Willow Bank Cemetery.

The thirteenth annual meeting of the Willow Bank Cemetery Corporation was held at the Firemen's room on Wednesday evening, the 5th inst., the president, J. W. Caldwell, Esq., in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

The report of the managing committee was then read and discussed. The clause relating to a caretaker claimed particular attention, and it was decided to see if a suitable person could be procured.

The secretary's report was read, which shows that there have been 120 burials and 80 lots sold.

The secretary was instructed to take measures to collect the arrears still due the corporation for lots sold.

The treasurer's report was then read giving the receipts and expenditures for the year.

The trustees were then elected to fill the place of the retiring trustees, namely: R. E. Wickwire, J. B. Davison and T. Reuben Wallace.

The officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: J. W. Caldwell, Pres.; Geo. V. Rand, V. P.; A. J. Woodsman, Secy.; Clarence H. Borden, Treas.

The managing com. were then elected, viz: Prof. E. M. Keirstead, A. J. Woodsman, C. H. Borden, G. V. Rand and F. J. Porter.

The committee on the old burying ground were then appointed as follows: G. V. Rand, J. W. Caldwell and J. W. Wallace.

It is much to be regretted that out of more than sixty notices sent to lot owners, only eleven persons were present.

Town Council.

Minutes of adjourned first meeting of Wolfville Town Council, April 1st, 1893.

Present: the Mayor, Councillors C. H. Borden, G. W. Borden, Starr, Bairs and Sawyer.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Report of Com. on Laws and Legislation received.

Resolved: Com. Bairs' name be substituted for Com. Sawyer's on Com. of Streets, Public Property and Waterworks.

Com. Sawyer read draft of proposed bill to enable town of Wolfville to borrow money for school purposes already voted by ratepayers at school meeting.

Resolved that said bill be adopted by council and forwarded to legislature.

Letter read from J. W. Caldwell asking for bridge in front of Kennis home to enable him to haul heavy loads to his property. Referred to Com. on streets.

Resolved that E. B. Crawley be appointed Recorder at salary not to exceed fifty dollars per annum, and that said salary include all his legal fees against council on date.

On suggestion of Mayor, Mr. Crawley, who was present, read a draft of a proposed bill to amend the "Act to incorporate town of Wolfville for water purposes."

Resolved that said bill be adopted and sent by Recorder to legislature.

Upon a ballot being taken, Wm. Harwick was declared elected Superintendent of streets and waterworks. Resolved that salary of supt. of streets and waterworks be \$200 per annum.

Resolved that the matter of guarantee bond required of town clerk be reconsidered. Resolved that the town clerk be required to furnish a guarantee bond for \$2,000 instead of \$5,000 as before resolved.

Resolved that Com. G. W. Borden, Starr and Sawyer be committee on schools.

Adjourned sine die.

WATERVILLE WAIFS.

Good Friday dawned upon us bright and clear, but considering the events of the day from a human standpoint, it was one of ill luck to some at least.

The programme commenced with three accidents. First the bright little boy Freddie, son of Mrs. Lovelace, fell from a scaffold in the barn and dislocated, or so said if not worn, his shoulder. Dr. Miller, diemore fortunately was in the village at the time and attended to the injuries of the little sufferer.

Shortly after a son of Mr. Hefewe, about the same age, while trying to step from a ear of wood to a pile, missed and fell, breaking his arm near the elbow so that danger is feared of his having a stiff arm. Dr. Middlemas was again fortunately on hand.

An Unconscious Prophecy of Heathendom.

THE MOST REMARKABLE COINCIDENCE IN ALL LITERATURE. THE COMING OF THE MESSIAH, ACCORDING TO THE OPINION OF MANY, PROPHECIED BY THE ROMAN POET VIRGIL ABOUT THE YEAR 40 B. C. IN HIS FOURTH BUCOLIC, MORE COMMONLY KNOWN AS "THE FOLLIO."

Before making any observations we will present a rough metrical translation of the whole poem.

Sicilian muses in divine strain, Inspire my song. The humble Tamarisk groves

Please not for aye, and through the sylvan scene

Yet numbers claim, allow my verse to sound

Meet music for a Roman consul's ear

The latest age of which the sybil sang

When rolling moons shall their course renew

Approach now. The virgin Justice comes

Saturian times return, and from the skies

Another race descends. Lucina pure

Prosper the infant's birth (3) with whom

Of iron terminates, and o'er the earth

The golden prime begins (4)—thy Phœbus reigns

In thy, O Pollio, thy consoling

This morning dawn, the glorious months go forth

Beneath thy leading every trace of crime

Falls powerless and frees the land from fear

The offspring of the gods shall live like them

And see divinely (9) and with godlike souls

Familiar mingle, and the peaceful world

With all his father's wisdom rule forever

To thee, O boy, the earth spontaneously pours

Her earliest gifts; the ivy's twining wreath,

The sweet Acanthus, and all flowers that bloom

The goats undriven to their homes—shall bring

Udders with milk o'eff-wing, (9) and the herds

Fear not the lion's roar. (10) For thee, O boy,

Fresh flowers yield their fragrance round thy bed,

The serpent dies, the poisonous plants expire

The Assyrian fields shall blossom everywhere

Yet still thou mayest praise ancestral deeds

But when thou knowest valor and shall hear

Of heroes, then the idly frowny field shall gleam

As glad with ripening ears of corn

The luscious grape depend from every brier

And dewy honey drip from rugged oaks

But yet some vestiges of ancient feud shall remain

11. I have sworn by myself; the word is given out of my mouth and shall not return; that unto me, etc. Isa. 45:23.

12. Sing, O Heavens! Be joyful, O Earth! And break forth into singing, O Mountains! For the Lord hath comforted his people. Isa. 49:13.

All readers will no doubt regard the close resemblance between the thoughts of the inspired prophet and those of the pagan poet as remarkable, and wonder how it happened. On this subject a great deal has been written by learned men; but no satisfactory conclusion has ever been reached.

Some of the theories however, might prove interesting to the curious reader. The poem was composed in the year 40, B. C., thus closely approaching the birth at Bethlehem. Whether Virgil refers in the poem to the son of the consul, Pollio himself, to whom the lines are dedicated, or whether the whole poem in form is strictly imaginary, that the child, already born, was none other than Augustus, and that Virgil here uses only the license of poetry to express his hopes of a golden age to follow the Peace of Brundisere, or whether the work be regarded as what Archbishop Trenc calls "the unconscious prophecies of heathendom," is a very interesting inquiry, and opens up a wide field for speculation.

The poem is commonly believed to have been taken, as far as the ideas go, from the prophecy of the Sibyl or Prophecia of Cumine (we meet her in the sixth book of the Æneid), referring to the birth of a child that shall become the moral regenerator of the world. The very intensity and glow of the delight with which Virgil sings the golden time, shows how he hoped for a Saviour of some kind to come and renovate the then putrefying world.

The import of some of the Sibylline prophecies as bearing up the truth of Christ's Incarnation was evidently recognized by Christians in early times, for the old hymn, "Dies Iræ," contains the following lines:

"Dies Iræ, die illa Solvit solum in favilla, Tostæ David cum Sibylla."

The new cycle of ages which the poet supposed to begin with the birth of the child, refers to the Platonic doctrine of an "Ævion Magnus," or great year.

This doctrine was that there were certain recurring periods at long intervals in which the history of the world repeated itself.

As regards the similarity of thought and language in this poem to the passages in Isaiah quoted above, another theory having the merest possibility may be advanced. The Septuagint edition of the old testament was published in Greek at Alexou, dia about 245, B. C., long before Virgil's poem was written. There is just a mere possibility that Virgil, who was an excellent Greek scholar, may have read the book of Isaiah in that language.

The Editor's Duties.

An exchange remarks: A newspaper man has no business to seek office. It is his business to try and get an office for the other fellow; it is sound the praise of the candidate and keep quiet his own feelings; and let him forget all about him when he is elected; to defend his candidate against the unjust attacks of the opposition; and see that whatever favors his candidate has to bestow goes to the other fellow. It is his business to boom the city for all it is worth, month after month, and then see \$100 worth of printing go out of the city because ten cents can be saved by doing so. It is the business of the newspaper man to give every enterprise a frequent "hand out," and then catch some because he had failed to record the fact that some prominent citizen had his delivery wagon painted.

To subscribe liberally to every public charitable entertainment, advertise them for nothing, pay his own way to everything, and then be called "prejudiced and mean spirited" because a column is not devoted to that particular affair.

The absence of tidings from the White Star steamship Naronic now twenty-four days out, recalls the names of some of the ocean steamers that have never been heard from after putting out from their ports of departure. There was the American steamship President, which sailed for this country from England in 1841, and disappeared forever, leaving no trace behind. The same fate overtook the steamship Pacific, which sailed from Liverpool for New York in February, 1856, and there was the City of Boston, which sailed from this country for Europe in 1870 and never reached her port, nor was anything ever heard of her. The Eric of the National Line, which sailed for Queenstown Dec. 27, 1869, was not seen afterward, and her fate remains a mystery. It is too soon yet to despair of the Naronic, but it is high time that something was learned from her if she is still afloat.—Boston Herald.

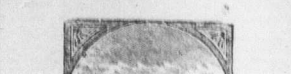
