#### Rev. W. Butler's Letter. (Concluded.)

Persons at a distance can hardly reali the seriousness of our position on the 14th of September last : they cannot imagine the anxiety of heart with which every refugee in India watched and waited for the news of each succeeding day during that painfully protracted struggle. And when at the last came to us, it came not by the post, but by a private dispatch to our commanding

It was impossible to repress the sense of largeness of heart, and of hope for our mis-sion, which filled my soul. The tears came freely, and I blessed God for the English army and its brave commander, by whom, under Providence, all had been won. The last fierce effort of a blaspheming Moham-medanism to regain its lost ascendency, with all its accompaniments of murder, lust, and cruelty, was defeated, and "the people of the saints of the Most High" were victorious. Before the rising glory of the cross, this hateful crescent of the Arabian Artichrist, struck from the orbit of its power in the Orient; sinks with accelerated speed, to the blackness of darkness forever !" let thine enemies perish, O Lord; but let them that love him be as the sun when he goeth forth in his might !" Such were the thoughts and feelings of the 22nd of Sep-

We next went to see the beautiful Jain temple, belonging to the Surrowgee sect .--The outer court reminded me of the descriptions of Solomon's temple, so rich and elegant was it. In the sanctuary there stood a shrine, but such a shrine ! It ruse tier above tier, till it terminated in a dome on four piltars; the proportions of the whole being exquisitely fine, and every part was so richly carved in screen work in white marble, and inlaid with precious stones .--Bat everything movable had been carried off. The magnificent curtains, embroidered in gold, which hung round the court, per-

haps twenty in number, brought, we were told by the gentleman who accompanied us, the sum of 500 rupees each at the prize auction !

In the sanctuary we found two Parasu aths, one of them as large as life, in black marble, with a genuine negro type of countenance, high cheek bones, thick lips, and curly bair. One of the priest's daiy informed me they believed the gods were black, and that their god Parasanth was exactly like a negro !

Both of the venerable deities had their loses smashed, and looked in consequence rather ridiculous. I asked the priest, "Who autilated them ?" He said the Mohammedan Sepoys had done so, and that the Sikhs came afterward and robbed them of everyhing they could carry off. This temple. for its size, is certainly the most splendid place of worship I ever sow. 




