GERMANS HAVE PLEASANT DREAM

Leaders Stuff People of Germany With a Yarn About Landing Army in Great Britain

London, October 27.—Rene H. Feibelman, special correspondent of the Daily Express, sends the followng despatch from The Hague:-

Germany, according to information eceived here from Berlin, is preparing to deal Great Britain a decisive blow. The scheme is to disembark several army corps somewhere n the south of England while the grand fleet is occupied with fighting the German fleet in the North

Deciding Factor. German experts believe the plan ill be entirely successful. Accordng to this fairy tale, as soon as the ast resistance of the Belgian army s disposed of, there will be a great movement of Landstrum troops from Central Germany to Ostend and Zeebrugge, where they will await an pportunity of crossing to the English shore and marching on London, where Zeppelins and Taubes will have caused havoc and demoralized

the population. While this is taking place, Admiral Van Ingoehl, of the fleet now confined at Wilhelmshaven, will steam over into the North Sea for

These German calculations rest on the hypothesis that the coasts of England will be left absolutely without protection, all of Admiral Sir John Jellicoe's ships being engaged n the great North Sea battle. Have Faith In It.

The German newspapers, by way of preparing public opinion for this great stroke, publish extravagan despatches dilating on British nervousness and the fear of unavoidable destruction by Germany. The German fleet is described as awaitng with passionate impatience the moment when it can make a dash at the enemy. Prince Henry of Prussia is actively engaged, it is announced, in the work of inspecting the fleet, and he is continually keepng the men on the run by surprise

The Prince is reported to be in Belgium this week to take over comnand of the general operations gainst Britain. On these operaions, by means of which the war will, it is believed in Germany, peedily be brought to an end, the ublic opinion of Germany is now ocussed. Should they fail, the disppointment engendered may have acalculable consequences.





Having practically devasted this peaceful and prosperous town, the Huns have now declared the whole Government of Kalish annexed to Prussia and introduced "conscrip-

Conscription Order.

The conscription order extends to the town of Kalish and eight villages in the vicinity. All males between 16 and 45 are called upon to join the Kaiser's forces. The mobilisation was to commence on Sept. 18. But long before that date German soldiers began rushing into private houses and dragging away youths and men of military age. In the first few days of German "conscription," twenty-two men were shot for disobeying the dastardly order.

"An epidemic of suicides, concludes the report, is now raging in the town. Some consolation may be derived from the news that the recent German commandant of Kalish, the man guilty of the destruction of this ancient city, the notorious Major Preisker, is now a prisoner at Lubin. When he appeared in the streets, being led together with other German prisoners of war by Russian guards, people recognised him and hissed him. He vainly tried to hide himself behind the backs of his fellow prisoners.





BRITISH OFFICERS FELL ON HONOR'S FIELD

Corporal McGlade, of the 1st Royal Scots, in an interview at Newcastle-

on-Tyne, said: I was with the company commanded by Lieutenant Goffrey Lambton, nephew of the Earl of Durham, whose death was notified some time ago. It was in the third rearguard action from Mons that he was killed.

The lieutenant was in charge of us in the wood, and was directing our fire from a mound. The Germans were below in force, and were preparing to attack. The lieutenant had given orders to fire, had picked up a rifle, and was in the act of firing himself when he was fatally wounded by a German bullet.

Paper Refers to the Valuable **Quantities of Cod Tongues** and Sounds That Are Thrown Away

Fishermen tell us that large quantities of cod heads, sounds and tongues are being dumped into the sea from the fishing stations along this Coast, says the Western Star.

This treating of cod tongues and sounds as offal is going on from year to year, notwithstanding the fact that here are many ready markets where hey would fetch remunerative prices; and the greater the catch and the larger the fish, so is the waste propor-

ionately increased. At this time when salt junk is sellng at from 14 to 16 cents per pound, and the price of other food stuffs soaring to the moon, it certainly is a pity that some effort is not being nade to utilize such palatable byproduct of the codfishery.
