

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

NOT A SURPRISE.

By Special Wire to the Courier. Paris, Oct. 1, 2.37 p.m.— In the great battle in the Artois district the will be busy during Campaign Week, French have made further progress which is to be held between the 16th and 23rd of October, chasing after by means of attacks with hand grenades on German trenches. Announcenew members for the boys' department to this effect was made to-day by the War Office.

In the Champagne a German counter attack near Maisons de Champagne was checked. The Germans violently bombarded French trenches near Soupir, north of Aisne, but made no infantry attack. The text of the communication is

as follows: "In the Artois district we made progress by the use of hand grenades in the trenches and under ground passages to the east and to the southeast of Neuville.

"Two German counter-attacks have been delivered, one against a fort which we conquered yesterday in the forest of Givenchy; the other against the trenches to the south of Hill 119, where the French troops had installed themselves. Each one of these attacks was conclusively repulsed. "To the north of the Aisne,
