house is now about complete, and the basement ready to occupy. Bro. J. F. Bartlett, a graduate of Newton highly recommended to us, has consented to take charge of the interest, and it is expected that a church will be organized at an early day. The advance already made and the interest shown leads us to expect that it will soon become a strong felf-sustaining interest.

Knowlesville, &c., Carleton Co., N. B.—Rev. A. H. Hayward has continued his faithful, self-denying labours on this widely-extended field. A church of 20 members was organized at Windsor on the 5th of March, and the work is being pushed on to the head waters of the Miramichi.

Lower Stewiacke, &c., N. S., not being able to procure a suitable man after Bro. O. C. S. Wallace returned to his studies, with the exception of a few weeks at the Christmas vacation, has been without ministerial labour until June last. At that time Bro. C. Haverstock accepted a call to the field, and it is expected that he will remain with them at least for a year.

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Shelbur place ca with the however, baptized Maitland, Walton, &c., Hants Co., N. S.—Rev. I. Wallace has occupied this field since July, 1880. Revival meetings have been enjoyed at Noel, a branch of the Maitland Church, at Walton, and at Rawdon. Bro. Wallace reports the cause greatly strengthened, and the outlook hopeful.

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Margaret's Bay, N. S., long without regular pastoral care, and much weakened by removals, was assisted in their efforts to settle Rev. A. W. Barss as their pastor, by the promise of a small grant. A gracious revival has spread over a large part of the field, and pastor and people have been greatfy encouraged by the large addition to their membership.

New Ross, Lunenburg Co., N. S., that had hitherto been supplied during the summer season only, has had ministerial labour throughout most of the year. The stations at Lakes Paul and George have been worked in connection with it, and at present Waterville also is included. The aim is to work up such a field as will warrant the Board in settling a man in that region.

Port Elgin, &c, Westmorland Co., N. B.—Work has lately been commenced on this interesting and promising field. Through some misunderstanding a part of the field was occupied for a portion of the time by another brother before our missionary reached the field, but as so much ground remained uncared for, he wisely decided to remain. Your Board wish, as soon as possible, to settle a man at Port Elgin, including in his field the many important stations surrounding it.

Rustico, &c., P. E. I.—Of the encouraging state of the work in this field the words of the missionary pastor will give you the best idea. Bro. Woodland writes: "It has been my privilege to baptize 21 on the mission field during the year. The majority of them are heads of families. Several more are almost decided. The work done, I have every reason to believe, has been deep and genuine. Not one, I am glad to say, has failed in his devotion. or even slackened in his zeal. I have never met a more earnest, devoted band of Christians. We have now a strong Baptist interest over a section of country where, two and a-half years ago, Baptists were unknown. And I firmly believe that the work is only just begun, and that the next year, if the field can be worked, will give more fruits than the last two years put together."

It is but just to add that Cavendish Church, which pays Bro. Woodland for half of the time, has generously allowed him to devote as much time to the mission interests as he thought proper, and he has consequently spent more than three-fourths of the days of the year on the mission field.

Shediac, N. B., is showing signs of improvement in moving their house of worship into the town, and improving its general appearance. Rev. T. M. Munro was called to the pastorate in April. He reports congregations good, and prospects hopeful.

Shelburne, &c., N. S.—The continued financial depression in this place causing, as it does, the removal of many, greatly interferes with the progress of the work. Pastor Goudey has been encouraged, however, by a revival in the Sand Point Church, where he has baptized fourteen.

Tobique, Victoria Co., N. B.—The cause on this field is making good progress under the lead of Bro. C. Henderson. There are in this region many small settlements, some of them new, which would, we understand, be wholly without gospel privileges, but for the presence of your missionary. At Birch Ridge one of these settlements, a church was organized during the past winter. More labour is greatly needed, and it is hoped the Board will be able to supply it during the coming year.

Weldford, Kent Co., N. B.—This church, organized a little more than a year ago, with seven members, now numbers twenty, with a good

prospect of further increase.

French Mission, Yarmouth Co., N. S.—No material change in the working or prospects of this mission has taken place during the year. Revival influences have been enjoyed in the little church at the Wagoner Settlement, and five have been baptized. A preaching station has been opened at Hectanooga, where a few English families have moved in. For the work done by the missionary, see Table.

In this hurried review only a few of the fields have been referred to, and it is proper to add that of very many others facts more or

less interesting might be stated did space permit.

We wish, in passing, to make grateful mention of work done in the interest of our weak churches by Rev. W. E. Hall,—first at Margaret's Bay, and subsequently at Musquash. This work was without cost to the Board, but, we believe, very helpful to the churches. We would be glad indeed if other pastors would follow the example of Bro. Hall, and go out for a week or two to some destitute fields. The Secretary would always be glad to name places where they would be gladly received.

Bro. L. M. Weeks, of Antigonish, has also performed what is about equal to 6 weeks mission work, at a station some miles from Anti-

gonish. This also was gratuitous.

Hitherto all the Secretarial work of the Board has been done gratuitously. But as this work has now greatly increased, and as the other Mission Board has adopted the rule of paying its Secretary, the Recording Secretary has been allowed \$60.00, and the Corresponding Secretary \$200.00, it being understood that the latter officer would spend the months of June and July visiting the Associations and mission fields as far as practicable, paying his own travelling expenses, and for the supply of his pulpit. During this time he visited four of the Associations, and ten mission fields, preached 15 sermons, delivered 10 addresses, and gathered much valuable information as to the condition and needs of the mission fields.

While your Board feel that there is much to be thankful for in the blessings that have accompanied the efforts put forth, they deeply regret that they have not been permitted to attempt more. There are, especially in New Brunswick, a large number of small churches in a very low state, from which they are not likely to arise unless aided from without. The Board has been prevented from aiding most of these, partly for lack of men, but especially for want of funds. We began the year with the hope that the income would not be less than \$7,000.00. But as the year advanced it became apparent that the expenditure must, if possible, be kept within \$5,000.00. We regret to say that even that amount has not been received, and we close the year with a debt of \$849.60.

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We have Treasurer,

The Board are pleased to believe that there is a growing interest in this department of our denominational work, but we need to make great advancement before it shall have attained that position which its importance demands. Let us remember that by this work the stronger are assisting the weak in bearing their burdens; the gospel is being preached to the poor; and the springs that feed both the ministry and the stronger churches are being cared for. More faithful men of God ready for any part of duty, more love for the souls of the perishing, more readiness for personal sacrifice on the part of the people as well as the ministry, are the conditions necessary for an increased measure of success.

The Board of Management of the Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund respectfully submit their Second Annual Report:

At the first meeting of the Board after the Convention, which was not until February 9th, 1881, the officers for the ensuing year were re-elected, viz.: Stephen Selden, Esq., Chairman; Rev. E. M. Saunders, Treasurer; and Rev. J. W. Manning, Secretary.

The recommendations of the Convention were laid before the Board, whereupon J. Parsons, Esq., was appointed a committee to prepare a petition and draft of an Act of Incorporation, to be submitted to the Board for signature and approval; also a committee consisting of Rev. J. W. Manning and J. Parsons, to prepare a code of rules with reference to the conditions of membership and regulations for the expenditure of its funds, and for the management of the affairs of the Board generally, to be submitted at a future meeting for approval or amendment.

At an informal meeting of the Board held June 14th, the Secretary was instructed to procure a copy of the Act of Incorporation passed at the last session of the Nova Scotia Legislature, and forward the same to the Secretaries of the Boards of the Infirm Ministers' Fund in connection with the Nova Scotia Western and Eastern Associations, and also a letter to the Central Association, informing that body of the action taken by the other Associations in Nova Scotia in respect to the funds at their disposal, and to ask the above Association to instruct the Board of Infirm Ministers' Fund to hand over to the Treasurer of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund the monies, books, papers, &c., in their possession, so that there may be in these Maritime Provinces the one fund for aged and infirm ministers and their families.

As the Secretary was unable to procure a copy of the Act of Incorporation, that part of his duty was not complied with; but the brethren were informed that such an Act had been passed, and had received the sanction of the Governor in Council, and, therefore, had become law.

The following is the response of the different bodies addressed:

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The Board of Infirm Ministers' Fund in connection with the Western Association say in their Annual Report:

Notice has to-day been received from the Board of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund of the Convention of their being prepared to receive the funds of your Board, and the transfer will be made at an early date.

The Nova Scotia Eastern Association passed the following:

Whereas, Several brethren of the Board of Infirm Ministers' Fund have given their obligation to the executors of an estate, making themselves responsible for the fulfilling of the requirements of the legatee;

Therefore resolved, That this Association commend the action of these brethren, and that the following brethren constitute the Board of the Infirm Ministers' Fund : Revds. D. A. Steele, G. F. Miles, J. E. Goucher, M. P. Freeman, C. H. Martell, and Deas. Moses Lowe, and Wm. Read; and that the Board be instructed to hand over the funds entrusted to them, in accordance with the resolution of last year, so soon as they are satisfied that the Board of the Convention appointed for that purpose is duly prepared to receive the trust.

The Central Association at its late session passed the following:

In view of the present position of the Board of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund, the same having been duly incorporated, and considering that the management of this fund can be much better conducted by one Board

Therefore resolved, That this Association concur in the belief, and that the funds in the hands of our Board be at once handed over to the Board above mentioned, agreeably to the request of said Board, as communicated by the letter of the Secretary now before this Association.

At a meeting of the Board held July 28th, Dr. Parker presented printed copies of the Act of Incorporation, which the Secretary was instructed to forward at once to the Boards of the Infirm Ministers' Fund in connection with the different Associations.

The following is a copy of the Act as received:

An Act to incorporate the Board of Management of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime

(Passed the 14th day of April, A. D. 1881.)

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SECTION.

Incorporation. 2. Vesting of property.

3. Annual Accounting. 4. Approval of bye-laws.

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly, as follows: I. The Hon. D. McN. Parker, M. D., Rev. J. F. Avery, Jonathan Parsons, Rev. E. Hickson, Rev. John A. Gordon, Rev. D. A. Steele, Rev. E. M. Saunders, Rev. J. W. Manning, and Stephen Selden, and such other persons as may from time to time be appointed by the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces to constitute the Board of Management of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund of that body, are hereby created a body corporate, by the name of "the Board of Management of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces," with power to purchase, take, and hold real estate, and to accept legacies and donations of real and personal property, and to dispose of, lease, sell, convey or mortgage the same, and to invest any moneys which may come into their hands in such ways as they may deem most advantageous for the purpose of carrying out the objects of the corporation.

2. The Boards for managing the Infirm Ministers' funds in the Western Baptist Association, the Central Baptist Association, and the Eastern Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, respectively, on a vote or resolution of a majority of the members present at any regular meeting of such Board, may be and are hereby empowered to transfer their work, funds, and property to the corporation hereby established; and thereupon the existence of such Board or Boards, or either of them, shall cease and determine, and any Act or Acts creating or incorporating them shall be, and is and are hereby repealed, and all the real, personal, or other estate which such Board or Boards, or either of them, is, are, or may be interested in or entitled to, shall be vested in the corporation hereby established, and every conveyance, grant, bequest, devise, or gift of any lands, or other real, personal, or mixed estate whatsoever, that may have been made to any or all of such Boards, or may hereafter be made to them or either of them, shall be deemed to be made to and vested in the corporation hereby established, in the same manner and as fully to all intents and purposes as if specially given, granted, bequeathed, or conveyed to such corporation by its proper title; and such Board of Management of Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund shall have full power and authority to sue for and recover the same either at law or in equity, and to assign, transfer, sell, encumber, lease, convey, charge, or otherwise dispose thereof, but shall appropriate the sums, proceeds, and profits thereof to and for the purposes and objects for which the same was or were specially given or intended to be given by the donors or grantors.

3. The corporation hereby created shall furnish annually to said Convention a full and particular statement of its affairs and its transactions for the preceding year.

4. The bye-laws and regulations of said corporation shall be subject to the approval of the said Convention, which body shall at all times have power to amend or repeal such bye-laws and regulations, and to substitute other bye-laws and regulations in their place.

The Committee appointed to prepare rules for the management of the Fund, reported, which was amended to read as follows, and adopted:

(1). The Ministerial Relief and Aid Fund of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces shall be formed by donations, contributions, subscriptions, legacies, and of the percentage granted by the Convention Scheme.

(2). The Fund shall provide for the support of those ordained ministers disabled either by age or infirmity from the active duties of their office, and for their widows and children.

(3). The mode of admission to the benefit of the Fund shall be by certified application to the satisfaction of the Board.

A letter was also received from Rev. W. P. Everett, just previous to the last meeting of the Board, asking whether the conditions for the transfer of the balance on hand in the funds of the H. M. Board to the credit of the Infirm Ministers' and Widow's Relief Department of said Society have been complied with. The Secretary was instructed to reply by forwarding the decisions of the respective Associations at their last annual meetings, as well as a copy of the Act of Incorporation.

In consequence of there being such a small amount in the hands of the Treasurer, as well as the fact that they were not legally qualified to do business, your Board did not feel justified in making any appropriations, more especially as the Boards of the Infirm Ministers' Fund were still continuing their aid to a number of the brethren. They hope, however, before another year passes, that they will be in possession of the funds now controlled by other bodies, and therefore be in a position to enter upon the real work for which they were

appointed.
Your Board cannot close their Report without expressing their gratification at the prospect of unity in this department of denominational work so long practically neglected, an unity contemplated in the first organization of the Convention.

Report of Finance Committee.

The Committee on Finance respectfully submit their second Annual Report. During the past year your Committee thought it best to pursue the course which they had followed the year previous. A circular or collecting card was prepared, and sent to all the churches within the limits of the Convention. The churches were also appealed to through the press, by the editors of the denominational organs, and by several other brethren. Your Committee also convened quite a large number of public meetings, at which the Convention Scheme was explained, and the claims of the denomination on the benevolence of the churches were faithfully presented.

Your Committee are pleased to state that the Convention Scheme is proving a success. The contributions of many individuals and a large number of our churches are greatly increased. In some cases they are doubled, and in others they have reached a much higher rate of increase. The success of the past year furnishes the pledge that before many years we shall reach the standard of benevolence which the Scheme first set up. It was scarcely to be expected that for the first two or three years we should attain to the one dollar per member. There were many difficulties in the way. These are being removed. With their removal we may expect absolute success in the near future.

In Nova Scotia nearly all the churches in the Western Association have adopted the Convention Scheme, and have contributed directly to the Committee. A large proportion of the churches connected with the other Associations have done the same. We hope that all the churches will fall into line the present year.

In New Brunswick the Scheme has been as fully successful as it could well be under the circumstances. There are about 70 contributing churches. The number increases as the matter is presented to and understood by the people. We believe that there is no plan that could be suggested which would be more likely to reach the desired result. The contributions in New Brunswick have risen from \$1,200.00 in 1879-80 to over \$3,700.00 during the past year.

In Prince Edward Island the Scheme has been heartily adopted by all the churches, and their contributions have been about 70 per cent. in advance of last year. All the churches save one have contributed, and the average on the total membership has been 52½ cents. Your Committee have confidence in the Scheme as the best yet submitted to the churches, and believe that patient effort will make it a grand success.

Your Committee have taken a good deal of pains to get all the ordinary contributions of the churches in their Report. If there is any error or omission, it is because the correct figures could not be readily obtained.

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Report on State of Religion in the Denomination.

The annual returns from the Baptist Churches of the Maritime Provinces furnish the following statistics:

The state of religion in our denomination cannot be judged of safely by the number of baptisms that occur during the year. Many churches which report no baptisms may be in a much more prosperous condition than some of those which report large accessions to their numbers. Yet spiritual life and activity almost invariably result in numerical increase.

The three Associations of Nova Scotia report a total number of 720 baptisms, which is about one-fourth less than the number reported a year ago. The returns of the Central Association show a net increase of 307 in the total membership of the churches comprising that body: whilst those of the Eastern indicate a net increase of but 19; and those of the Western show a decrease of 61. The rate of increase throughout the Province has, therefore, been less than 1 per cent.

The statistics from New Brunswick are even less favorable. The net increase in the N. B. Western Association has been 156; whilst the Southern has suffered a net decrease of 115, and the Eastern a net decrease of 215. The total membership in New Brunswick thus appears to have diminished by 174, representing a loss of nearly 114 per cent.

Another unfavorable feature in the returns from the churches is the increasing number of what are termed "non-resident members." These are, for the most part, persons who in removing to new places of residence either neglect or refuse to take regular letters of dismission in order to unite with churches in the vicinity of their newly chosen places of abode. They become gradually lost not only to the churches with which they are nominally connected, but also to the

Denomination. Nearly one-quarter of the total membership of the churches of the Maritime Provinces are reported as "non-resident members." This is an alarming fact, demanding the immediate and careful attention of all concerned.

Among the many favorable features in the present aspect of our denominational affairs may be mentioned the growing care which is exercised in accepting candidates for baptism, the increasing tendency to permanency in pastoral relations, a greater degree of steadiness in the maintenance of religious worship, and a more complete subordination of ever-varing feelings to fixed religious principles.

That there is great need of spiritual quickening among our churches is very apparent. Harmony among our brethren and concerted action in the promotion of the important religious enterprises which we are pledged to sustain are loudly called for at the present time. Personal and sectional prejudices should be swallowed up in one sovereign desire to honor the Master by earnest and united effort in the universal diffusion of the knowledge of salvation.

Report on Obituaries.

Your Committee appointed last year for the purpose of presenting to this Convention a notice of departed brethren, submit the following report:

Two honored and venerable brethren have been removed from the scenes of their earthly toil to join with the spirits of the just made perfect before the throne: viz.: the Rev. James Stevens, and Rev. Dr. Tupper. Full particulars of their lives have already appeared in the columns of our religious press; extended notices are therefore unnecessary. We submit the following facts:

REV. JAMES STEVENS

of Horton departed this life on the evening on Saturday, the 2cth November, 1880, in his 77th year. In 1828 having previously experienced the power of Divine grace, he united himself with the First Horton Church then under the pastoral care of the late Rev. T. S. Harding. In the following year he felt it his duty to engage in the work of the ministry, and entered upon a mission to Prince Edward Island, where for several months he scattered the seed of Divine truth at different points. Returning, he pursued his studies at Horton Academy. On the 4th August, 1830 he was ordained as an Evangelist. In 1842 he became pastor of the Baptist Church at Hopewell, N. B., where he spent five or six years in successful

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labour. He itinerated in several other places, preaching the word. He next became pastor of the Baptist Church at Fa'mouth and Hantsport; an extensive revival followed,-many believed and were baptized. He afterwards accepted the pastorate of the 2nd Horton Church, labouring there for 12 or 13 years with evident tokens of the Divine blessing. In 1857 he removed to Rawdon, and continued his labours among that people until October 1868, after which he again returned to Horton, continuing to labor occasionally as his health and strength permitted. He was a man of sterling integrity, earnest piety, and unblemished reputation. The influence of his ministry will be long felt, and his memory will be cherished by many to whom he ministered the words of eternal life. In his last days he suffered somewhat severely, but patiently endured "as seeing Him who is visible." And on the evening of the day above mentioned breathed out his life upon the bosom of his Redeemer. His funeral services were attended by Revds. Drs. Crawley, S. W. DeBlois, George Armstrong and John Williams, and many other sympathising friends. And his remains are deposited in the bak's burying-ground at Kentville, beside those of his son, (whose demise we recorded last year), there to await the dawn of the resurrection. May the lives of those who survive him be as useful, their deaths as peaceful, and their memories as precious as his.

REV. CHARLES TUPPER, D. D.,

closed his long and successful career at Kingston, Aylesford, N. S., on Wednesday morning, January 19th, in the 87th year of his age, and the 64th year of his ministry. Dr. Tupper was born in Cornwallis, August 6th, 1794, and became the subject of Divine grace in early life, not however without passing through severe mental and spiritual conflicts. He was baptized by the late Rev. Edward Manning, May 14th, 1815, at which time he was occupied as an instructor of the young. He soon sought and found opportunities to proclaim Christ to his dying fellow men. Developing an aptitude for this work he was ordained on the 17th July, 1817. For many years he travelled in these three provinces as an Evangelist, and his opportunities for observation, general influence and labor in every department of christian effort, were abundant and successful. For a time he combined with his duties as a minister, the active labors of a teacher, both at Amherst and at Fredericton. He also added to his other labors those of Editor of the Baptist Magazine, and to the Christian Messenger ne was always a liberal contributor. He advocated the interests of these periodicals in extended and self-sacrificing travels. During his ministry he was pastor of several churches in the Lower Provinces, but the last thirty years of his life he spent with the Lower Aylesford and Upper Wilmot Church where his pastorate extended over a large section of country. We cannot more concisely express our estimate of him than by quoting the language of Rev. Dr. Cramp:

"Dr. Tupper was a sound practical preacher. He was an industrious pastor. He administered christian discipline with impartiality and righteousness. He was a very laborious itinerant. As a teacher of

the young he greatly excelled."

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Although self-taught, Dr. Tupper was a fine linguist, and possessed in a remarkable degree the power of acquiring languages. In 1859 he had perused the whole of the Sacred Volume in eight languages, and the New Testament in ten. His expository notes on the Syriac Version were published many years ago and were highly prized. He was a constant student both of Theology and Ecclesiastical History, and his writings were numerous and much valued.

He was a warm friend of the Foreign Mission enterprize as well as of Evangelistic labors at home, and the cause of Temperance found

in him a ready and able advocate.

He was a man of sincere and fervent piety, ardent zeal, and selfdenying devotion. He highly valued, and well employed all his time; and thus amid many adverse circumstances gained for himself a well earned reputation for scholarly attainments, theological acumen and correct judgment upon points of difficulty and dispute He was a man of rare meekness and humiltty, and withal a loving faithful counseller and friend. He was always self-possessed, and this rendered his admonitions and counsels peculiarly valuable. He was also a man of peace and a peacemaker. We shall miss his venerable form henceforth in our solemn assemblies, our Conventions and Associations, and his pious counsels and prayers we can no longer enjoy. We cannot but thank God however for his life, his example, his toils, and his successes, and pray that his mantle may fall upon, his successors, and that they may be more abundantly endowed with those many excellencies of character which were his distinguishing features and crowning glory.

He lived long enough to see his sons come to honour, and his posterity rise up to call him blessed, and he came to his grave in full age, like as a shock of corn fully ripe cometh in, in his season.

Dr. Tupper was married three times, and has left behind him a devoted but sorrowing widow and many relatives, in whose behalf we invoke the sympathies and the prayers of God's people.

Ordination.

The Committee appointed by this Convention last year to consider

the subject of Ordination, beg leave to report:

While it is doubtless the solemn and imperative duty of the Church of Christ to take such careful and wise measures, as will, with the special blessing of God, secure to the churches a ministry in accordance with the requirements of the New Testanent, it is no less a duty incumbent on the church to protect itself from the serious dangers and obstructions to divine truth and to vital Christianity which, it may be justly apprehended, will arise from the admission of unsuitable, incompetent, unqualified persons into the Christian ministry.

What your committee propose to say on the important subject

assigned it, will be presented under the following heads:
What is Ordination; Who calls to Ordination; The Qualifications required of Candidates for Ordination; To whom Scripturally belongs the right and duty to Ordain; The use of Councils in ordinations; to which will be added the Recommendations which the Committee deems it proper to make in respect to Ordinations.

I. From intimations in the New Testament we gather that Ordination is "the laying on of hands," for ecclesiastical purposes

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upon a suitable candidate "by the Presbytery," i. e., the Christian edership or ministry, accompanied with "prayer to God" for special spiritual blessings on the candidate in the sacred work to which he is

The Apostle Paul exhorts Timothy thus: "Neglect not the gift that is in thee, which was given thee by prophecy with the laying on of

the hands of the Presbytery." I Tim. iv. 14, compared 2 Tim. i. 6.

And the Apostle commands him also to "Lay hands suddenly on no man;" by which we understand him to forbid the ordination of persons not ripe for it, or a hasty admission to the Christian Ministry of those who intellectually and spiritually are immature, and who therefore are unable to give full satisfaction as to their character, call and qualifications. That prayer was an essential part of such services is plain from Acts vi. 6, and xiii. 3.

II. Who calls to Ordination. Though full information respecting this point is wanting in the New Testament, yet, in the opinion of your committee it contains enough to warrant the belief that in general the right of choosing "pastors or teachers" belonged individually to the churches of Christ. To suppose that even the Apostles would force upon churches "pastors and teachers" without consultation with them, or against their judgment and wishes, is unreasonable; and such a course would moreover be contrary to the

If the procedure observed in the selection of persons for the important but subordinate office of deacon be taken, as may fairly be done, as indicative of the Apostles' course in regard to the higher office of "pastor and teacher," we have just reason to infer that in general, at least, if not always, the churches choose their own

Apostolic injunction as to the choice of persons to fill the new office of deacon distinctly recognizes the right and duty of selection as belonging to the church itself. For, having called the disciples together and stated the case to them, the Apostles addressed them thus: "Brethren, look ye out from among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom whom we may appoint over this business." Even in the matter of choosing delegates or deputies to travel with the Apostle Paul to aid in distributing the contributions raised for the relief of indigent, suffering brethren, the churches were consulted, and their decision respected. Now, why should not the same liberty be accorded to the churches in a matter so vital to their lighest interests and welfare as that of choosing "Pastors and Teachers" is, with, of course, the limitation that the persons chosen shall have the qualifications laid down in the New

But the right to choose "Pastors" implies the right to call for the ordination of such as have not already been ordained.

III. Dut in determining the proper course to pursue on such occasions, it is of prime importance to ascertain and carefully note the Scriptural qualifications required of candidates for ordination.

(1). The candidate must, of course, possess decided piety, must have had a true, spiritual experience of the gospel as the power of God to salvation, (Gal. i. 16; 2 Tim. ii. 2).

(2). A special call from the Lord to the work of the gospel ministry, (Matt. ix. 38: xxviii. 19; Acts xiii. 2-4; Rom. x. 15; 1 Tim. iii. 1).

(3). But, in addition to spiritual qualifications, which should be regarded as primal and fundamental, the New Testament requires in a candidate for the ministry *fifteen* or *sixteen* other qualifications of a special character. (See I Tim. iii. 2-7; Titus i. 6-9).

Among these are high moral and social qualities, good reputation, also governing and administrative abilities, mental and didactive powers of no mean order, in short, such a combination of mental powers and spiritual endowments, of moral and social qualities, of experience and attainments as will, by the special grace of God, enable the pastor, or the candidate for that position, to teach and train, counsel and tend, lead and edify Christians and Christian churches in all things required by the Oracles of God.

Indeed, "aptness to teach" is made prominent by the spirit of inspiration, and seems indispensable to a right performance of a minister's duty. To impart instruction well in regard to spiritual things requires talent and knowledge, and also power to communicate Divine truth in intelligible and appropriate forms, such as may justy be expected to interest and profit the hearers.

And, while this Committee cheerfully and gratefully recognizes the fact that brethren without collegiate or classical education have attained to great usefulness and even eminence as ministers of Christ and preachers of the gospel, yet it is highly desirable, and of very great consequence, that young men who feel it to be their duty to devote themselves to the work of the ministry should, in addition to pietv of the best type and culture, seek to obtain the best literary training and the largest stores of knowledge, in order to perform acceptably and well the work of this sacred calling; or, as the Apostle expresses it to Timothy: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

Though entertaining in general a high estimation of the value and usefulness of collegiate training and learning to a minister of the gospel, yet the Baptist denomination has never set up an educational standard for its ministry, because Baptists have not come to regard such advantages, however great, as any guarantee of soundness in faith and doctrine, or assuring the possession of the high moral and spiritual qualities which the New Testament requires of candidates for the Christian ministry.

But, in the opinion of your Committee, it should generally be regarded as indispensable in the present age that a candidate for the ministry have, at the *lowest* estimate, a respectable amount of literary training, a good knowledge and use of the English language, and a competent knowledge of Biblical Interpretation and Theology.

IV. To whom Scripturally belongs the right and duty to ordain candidates for the gospel ministry?

From facts stated in the *New Testament*, your Committee believe that to ministers of Christ that duty has been rightfully assigned among us.

For, though by Apostolic direction the church at Jerusalem was authorized to choose out the seven who were to serve tables, yet the Apostles were, notwithstanding, "to appoint," ordain, or set them "over the business" of the office to which they had been elected, (Acts vi. 3). And when the church presented the seven whomit had chosen to the Apostles, the latter "prayed, and laid hands on them," (v. 6). This was Apostolic ordination.

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But, by Divine direction, similar services were also performed by the other "prophets and teachers" at Antioch is respect to Paul and Barnabas just previous to their first great missionary tour,—that to Cyprus and Asia Minor, (Acts xiii. 1-3).

And still further. While we do not know when the Apostle Paul exercised his ministry in Crete, though it is very probable it occurred before leaving that Island, he had instructed Titus to remain there and complete what was necessary to the full equipment of the Cretan churches: "That he should set in order the things that were wanting, and ordain elders in every city," (Titus i. 5).

Now, this would have been wholly unnecessary, if it had not been the rule or custom in the Apostle's time, for ministers to ordain elders over churches. It appears plain to us, however, that Titus would perform this duty in harmony with the wish of the churches, supposing always, of course, that suitable selections had been made, or concurred in, by the church.

V. The use of Councils in ordinations. That in the Apostolic age when, if ever, such help as consultation with other churches can supply seemed unnecessary, a church in a certain crisis sought and obtained counsel and guidance from another church, and that, too, and in the other, and that by the interchange of thought and by church at Jerusalem, and also to that at Antioch, and was accepted also by other churches, seems plainly to justify resort to other help when required.

Besides, in respect to the matter in hand, Councils are, in effect, an assembly or union of churches and ministers, the very parties most directly and intimately concerned in the ordination of ministers, and the progress and prosperity of Christ's kingdom in the world, and on whom, therefore, devolves the great duty of acting wisely and faithfully in matters of such vast spiritual importance.

Councils should carefully and thoroughly examine ministerial candidates, not only as regards their Christian experience, call to preach, views of Christian doctrines, ordinances, and church polity, qualifications, adaptation to, and fitness for the great work of preaching the gospel, teaching the truth clearly and well, training and guiding churches and people in the ways of the Lord; and the candidate's reputation and standing, especially in the community where he is best known.

In order the better to carry out the instructions laid down in the New Testament as to the admission of persons into the Christian ministry, your Committee ventures to make the following recommendations:

(1). That each church exercise great care and caution in encouraging young men to commence preaching, and, before granting any of its members a *license* to preach, should have good evidence that he possesses character, gifts, and qualifications to justify the church in thus sanctioning this initial step towards the Christian ministry.

(2). That the church calling for the ordination of a candidate ask the best counsel from not less than seven churches within the county

or district in which said church is located; and that the church make no appointment for ordination, but simply for the meeting of the Council to consider the matter.

(3). That the churches applied to for counsel send, in addition to their pastor, two of their most pious and intelligent, discriminating and judicious members as delegates to the Council called to advise and determine as to the propriety of ordaining the proposed candidate.

(4). That sufficient time be taken, even two days, if necessary, for a thorough examination of the candidate in all things requisite for a minister of the gospel to be, to hold, to teach, and to do; and, moreover, that, as on ministers are devolved special responsibilities and duties in respect to ordinations, they should decline to ordain candidates who, after due examination, shall have been found wanting in the qualifications required by the Word of Inspiration.

(5). Careful study of the requirements laid down in Scripture for ministers of the gospel is recommended to all concerned, especially

the Epistles to Timothy, and that to Titus.

(6). That, in case any serious disagreement exists in the church, or in the Council, as to the wisdom and propriety of ordaining a candidate, and efforts to remove such disagreement fail, further proceedings may be deferred, so that time may be allowed to use other Christian endeavours to have the differences properly adjusted, and thus secure harmonious action in the proposed ordination, and promote union in the church and in the denomination.

(7). That churches over which pastors have been ordained, or in which evangelists have been set apart to the ministry during the year, be requested to report the same to the next session of the Association with which such churches are connected, stating the names of the brethren who have been ordained, together with the names of the churches that advised or concurred in the respective ordinations, and also the names of the ministers who took part in the services, or concurred in them; all the said names to be published in the Minutes of the Association for that year.

(8). That all the foregoing names thus reported be published also in the "Baptist Year Book of the Maritime Provinces" for that year, so that a permanent record of such important transactions may be had for reference, that it may be known, or easily ascertained, what church called for each ordination, what churches advised or concurred in it, and by what ministers every pastor and evangelist in the denomination was introduced into the ministry.

(9). That the authorities having charge of the Theological Department of Acadia College exercise a wise discrimination in regard to whom they encourage to enter on and pursue a course of *Theological*

study, with a view to the Christian ministry.

(10). That in case a stranger professing to be a minister of the gospel comes to a church and seeks to be recognized or accepted in that capacity, neither the pastor nor members invite him to preach unless he first establishes by the printed Minutes of some of our Associations, or by the "Baptist Year Book of the Maritime Provinces," that he is a recognized minister of the Baptist denomination; or, if from another country, that he exhibit satisfactory credentials, showing him to be a recognized minister connected with a Baptist Association or church in the Province, country, or State from which he has come. And, inasmuch as this is a day in which

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unwarranted and wild speculations are indulged in by some who profess to be ministers, and who, moreover, disregard church order, relationship, and responsibility, it behooves our churches to take heed whom they receive, and whom they follow as ministers of the gospel, and to guard well their pulpits from dishonour, and themselves from confusion and loss.

The last writer in the New Testament, the "disciple whom Jesus loved," found it needful to enjoin on Christian churches in his day the following rule, which still demands careful attention: "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they be of God."
